## I. Briefing by the Administration on the Regulation

<u>Principal Assistant Secretary (Food & Environmental Hygiene)1</u> briefed the Subcommittee on the Amendment Regulation which sought to amend the Principal Regulations to the effect that the licence fee for keeping not more than 20 animals/birds was \$2,720 and for keeping more than 20 animals/birds was \$9,700. The fees were calculated on the principle of full cost-recovery.

### II. Meeting with deputations and the Administration

- 3. The Administration was requested to consider the following requests and revert to the Subcommittee at the next meeting
  - (a) to undertake a study on the regulatory regime for racing pigeon activity in countries/places which had an outbreak of avian influenza and report

the outcome to the Panel on Food Safety and Environmental Hygiene for follow-up in due course; and

- (b) to consider whether the licence fees proposed under the Amendment Regulation could be reduced.
- 4. Pending deliberation of the Amendment Regulation by members, the Administration was requested to consider deferring the deadline for payment of licence fees by successful applicants.

(*Post-meeting note*: The Administration's response was issued to members vide LC Paper No. CB(2)67/06-07(01) on 13 October 2006.)

5. The Subcommittee agreed that the next meeting would be held on 9 October 2006 at 2:30 pm. The Subcommittee also agreed that the scrutiny period of the Amendment Regulation should be extended from 18 October 2006 to 8 November 2006.

		Response of the Administration –  (a) the threshold of 20 was stipulated in the Public Health (Animals and Birds) (Licensing of Livestock Keeping) Regulation (Cap. 139 sub. leg.L) and the Waste Disposal Ordinance (Cap. 354). A person keeping not more than 20 poultry was not required to obtain a licence. Total banning of backyard poultry keeping including pigeons was in operation since 13 February 2006 to reduce the risk of avian influenza outbreak;
