	he meeting, the Administration was ested to:-	The Administration's written response:-
(a)	Provide information concerning financial investigations into illegal bookmaking activities	Where it is believed that financial assets are connected with illegal bookmaking activities, the Police will exercise the power under Organized and Serious Crimes Ordinance (OSCO) (Cap. 455) and undertake in-depth financial investigation with a view to restraining and subsequently confiscating such assets. This is a highly protracted process which requires a huge amount of resources in order to track down the movement of the assets and to identify individuals who have control over the same. Since 1998, financial investigation had been conducted in respect of 25 bookmaking cases which resulted in convictions for bookmaking related money laundering charges in the Courts. The aggregate amount involved was about \$2,500 million. Arising from these convictions, there was one confiscation order involving an amount of \$2.5 million.
(b)	Provide statistics concerning police involvement in illegal bookmaking activities	Between 2001 and 2005, a total of eight police officers had been arrested in connection with bookmaking, two of whom were subsequently charged and convicted in Court. The others were not prosecuted after seeking legal advice due to insufficient evidence. (NOTE: One subsequently had his conviction quashed upon appeal.)

		We would like to reiterate that the Police attaches great importance to the conduct and integrity of police officers. Any officers who are found involved in any illegal activities can expect to be dealt with in the most serious manner.
(c)	Together with the Hong Kong Jockey Club (HKJC), consider introducing financial incentives to encourage report and/or provision of intelligence on illegal bookmaking activities	This will be further explored with the HKJC.
(d)	Provide statistics on customers' complaints relating to the conduct of horse race betting	In 2004 and 2005, the Administration received no complaints relating to the conduct of horse race betting. (NOTE: The ambit of the Football Betting and Lotteries Commission does not cover horse race betting at present.)
(e)	Liaise with HKJC to provide the performance targets set by HKJC for staff involved in taking horse race bets	According to the HKJC, there is a set of performance appraisal system for all staff setting out the standards against which individual staff performance will be evaluated. For front-line betting staff these performance standards cover: punctuality and attendance; meeting service standards; handling customer requests; job knowledge; interpersonal relationships and teamwork; grooming and appearance; and being pro-active and cooperative at work. There are no other performance targets for individual front-line betting staff.
(f)	Consider a member's view that the voting members of HKJC should not be appointed to the Football Betting and Lotteries Commission	The voting members of HKJC would not be responsible for the day-to-day operation of the Club and management of assets. As such, we do not consider that appointing voting members of HKJC to the Football Betting and

	Lotteries Commission would cause a problem of conflict of interest.
	Having said this, we appreciate the member's concern in this aspect. We will take this into account when considering new appointments to the Commission.
(g) Together with HKJC, consider increasing resources for the prevention, counselling and treatment of problem gambling	The Administration will continue to implement measures to address gambling-related problems, including public education, prevention, counselling and treatment as well as other remedial services for problem and pathological gamblers. The estimated expenditure will be \$12 to \$15 million to be financed by the Ping Wo Fund. We will continue to enhance public understanding of the nature and risks of gambling activities and to increase public awareness of gambling-related problems, particularly amongst young people in the run-up to the World Cup 2006. We will commission organizations with experience in conducting school and youth education programmes to launch youth education campaigns in schools and districts to drive home the message of the adverse consequences of excessive gambling to young people. We note the request for the allocation of increased resources for the prevention, counselling and treatment of problem gambling. Together with HKJC, the Administration will carefully consider such requests in the light of the findings of the review of the effectiveness of the existing two gambling counselling and treatment centres.

If such information is not ready for the time being, please provide an undertaking that the Administration would consult the Panel on Home Affairs on the code of practice in due course;	Taking reference from the codes of practice relating to football betting and lotteries, a code of practice relating to the licensing conditions under the licence for horse race betting will be drawn up in consultation with the Hong Kong Jockey Club (HKJC) and the future Betting and Lotteries Commission. The code of practice shall cover, broadly, the following major areas: (a) Prevention of underage betting-
		(i) The licensee should display signs of reasonable size and clarity in its Premises and betting website to indicate that juveniles are not allowed to enter such Premises.
		(ii) The licensee should display signs of reasonable size and clarity in its Premises and betting website to indicate that juveniles are not allowed to place bets with the licensee.
		(iii) The licensee should adopt appropriate and practicable measures aiming at preventing juveniles from placing bets with the licensee, including the checking of the identification of any person whom it has reason to believe might be a juvenile.

	(iv) The licensee should not open any Internet or telephone betting accounts for juveniles and should require passwords from account holders to access such accounts and to place bets with the licensee.
	(b) Advertising or promotion activities not to target juveniles-
	(i) Without prejudice to the licensee's right to advertise or promote horse race betting in accordance with the Ordinance and the licence at its Premises or otherwise, the licensee should not advertise the conduct of horse race betting in, or in close proximity to, educational and training institutions for juveniles.
	(ii) The advertising and promotional activities or materials of the licensee shall not:
	 use individuals or cartoon figures who are, or reasonably appear to be, juveniles to promote horse race betting;
	- show juveniles participating in horse race betting;
	- be placed by the licensee

	in the media directed at juveniles;
	- be placed by the licensee at events organized for juveniles; and

	The advertising and promotional activities or materials of the licensee shall not:
	- be false or misleading about the chance of winning;
	- suggest that betting on horse racing is a form of financial investment;
	- present betting on horse racing as an alternative to employment;
	- suggest that betting on horse racing is a reasonable strategy for financial betterment;
	- promote reliance on betting on horse racing as a means of relieving a person's financial difficulties;

	- suggest that chances of winning increase the longer or more one plays; and
	- present winning as the most probable outcome.

	- information on the remedial services available in Hong Kong for problem and pathological gamblers including those financed by the Ping Wo Fund.
	(ii) The licensee should, upon request by its patrons, provide contact information about the remedial services available in Hong Kong for problem and pathological gamblers.
