I. Confirmation of minutes

The minutes of the meeting held on 26 September 2006 were confirmed.

II. Meeting with the Administration

[LC Paper Nos. CB(2)3156/05-06(01) - (03)]

2. The Bills Committee deliberated (Index of proceedings attached at the **Appendix**).

- 3. The Administration was requested to -
 - (a) ascertain whether aggravated offences and repeated offences were provided in animal laws in Singapore and Japan;
 - (b) advise the number of appeals lodged by the Administration concerning the fines imposed by the court for cruelty to animal offences (Annex C to LC Paper No. CB(2)3156/05-06(02));
 - (c) reconsider and advise the timeframe for reviewing the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Ordinance (Cap 169). Members considered the Administration's proposal of reporting the progress of its review to the relevant Panel in around one year unacceptable; and
 - (d) in the review of Cap 169, consider regulating the operation of animals crematoria and the recommendations made by the Animal Welfare Advisory Group.

- 4. <u>Members</u> agreed to refer the subjects of regulating animal crematoria and treatment of stray cattle and buffaloes to the relevant Panels for discussion.
- 5. <u>Members</u> agreed unanimously that amendments should be made to the Bill to provide for heavier penalties to enhance the deterrent effect against acts of cruelty to animals. It was proposed that -
 - (a) aggravated offences be provided in the Bill and the penalty for which should be a maximum fine of \$250,000 and imprisonment for 3 years; and
 - (b) correspondingly, aggravated offences with heavier penalties be provided in the Regulations.

6. <u>Members</u> also agreed that subject to further views of members, the above proposals would be forwarded to the Administration for consideration. In the event that the Administration did not take on board members' proposals, the Chairman, on behalf of the Bills Committee, would move amendments to the Bill.
