#### Reply:

Before January 2007, the Hong Kong Sports Institute Limited (HKSIL) was based in Yuen Wo Road in Sha Tin. HKSIL could generate income from its operations of a club membership scheme, a restaurant and a sports shop at its complex, renting out of carparks and facilities, and organising community sports training programmes to the public.

Since 2 January 2007, the headquarters of HKSIL, including the core administrative functions and supporting facilities for the elite athletes, have been temporarily relocated to the YMCA Wu Kwai Sha Youth Village (WKSYV) in Ma On Shan. The HKSIL considered that the facilities at the WKSYV available to HKSIL would not allow it to continue running its previous range of incomegenerating activities. Accordingly, HKSIL estimated that its income generated from commercial activities would decrease from \$15.6 million in 2006 to \$2.9 million in 2007.

Separately, HKSIL estimated that sponsorship and donation income would decrease from \$4.0 million in 2006 to \$1.9 million in 2007 mainly because of the cessation of a sponsorship programme in 2007, which was entered into by the then Hong Kong Sports Development Board in 2004 for a three-year period only.

#### Reply:

In 2006-07, the revised estimate has increased to \$84.1 million, which is \$46.2 million higher than the original estimate at \$37.9 million. The increase is attributable to a one-off injection of \$40 million into the sports portion of the Arts and Sport Development Fund and an additional provision of \$6.2 million associated with the implementation of recreation and sports initiatives in the year. The one-off injection into the sports portion of the Arts and Sport Development Fund would provide a more re-assuring and steady source of funding support as our athletes are intensifying their training for the 2008 Beijing Olympics and the 2009 East Asian Games to be hosted by Hong Kong.

In 2007-08, we will proceed to the next stage of planning which would include refining the scope and range of facilities for the MPSC, and examining the technical and interfacing issues in relation to the infrastructural development at Kai Tak.

Since 2005-06, the Administration has spent about \$1.68 million in three consultancy studies to, respectively, examine the need for a MPSC in Hong Kong, define the initial requirements, and examine the financial case for the proposed MPSC. In 2007-08, the Administration has set aside \$2 million to conduct further studies as necessary for planning the development of the MPSC at Kai Tak.

(a) At present, the Hong Kong Sports Institute Limited (HKSIL) does not have any specific subsidised projects for the training of elite athletes. Instead, the HKSIL provides subsistence grant to elite athletes mainly through three funding sources that it administers, namely, monthly stipends, Sports Aid Foundation Fund (SAFF), and Sports Aid for the Disabled Fund (SADF) which caters for the disabled athletes.

- (c) whether non-government organisations and universities will be provided with funds to carry out study programmes on built heritage conservation as well as publicity and education activities?
- (d) whether the Government will conduct such review regularly? If yes, how often will they be conducted?

Reply:

#### Reply to (a), (b) and (d):

We are conducting a review on the built heritage conservation policy with a view to formulating a holistic approach and effective improvement measures to enhance built heritage conservation work. In February 2004, we launched a three-month public consultation on the policy review. Specifically, the public was invited to express views on three broad questions, namely "what should we conserve"; "how do we conserve", and "how much and who should pay". A total of 150 written submissions with some 500 views were received. A clear consensus on the above three fundamental questions had yet to emerge. We reported the results to the Legislative Council Panel on Home Affairs in November 2004.

Taking into account the views received, we reviewed and developed a new set of criteria for assessing the heritage value of historical buildings from December 2004<sup>Note</sup>. From March 2005, an expert assessment panel under the Antiquities Advisory Board (AAB) has been conducting a heritage survey of some 1 400 historic buildings selected from around 8 800 buildings with more than 50 years of age in Hong Kong. The survey results will be considered by the AAB with a view to selecting buildings for declaration or grading. This will also provide a basis for the AAB to consider whether and how the current assessment and grading mechanism would need to be reformed. We have also examined other improvement measures since the consultation in 2004. More concrete policy proposals have yet to be finalised due to the complexity of the subject.

In response to the recent growing public concern over built heritage conservation, we consider it necessary to provide the community with yet another opportunity to understand our current policy and measures, and to further gauge public views on what and how to conserve our built heritage before we finalise the policy review. We organised seven public forums in January and February 2007. We would be attending meetings of the 18 District Councils in the coming months. We have also been making use of other channels, including radio and television programmes, website forum and e-mail, to disseminate information and collect public views. Moreover, we are planning to conduct a telephone opinion survey on the general population regarding built heritage conservation. Subject to the results of this round of public engagement, we expect to be able to announce the proposals and measures on built heritage conservation in the latter half of 2007.

Note: The new assessment criteria to determine the heritage value cover a wide range of areas, including historical interest, architectural merit, rarity, group value, social value, collective memory and authenticity.

#### Reply to (c):

The Lord Wilson Heritage Trust, established in 1992, provides funding support to assist community organisations and individuals to undertake heritage related activities and research projects. The Antiquities and Monuments Office under the Leisure and Cultural Services Department would also engage organisations and professionals for conducting assessment and research projects on built heritage and organising educational and promotional activities to enhance public awareness and understanding of the subject.

#### Question:

According to the Budget, there are 136 civic education projects sponsored under the Community Participation Scheme in 2006 and they are used as an indicator of key performance measure under Programme (2) "Rights of the Individual". The Introduction to the Community Participation Scheme 2006-07 stated that the Committee on the Promotion of Civic Education (CPCE) would sponsor projects promoting the theme of "Harmony and Integration" and put aside resources for the promotion of human rights education, upholding the rule of law and social justice, national education and the Basic This shows that "human rights education" is only one of the themes of the Scheme. Referring to the sponsored projects on "human rights education", only two have included the wordings of "human rights" in their themes according to the list of sponsored projects on CPCE's webpages. However, all the 136 sponsored projects, including those promotion the theme of "Harmony and Integration", are used as an indicator of performance measure of the Programme "Rights of the Individual" in the Estimates. Would the Administration inform this Committee of the following:

- (a) How many applications seeking to promote the theme of "human rights education" were received by CPCE under the Community Participation Scheme in 2006-07? How many were approved? What was the total amount of subsidy? What were the corresponding figures for projects on the other themes, such as upholding the rule of law and social justice, national education and promotion of the Basic Law, and what were the corresponding figures for all the projects under the Scheme?
- (b) What is the respective amount of provisions set aside for the promotion of human rights education, upholding the rule of law and social justice, national education and the Basic Law under the Community Participation Scheme in 2007-08? Of the 30.2% increase in estimated expenditure in 2007-08, how much will be used for promoting "human rights education"?

#### Reply:

(a) In 2006-07 we had sponsored 136 civic education projects at \$3.21 million<sup>1</sup> under the Community Participation Scheme by the Committee on the Promotion of Civic Education (CPCE) as follows -

Note 1: Of the 136 projects, 75 were funded by charity donations from the Board of Management of the Chinese Permanent Cemeteries (BMCPC) with a total sponsorship of 1.75 million.

(b) In 2007-08, the Home Affairs Bureau will sponsor community organisations under the Community Participation Scheme (CPS) to carry out civic education activities for the promotion of a major topical theme - "Harmonious Community" and certain core civic values, including human rights education, upholding social justice and the rule of law, national education, promotion of the Basic Law and other specific topics relating to civic education at the district level. The number of sponsored projects on each theme will depend on the number of applications and the quality of the proposals. Applications are assessed on individual merits on the advice of a designated working group under the CPCE. The major consideration is whether the proposed activity could effectively promote the major topical theme, taking into account its contents, objectives, values and philosophy, creativity, target groups, number of beneficiaries, self-assessment performance indicators and cost-effectiveness. The estimated expenditure for the CPS in 2007-08 is \$5.5M, including donations from the BMCPC.

The 30.2% increase for the programme of rights of the individual is mainly due to the increased provision for the promotion of equal opportunities, human rights and increased cash flow requirements for non-recurrent projects (e.g. the Hong Kong Harmonious Family Drive and the International Association for Community Development Hong Kong Conference). As far as human rights education is concerned, part of the resources will be used for sponsorship for community organizations, educational materials, perception survey and seminar. The provision will depend on the number of funding applications, quality of the proposals and work plan of the CPCE.

#### Question:

According to the Brief Description of the Home Affairs Bureau (HAB) in the Estimate, HAB promotes equal opportunities on grounds of gender, family status, race and sexual orientation. Matters on sexual and family status discrimination are handled by the Equal Opportunities Commission, while race discrimination and sexual orientation issues are handled by the Race Relations Unit and the Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation Unit of HAB respectively. The two Units have set up hotlines for enquiries and complaints. However, only the "number of enquiries/complaints on race relations handled" is included as indicator of "the key performance measure" in the Estimate. Would the Administration please inform the Committee of the following:

- (a) Why is the number of enquiries/complaints on gender identity or sexual orientation handled not included as indicator of "the key performance measure"?
- (b) What were the numbers of enquiries/complaints on gender identity or sexual orientation handled in 2005 and 2006? What is the estimated number in 2007-08?
- (c) Will the number of enquiries/complaints on gender identity or sexual orientation handled be included as indicator of "the key performance measure" in the 2007-08 Estimate?
- (d) Will the number of funded projects under the Equal Opportunities (Sexual Orientation) Funding Scheme and the Equal Opportunities (Race) Funding Scheme be included as indicator of "the key performance measure" in the 2007-08 Estimate?

#### Reply:

(a) We note that while there were only a few complaints relating to sexual orientation and gender identity in the past two years, the number of enquiries varies significantly. A large number of such enquiries had been triggered by individual events concerning homosexuality. For example, among the 1 772 enquiries received in 2006, 1 564 were emails requesting legislation against discrimination on the ground of sexual orientation sent by one campaign organisation. Hence, we do not consider it appropriate to include the number of enquiries/complaints on sexual orientation and gender identity as a key performance indicator at this stage.

(b) The number of complaints and enquiries handled by the Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation Unit in 2005 and 2006 are as follows:-

Year	Number of Enquiries	Number of Complaints

2006	1 772 <sup>2</sup>	2

- 1. The Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation Unit hotline service commenced on 7 July 2005.
- 2. Included 1 564 emails requesting legislation against discrimination on the ground of sexual orientation sent by one campaign organization in September 2006.

We estimate that the number of complaints to be received in 2007-08 would be similar to those in the past two years. On the number of enquiries, we do not consider it appropriate to provide an estimate in view of the significant fluctuations in the past two years.

- (c) As explained in (a) above, we do not consider it appropriate to include the number of enquiries/complaints on sexual orientation and gender identity as a key performance indicator in 2007-08. Nevertheless, statistics on the number of enquiries/complaints on sexual orientation and gender identity will continue to be released quarterly on the website of the Home Affairs Bureau.
- (d) At present, names of the projects and the successful applicants under the Equal Opportunities (Sexual Orientation) Funding Scheme and the Equal Opportunities (Race) Funding Scheme are already available on the Bureau's website. We will seriously consider whether the number of funded projects under these two Schemes could be included as indicator of our "key performance measure" in future Estimates.

### Reply:

(a) The \$500,000 earmarked for non-governmental organizations and sexual minority groups to conduct worthwhile projects to promote equal opportunities for people of different sexual orientations is an estimate based on the number of applications received and the quality of the projects concerned in 2006-07 (In 2006-07, we granted about \$540,000 to sponsor 11 projects under the Equal Opportunities (Sexual Orientation) Funding Scheme). We will continue to keep the position under review and consider whether there is a need to revise the funding allocation to this Scheme in light of the experience gained in the 2007-08 exercise in examining funding applications from NGOs/sexual minority groups.

- (b) In 2006-07, we conducted the following publicity and educational programmes to promote equal opportunities for people of different sexual orientations:-
  - organization of an Equal Opportunities (Sexual Orientation) Awareness Day on 14 January 2006 at Kowloon Park to promote equal opportunities for people of different sexual orientations with participation of sexual minority groups and non-governmental organizations.
  - launching of poster campaigns in MTR and/or KCR in 2006 and 2007 to promote the awareness of the Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation Unit under Home Affairs Bureau and its hotline.
  - sponsorship for 11 projects under the Equal Opportunities (Sexual Orientation) Funding Scheme 2006-07, including dramas, exhibitions, school talks, conferences, camps, song composer competition, reports and researches.

The Administration expressed that it would continue to conduct public education on gambling-related problems, to provide counselling and treatment services for the problem and pathological gamblers, and to carry out studies on the impact of gambling. Can the Administration provide information on:

- (a) the Administration's estimated expenditure on public education on gambling-related problems in 2007-08?

- (c) whether the Administration has any plans to increase resources provided to the existing gambling counselling centres?
- (d) whether the Administration has any plans to set up centres in remote areas (e.g. Tung Chung or the North Territories) to handle gambling-related problems?

#### Reply:

- (a) In 2007-08, we will continue to implement measures to address gambling-related problems, including prevention, counselling and treatment as well as other remedial services for problem and pathological gamblers. We plan to launch campaigns in schools and districts to educate the youths on the adverse consequences of gambling. We will also launch a new series of public education programme, including production of new posters, banners and, TV and radio Announcements in Public Interests to alert the public on gambling-related problems, as well as to remind them not to take part in any illegal gambling activities. We have yet to firm up the detailed budget but these programmes will be financed from the Ping Wo Fund (the Fund) which the Government set up in 2003 to finance preventive and remedial measures to address gambling-related problems.
- (b) The estimated expenditure in 2007-08 for commissioning the non-Governmental organizations in operating a total of four pilot counseling and treatment centres for problem and pathological gamblers is around \$10M. The expenditure will be met from the Fund.

(c) and (d) We plan to review in 2008 the effectiveness of the four pilot centres in (b) above and then decide on the way forward having regard to the review findings and advice from the Ping Wo Fund Advisory Committee.

### Reply:

To promote the concept of equal pay for work of equal value (EPEV) in the context of gender equality, the Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC) will develop guidelines on EPEV for reference by employers and employees. The guidelines aim to enhance understanding on the principles of EPEV in relation to Hong Kong's anti-discrimination legislations and to recommend tools and good employment practices to help prevent systemic wage discrimination on the ground of sex. The guidelines will be completed by end 2007. The EOC will organize seminars for stakeholders and launch other publicity campaigns to promote the guidelines. While a part-time consultant has been engaged to develop the guidelines, the additional work arising from the promotion of the concept of EPEV will mainly be absorbed by EOC's existing resources. In 2007-08, the estimated expenditure in connection with the promotion of the concept of EPEV is about \$700,000.

# **Question**:

Regarding the key performance measures for Hong Kong Arts Development Council (HKADC), the Administration states that previous indicators "promotion programmes for arts education" and "international cultural exchange activities" have been removed because the figures have been reflected in the indicators on all grant schemes, proactive projects and partnership projects. Would the Administration please inform the Committee of the following:

- (a) Is it a prerequisite for the arts groups to take part in the grant schemes, proactive projects and partnership projects to apply for grants for "promotion programmes for arts education" and "international cultural exchange activities"?
- (b) Some arts groups indicated that they had been impeded from obtaining funding to gain experience from and exchange with overseas arts groups. They said that the theatres did not have sufficient time to grasp the different contents and guidelines of the yearly proactive projects. What remedial measures will the Administration take to address this problem?
- (c) Regarding the indicators for "three-year grant", how will the Administration ensure that the assessment mechanism is fair, open and impartial?

#### Reply:

(a) The previous indicators "promotion programmes for arts education" and "international cultural exchanges activities" are removed to rationalise the presentation format to avoid double-counting the same activity by their nature as well as by the grant scheme to which they apply. The change is only a matter of presentation and does not involve any change to the level of support for activities on art promotion and international cultural exchange. As before, funding applications for "promotion programmes for arts education" and "international cultural exchanges activities" come under the Hong Kong Arts Development Council (HKADC) Project Grant Scheme.

- (b) For overseas cultural exchange, artists/arts groups may apply for funding support under the HKADC Project Grant Scheme, the applications for which are invited twice a year. Application guidelines are available from the HKADC. In addition, the Arts Development Fund administered by the Home Affairs Bureau also supports cultural exchange projects. Application guidelines are available from the Home Affairs Bureau and applications can be made throughout the year.
- (c) HKADC used to invite applications for three-year grants once every three years. Applications for grant are assessed on a competitive basis. To ensure that the assessment mechanism is fair, open and impartial, the HKADC used to invite external experts to assist Council members to assess the funding proposals. Detailed guidelines are given to Council members, external experts and staff to avoid conflict of interest. A review system is in place to ensure fairness in the assessment process. With effect from 1 April 2007, the funding responsibility for the incumbent HKADC three-year grantees will be transferred to the Home Affairs Bureau along with the transfer of funding responsibility for four major performing arts groups from LCSD to HAB. This is to implement the Committee on Performing Arts's recommendation aimed at developing a new set of funding assessment criteria and a new funding mechanism in 2009 conducive to a more vibrant and robust performing arts sector.

### Reply:

Of the \$55.4 million estimated under Programme (7), \$20.9 million will be spent on personal emoluments and \$34.5 million will be used for departmental/non-recurrent expenses on initiatives such as the Asia Cultural Cooperation Forum, promotional activities for cultural and creative industries, and the outstanding payment for engaging a financial advisor for the West Kowloon Cultural District project.

We do not have specific funding earmarked under Head 53 for the installation of public art or for conducting research studies on the best use of public space for the display of public art and sustainable development.

The promotion of public art in public space is under the remit of the Art Promotion Office of the Leisure and Cultural Services Department. The Art Promotion Office has a dedicated budget in 2007-08 to commission new public art works in public space and on public transport.

The Hong Kong Arts Development Council (HKADC) also supports the development of public art through providing funding support for visual and media arts projects with public art elements. The Council itself staged an outdoor interactive media arts exhibition in 2006 and conducted the Public Art Research in 2003. HKADC is planning another outdoor media arts project for 2007.

# Reply:

- (1) In 2007-08, the Home Affairs Bureau will continue to promote the rights of children through the Children's Rights Unit (CRU) and the Children Rights' Forum (CRF). The CRF was set up in 2005 to provide a platform for children's rights organizations and children's representatives to exchange views with the Government on children's rights. In addition, we will continue to provide funding support to community projects, e.g. the Children's Rights Education Funding Scheme. The total estimated expenditure on promoting children's rights in 2007-08 is about \$960,000.
- (2) The Government will continue to implement the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child ("the Convention") through the various bureaux/departments and seek views from relevant advisory boards/committees and stakeholders as appropriate. For Government policies that straddle more than one bureau, there are established arrangements and mechanisms for coordination amongst them. The above arrangements are conducive to flexible and swift responses by the Government to meet the changing needs and concerns of the community, and have been working effectively.

In his Policy Address in 2006, the Chief Executive indicated that the Government would seriously study whether we should set up an integrated, holistic and high-level Family Commission responsible for policies and initiatives relating to family support. The mechanism for handling issues concerning different gender and age groups including children will be examined in the process. The study has already commenced and is expected to be finished by mid-2007.

The responsibilities of the Bureau under Programme (4) District and Community Relations are to:

- (a) formulate and develop policy in respect of the District Administration Scheme; the community building programme; building management; gambling; wills; advisory and statutory bodies; licensing of hotels, guesthouses, clubs and bedspace apartments; design of postage stamps; and opinion gauging;
- (b) oversee the management of Chinese temples and Chinese permanent cemeteries; administration of trust funds for which the trustee is The Secretary for Home Affairs Incorporated; and management of the properties of The Secretary for Home Affairs Incorporated;
- (c) co-ordinate major celebration activities;
- (d) undertake housekeeping functions for the Home Affairs Department; and
- (e) oversee the policy and resources allocation on community development work.

We do not have any plans to create additional District Officer posts for the Islands District nor to establish a District Office on the Lantau Island. Indeed, any such manpower enhancement proposals should be considered and where justified resourced under Home Affairs Department's Head of Expenditure.

# **Question**:

Since the ordinance on regulation of football betting came into effect, studies have shown that there is a rising trend of Hong Kong people's participation in gambling, in particular the youths and women. Can the Administration provide information on how much of the resources allocated in 2007-08 will be devoted to forestall the rising tendency, and to provide assistance to the pathological gamblers? (please list out the proposed measures and the evaluative strategies in detail)

### Reply:

The "Study on Hong Kong People's Participation in Gambling Activities" by a university in 2005 provided us with a useful and comprehensive set of updated statistics on Hong Kong people's participation in gambling activities. Comparing findings of this study with those in an earlier study conducted in 2001, we note that the overall participation rate in gambling remained stable, but there was a decline in the overall participation rate in illegal gambling activities. We could possibly attribute this to our success in diverting the significant demand for football betting, previously met by illegal channels, to authorized channels introduced in 2003.

In 2007-08, we will continue to implement measures to address gambling-related problems, including prevention, counselling and treatment as well as other remedial services for problem and pathological gamblers. We plan to launch campaigns in schools and districts to educate the youth on the adverse consequences of gambling. We will also launch a new series of public education programme, including production of new posters, banners and TV and radio Announcements in Public Interests to alert the public on gambling-related problems, as well as to remind them not to take part in any illegal gambling activities. To provide better assistance to the problem and pathological gamblers, we have commissioned two non-governmental organizations to operate two small-scale gambling counselling centres from 2007 to 2008 on pilot basis, in addition to the two large scale pilot centres which have been in operation since 2003. The two new pilot centres will adopt a community-based approach, and focus particularly on gambling problems in connection with youth, ethnic minority, women and elderly.

All of the above programmes will be financed from the Ping Wo Fund (the Fund) which the Government set up in 2003 to finance preventive and remedial measures to address gambling-related problems. The estimated expenditure on the four pilot counselling centres will amount to about \$10 million for the year 2007-08. The Home Affairs Bureau (HAB) plans to review in 2008 the effectiveness of the four centres so as to decide on the way forward.

Generally speaking, funding provided under Programme 6 - "Recreation, Sport and Entertainment Licensing" is for the HAB to implement the policy initiatives to promote the development of recreation and sport in Hong Kong on all fronts, to serve the Sports Commission and its various committees, to support the work of the Sports Federation and Olympic Committee of Hong Kong, China and to provide a business-friendly and effective regulatory regime in respect of various types of places of public entertainment. Direct expenditure on support for athletes is accounted for under the Hong Kong Sports Institute Limited (HKSIL) included in Programme 8 – "Subvention: Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts, Hong Kong Arts Development Council, Hong Kong Sports Institute Limited and Subvention for Major Performing Arts Groups".

We plan to launch campaigns in schools and districts to educate the youths on the adverse consequences of gambling. We will also launch a new series of public education programme, including production of new posters, banners and, TV and radio Announcements in Public Interests to alert the public on gambling-related problems, as well as to remind them not to take part in any illegal gambling activities. We have yet to firm up the detailed budget but these programmes will be financed from the Ping Wo Fund (the Fund) which the Government set up in 2003 to finance preventive and remedial measures to address gambling-related problems. In 2006-07, the Fund supported these programmes at a total cost of \$12 million. We expect that similar resources will be made available in 2007-08.

The Fund financed a survey in 2005 on "the Study on Hong Kong People's Participation in Gambling Activities", which was a follow-up survey of an identical study conducted in 2001. The findings of the 2005 survey showed that the overall participation in gambling activities (78% in 2001 and 80% in 2005) and the overall percentage of problem and pathological gamblers (5.8% in 2001 and 5.3% in 2005) remained stable. Overall participation in illegal gambling activities dropped from 4.2% in 2001 to 2.1% in 2005.

The various research and studies helped us to better understand the extent of problem and pathological gambling in the community; draw up suitable gambling policies and conduct public education programmes on gambling-related problems; review current programmes; and plan new measures to address the needs of the community, particularly problem and pathological gamblers and their families.

For example, in 2005 we commissioned a university to conduct a study to review the effectiveness of the programmes provided by the two counselling centres dedicated for problem and pathological gamblers. The findings of the review suggested that the existing services provided by the two pilot counselling centres were effective and should be extended for another two years. The review also proposed to set up two smaller-scale counselling centres, using a community-based approach to target specific social groups. Following the study's recommendations, the Home Affairs Bureau, with funding from the Ping Wo Fund (set up by the Government in 2003 to address gambling-related problems), extended the operation of the two pilot centres and commissioned two non-governmental organizations to operate two new and smaller-scale gambling counselling centres to provide counselling and treatment services for the community, particularly the youth, ethnic minority, women and elderly sector. In sum, the study provided useful reference for the Government in considering the service modes in future.

#### Reply:

The Chinese Temples Committee (CTC) commenced a pilot scheme in managing the Hau Wong Temple (HWT) at Junction Road in May 2006. Instead of tendering out the management of the temple, which is the conventional arrangement for other temples under the CTC, the CTC manages the HWT directly. Under the pilot scheme, CTC has made various efforts to promote the HWT as a community focal point and to enhance the public's appreciation of the temple's cultural and heritage value. These include the introduction of docent service and organisation of various programmes and thematic exhibitions in the temple involving the local community.

The CTC is closely monitoring the operation of the HWT, and will consider whether the same mode of operation should be extended to other CTC temples in the light of the experience of the pilot scheme.

The estimated expenditure for implementing the pilot scheme is \$1M for the year of 2007-08, which will be paid from the CTC's own resources. The CTC is a financially independent body. It does not receive any subvention from the Government.

The Home Affairs Bureau (HAB) operates a "Community Participation Scheme for Organizing Study Tours to the Mainland" (the Scheme) through the Commission on Youth (COY), an advisory body to Government on youth matters, to sponsor study tours to the Mainland for young people. The estimated allocation for the Scheme in 2007-08 is about \$10M which is funded by the Administration and charity donations from the Board of Management of the Chinese Permanent Cemeteries.

The COY will invite applications for sponsorship from non-governmental organizations at the beginning of the calendar year. Applications will be assessed against a set of criteria (e.g. the contents, creativity, cost-effectiveness) as stipulated in the application form. The maximum sponsorship for each project or the total sponsorship for all the projects organized by different subgroups under a single organization shall not exceed \$200,000. Maximum sponsorhip for proposed two-way exchange programme is \$300,000. Upon completion of the projects, the organizations are required to submit a project report with details on the actual expenses to HAB for reimbursement purpose.

In 2007-08, we will implement the relevant initiatives by phases with the necessary additional funding resources. Such funding will all be for direct benefits of elite athletes. The Cantonese Opera Advisory Committee was set up in May 2004 to advise the Government on the promotion, preservation, study and development of Cantonese opera. The Committee initiated the establishment of the Cantonese Opera Development Fund (the Fund) to support programmes and events aimed at research into, promotion and continuous development of this art form.

Since the establishment of the Fund in November 2005, more than \$20 million has been raised from the community. In 2007-08, the Fund will set aside \$6 million to support the establishment of up to two new talent Cantonese opera troupes for a period of three years. Another \$6 million will be set aside to fund the year round applications for support to Cantonese opera performances, training and research, as well as educational and promotional activities.

Apart from the Fund, the Hong Kong Arts Development Council plans to use about \$7.9 million to support projects related to Cantonese opera and the Leisure and Cultural Services Department plans to set aside \$15 million to present and sponsor more than 300 sessions of Cantonese opera programmes. The Administration will also provide additional recurrent funding of \$5.4 million to the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts in support of its Cantonese opera programmes.

In the 2007-08 financial year, the total amount of resources (both the Government and the Fund) earmarked for developing Cantonese opera will be around \$40.3 million.

- (a) The recurrent subvention for the HKSIL for elite training is about \$100 million per annum. In 2006-07, the provision for HKSIL has included an additional one-off funding allocation of \$74.3 million for the purpose of enhancing elite athletes training in anticipation of the coming major events.
  - Discounting this one-off grant, the provision for HKSIL in 2007-08 represents an increase of \$20 million. This is part of the allocation of additional recurrent expenditure of \$40 million announced in the Chief Executive's 2006-07 Policy Address to provide enhanced support for elite athletes in order to encourage and nurture more talented young people and disabled athletes to pursue a career in sports.
- (b) Reduced Subvention to HKADC in 2007-08 is the result of a cost-neutral transfer of \$41.09 million to Home Affairs Bureau (HAB) to implement the Committee on Performing Arts' recommendation that subvention to the four major performing arts companies currently funded by the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) and the six major performing arts groups funded by the HKADC should be unified under HAB.

This reduction in 2007-08 is partly offset by an increase of \$10 million in recurrent subvention to HKADC to support budding artists and small/medium arts groups.

Before January 2007, the Hong Kong Sports Institute Limited (HKSIL) was based in Yuen Wo Road in Sha Tin. HKSIL could generate income from its operations of a club membership scheme, a restaurant and a sports shop at its complex, renting out of carparks and facilities, and organising community sports training programmes to the public.

Since 2 January 2007, the headquarters of HKSIL, including the core administrative functions and supporting facilities for the elite athletes, have been temporarily relocated to the YMCA Wu Kwai Sha Youth Village (WKSYV) in Ma On Shan. The HKSIL considered that the facilities at the WKSYV available to HKSIL would not allow it to continue running its previous range of incomegenerating activities. Accordingly, HKSIL estimated that its income generated from commercial activities would decrease from \$15.6 million in 2006 to \$2.9 million in 2007.

Separately, HKSIL estimated that sponsorship and donation income would decrease from \$4.0 million in 2006 to \$1.9 million in 2007 mainly because of the cessation of a sponsorship programme in 2007, which was entered into by the then Hong Kong Sports Development Board in 2004 for a three-year period only.

Separately, the EOC has eight temporary staff to cope with additional workload in investigation works and provision of information technology support.

As for the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data, the current number of staff and the establishment are 32 and 39 respectively, of which three staff have emoluments equivalent to or above the minimum salary point of the Government directorate pay scale. Apart from employing 32 staff members on agreement terms, PCPD also employs 21 staff on temporary terms due to the following reasons:

- a) to cope with surge in workload;
- b) to expedite actions on outstanding cases; and
- c) adoption of an appointment policy to require new recruits to be initially appointed on temporary terms for assessment of the staff's suitability for the job.

This was preceded by a full public consultation on legislating against racial discrimination in 2004-05. A breakdown of expenditure is as follows –

The Race Relations Unit of the Home Affairs Bureau has a total of four officers who are deployed, among their other duties, for handling enquiries and complaints on race relations.

In 2006, the Unit handled a total of 439 cases. Of these, 421 were enquiries for information and 18 were complaints alleging racial discrimination. Of the 18 complaint cases, 16 have been resolved and the remaining two cases are presently under investigation. The key areas of complaint were as follows:

In 2006, the Equal Opportunities Commission has initiated investigation of its own accord into 59 incidents of alleged discrimination largely due to media reports on issues which might have contravened the three anti-discrimination ordinances or upon receipt of information from informants who were unwilling to lodge a formal complaint. 22 of them were related to sex discrimination and 37 were on disability discrimination. In terms of the subject matters of the cases, 3 investigations were on discriminatory advertisement, 13 on recruitment, 20 on access to premises, 23 on provision of goods, services, facilities and others.

Apart from handling complaint cases, the EOC also initiated investigation of its own accord to follow-up media reports on incidents which may have contravened the existing anti-discrimination ordinances and information provided by informants who are unwilling to lodge a formal complaint. Among such cases handled by the EOC in 2006, 43 cases were successfully resolved through conciliation, of which, 19 were related to SDO and 24 to DDO.

The Operations Division, consisting of 1 Director, 2 Chief Officers, 4 Senior Officers, 3 Officers and 6 Assistant Officers at present, is responsible for handling all enquiries and complaints. Its total staff cost incurred in 2006 was \$10.79M. As the Division is responsible for handling both enquiries and complaints and undertaking investigations into all complaints received, the EOC does not have separate cost estimates for cases resolved through conciliation.

The Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC) commenced the "Formal Investigation on Accessibility in certain Publicly Accessible Premises" in December 2006. The purpose of the investigation is to inspect a selection of premises built, owned or managed by Housing Authority, Housing Society, the Link Management Ltd, and the Government with specific reference to the legal requirement of providing accessible facilities to persons with a disability in a non-discriminatory manner, and to promote equality of opportunity between persons with disability and persons without a disability. The investigation includes the inspection of 60 selected sites, identifying difficulties encountered by persons with a disability, evaluating how the requirement of non-discriminatory accessibility has been achieved in such buildings, identifying improvement works required, etc. The investigation, which will last for 12 months' time, is expected to be completed by end of 2007. An initial budget of \$500,000 has been earmarked by EOC for the project.

In 2006, the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data (PCPD) initiated a total of 79 compliance checks on cases of suspected contravention of the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance (the Ordinance) in the following areas:

- (a) unfair and/or excessive collection of personal data in various situations;
- (b) failure to provide personal information collection statement when collecting personal data; and
- (c) security of personal data.

These checks were conducted:

- (a) in response to press reports on acts or practices related to personal data which might contravene a requirement under the Ordinance;
- (b) to follow up on suspected violation of the Ordinance lodged with PCPD by the public; or
- (c) suspected violation of the Ordinance that came to the attention of the PCPD in processing complaint cases.

In response to my question in 2006, the Administration indicated that following the announcement to discontinue the Invitation for Proposals process of the West Kowloon Cultural District (WKCD) project on 21 February 2006, the need for the three supernumerary directorate posts to perform the relevant duties would be under review. ### Reply:

- (a) The three supernumerary directorate posts were originally planned for creation under Head 138: Housing, Planning and Lands Bureau (HPLB) in 2006-07. Following the discontinuation of the Invitation for Proposals process in early 2006 and the subsequent transfer of policy responsibility of the WKCD project from HPLB to Home Affairs Bureau (HAB), these posts had not been created in HPLB.
- (b) In April 2006, a dedicated secretariat was created in HAB to provide the necessary support to the Consultative Committee on the Core Arts and Cultural Facilities (CACF) of the West Kowloon Cultural District (the Consultative Committee) and its three Advisory Groups. The secretariat was set up through internal re-deployment of manpower resources within HAB and staff on loan from other Bureaux and Departments. At present, the secretariat has a total of 12 civil servants. The expenses incurred in 2006-07 in respect of the WKCD project is about \$9.6 million, covering staff costs, departmental expenses and funding required for the engagement of a Financial Advisor for the Development of the WKCD and Related Matters.

(c) In light of the latest progress, the Consultative Committee is expected to complete its work around mid-2007. Having received the recommendations of the Consultative Committee, the Administration would consider how best to formulate proposals in the latter half of 2007 for establishing an independent statutory body to take forward the WKCD Development Project. The long-term resources requirements for the WKCD Development Project will be drawn up in the context of deliberating on how the Project should be taken forward.

### Reply:

One of the recommendations of the 2006 District Councils (DC) Review was to launch a pilot scheme on 1 January 2007 to involve DCs in the management of district facilities in four selected districts before full implementation in all 18 districts from the next DC term commencing 1 January 2008. These district facilities include district libraries, community halls, leisure grounds, sports venues and swimming pools/beaches.

The pilot scheme seeks to encourage the development of a more participatory model in managing district facilities and in promoting partnership in order to ensure that district activities and programmes will better meet district needs. Each pilot DC would be given an additional allocation of \$3 million for 2007-08 to implement various community involvement projects and capital works funding of \$5 million to implement district minor works projects.

Specifically, the management of district facilities involving the pilot DCs consists of –

- (a) considering and endorsing proposals relating to the operation, management and maintenance of the facilities;
- (b) discussing and endorsing proposals on programmes and activities to be undertaken at the facilities; and
- (c) prioritising works projects to improve and upgrade existing facilities or to establish new facilities to be funded from the district facility capital works block vote.

Separately, a high-level Steering Committee on District Administration has been set up under the chairmanship of the Permanent Secretary for Home Affairs to help resolve cross-departmental district problems more effectively. The Steering Committee has held its first meeting in January 2007 and has identified several district management issues for priority attention.

### Reply:

- (a) The increase in the 2006-07 revised estimate is mainly due to the injection of funds into the culture portion of the Arts and Sport Development Fund (ASDF) (\$40 million), the injection of funds into the Arts Development Fund (ADF) (\$20 million), as well as the engagement of Financial Advisor for the Development of the West Kowloon Cultural District and Related Matters (\$4.2 million). The provision does not involve any manpower resources.
- (b) The decrease in the estimated expenditure for 2007-08 is mainly due to the lapse of the one-off effect of the injection of funds into ASDF and ADF mentioned above, partly offset by the increase in provision for cultural initiatives and creation of five posts mainly for the purpose of handling the funding responsibility for major performing arts groups, and strengthening support for the review on built heritage conservation policy in 2007-08.

### Reply:

In 2007-08, we will be working closely with the Committee on the Promotion of Civic Education (CPCE) to implement a series of activities to promote civic education outside schools. The estimated total expenditure is \$10,315,000. The major projects are as follows –

The CPCE provides sponsorship for civic education activities organized by non-Government/community organizations through the Community Participation Scheme (the Scheme). Following a review of the Scheme in 2003, the CPCE decided to designate one major promotional theme each year for the purpose of inviting proposals beginning from 2004-05 so as to enhance the overall effectiveness of the Scheme. The budget for the Scheme remained more or less the same in the past few years and had in fact been increased starting from 2006-07 when the Scheme was also partially funded by charity donations from the Board of Management of the Chinese Permanent Cemeteries (BMCPC).

The number of sponsored projects will depend on the number of applications and the quality of the proposals. To facilitate interested organizations in preparing their applications, CPCE will organize a briefing session with sample cases, setting out the assessment criteria and the major topical theme designated by the CPCE. The total estimated expenditure for the Scheme in 2007-08 is \$5,500,000, inclusive of donations from the BMCPC.

Note 1: The Scheme will be operated at an estimated total cost of \$5,500,000 with \$3,000,000 to be provided by the BMCPC.

Note 2: The total estimated expenditure for the survey is \$1,296,800, with amounts of \$388,800 and \$648,000 settled in 2005-06 and 2006-07 respectively.

#### Reply:

The Chief Executive announced in the 2006-07 Policy Address that the Government would provide an additional funding of \$40 million annually from 2007-08 onwards to enhance the support for elite athletes. Funding would be provided in the key areas including education opportunities; career development; financial assistance; and athlete training and coaching support. To ensure the proper use of the additional resources, we are actively listening to and gauging the views from the stakeholders, including Sports Federation & Olympic Committee of Hong Kong, China, Hong Kong Sports Institute Limited (HKSIL), National Sports Associations, coaches and athletes.

In 2007-08, we will implement the relevant initiatives by phase with the necessary additional funding resources. Such funding will all be for direct benefits of elite athletes. Out of the \$40 million, about \$20 million would be allocated to enhance the direct financial support/training grants to athletes and hence placed as additional subvention to HKSIL which is the agent to disburse subsistence/training grants to elite athletes.

With a more comprehensive plan to support elite athletes, we expect that more young people with sports talent will be willing to take up sports as a career.

### Reply:

The annual subvention provided to the Outward Bound School (OBS) serves to assist an average of about 550 underprivileged or disabled persons and young people at risk (the target group) to take courses of OBS each year. In 2006, the OBS adopted a new programme planning strategy and re-scheduled some of the courses for the target group to the first quarter of 2007 with a view to providing better services. As such, the number of persons in the target group who took courses of OBS in 2006 was only 430, showing a drop of 139 persons as compared to 2005. It is expected that the number of participants taking courses of OBS will move up to 672 persons in 2007 (i.e. 103 persons above 569 in 2005).

In order to encourage the target group to take courses of OBS, OBS will provide tailor-made programmes for the target group. In addition, OBS would provide partially or fully subsidised places to individuals of the target group who can prove their needs of financial support.

The subsidy to be provided to the OBS for assisting the underprivileged or disabled persons and young people at risk to take OBS courses in 2007-08 is estimated to be \$1.771 million.

#### Reply:

To celebrate the 10th Anniversary of the Establishment of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (HKSAR), the Government will organise a wide variety of celebration events in Hong Kong, the Mainland and overseas from April to December 2007. They include ceremonial events, exhibitions and international conferences, cultural and sports events, district events, commissioning of infrastructure projects and celebration activities in the Mainland and overseas. Details of the celebration events will be announced towards the end of March 2007.

In 2007-08, an additional provision of around \$13 million has been earmarked under Head 53 Home Affairs Bureau Programme (4) District and Community Relations for work relating to the 10th Anniversary celebrations, including the setting up of a Celebrations Coordination Office (CCO). The increase under this Programme is also due to the transfer of a regular provision of \$8.8 million for the annual celebration of the establishment of the HKSAR from the Home Affairs Department to the Home Affairs Bureau, so that the planning and resources relating to the celebration are brought under one roof on this unique occasion. Of the total provision of \$21.8 million, it is estimated that about \$12.6 million is for staff cost, \$4.2 million for flag-raising ceremony, reception and banquet and \$5 million for project expenses. While staff cost and ceremonial events will be met by Government provision, we will encourage donations and sponsorship for other community participation events.

The CCO has been set up under the Home Affairs Bureau in January 2007 to coordinate the Government's efforts in organising ceremonial and major celebration events and to facilitate community involvement in the 10th Anniversary celebrations. There are at present 32 staff members in the CCO. Additional staff will be engaged to cater for operational needs as and when necessary.

In April 2006, the Government established the Consultative Committee on the Core Arts and Cultural Facilities (CACF) of the West Kowloon Cultural District (Consultative Committee) and its three Advisory Groups to re-examine, with a view to re-confirming as appropriate, the needs for CACF as defined in the Invitation for Proposals (IFP) and other arts and cultural facilities to be provided in the West Kowloon Cultural District (WKCD), as well as the financial implications of developing and operating these facilities. The Consultative Committee and its three Advisory Groups have been working earnestly on their respective tasks since their establishment. The Performing Arts and Tourism Advisory Group and the Museums Advisory Group have respectively completed their deliberations and submitted their reports to the Consultative Committee. The Financial Matters Advisory Group based on recommendations of the two Advisory Groups is finalising its financial assessment and will submit a report to the Consultative Committee in due course. In light of the latest progress, the Consultative Committee is expected to complete its work around mid-2007. Having received the recommendations of the Consultative Committee, the Administration would consider how best to formulate proposals in the latter half of 2007 for establishing an independent statutory body to take forward the WKCD Development Project.

We work closely with the Betting and Lotteries Commission (the Commission) to ensure that authorized horse race and football betting and lotteries is properly regulated in accordance with the licence conditions and the legislative framework. In 2006-07, the relevant work was undertaken by a team comprising an Administrative Officer Staff Grade B1, an Administrative Officer Staff Grade C, a Senior Administrative Officer, and an Executive Officer in the Bureau, as part of their duties.

The HAB will continue to work closely with the Commission to ensure that authorized horse race and football betting and lotteries are properly regulated. The manpower and resources devoted to this area of work in 2007-08 will be comparable to those in 2006-07.

Reply:

In 2006-07, the Ping Wo Fund (the Fund) which the Government set up in 2003 to finance preventive and remedial measures to address gambling-related problems, helped to finance the operation of the two pilot gambling counselling and treatment centres at about \$7 million. The Fund also financed public education programmes against gambling at about \$5 million. These programmes include the commissioning of the "Watching soccer but no betting" (睇波不賭波) campaign during the World Cup 2006 which aimed to promulgate the negative impact of gambling to all schools, parents and teachers in Hong Kong.

In 2007-08, we will continue to implement measures to address gambling-related problems, including prevention, counselling and treatment as well as other remedial services for problem and pathological gamblers. We plan to launch campaigns in schools and districts to educate the youths on the adverse consequences of gambling. We will also launch a new series of public education programme, including production of new posters, banners, and TV and radio Announcements in Public Interests to alert the public on gambling-related problems, as well as to remind them not to take part in any illegal gambling activities. We have yet to firm up the detailed budget but these programmes will be financed from the Fund.

To provide better assistance to the problem and pathological gamblers, we have commissioned two non-governmental organizations to operate two small-scale gambling counselling centres from 2007 to 2008 on pilot basis, in addition to the two large scale pilot centres which have been in operation since 2003. The two new pilot centres will adopt a community-based approach, and focus particularly on gambling problems in connection with youth, ethnic minority, women and elderly. These will also be financed from the Fund. The estimated expenditure on the four pilot counselling centres will amount to about \$10 million for the year 2007-08.

The recurrent subvention for the HKSIL for elite training is about \$100 million per annum. In 2006-07, the provision for HKSIL has included an additional one-off funding allocation of \$74.3 million for the purpose of enhancing the elite training programmes in anticipation of the coming major events. Discounting this one-off allocation, the recurrent subvention to HKSIL in 2007-08 has increased significantly reflecting the Government's commitment to support elite athletes. As announced in the Chief Executive's 2006-07 Policy Address, the Government will allocate an additional \$40 million recurrent funding each year from 2007-08 to provide enhanced support for our elite athletes in order to encourage and nurture more talented young people and disabled athletes to pursue a career in sports. We have earmarked about \$20 million from the additional funding to HKSIL as subvention for disbursement to athletes for enhancing the direct financial support/training grants to athletes.

### (ii) Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts (HKAPA)

Subvention to HKAPA in 2007-08 has included additional funding for the continued development of the Full-time Diploma / Advanced Programmes in Chinese Traditional Theatre (Cantonese Opera); the introduction of a part-time course in the current Full-time Diploma / Advanced Diploma Programme in Chinese Traditional Theatre; and the establishment of a "Performing Arts Teaching Unit".

### (iii) Hong Kong Arts Development Council (HKADC)

Reduced Subvention to HKADC in 2007-08 is the result of a cost-neutral transfer of \$41.09 million to Home Affairs Bureau (HAB) to implement the Committee on Performing Arts' recommendation that subvention to the four major performing arts companies currently funded by the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) and the six major performing arts groups funded by the HKADC should be unified under HAB.

They include ceremonial events, exhibitions and international conferences, cultural and sports events, district events, commissioning of infrastructure projects and celebration activities in the Mainland and overseas. Details of the celebration events will be announced towards the end of March 2007.

In 2007-08, an additional provision of around \$13 million has been earmarked under Head 53 Home Affairs Bureau Programme (4) District and Community Relations for work relating to the 10th Anniversary celebrations, including the setting up of a Celebrations Coordination Office (CCO). The increase under this Programme is also due to the transfer of a regular provision of \$8.8 million for the annual celebration of the establishment of the HKSAR from the Home Affairs Department to the Home Affairs Bureau, so that the planning and resources relating to the celebration are brought under one roof on this unique occasion. Of the total provision of \$21.8 million, it is estimated that about \$12.6 million is for staff cost, \$4.2 million for flag-raising ceremony, reception and banquet and \$5 million for project expenses. While staff cost and ceremonial events will be met by Government provision, we will encourage donations and sponsorship for other community participation events.

The CCO has been set up under the Home Affairs Bureau in January 2007 to coordinate the Government's efforts in organising ceremonial and major celebration events and to facilitate community involvement in the 10th Anniversary celebrations. There are at present 32 staff members in the CCO. Additional staff will be engaged to cater for operational needs as and when necessary.

The annual subvention provided to the Outward Bound School (OBS) serves to assist an average of about 550 underprivileged or disabled persons and young people at risk (the target group) to take courses of OBS each year. In 2006, the OBS adopted a new programme planning strategy and re-scheduled some of the courses for the target group to the first quarter of 2007 with a view to providing better services. As such, the number of persons in the target group who took courses of OBS in 2006 was only 430, showing a drop of 139 persons as compared to 2005. It is expected that the number of participants taking courses of OBS will move up to 672 persons in 2007 (i.e. 103 persons above 569 in 2005).

The actual expenditure on the promotion of creative industries in 2004-05 and 2005-06 was \$10.53 million and \$10.00 million respectively. The revised estimate for similar activities in 2006-07 is \$11.24 million.

The promotional activities organised in the past few years have been effective in raising public awareness and interest in the importance of creative industries to the economic and cultural development of Hong Kong.

One indicator of the promotional impact is the year-on-year rising attendance figures at the Asia Cultural Cooperation Forum (ACCF), which is organised by the Home Affairs Bureau (HAB) since 2003 to provide a platform for experience-sharing in the development of creative industries and build up the momentum in regional cultural cooperation. Apart from official participants, the Forum has seen a rising trend of participation by members of the public from the attendance of 2 000 at ACCF 2003 to nearly 4 000 at ACCF 2006. ('Body Movies in Hong Kong' which was the largest public engagement session under ACCF 2006 attracted a spectator number of 250 000.)

For 2007-08, the HAB has included \$9.50 million under Head 53 to organise or sponsor activities to promote creative industries. Notable examples of the proposed activities include -

- (i) The 5th Asia Cultural Cooperation Forum 2007 As in the past, this cultural event will continue to enhance partnership between governments and facilitate and promote private sector collaboration. The Forum this year will be held in July.
- (ii) **Hong Kong Music Fair 2008** It is one of the eight events under the Entertainment Expo. It provides a platform for industry players to network, promote and explore business opportunities and new directions of the music industry.

The strategy on resource allocation for 2007-08, which remains the same as that in 2006-07, will continue to focus on promoting integration and harmony in the community, through public education and provision of support services to the ethnic minorities. Our specific initiatives planned for 2007-08 include –

#### I. For promoting racial harmony and equality

- (a) Equal Opportunities (Race) Funding Scheme for funding community projects to promote racial harmony;
- (b) Mobile Information Service for ethnic minorities arriving at the Airport;
- (c) Publication and updating of Service Guide Books in minority languages;
- (d) Cross-cultural programme to provide Cantonese lessons and mentorship programmes for young persons in the ethnic minority communities;
- (e) Cantonese and English classes for ethnic minorities;
- (f) Harmony Scholarship to recognize schools that have made effort in diversifying their enrolment:

Under this Programme, provision for 2007-08 is \$30.3M (116.6%) higher than the revised estimate for 2006-07. It is mainly for organising celebration activities for the 10th Anniversary of the Establishment of the HKSAR. #### Reply:

The Home Affairs Bureau (HAB) is responsible for the formulation and implementation of gambling policy, as well as the regulation of authorized gambling activities, including authorized horse race, football betting and lotteries. In 2006-07, the relevant work was undertaken by a team comprising an Administrative Officer Staff Grade B1, an Administrative Officer Staff Grade C, a Senior Administrative Officer, and an Executive Officer in the Bureau, as part of their duties. The manpower and resources devoted to this area of work in 2007-08 will be comparable to those in 2006-07 and therefore does not contribute to the significant increase in provision under Programme 4.

The Government separately established in 2003 the Ping Wo Fund (the Fund) to finance preventive and remedial measures to address gambling-related problems. The expenditure of the Fund is separately accounted for and does not feature as part of the General Revenue Account under Programme 4.

In 2006-07, the Fund supported programmes to address gambling-related problems at a total cost of \$12 million. We expect that similar resources will be made available in 2007-08. In 2007-08, we will continue to implement measures to address gambling-related problems, including prevention, counselling and treatment as well as other remedial services for problem and pathological gamblers. We plan to launch campaigns in schools and districts to educate the youths on the adverse consequences of gambling. We will also launch a new series of public education programme, including production of new posters, banners and, TV and radio Announcements in Public Interests to alert the public on gambling-related problems, as well as to remind them not to take part in any illegal gambling activities. We have yet to firm up the detailed budget but these programmes will be financed from the Fund.

To provide better assistance to the problem and pathological gamblers, we have commissioned two non-governmental organizations using the Fund to operate two small-scale gambling counselling centres from 2007 to 2008 on pilot basis, in addition to the two large scale pilot centres which have been in operation since 2003. The two new pilot centres will adopt a community-based approach, and focus particularly on gambling problems in connection with youth, ethnic minority, women and elderly. The estimated expenditure on the four pilot counselling centres will amount to about \$10 million for the year 2007-08.

These district facilities include district libraries, community halls, leisure grounds, sports venues, swimming pools and public beaches.

The pilot scheme seeks to encourage the development of a more participatory model in managing district facilities and the adoption of district activities and programmes that will better meet specific district needs. The pilot DCs will have greater involvement in the management of not only the "hardware" of the district facilities, but also the accompanying "software" for promoting the use of those facilities or making better use of the facilities to achieve wider social objectives. Each pilot DC would be given an additional allocation of \$3 million for 2007-08 to implement various community involvement projects and a total of \$5 million to implement district minor works projects under a new dedicated block vote under Capital Works Reserve Fund. Upon full implementation, the total allocation of DC funds for the 18 DCs will increase from the current \$173.5 million to \$300 million and the new block vote for district minor works will also increase to \$300 million in 2008-09 subject to approval by the Finance Committee.

To achieve the objective of enhancing their role in district administration, the pilot DCs have each set up a dedicated committee to assume responsibility for the management of the district facilities mentioned above. They are now identifying suitable community involvement and minor works projects to meet district needs and drawing up plans for collaboration with district organisations to undertake proposals that would achieve a wide range of social objectives.

#### Reply:

A total of \$150 million has been earmarked for five years starting 2006-07 to strengthen district-based poverty alleviation work. To implement this initiative, the Home Affairs Department launched the Programme in June 2006. Under the Programme, non-government organisations and district associations may apply for grants to implement projects that would create employment opportunities for the disadvantaged groups or promote social enterprises.

So far, we have approved 41 projects which will create an estimated 750 employments and involve an estimated cashflow requirement of \$10 million in 2006-07. The estimated provision for the Programme in 2007-08 is \$45 million, comprising mainly the cashflow requirement of the 41 approved projects and the new successful applications in the year.

Under the Programme, we have encouraged collaborations among different sectors of the community in initiating projects leading to job opportunities for the disadvantaged groups in the districts. Of the approved projects, there are cases of collaboration with the business sector in the provision of catering services, with the social welfare sector in the provision of health care services, and with the Employment Retraining Board in the provision of retraining courses to employees of approved projects.

In 2007-08, applications for grants from the Programme will continue to be open all year round to enable worthwhile projects to obtain grants for implementation. To facilitate applications, we held a briefing session in February 2007 to share experience with 300 representatives from non-government organisations and district bodies on the application process and the preparation of practical proposals. Interested parties have been encouraged to submit proposals for grants under the Programme. The Programme Secretariat will monitor the progress of the approved projects and, where appropriate, arrange mentors to provide support and advice to the grantees on the implementation of their projects.

The Administration has engaged a tertiary institution to conduct an evaluation study of the effectiveness of the pilot scheme. The study team is expected to complete its evaluation by the end of 2007 and would present its findings to the relevant stakeholders, including the Legislative Council and the 18 DCs.

(b) The Administration has considered it necessary to provide additional resources to the pilot DCs for discharging their enhanced role in the management of district facilities. Each pilot DC would be given an additional allocation of \$3 million for 2007-08 to implement various community involvement projects and \$5 million to implement district minor works projects. We have issued new guidelines to the pilot districts for implementing these projects.

In addition, under the recommendations of the 2006 DC Review, the Government will set up a dedicated block vote with a provision of \$20 million in 2007-08 for the four pilot districts (Sai Kung, Tuen Mun, Wan Chai and Wong Tai Sin) to implement minor works projects initiated by DCs.

In view of the above, it is likely that more local environmental improvement projects will be implemented in 2007-08.

The estimated provision for the Local Public Works (Maintenance) vote in 2007-08 is \$33.325 million, of which about 18% (i.e. about \$6 million) has been earmarked for emergency repairs of damages caused by natural disasters such as rainstorms and typhoons. By virtue of the unanticipated nature of emergency repairs, this amount is deliberately set on the generous side to cater for unexpected circumstances. As we move on during the year, we will closely monitor the expenditure having regard to the actual circumstances and, where appropriate, we will re-deploy parts of the provision to other maintenance works to ensure optimal utilization of the provision concerned.

From past experience in 2005-06 and 2006-07, the expenditure incurred for emergency repairs resulting from natural disasters was in the range of \$600,000 to \$800,000 each year.

The Administration has closed the four Building Management Resource Centres at Central, Yau Ma Tei, Shatin and Tsuen Wan. Some of the work on building management is taken up by the District Building Management Liaison Teams set up in the 18 districts by the Home Affairs Department. Would the Administration allocate additional resources to the liaison teams accordingly in view of their increased workload? What is the expenditure involved? What will be the future use of the premises of the four resource centers?

#### Reply:

Between 1998 and 2003, we set up a total of four Building Management Resource Centres (BMRCs) to offer building management services to the public. To cater for specific district needs, we have also set up since 2001 dedicated District Building Management Liaison Teams (DBMLTs) under the 18 District Offices to handle building management matters in the respective districts.

After accumulating years of experience, we consider that the DBMLT mechanism is a more suitable and effective means of providing building management services to the public. We also note that the Hong Kong Housing Society has started to operate Property Management Advisory Centres (PMACs) across the territory to provide one-stop building management and maintenance service to the public. In order to better utilise public resources, we closed the BMRCs on 31.12.2006. The staffing resources released from the BMRCs are used to cope with the increased workload arising from the implementation of the recommendations of the 2006 DC Review and strengthen the building management team of the Department

The Government's policy on building management remains unchanged and the provision of our services to owners' corporations and the property owners would not be affected. The DBMLTs of the 18 District Offices would continue to provide outreach service on building management matters. These include assisting property owners to incorporate under the Building Management Ordinance, attending owners' meetings to give advice and assistance, organizing training courses and workshops and providing informal mediation to help resolve disputes among owners.

As regards the arrangement for the vacant sites of the BMRCs, the two centres in Sha Tin and Tsuen Wan are Government offices and have been returned to the Government Property Agency for re-allocation. The BMRC (Kowloon) was located on private premises and the tenancy agreement with the private owner has been terminated upon closure of the centre. The site on Hong Kong Island is at The Center, which is the property of the Urban Renewal Authority (URA). We are still using part of the site as a Public Enquiry Service Centre for the District Office (Central & Western). We are considering the possibility of using the remaining space as a PMAC by the Hong Kong Housing Society.

In order to have a more informed deliberation on whether, and if so, how a regulatory regime for property management companies should be established, we have launched a phased consultancy study on the subject. We are now conducting the first phase study which is mainly a fact-finding exercise focusing on the following three areas:

- (a) the present situation of the property management industry in Hong Kong;
- (b) the overseas practices in regulating property management companies; and
- (c) the regulatory regime for other comparable industries / professionals in Hong Kong.

It is expected that the first phase study will be completed around June 2007. The consultancy fee for the first phase study is \$595,000. Based on the result of the first phase study, we will engage a consultant to conduct the second phase of the study, the objective of which will be to assess the need for a regulatory scheme.

#### Reply:

"Community Used Clothes Recycling Bank" is a community participation scheme launched by the Home Affairs Department (HAD) in 2006-07. With HAD's one-off sponsorship for the banks' capital cost, non-profit making organizations manage the recycling banks scheme. Hence, the government does not need to reserve fund for the scheme in 2007-8 and there is no need for additional manpower resources. Under the scheme, HAD District Offices have liaised with the relevant departments and identified around 170 convenient off-street locations (such as parks, entrances to community centres and sports centres, etc.) for placing collection banks operated by non-profit making organizations. The scheme has shown good progress. In 2006, the scheme managers experienced some 25% increase (compared with 2005) in the total amount of used clothes collected from all sources, including those collected under the scheme. We envisage this trend may continue in 2007.

#### Reply:

District Councils (DCs) are provided with funds to implement Minor Environmental Improvement (MEI) projects. The actual number of projects implemented in a year is decided by DCs which are responsible for identifying possible projects, deciding their scale, priorities, and implementation timetable and monitoring their progress. Hence, the number of MEI projects implemented in a year and the corresponding expenditure will vary from year to year.

In 2007, the estimated number of MEI projects is 218 which is smaller than those in 2006. This is because in accordance with the recommendations in the 2006 DC Review, the Government has earmarked additional resources of \$20 million for the four pilot districts (Sai Kung, Tuen Mun, Wan Chai and Wong Tai Sin) to implement district minor works with a dedicated block vote under the Capital Works Reserve Fund in 2007-08. The MEI programme for these four districts will cease in 2007-08 under the new arrangement as such improvement projects would be carried out under their district minor works programme. As the projects to be implemented would be decided by the respective DCs during the course of the year, details of the projects and the manpower to be involved are not available at this stage.

The Local Public Works (Maintenance) vote is used for carrying out maintenance of local public works in rural areas of the New Territories and for emergency repairs arising from natural disasters. When planning these projects, we have to take into account relevant factors such as the need for repair and maintenance, technical issues and priorities of projects, etc. Hence, the estimated expenditure and the required manpower may vary from year to year.

#### Reply:

The Office of the Licensing Authority (OLA) is responsible for the enforcement of the Hotel and Guesthouse Accommodation Ordinance (Cap.349) (HAGAO), Clubs (Safety of Premises) Ordinance (Cap.376), Bedspace Apartments Ordinance (Cap.447) and Karaoke Establishments Ordinance (Cap.573). These four pieces of legislation aim to ensure that the establishments concerned comply with the statutory requirements in respect of fire safety, building safety, health and hygiene.

OLA has 67 staff who are mostly seconded from the Buildings Department and the Fire Services Department. In processing new or renewal applications, OLA staff will conduct compliance inspections to the premises to ensure that they comply with the building and fire safety requirements set out in the Fire Services Ordinance (Cap.95) and the Building Ordinance (Cap.123). OLA staff will also conduct inspections to combat unlicensed operations. We do not keep a separate account of expenditure for such inspections.

The reasons for a decrease in the number of inspections made in 2006 are as follows –

- (a) With the introduction of the multi-year licence scheme under HAGAO in 2001, many hotels/guesthouses have been issued with a 36-month licence in 2002. As a result, the licences of many hotels/guesthouses were renewed in 2005 and fewer renewal applications were received in 2006.
- (b) In preparation for the World Trade Organisation Sixth Ministerial Conference held in December 2005, OLA conducted additional inspections to combat unlicensed operations. This also explains why the number of inspections in 2005 is higher.

#### Reply:

A Singleton Hostel Programme (SHP) was introduced in 1991 by the Home Affairs Department to ensure that no lodgers of bedspace apartments were rendered homeless as a result of the implementation of the Bedspace Apartments Ordinance, Cap.447. Under the programme, a number of small/medium-sized hostels and two large-sized purpose-built hostels have been provided for singletons.

The small/medium-sized hostels which are converted from private tenements in urban areas are managed by the Agency for Volunteer Service (AVS). The two large-sized purpose-built hostels, namely Sunrise House in Sham Shui Po and High Street House in Sai Ying Pun, are managed by the Salvation Army and Neighbourhood Advice-Action Council respectively. The Government will not provide any direct funding for the management of these singleton hostels in 2007-08.

Singletons who are under 60 years of age earning a monthly salary of not more than \$9,900 and living in an apartment of less than 5.5m<sup>2</sup> for more than six months are eligible to apply for a place in the hostels under SHP. Compassionate cases referred by the Social Welfare Department or other non-governmental organizations are also accepted when there are vacancies in the hostels.

The Sunrise House and High Street House provide accommodation to 580 lodgers and the latest average occupancy rate is 82%. Since 2005-06, these two large-sized purpose-built hostels have been operating on a self-financing basis.

The small/medium-size hostels converted from private tenements in urban areas, such as Sham Shui Po, Yau Tsim Mong, Kwun Tong, Wan Chai and Eastern, have been managed by AVS since 1991. The monthly service charge for hostels managed by AVS is \$430 per person.

In 2004, the Administration reviewed the demand for the SHP. As there had been a decrease in the number of bedspace apartments (BSAs) and the Sunrise House and High Street House should be sufficient to cater for the needs of BSA lodgers, the Administration decided to render all possible assistance to the lodgers in the small/medium-sized hostels and help re-locate them in the Sunrise House or High Street House or other accommodation of their choice and gradually phase out the small/medium-sized hostels in four years starting from 1 April 2005.

In December 2004, the Chinese Temples Committee approved an allocation of HK\$8m from the General Chinese Charities Fund for funding the recurrent expenses for the management of hostels by AVS from 2005/06 to 2008/09, and completing the phasing-out programme by March 2009. There were then some 160 lodgers residing at 26 small/medium-sized hostels managed by AVS. At the end of December 2006, there remained 11 small/medium-sized hostels with 87 lodgers. We have not received any complaints from lodgers about the closure of these hostels.

(a) One of the recommendations of the 2006 DC Review was to launch a pilot scheme on 1 January 2007 to involve the District Councils in the management of district facilities in four selected districts before the full implementation of the recommendations of the DC Review in all 18 districts from the next DC term.

The Administration has engaged a tertiary institution to conduct an evaluation study of the effectiveness of the pilot scheme. The study team would obtain feedback from stakeholders and evaluate the process of involving DCs in the management of district facilities and in the organization of district programmes in collaboration with other sectors of the community aiming at a wide range of social objectives.

The study team has commenced work since end 2006 and has closely followed the progress of the four pilot DCs. It is expected to complete its evaluation by the end of 2007 and would present its findings to the relevant stakeholders, including the Legislative Council and the 18 DCs. The cost of the evaluation study is \$800,000.

(b) In enhancing the role of DCs in the management of district facilities and providing them with additional resources to better meet local needs, we believe this would help encourage more of those people with political aspirations to participate in district affairs.

- (a) District campaign activities and District Fight Crime Committee (DFCC) activities are organised by Home Affairs Department and its District Offices and DFCCs in collaboration with District Councils, local organisations and government departments as appropriate. As regards 2007-08, these activities are being planned by the aforementioned parties and details such as number of activities, expenditure and manpower involved are not available at this stage. Nevertheless, in 2007, smaller number of district campaign activities may be organised as we need to deploy some resources to organise over 50 major district events to celebrate the 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Establishment of the HKSAR. Nevertheless, these activities will also promote community building and cohesion.
- (b) In 2006, 1 568 district campaign activities were organised (six activities less than those in 2005). As regards 2007, as over 50 major district activities will be organised to celebrate the 10th Anniversary of the Establishment of the HKSAR, we expect that less smaller scale district campaign activities will be organised. Hence, the estimated number of activities (1 500) and participants (1.8 million) in 2007 would be slightly less than those (1 568 activities with 1.9 million participants) in 2006.

When planning their activities, DFCCs would take into account relevant factors such as the latest crime situation in the districts. In 2005 and 2006, the 18 DFCCs organised a total of 440 and 417 activities respectively. These were higher than their original estimate of 350. In 2007, we estimate that 380 district activities will be organised by DFCCs, i.e. 30 activities more than the estimates in 2005 and 2006.

In 2007-08, we will continue implementing the Programme to promote substainable poverty prevention and alleviation efforts at district level that help enchance self-reliance, targetting socially disadvantaged groups. The estimated provision for the Programme in 2007-08 is \$45 million, comprising mainly the cashflow requirement of the approved projects in 2007-08 and new successful applications in the year. It also covers the expenses of the Programme Secretariat (comprising four full-time/part-time staff and other administrative costs). Details of the approved projects under the Programme are set out at Annex for reference.

In 2007-08, we will continue to encourage interested non-government organisations and district organisations to apply for grants from the Programme for implementing projects that would benefit the socially disadvantaged groups. The Programme Secretariat will also monitor the progress of the approved projects and, where appropriate, arrange mentors to provide support and advice to the grantees in the implementation of their projects.

To ensure a reasonable wage level for employees of the approved projects under the Programme, all grantees are required to specify the wage level for each job to be created in their grants agreements signed with Government. In this respect, all grantees have been reminded to make reference to the average monthly wages for the relevant industry/occupation as published in the latest Census and Statistics Department's Quarterly Report of Wage and Payroll Statistics. The Programme Secretariat will also monitor implementation of the projects and ensure that the actual emoluments paid out under the approved projects are no less than the amount specified in the grants agreements signed with Government. Where appropriate, the Programme Secretariat will arrange mentors to provide support and advice to the grantees on the implementation of their projects.

Furthermore, the Commission on Poverty (CoP) is looking into the development of social enterprises (SEs) in Hong Kong. We understand that it has provided resources to support the development of SEs and promote the concept of SE to the public. The CoP, the Hong Kong Council of Social Service and various tertiary educational institutions will launch Hong Kong's first SE management training course in mid-2007. The training course targets at the middle-management of NGOs who are running SEs or interested in running SEs. Such training course would help equip interested organizations in making applications for grants from the Programme.

Under Programme (2) Community Building, our policy objectives are to develop policy in respect of community building and to promote community involvement activities and public participation in community affairs. Community involvement activites are initiated by both this Department (including the 18 District Offices) and local organisations.

In 2006, 1 568 district campaign activities were organised by the Department, which is six less than that in 2005. Hence, we expect that the estimated number of district campaign activities in 2007 (i.e. 1 500) will be less than those in 2006. Nevertheless, we envisage that local organisations will initiate a large number of activities to celebrate the 10th Anniversary of the Establishment of the HKSAR this year. This will compensate, to a considerable extent, the reduced number of activities to be launched by us.

The number of participants in district campaign activities is a new indicator introduced this year. As it is expected that local organisations will launch a large number of district activities to celebrate the 10th Anniversary of the Establishment of the HKSAR, we expect that the total number participants of our own district campaign activities in 2007 (i.e. 1.8 million) will be 5% lower than that in 2006 (i.e. 1.9 million).

# Question:

In this year's Budget Speech, it is said that the Administration will support the development of social enterprises and has launched the Enhancing Self-reliance Through District Partnership Programme for this purpose. For social enterprises to effectively realise their characteristics, multi-level development and collaboration are necessary. In this connection, please inform this Committee of the following:

- (i) What is the estimated expenditure on promoting the development of social enterprises and launching relevant projects in 2007-08? What are the specific plans? How is the estimated expenditure compared with that in 2006-07?
- (ii) Since the concept of social enterprises is new to the society, what is the provision earmarked in 2007-08 for public education, promotion and research?

Asked by: Hon. LEUNG LAU Yau-fun, Sophie

#### Reply:

A total of \$150 million has been earmarked for five years starting from 2006-07 to strengthen district-based poverty alleviation work. To implement this initiative, the Home Affairs Department launched the Enhancing Self-Reliance Through District Partnership Programme (the Programme) in June 2006 to assist socially disadvantaged groups to gain self-reliance, including support for social enterprises (SEs).

Under the Programme, non-government organisations (NGOs) and district associations may apply for grants to implement projects that would create employment opportunities for the disadvantaged groups and promote the development of SEs. Since the launch of the Programme in 2006, we have approved 41 projects with a total grant of \$38 million. The estimated cashflow requirement of these approved projects is \$10 million in 2006-07. The estimated provision for the Programme in 2007-08 is \$45 million, comprising mainly the cash flow requirement of the 41 approved projects and the new successful applications in the year. Implementation of projects funded under the Programme would help promote sustainable poverty alleviation efforts at the district level and enhance public awareness of the concept of SEs.

The Commission on Poverty (CoP) is looking into the development of SEs in Hong Kong. We understand that it has provided resources to support the development of SEs and promote the concept of SE to the public. The CoP, the Hong Kong Council of Social Service and various

tertiary educational institutions will launch Hong Kong's first SE management training course in mid-2007. The training course, involving an expenditure of about \$1 million, is targeted at the middle-management of NGOs who are running SEs or interested in running SEs. Depending on the effectiveness of the training course, CoP will consider promoting SE training in the university curriculum. The CoP has also sponsored the SE Challenge 2007 (社會企業挑戰盃 2007) organised by the Chinese University of Hong Kong to promote the concept of SE to university students. The estimated cost of the event is about \$0.8 million.

# **Question**:

It is noted that the Administration will continue to implement the Singleton Hostel Programme in 2007-08. What is the expenditure involved? What measures will the Administration take to expedite the implementation of the programme to provide accommodation for eligible persons?

#### Reply:

A Singleton Hostel Programme (SHP) was introduced in 1991 by the Home Affairs Department to ensure that no lodgers of bedspace apartments were rendered homeless as a result of the implementation of the Bedspace Apartments Ordinance, Cap.447. Under the programme, a number of small/medium-sized hostels and two large-sized purpose-built hostels have been provided for singletons. The small/medium-sized hostels which are converted from private tenements in urban areas are managed by the Agency for Volunteer Service (AVS). The two large-sized purpose-built hostels, namely Sunrise House in Sham Shui Po and High Street House in Sai Ying Pun, are managed by the Salvation Army (SA) and Neighbourhood Advice-Action Council (NAAC) respectively.

In 2004, the Administration reviewed the demand for the SHP. As there had been a decrease in the number of bedspace apartments (BSAs) and the Sunrise House and High Street House should be sufficient to cater for the needs of BSA lodgers, the Administration decided to render all possible assistance to the lodgers in the small/medium-sized hostels and help re-locate them in the Sunrise House or High Street House or other accommodation of their choice and gradually phase out the small/medium-sized hostels in four years starting from 1 April 2005.

In December 2004, the Chinese Temples Committee approved an allocation of HK\$8,000,000 from the General Chinese Charities Fund for funding the recurrent expenses for the management of hostels by AVS from 2005-06 to 2008-09, and completing the phasing-out programme by March 2009. There were then some 160 lodgers residing at 26 small/medium-sized hostels managed by AVS. By the end of December 2006, there remained 11 such hostels with 87 lodgers. We have not received any complaints from lodgers about the closure of the AVS hostels.

Since 2005-06, these two purpose-built hostels have been operating on a self-financing basis. The Government will not provide any direct funding for the management of all these singleton hostels in 2007-08.

We have established mechanisms to oversee the implementation of minor works projects so as to ensure that the projects will be completed within the planned schedule. Under the Rural Public Works (RPW) and the Urban Minor Works Programmes, District Working Groups (DWGs) are set up in each district to identify projects and monitor their implementation. In addition, there are two central Steering Committees (SCs) to oversee project implementation in the New Territories and urban districts respectively. DWGs are chaired by non-officials and comprise representatives of the relevant District Councils, Area Committees, Rural Committees (for NT districts), and relevant government departments. The SCs are chaired by the Director of Home Affairs and comprise DWG Chairmen, representatives of Heung Yee Kuk (for the RPW SC) and relevant government departments.

As regards Minor Environmental Improvement projects, they are funded by District Councils who would identify and prioritise the projects and oversee their implementation.

After the closure of the 4 Building Management Resource Centres, building management programmes have decreased and the expenditure in this respect should reduce accordingly. Please specify the savings to be achieved. What are the reasons for an increase rather than a decrease in expenditure under this Programme in 2007-08?

### Reply:

Between 1998 and 2003, we set up a total of four Building Management Resource Centres (BMRCs) to offer building management services to the public. To cater for specific district needs, we have also set up since 2001 dedicated District Building Management Liaison Teams (DBMLTs) under the 18 District Offices to handle building management matters in the respective districts.

After some years of experience, we consider that the DBMLT mechanism is a more suitable and effective means of providing building management services to the public. Furthermore, the Hong Kong Housing Society has started to operate Property Management Advisory Centres (PMACs) across the territory to provide a one-stop building management and maintenance service to the public. In order to better utilise public resources, we decided to close the BMRCs on 31.12.2006.

The staffing resources released from the BMRCs are used to further strengthen the district administration and building management work of the Department. There are also savings of \$2.3m per annum on rental and running costs arising from the closure of the BMRCs.

The Government's policy on building management remains unchanged and the provision of our services to owners' corporations and property owners would not be affected. The DBMLTs of the 18 District Offices would continue to provide an outreach service on building management matters. These include assisting property owners to incorporate under the Building Management Ordinance, attending owners' meetings to give advice and assistance, organizing training courses and workshops and providing informal mediation to help resolve disputes among owners

The increase in expenditure under this Programme is mainly due to additional cashflow requirements for the Enhancing Self-Reliance Through District Partnership Programme, celebration activities for the 10th Anniversary of the Establishment of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region, the establishment of an Estate Beneficiaries Support Unit and the implementation of new community building initiatives.

There are about 40 000 private multi-storey buildings in Hong Kong. We have all along encouraged owners to incorporate under the Building Management Ordinance so as to facilitate building management and maintenance.

So far, we have successfully assisted owners of about 15 000 buildings to form owners' corporations (OC). There remain, however, some 25 000 buildings which do not have an OC and some 7 000 of them do not even have any form of management (e.g. an owners' committee, a Mutual Aid Committee or a property management company). We would continue to encourage and assist owners of these buildings to form OCs and step up the management of their buildings. In 2007, we plan to assist owners of about 350 buildings to incorporate under the Building Management Ordinance.

We do not keep a separate account of expenditure for the formation of OCs. Apart from the formation of OCs, we also attend owners' meetings to give advice and assistance, organize training courses and workshops and help mediate disputes over building management issues.

At present, there are around 400 Liaison Officers in the District Offices, of whom about 25% are engaged in building management duties. The DBMLTs would continue to provide an outreach service to owners and residents on building management matters. These include assisting owners to incorporate under the Building Management Ordinance, attending owners' meetings to give advice and assistance, organizing training courses and workshops and help mediate disputes.

There are about 40 000 private multi-storey buildings in Hong Kong. To date, we have successfully assisted owners of about 15 000 buildings to form OCs. There remain, however, some 25 000 buildings which do not have an OC and some 7 000 of them do not even have any form of management (e.g. an owners' committee, a Mutual Aid Committee (MAC) or a property management company). We would continue to encourage and assist owners of these buildings to form OCs and step up the management of their buildings. In 2007, we plan to assist owners of about 350 buildings to incorporate under the Building Management Ordinance.

In 2005 and 2006, we successfully assisted 410 and 354 buildings respectively to form OCs. We also assisted residents of 66 and 56 buildings in 2005 and 2006 respectively to form MACs.

In 2005 and 2006, we received 13 411 and 13 628 enquiries respectively about building management matters. Out of them, 909 and 666 were enquiries related to OC formation.

District Councils (DCs) are provided with funds to implement Minor Environmental Improvement (MEI) projects. The actual number of projects implemented in a year are decided by DCs which are responsible for identifying possible projects, deciding their scale, priorities, implementation timetable and monitoring their progress. Hence, the number of MEI projects implemented in a year and the corresponding expenditure would vary from year to year. In 2007, the number of MEI projects planned for implementation is 218 which is smaller than the number of MEI projects in 2006. This is because in accordance with the recommendations in the 2006 DC Review, the Government has earmarked additional resources of \$20 million for the four pilot districts (Sai Kung, Tuen Mun, Wan Chai and Wong Tai Sin) to implement district minor works under a dedicated block vote under the Capital Works Reserve Fund in 2007-08. Accordingly, the MEI programme for these four pilot districts will cease in 2007-08 as such improvement projects would be carried out under their district minor works programme under the new arrangement.

The Local Public Works (Maintenance) vote is used for carrying out maintenance of local public works in rural areas of the New Territories and for emergency repairs arising from natural disasters. When planning these projects, we have to take into account relevant factors such as the need for repair and maintenance, technical issues and priorities of projects, etc. Hence, the estimated expenditure may also vary from year to year.

#### Reply:

In the 2006-07 Budget, the Financial Secretary earmarked \$150 million over the next five years to strengthen district-based poverty alleviation work and assist socially disadvantaged groups to gain self-reliance, including support for social enterprises. To implement this initiative, the Home Affairs Department launched the Enhancing Self-Reliance Through District Partnership Programme ("the Programme") in June 2006. Under the Programme, non-government organisations (NGOs) and district organisations could apply for grants to implement projects that would create employment opportunities for the disadvantaged groups or promote social enterprises. An Advisory Committee, comprising non-official members from different sectors and representatives of Labour Department, Home Affairs Department and Social Welfare Department, has been established to examine and make recommendations on the applications for grants.

Since the launch of the Programme in 2006, we have approved 41 projects with an estimated cashflow requirement of \$10 million in 2006-07. These projects, with an estimated 750 employment opportunities, are being implemented in the various districts including Sham Shui Po, Kwun Tong, Tin Shui Wai and Tung Chung. The approved projects would help promote sustainable poverty alleviation efforts at the district level.

In 2007-08, we will continue to encourage NGOs and district organisations to apply for grants under the Programme to implement projects that would reinforce the district-based approach in poverty alleviation especially in the needy districts. The estimated provision for the Programme in 2007-08 is \$45 million which mainly comprises the cashflow requirement of the 41 approved projects in 2007-08 and the new successful applications in the year.

The Commission on Poverty (CoP) is also looking into the development of social enterprises (SEs) in Hong Kong. We understand that it has provided resources to support the development of SEs and promote the concept of SE to the public. The CoP, the Hong Kong Council of Social Service and various tertiary educational institutions will launch Hong Kong's first SE management training course in mid-2007. The training course targets at the middle-management of NGOs who are running SEs or interested in running SEs. Such training course would help equip interested organizations in making applications for grants from the Programme.

Hence, no public expenditure is involved for the conversion projects.
- (2) To make better use of its under-utilised facilities and to meet changing community demand, the Department has converted 14 squash courts and 12 tennis courts into other uses such as activity rooms, indoor climbing room, basketball courts, tai chi garden and 5-a-side mini soccer pitch. Funding support is provided to NSAs and CSCs to meet essential expenditure items in the organisation of programmes including venue hire charges, instructor fees and publicity expenses. Since the implementation of the CSC Project in 2001, the number of CSCs has increased from 84 in 2001-02 to about 290 in 2006-07.

In 2006-07, an amount of \$7 million has been granted through respective NSAs to CSCs to organise 1 700 sports programmes for 38 000 participants. - (c) the revenue forgone under the Scheme in 2005-06 was \$6.7 million. As one of the objectives of the Scheme is to promote use of facilities of low usage during non-peak hours, the revenue forgone under the Scheme is in essence notional rather than actual; and

(d) the Department has no plan to further extend the Scheme to other sports facilities at this stage. To promote utilisation of sports facilities during non-peak hours, the Department will continue to allow schools, subvented non-government organisations (NGOs), national sports associations and district sports associations to use selected sports facilities free of charge during those hours (i.e. from opening time to 5 p.m. on weekdays from September to June next year). We will strengthen our liaison with these organisations, in particular schools and NGOs to maximise the usage of these sports facilities as well as to promote sports. We will continue to work in partnership with NGOs to promote the organisation of sports programmes. Venue managers of sports facilities will make every effort to publicise the facilities and organise tailor-made programmes to further enhance their utilisation rates.

Financial provision for the performing arts in 2007-08 is \$170.7 million, or 18.1% less than that for the 2006-07 revised estimate, mainly due to an administrative arrangement involving the transfer of the funding responsibilities for ten major performing arts groups from the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) to the Home Affairs Bureau (HAB). Following the recommendation of the Committee on Performing Arts of putting the major performing arts groups supported by LCSD and the Hong Kong Arts Development Council (HKADC) under one roof with a view to developing a single assessment mechanism, an amount of \$177.3 million, which would otherwise be LCSD's subvention for the four performing arts groups (namely the Hong Kong Philharmonic Society, the Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra, the Hong Kong Repertory Theatre and the Hong Kong Dance Company), and its support for the six HKADC 3-year grantees (namely, the Hong Kong Ballet, the Hong Kong Sinfonietta, the City Contemporary Dance Company, the Zuni Icosahedron, the Chung Ying Theatre and the Theatre Ensemble) and the related administrative expenses, will be transferred to HAB in 2007-08. This decrease in provision is partly offset by additional allocation to LCSD for the celebration activities for the 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Establishment of the HKSAR.

  - ii) Lei Yue Mun Park and Holiday Village: 77%
  - iii) Sai Kung Outdoor Recreation Centre: 97%
  - iv) Tso Kung Tam Outdoor Recreation Centre: 87%
- (b) In 2007, the target attendance in water sports centres is 112 000, which will represent an average usage rate of 79%. The attendance is higher than those in previous years and is considered satisfactory. The estimated expenditure for the five water sports centres in 2007-08 is \$23.9 million.

(c) The comparatively lower usage rate of tennis courts is probably due to the declining popularity of the sport in recent years. To enhance the usage of existing tennis courts, the Department will continue to work in partnership with sports organisations to promote the sport and to make more use of the facilities. We also have a plan to convert Kowloon Tsai Park Tennis and Squash Courts into a dedicated sports training base for tennis to promote the sport and to increase utilisation of the venue. #### Reply:

- (a) To facilitate sports organisations to provide training and promotional programmes for the long term development of specific sports in Hong Kong, we plan to convert two underutilised sports venues, namely Kowloon Tsai Park Tennis & Squash Courts and Jockey Club Kwai Shing Public Squash Courts, into dedicated sports training bases for tennis and air gun shooting respectively. The sports training bases will be operated by non-profit making sports organisations on a self-financing basis. The organisations will be required to upgrade/convert the existing facilities to meet the necessary requirements at their own cost. Hence, no public expenditure is involved for the conversion works. The Sports Commission and the relevant District Councils have been consulted on the proposal and they support the conversion. We are now working on the logistic arrangement for the tenders.
- (b) The Leisure and Cultural Services Department has, since 2001, been actively promoting sports in primary and secondary schools through the School Sports Programme (SSP). The SSP consists of seven subsidiary programmes, namely, Sports Education Programme, Easy Sport Programme, Sport Captain Programme, Outreach Coaching Programme, Joint Schools Sports Training Programme, Badges Award Scheme and sportACT Award Scheme.

By 2004, 875 schools had joined the SSP, representing 68% of the total number of primary and secondary schools in Hong Kong. The number of schools joining in 2005 and 2006 increased to 905 and 955 respectively, representing 70% and 76% of the total number of primary and secondary schools. Our target is to increase the school participation rate to 90% in three years' time. To achieve the target, more promotional and publicity activities as well as school visits will be conducted to boost the participation rate of schools. The sportACT Award Scheme is introduced to give recognition and further encouragement for schools to actively promote sports to students as well as for students to participate regularly in sports activities.

In financial year 2006-07, \$14 million was spent on SSP. In order to further promote sports to students and increase the school participation rate, we will work through National Sports Associations and provide them with additional subvention of \$3 million to organise more SSP activities. The additional administrative work of the increased activities will be carried out using the existing manpower of the Department.

#### Reply:

Four public works projects with a total cost of some \$1,030 million are being implemented in Tung Chung New Town. These include the Indoor Recreation Centre, Community Hall cum Library in Area 17, Tung Chung (construction commenced in December 2006 for completion in late 2009) and a Swimming Pool Complex in Area 2 (Phase I), Tung Chung (construction to commence in end-2007 for completion in mid-2010). Six projects with a total cost of some \$903.9 million are also being implemented in Tin Shui Wai New Town. These include an Indoor Recreation Centre in Area 17 Tin Shui Wai (construction expected to complete by early 2007) and Tin Shui Wai Public Library cum Indoor Recreation Centre (with a 25-meter indoor heated pool) (construction will be advanced to commence in late 2007 for completion by mid-2011).

We will review in conjunction with the Islands District Council the need for an additional sports centre and the construction of Phase II of Swimming Pool Complex in Tung Chung New Town in the light of the future population growth and the aspiration of local residents. A Sports Centre and Community Hall in Area 101, Tin Shui Wai and the feasibility of inclusion of a public swimming pool complex in Phase II of District Open Space in Area 107, Tin Shui Wai are also under active planning in consultation with the Yuen Long District Council. We will bid for the necessary funding to take the projects forward according to the established resource allocation procedures with reference to the priority accorded by the relevant District Councils in the implementation of the projects.

#### Question:

At present, performing arts venues managed by the Government are often fully booked. It is difficult for performers or performing groups to book these venues for use. However, it is learnt that many venues booked are not actually used for performing or arts activities. Does the Administration have the intention to separately process venue booking applications of performing arts use and non-performing arts use so that performing or arts groups can have priority use of the venues, making it more in line with the original intention of building such venues?

#### Reply:

In the existing booking arrangement for the 13 performing arts venues of the Leisure and Cultural Services Department, all facilities are open for public hiring but priority is already accorded to arts-related activities. Generally, ordinary booking applications for arts-related activities are accepted at the earliest from four to 12 months in advance of the month of hire, while booking applications for non-arts activities are only accepted at the earliest three months in advance with the exception of applications by government departments, District Councils or registered schools. For non-arts bookings by these three types of hirers, time restriction is imposed on venues with keen competition, e.g. for the Hong Kong Cultural Centre Grand Theatre, non-arts bookings are only accepted four months in advance while the Hong Kong Cultural Centre Concert Hall and Studio Theatre, the City Hall Theatre and Concert Hall will only accept such bookings for the morning sessions from Monday to Thursday (except public holidays). For competing bookings, arts-related activities are always accorded priority over non-arts events. Statistics show that in 2005-06, non-arts activities at the Hong Kong Cultural Centre Concert Hall and Grand Theatre accounted for only 6% out of 96% of usage based on bookings by session and 2% out of 98% of usage respectively. At the Hong Kong City Hall Concert Hall, non-arts activities accounted for only 6% out of 92% of usage.

The Department reviews the booking arrangement from time to time in consultation with stakeholders in order to meet with the changing needs and aspirations of the community.

- (e) developing district sports activities with local characteristics; and
- (f) introducing suitable sports activities to people of different age groups in order to encourage them to participate in sports suitable to them.

The six strategies will be implemented step by step from 2007 onwards with the ultimate objective of building up a strong sporting culture in Hong Kong in the long run. #### Reply:.

(a) For the Leisure and Cultural Services Department, the provision earmarked in 2007-08 for holding major sports activities in celebration of the 10th Anniversary is around \$25 million. The major sports activities under planning are the 1st Hong Kong Games, 2007 International Dragon Boat Races, International Soccer Exhibition Match, International DanceSport Extravaganza, Euro-Asia Snooker Masters Challenge 2007, Gymnastics Extravaganza, 2007 Federation Internationale De Volleyball World Lady Volleyball Grand Prix-Hong Kong and Mega Tai Chi Show. The Department will co-organise most of these activities with the respective National Sports Associations and discussion with them is still underway. Apart from the additional provision, the existing resources of the Department will be redeployed and commercial sponsorships will be solicited to support the organisation of the celebration activities. As the sports activities are still under planning, the detailed breakdown of the expenditure items is not available at this stage.

- (a) Chapter 4 of the 'Hong Kong Planning Standards and Guidelines' (HKPSG) provides a standard of provision for sports centre with reference to the population of a district. The standard is one centre per 50 000 to 65 000 persons. The Chapter also highlights the growing need to provide exercise facilities for the aged in Hong Kong and recommends integrated design principles in planning exercise facilities to cater for such need. The Department makes reference to the HKPSG in planning the provision of its recreation and sports facilities.
- (b) The Department will consider making use of uncommitted government sites as temporary leisure grounds where justified. The factors we take into consideration include the views of the District Council concerned, the socio-economic structures of the population, the utilisation rate of the existing leisure and recreation facilities and the cost effectiveness of such temporary use.

#### Reply:

The Swimming Pool Complex in Area 1 (Sun Wai Court), Tuen Mun, which is near Tin King Estate, has already reached an advanced stage of planning. The estimated cost of the project is about \$392 million. It will comprise a 50m outdoor main pool, a 25m indoor heated pool, a teaching pool, a training pool cum warm-up pool, and a children pool with Jacuzzi facility and water play equipment. The conceptual design of the swimming pool complex is being prepared for consultation with the Tuen Mun District Council in mid-2007. The current plan is advance the construction works to start in late 2008 for completion by 2011, which will be about two years earlier than originally planned.

The sports ground in Area 16 is not in the list of outstanding leisure and cultural services projects of the former Municipal Councils. It has not been included for priority implementation by the Tuen Mun District Council, and there is no development programme for it at present.

- (a) In planning new library facilities, the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) will draw reference from the Hong Kong Planning Standards and Guidelines (HKPSG) which stipulate that one district library should be provided for each district and that there should also be a district library for every 200 000 persons. The Department will also take into account the geographical environment and the pattern of population distribution in a district and consider, in consultation with the District Council concerned, the provision of supplementary library services such as small libraries and mobile library stops. Study rooms are provided in the major and district libraries to supplement those provided by other organisations.
- (b) The current implementation plans for the eight ex-Municipal (ex-MC) projects with library facilities are as follows:
  - (i) Indoor Recreation Centre, Community Hall cum Library in Area 17, Tung Chung: works already started in end 2006 for completion in late 2009;
  - (ii) Tin Shui Wai Public Library cum Indoor Recreation Centre: works to start in late 2007 for completion in mid-2011;
  - (iii) Small public library at the Siu Sai Wan Complex, Chai Wan: works to start in early 2008 for completion in early 2011;
  - (iv) Public libraries at Yuen Long town centre and at Tseung Kwan O: works to start in early 2009 for completion in late 2011;

- (v) Public library at Lam Tin North Municipal Services Building (Kwun Tong): works to start in late 2009 for completion in late 2012;
- (vi) Indoor Recreation Centre-cum-Library Area 14B, Sha Tin: works to start in late 2010 for completion in mid-2013; and
- (vii) Public Library at Tung Chau Street (Sham Shui Po): works to start in late 2010 for completion in late 2013.

## **Question**:

I have received complaint(s) from member(s) of the public that the operation of the new ticketing system for the Urban Ticketing System (URBTIX) in Paragraph 23 under this Programme takes a long time. Would the Administration inform this Committee:

- (a) of the details of the system upgrade project together with the expenditure and manpower involved;
- (b) of the details regarding the time required by the new system to process each ticket booking and failure rates as compared with the old system; and
- (c) of the number of complaints about the new system received and the reasons for the complaints, as well as measures to be taken to improve the operation of the new system?

## Reply:

- (a) The new URBTIX backend system is owned, operated and maintained by the contractor CityLine at no capital cost to the Government. The contractor is paid a fee by programme presenters for each ticket sold. The system was launched in October 2006 and has completely and successfully replaced the old system since late December 2006.
- (b) The new system can issue up to 20 000 tickets per hour as compared to 16 000 for the old one. Transaction time at the box office varies, and depends on the complexity of the customer's requirements. For a simple purchase through the Internet, the transaction could be completed in less than a minute. The old system recorded three system failures in its last operating period of 12 months, totaling 195 minutes' down time, while the new system has not encountered any system failure since launching. The new system has passed the acceptance test with a serviceability level of 99.47%.

(c) Up to 12 March 2007, records show that only four complaints on ticket selling service had been received since the new system was launched. None of them was related to the system's performance. The subject of two of the complaints was that the 'day of the week' was not displayed next to the 'date of performance' on the ticket. That shortfall has been rectified subsequently. The third complaint was about a 15-minute delay at an outlet in Tai Po due to failure of the outlet terminal caused by human error. The box office operator concerned has been advised to follow the standing procedures in future to avoid similar problems. The fourth complaint was about long waiting time at an outlet in Tuen Mun in the morning of 9 December 2006 when counter sale for the HK Arts Festival commenced causing long queues at many URBTIX outlets in that morning. We will further promote the use of Internet ticketing as an alternative and a more convenient channel for purchasing tickets to reduce the number of people queuing at URBTIX outlets.

### Reply:

The amounts of sports subvention that the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) provided to the Hong Kong Amateur Athletic Association (HKAAA) in 2004-05, 2005-06 and 2006-07 were \$3,656,310, \$3,593,498 and \$3,866,218 respectively. The subvention included personnel, administration and programme expenses.

The HKAAA, like all National Sports Associations (NSAs) receiving subvention from LCSD, has entered into a subvention agreement with the Government. Under the subvention agreement, the subvented organisation is required to exercise proper internal controls to ensure the cost-effectiveness and accountability in the use of the subvention. It is required to report expenditure position and activity progress to LCSD at quarterly intervals, submit annual audited report and adopt ethical code of conduct and declaration practice to prevent conflict of interests. The subvented organisation is obliged to act upon any corruption prevention advice rendered by the Independent Commission Against Corruption as well as other accounting and administrative procedures proposed by the Government to improve public transparency and accountability.

LCSD assumes a monitoring role to oversee the implementation of the subvented activities. LCSD keeps in close liaison with the NSAs in programme planning and carries out site inspection of the subvented activities for progress monitoring and assessment of the results achieved. The Quality Assurance Section of LCSD also carries out inspections and checks of the funding records to ensure that proper accounting procedures are adopted and the terms of the subvention agreement are complied with. LCSD will follow up any irregularities found and seek rectification as appropriate.

Based on our observation and the information gathered from the HKAAA, there is no evidence to suggest that there is a breach of the subvention agreement nor contravention of the law during the past years.

- (a) To make better use of under-utilised facilities, this Department has converted 14 squash courts and 12 tennis courts into other uses to meet the changing community demand. The total expenditure for the conversion works is about \$12.1 million. Details are at Annex I. Compared to 2005, the usage rate of the Department's squash courts in 2006 was 43%, representing a 6% increase, and that for its tennis courts was also 43%, which was a slight drop by 1%.
- (b) In 2007-08, we plan to convert Kowloon Tsai Park Tennis and Squash Courts and Jockey Club Kwai Shing Public Squash Courts into dedicated sports training bases for tennis and air gun shooting respectively. The sports training bases will be operated by non-profit making sports organisations on a self-financing basis. The organisations will be required to upgrade/convert the existing facilities to meet the necessary requirements at their own cost. Hence, no public expenditure is involved for the conversion works. We have also identified some less popular squash courts for conversion into landscaped open space with elderly fitness stations to meet the need of the districts. The total expenditure is about \$12.2 million. Details are at Annex II.

## Reply:

With an aim to promote Sports for All and to encourage people of all age groups and different abilities to lead an active and healthy life, the Leisure and Cultural Services Department organises a wide range of recreation and sports activities for different target groups including elderly persons and persons with a disability. Programmes specifically organised for elderly persons and persons with a disability include fitness, dancing, swimming, lawn bowl, table-tennis, day camping, excursion, gateball and golf activities. In 2006-07, a total of about 3 190 programmes were specially organised for persons aged 60 or above, catering for more than 312 000 participants, at a cost of \$4.66 million. As for persons with a disability, over 960 programmes for more than 52 000 participants were organised at a cost of \$1.72 million. These programmes were mostly held in leisure facilities managed by the Department during day time. Outreaching programmes were also organised for elderly persons and persons with a disability at elderly centres and rehabilitation centres.

In 2007-08, we will continue to organise similar programmes as in last year for these two target groups. About 3 300 programmes will be organised for some 340 000 elderly persons at an estimated cost of \$5 million, while another 1 000 programmes will be tailor-made for about 61 000 persons with a disability at an estimated cost of \$2 million. To provide more opportunities for elderly persons to participate in structured sports activities, this Department will assist voluntary agencies in implementing the project "Healthy Exercise for Longevity" commencing in 2007-08. It is estimated that some 2 000 sports activities will be organised to benefit 29 000 participants under this project with funding to be raised by the voluntary agencies themselves.

The decrease is mainly due to the administrative arrangement involving the transfer of the funding responsibilities relating to the six Hong Kong Arts Development Council (HKADC) 3-year grantees from the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) to the Home Affairs Bureau (HAB). LCSD has been giving support to six HKADC 3-year grantees, namely, the Hong Kong Ballet, the Hong Kong Sinfonietta, the City Contemporary Dance Company, the Zuni Icosahedron, the Chung Ying Theatre and the Theatre Ensemble, through subsidising their programme production fees, marketing and publicity costs, etc. Following the recommendation of the Committee on Performing Arts of putting the major performing arts groups supported by LCSD and HKADC under one roof with a view to developing a single assessment mechanism, the allocation to LCSD for supporting the six HKADC 3-year grantees will be transferred to HAB in 2007-08.

  - (i) \$1.36 million as the first-year expenditure of the project for replacing the existing Library Automation System (LAS) at a total estimated cost of \$196.47 million under the Capital Works Reserve Fund as approved by the Finance Committee in February 2007:
  - (ii) \$5.80 million for upgrading 548 Multimedia Information System (MMIS) workstations in 27 branch libraries;
  - (iii) \$4.70 million for conducting a feasibility study on the future development of the MMIS;
  - (iv) \$4.96 million for the installation of 82 Internet Express Terminals in 57 branch libraries; and
  - (v) \$3.00 million for the installation of the Octopus payment system for the collection of library fines and charges.

(c) The replacement of the LAS and the installation of the Octopus payment system will benefit all public libraries. With the upgraded MMIS workstations, 27 libraries would be able to provide a more effective multimedia information service to the public. The addition of 82 Internet Express Terminals would further enhance the provision of Internet service at 57 libraries.

The work of AMO mainly covers the following areas: (a) identifying, recording and researching on buildings and items of historical interest; (b) organising and coordinating surveys and excavations of sites of archaeological significance; (c) organising the protection, restoration and maintenance of declared monuments; (d) assessing and evaluating the impact of development projects on heritage buildings and sites, as well as organising appropriate mitigation measures; (e) arranging adaptive reuse of suitable historical buildings; (f) fostering public awareness of Hong Kong's heritage through education and publicity programmes such as exhibitions, lectures, volunteer programmes, tours and workshops; and (g) maintaining and developing archives of written and photographic material relating to heritage sites.

AMO endeavours to achieve the following specific performance targets in 2007-08: (a) to declare at least one historical building as monument and to complete 60 projects on restoring and maintaining monuments and historical buildings; (b) to organise about 550 educational and public programmes including seminars, conferences, workshops and heritage tours with a total estimated attendance of 36 000; and (c) to develop three electronic heritage information database systems, namely the Geographical Information System on Hong Kong Heritage, Hong Kong Traditional Chinese Architectural Information System and Heritage Virtual Tour System, upon completion of which, information on about 850 heritage items could be accessed by the public through the Internet.

- (b) The declaration of monuments is a legal process under the Antiquities and Monuments Ordinance and the work is undertaken by the Antiquities and Monument Office (AMO) with its existing resources. However, additional capital expenditure will be required for renovating the historical buildings after they have been declared as monuments and before they can be opened to the public. The cost of restoring and maintaining a monument varies according to its individual physical condition and the conservation and maintenance requirements specified by conservation experts. For 2007-08, an estimated provision of \$21.447 million has been earmarked for the AMO to carry out about 60 projects.

AMO has eight professional staff responsible for restoration and maintenance projects. The total staff cost in 2006-07 was \$3.1 million.

(c) In March 2005, the Antiquities Advisory Board (AAB) appointed an expert panel to assess the heritage value of 1 440 buildings constructed before 1950. Upon completion of the assessment, the expert panel will submit the assessment results to the AAB which will then identify buildings for grading or for declaration as monuments, and submit recommendations to the Antiquities Authority for consideration. We will discuss with the expert panel and the AAB on the possibility of speeding up the assessment and related work.

# Reply:

With a view to developing a strong sporting culture in Hong Kong and encouraging more people to participate regularly in recreation and sports activities, the Leisure and Cultural Services Department organises a wide variety of sports training courses, recreational activities and sports competitions in the community. Moreover, major events and territory-wide projects including the Healthy Exercise for All Campaign, Young Athletes Training Scheme, Corporate Games, Masters Games, District Sports Teams Training Scheme and School Sports Programmes are also organised. In 2006-07, the Department organised over 29 100 community sports activities for more than 1 780 000 participants of all ages and abilities at a cost of about \$99 million.

In 2007-08, we will continue to organise various recreation and sports activities for different target groups. In addition, we will work closely with District Councils, local sports organisations and National Sports Associations to organise more sports activities with local characteristics; collaborate with voluntary agencies in implementing the "Healthy Exercise for Longevity" to encourage the elderly to participate in more structured sports activities; expand the School Sports Programme to enhance participation by schools; and support the organisation of the first Hong Kong Games. It is estimated that about 29 400 recreation and sports activities will be organised for about 1 785 000 participants at a cost of about \$111 million.

#### Reply:

The Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) supports local artist / arts groups by providing them with performance opportunities in the following manner -

- (a) presenting them at year-round cultural programmes at civic centres and in festivals organised by LCSD, including the International Arts Carnival in summer and the thematic arts festival every autumn, as well as the Programme Partnership Scheme organised at the various civic centres:
- (b) engaging them in audience building and arts education activities at schools, in the community venues, museums and civic centre facilities including foyers and open spaces; schemes offered included the Cultural Ambassador Scheme, the District Cantonese Opera Parade, the School Arts Animateur Scheme and the School Culture Day Scheme etc; and
- (c) featuring them in free entertainment programmes at various outdoor and indoor venues, in the districts and during festive carnivals.

In 2006-07, a total of 3 446 cultural performances featuring local artists with an expenditure of \$84,252,000 were organised. For 2007-08, the estimated number of such cultural performances will be 3 114, at an estimated expenditure of \$80,917,500. A detailed breakdown on activities supporting local artists/ arts groups is listed in the Annex. The decrease in the number of cultural performances in 2007-08 is mainly attributable to the number of performances by the six 3-year grantees supported by the Hong Kong Arts Development Council being taken out upon the transfer of their funding responsibilities to the Home Affairs Bureau following the recommendation of the Committee on Performing Arts.

From 2007-08 onwards, a Committee on Programme and Development, set up upon the advice of the Committee on Performing Arts comprising 13 members from six art form panels and the chairman of the Venue Partnership Committee will make recommendations to LCSD on the strategies for performing arts programmes, especially on formulating structured and sustainable strategies for supporting the development of local budding and small-scale performing arts groups.

The Community Garden Programme (the Programme) aims to encourage the public to participate in greening activities at the neighbourhood level. The Programme is organised in the form of gardening courses. Each participating unit (comprising five persons) will be allotted a planting plot of 2.25 square metres to practise gardening under the guidance of part-time horticultural instructors. The duration of each gardening course is four months. The course fee per participating unit is \$400.

The Programme was first launched in February 2004 and was well received by the public. It has been extended to all 18 Districts by the end of 2005. The estimated expenditure for each gardening course is \$50,000 which is mainly used to employ part-time horticultural instructors and staff to man the community garden. In 2006-07, a total of 40 gardening courses were organised for around 1 400 participating units (7 000 persons). The estimated expenditure was about \$2 million and revenue was about \$0.56 million. In 2007-08, we plan to maintain the scale of the Programme with the same level of provision (i.e. \$2 million) as in 2006-07.

<u>Note</u>: Phase 1 will mainly consist of the core library functions and Phase 2 will consist of the new or enhanced functions.

The Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) will procure hardware, software and implementation services through an open tender so as to engage a contractor with good reference and experience in implementing projects of a similar magnitude. LCSD will form a project team to monitor the performance of the contractor in order to ensure that the project is completed as planned. The total estimated non-recurrent expenditure for the procurement of hardware, software and implementation services is \$156,451,000. Since a consultancy study has been conducted before working out the roadmap for the replacement of the LAS, the implementation phase will not require the service of another consultancy firm.

- (b) The project to replace the LAS includes a pilot run of a RFID sub-system in six public libraries. In addition, the new LAS will provide the public with a high quality digital reference service through the introduction of virtual reference utilities that will enable the libraries to handle online enquiries more effectively and efficiently with a knowledge base of reference questions and answers. The new system will also introduce innovative electronic resources management utilities to enable readers to effectively access various types of electronic resources such as e-books, online databases and e-journals.
- (c) The entire replacement project will incur an estimated non-recurrent expenditure of \$196,467,000 over a period of six years with breakdown as follows:

- (a) The actual attendance in 2006 was lower than the target mainly because the attendance at two major exhibitions, viz the "Football Exhibition" and the "Artists and Their Models Masterpieces from the Centre Pompidou, Paris", was lower than that estimated despite intensive marketing efforts.
- (b) The target attendance at education and extension activities in 2006 was 1 055 000 while the actual figure was 1 049 264, which represents only a marginal difference of 0.54%. The target set is actually an estimation, and the difference in the estimated and actual numbers in question is not significant.
- (c) The estimated operating expenditure for all public museums in 2007-08 is \$462 million.

(d) To boost attendance, we will introduce more diverse and vibrant exhibitions, and enhance the publicity for our programmes in 2007. We are planning a series of blockbuster exhibitions to be staged at the Hong Kong Museum of Art, the Hong Kong Museum of History, the Hong Kong Science Museum and the Hong Kong Heritage Museum between the second and fourth quarters of 2007. #### Reply:

(a) Factors that affect the progress of our work related to declaration of historical buildings as monuments are manifold, such as the time required to clarify the ownership and land entitlement of the buildings, the willingness of the building owners to declare their buildings as monuments, and the difficulty in locating the owners particularly in cases of multiple ownership. The time required to settle the problems encountered cannot be accurately predicted in many cases. While some cases are more straight-forward, the preparatory work in other cases may take years. For 2007-08, we plan to declare Chik Kwai Study Hall in Pat Heung, Yuen Long as a monument under the Antiquities and Monuments Ordinance. The owner has already indicated no objection to the declaration.

The declaration of monument is a legal process under the Antiquities and Monuments Ordinance and the work is undertaken by the Antiquities and Monument Office (AMO) with its existing resources. However, additional capital expenditure will be required for renovating the historical buildings after they have been declared as monuments and before they can be opened to the public. In the case of Chik Kwai Study Hall, the Government would need to spend about \$5.5 million on its restoration.

- (b) The Government is committed to preserving buildings of heritage value and will consider declaring them as monuments as appropriate and practicable. However, declaring buildings as monuments is not the only means to preserve historical buildings and it is not praticable to increase the target number of declared monuments without knowing the plans and stance of owners of the buildings. Nevertheless, the Government will take different measures as appropriate to preserve buildings of high heritage value.
- (c) Depending on the ownership, the restoration and maintenance responsibilities of the declared monuments and graded historical buildings are undertaken by various parties including the AMO, the Architectural Services Department, other user government departments and/or private owners. The cost of restoration and maintenance of these buildings varies according to their individual physical condition, and the conservation and maintenance requirements specified by conservation experts. In 2006-07, the projected expenditure of AMO on restoring and maintaining monuments and historical buildings is \$11 million for a total of 79 projects.
- (d) The AMO draws up an annual maintenance programme for privately-owned declared monuments which are open for public visitation in consultation with the Antiquities Advisory Board. An estimated target of 60 restoration and maintenance projects in 2007 is put up after an assessment of the physical condition of the monuments during site inspections by AMO. Emergency repair and maintenance works, which cannot be projected and will be carried out when necessary, are not included in the target.

  - (II) The cash flow requirements for the following projects have been revised
    - (i) Replacement of star projector and seating at the Space Theatre of the Hong Kong Space Museum The tendering of the project has been deferred due to the need to conduct a technical feasibility study on a new technology now available in the projector system market.
    - (ii) Restoration and fabrication works of the Fireboat Alexander Grantham The works have been delayed due to unforeseen circumstances including site accidents involving the lifting system, the unavailability of lifting barge, and unfavourable weather and sea conditions which had delayed moving the Fireboat from the dockyard and lifting it from the sea to the park at Quarry Bay.
    - (iii) Restoration of historical buildings The restoration works can only proceed after the Department has obtained the consent of their respective owners for declaring the buildings as monuments. For some projects, the negotiation has taken longer than expected. For some traditional Chinese historical buildings, the commencement of the restoration works is subject to the setting of an auspicious day to the satisfaction of the owners/villagers, which has caused slippage to the original schedule.

(b) The reduction in the estimate for 2007-08 is due to a number of considerations. The museums will continue to exercise economy in spending on operation, building maintenance and organisation of programmes. Moreover, since some special projects such as replacement of minor plant and equipment, and renewal of exhibits and displays had been completed in 2006, a lower provision will be required for 2007-08.

- (a) Under the Antiquities and Monuments Ordinance (Cap. 53), the Antiquities Authority (i.e. the Secretary for Home Affairs) may, after consultation with the Antiquities Advisory Board (AAB) and with the approval of the Chief Executive, declare any place, building, site or structure, which he considers to be of public interest by reason of its historical significance, to be a monument. In March 2005, the AAB appointed an expert panel to assess the heritage value of 1 440 buildings constructed before 1950. The assessment is being undertaken based on a set of criteria comprising historical interest, architectural merit, rarity, group value, collective memory and social value, authenticity and building integrity. Upon completion of the assessment, the expert panel will submit the assessment results to the AAB which would then identify buildings for grading or for declaration as monuments, and submit recommendations to the Antiquities Authority for consideration.
- (b) As mentioned in (a) above, the expert panel appointed by the AAB is assessing the heritage value of 1 440 historical buildings. The work involves complicated considerations and will take some time to complete.

The reduction in the financial provision required for 2006-07 is mainly due to the following reasons –

- (a) Recurrent expenditure \$24 million
  - The museums had exercised economy in spending on operation and building maintenance, as well as organisation of programmes.
- (b) Restoration of historical buildings \$32 million
  - Restoration works for privately-owned historical buildings can only proceed with the owners' consent over declaration of their buildings as monuments. Some restoration projects could not proceed in 2006-07 as planned because more time than expected was needed for negotiation with the building owners concerned. For some traditional Chinese historical buildings, the commencement of works was subject to the setting of an auspicious day to the satisfaction of the owners/villagers, which had led to slippage in the works schedule in some cases.
- (c) Replacement of star projector and seating at the Space Theatre of the Hong Kong Space Museum \$14 million
  - Since new and reliable technology of the projection system has recently been available in the market, the implementation timetable for the project has been deferred to allow more time for the Department to conduct a technical feasibility study before tendering.

- (d) Restoration and fabrication of the Fireboat Alexander Grantham \$11 million
  - The schedule of the restoration and fabrication works has been revised due to unforeseen circumstances including site accidents involving the lift system, the unavailability of lifting barge, and unfavourable weather and sea conditions. The problems had delayed moving the Fireboat from the dockyard and lifting it from the sea to the park at Quarry Bay.

### Reply:

This project is one of the 25 priority projects announced in the January 2005 Policy Address. The project site, formerly the Ngau Chi Wan Landfill, comprises four platforms with a total area of about four hectares. The proposed scope of the project comprises:

- (a) an archery field with natural turfed ground;
- (b) a fitness corner with exercise stations, jogging track and pebble path for the elderly;
- (c) children's play area for children of different age groups;
- (d) a central lawn with associated facilities such as rain shelters, seatings, elderly fitness/play equipment;
- (e) one basketball court, colour coated and with floodlight;
- (f) a landscaped garden with sitting-out facilities, rain-shelters/pavilions and extensive planting of heavy flowering trees and shrubs etc; and
- (g) ancillary facilities including changing rooms, toilets and storerooms.

The overall construction cost is comparatively higher because the site covers four hectares in area and comprises four platforms at different levels. In addition, the site is a former landfill site, which requires special attention on the foundation design and the associated facilities due to the existence of aftercare facilities i.e. passive vent, leachate system, etc. Having regard to the factors mentioned above, the construction cost is considered to be reasonable.

The construction works are scheduled to commence in early 2008 for completion in early 2010. In view of the project complexity and site constraints, there is very limited room for expediting the programme.

- (d) The development programme for the project has been condensed previously and the project is now under construction. There would practically be little room for further acceleration. The question of partial opening of the facilities will be considered in due course vis-a-vis the progress of the construction works; and

(e) Before the completion of 3256RS, the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) will continue to provide more varieties of recreation programmes for the residents in Tung Chung, particularly the youths, through the scheme, "Kicking off from Tung Chung", and "School Sports Programme". These programmes include activities like football, swimming, rope-skipping, shuttlecock, dancing and outing. In 2007-08, LCSD will organise over 200 recreational programmes for over 15 000 participants. To facilitate the development of soccer activities in the community, LCSD will take forward two minor works projects to provide a 5-a-side soccer pitch and a 7-a-side soccer pitch near Yat Tung Estate. Works for the two projects are expected to commence in late 2007 for completion in late 2008.

To meet the demand for library service in Tung Chung, LCSD has set up a small library at Yat Tung Shopping Centre since 2004 as an interim arrangement. In addition, mobile library services are provided at Fu Tung Estate every Monday and Wednesday, and at Man Tung Road Park every Thursday.

These projects include the construction of piers and helipads, footpaths, access roads, drainage facilities, sitting out areas and rainshelters etc. It is expected that about 110 projects will be completed in 2007-08.

For Subhead 7015CX – Urban Minor Works programme, the estimated provision in 2007-08 is \$30 million for the implementation of 86 projects (comprising 40 new and 46 on-going projects). These projects include the construction of walking trails, sitting out areas and rainshelters etc. We expect some 59 projects to be completed in 2007-08.

For Subhead 7016CX – District Minor Works programme, it is a new block allocation created under the District Council (DC) review recommendations. The redevelopment of the Hong Kong Sports Institute (HKSI) aims at upgrading the existing facilities at the Hong Kong Sports Institute to international standard, meeting the current shortfall in training venues for some elite sports and providing the well needed infrastructure and enhancement conducive to elite sports training and development. Based on a report submitted by a Joint Task Force on Redevelopment of Hong Kong Sports Institute, the redevelopment was estimated to cost \$1.4 billion. Following the announcement of a Government commitment to the Hong Kong Sports Institute redevelopment project in the Chief Executive's 2006-07 Policy Address, a Hong Kong Sports Institute Redevelopment Project Steering Committee (the Committee), comprising government and HKSI representatives, was set up in November 2006 to plan and oversee the implementation of the project. The Committee is now working on the details of the scope of works and updating the project cost. The next step would be for the HKSI to consult the stakeholders. We will also consult the Sha Tin District Council and the LegCo Home Affairs Panel before the middle of this year.
