Phase one of the services to be launched in late March 2007 will include a 24-hour hotline, arrangement of immediate intervention and follow services, after office up hours outreaching/crisis intervention services and case consultation services. Short-term accommodation services will be provided in Phase two, tentatively scheduled to come on stream in early 2008.

> In addition to serving victims of sexual violence, the Centre will complement existing service for victims of domestic violence and

<u>Reply</u>:

Scheduled route services include cross harbour service and non-cross harbour service, and the monthly fare is \$264 and \$184 respectively. Half-monthly passes are also available at \$132 and \$62 for cross harbour service and non-cross harbour service respectively. As at end February 2007, no people with disabilities (PWDs) having no alternative means of transport to travel to their work place were put on the waiting list for scheduled route services. Some PWDs who can use public transport or have access to other means of transport do apply for rehabus service. Their average waiting time for the use of rehabus scheduled route services is about two months, allowing for adjustments to the boarding/disembarking schedules and locations, after a suitable route with seat available is identified.

To meet the demand for rehabus services, four additional rehabuses will be procured in 2007-08 and the total estimated expenditure involved is \$2.52 million. The new buses are expected to commence operation in late 2007.

Improving the accessibility of people with disabilities is one of the transport policy objectives. Public transport operators are constantly striving to make their services more accessible and convenient to all passengers, including people with special needs due to disabilities or other mobility handicaps.

Reply :(1) Making use of the additional recurrent funding of \$20 million secured<br/>in 2006-07, the Social Welfare Department (SWD) has increased the<br/>capacity of the non-frailty tested home care services for the elderly<br/>provided by the 60 Integrated Home Care Services (IHCS) Teams.<br/>The additional capacity has started coming into place since January<br/>2007. SWD projects that about 2 000 additional new cases will be<br/>served.

As regards the Enhanced Home and Community Care Services (EHCCS) which serve frail elders, SWD has over the past two years increased service capacity of the teams to meet the demand. The number of EHCCS users has increased from 2 885 in 2005-06 to 3 385 in 2006-07. As at end of February 2007, the utilisation rate was 82.5%. SWD will continue to monitor the service demand for EHCCS and increase the service volume for districts with high service demand where necessary.

- (2) The estimated expenditure on IHCS and EHCCS is \$391 million and \$96 million respectively in 2007-08.
- (3) The total expenditure on IHCS and EHCCS is estimated to be \$487 million in 2007-08 as compared to \$439 million in 2006-07, i.e. an 11% increase in resource allocation for these two services.

Reply Serial No. HWFB(WW)005 Question Serial No. 0133 The reduction in the cost per case per month for IHCS in the 2007-08 Estimate (\$1,169) as compared to the 2006-07 Revised Estimate (\$1,187) is mainly due to the relatively lower unit cost of the additional capacity mentioned in (1) above due to economies of scale.

The reduction in the cost per case per month for EHCCS in the 2006-07 Revised Estimate (\$2,820) as compared to 2005-06 (\$3,147) is due to the additional service volume which the operators have offered under the new contracts to provide without extra cost to the prescribed contract sum. The reduction in the cost per case per month in the 2007-08 Estimate (\$2,817) as compared to the 2006-07 Revised Estimate (\$2,820) is due to the adjustment of contract sum arising from the fall of the Composite Consumer Price Index.

(4) The waiting time for non-frailty tested home care services provided by the IHCS Teams varies on a case by case basis, ranging from a few days to a few months. As a guiding principle, the IHCS Teams will continue to accord priorities to elders who have urgent needs for services and will provide the most needed services (e.g. meal delivery) to them almost instantly.

With the additional capacity of the IHCS Teams mentioned in (1) above, we expect that about 2 000 new cases will be served. This should markedly reduce the waiting list.

The Social Welfare Department (SWD) provides a series of vocational <u>Reply</u> : rehabilitation training programmes to meet the various training needs of people with disabilities (PWD), which include sheltered workshop (SW), supported employment (SE), integrated vocational rehabilitation services centres (IVRSCs), integrated vocational training centre (IVTC), On the Job Training Programme for People with Disabilities (OTJ) and Sunnyway -On the Job Training Programme for Young People with Disabilities IVRSCs were set up since April 2004 by pooling the (Sunnyway). resources of SW and SE to provide PWD with a series of seamless and integrated vocational services in one service setting. In a review conducted by SWD in 2005, it was concluded that the IVRSCs had delivered a greater variety of training in a more flexible and integrated manner and were more able to meet the service users' changing needs. Therefore, IVRSCs is now a preferred direction and existing SWs will be converted to IVRSCs when possible. This accounts for the decreasing provision in SWs in 2007-08.

The Administration has implemented the policy of "one SSW for each secondary school" since the 2000/01 school year and the provision in the 2007-08 estimate amounts to \$206 million. The Steering Committee has covered a series of topics including support services for families, family-friendly employment practices, family and parenting education, and research, etc. The institutional arrangements and possible change options will be examined shortly. The aim is to complete the Study by mid-2007.

The expenditure involved in the Study is mainly staff costs and is estimated at about \$2.7 million, which will be absorbed within HWFB's existing resources.

- (1) The CSSA Scheme provides a safety net of last resort for individuals or families who cannot support themselves financially for such reasons as old age, disability, illness, unemployment, low earnings or single parenthood. During the first ten months in 2006-07, 27 807 new CSSA applications were approved. We do not keep a record of successful applications where the applicants have asked for immediate financial assistance.
  - (2) We are committed to providing prompt financial assistance to those who are genuinely in need. We also have the responsibility to conduct the means-test to ascertain that the applicants are genuinely in need of financial assistance. Hence, the average processing time for a CSSA application is 27 working days. For urgent cases, we would speed up the process as far as possible. We would also arrange payment from trust funds where an applicant has immediate financial needs.
  - (3) The current average processing time for new applications is considered reasonable. Our priority in the use of resources and manpower will be on improving the investigation of new applications and suspected fraud cases and reducing overpayment.

Volunteers including those who have overcome family/personal problems or crises will be recruited and trained to contact these families and to provide them with support and assistance. - Reply :Making use of the additional recurrent funding of \$20 million secured in<br/>2006-07, the Social Welfare Department (SWD) has increased the<br/>capacity of the non-frailty tested home care services for the elderly<br/>provided by the 60 Integrated Home Care Services (IHCS) Teams. The<br/>additional capacity has started coming into place since January 2007.<br/>SWD projects that about 2 000 additional new cases will be served.

The reduction in the cost per case per month for IHCS in the 2007-08 Estimate (\$1,169) as compared to the 2006-07 Revised Estimate (\$1,187) is mainly due to the relatively lower unit cost of the additional capacity mentioned above due to economies of scale.

As at December 2006, there were about 2 800 cases waiting for the non-frailty tested home care services under IHCS. All of them are not urgent cases. The waiting time varies on a case by case basis, ranging from a few days to a few months. Detailed breakdown by districts is not readily available. With the additional capacity of the IHCS Teams mentioned above, the waiting list will be markedly reduced.

As a guiding principle, the IHCS Teams will continue to accord priorities to elders who have urgent needs for services and provide the most needed services (e.g. meal delivery) to them almost instantly.

It is therefore possible for Day Care Centres to take in additional elders to fill in the unused time slots. We have set the enrolment rate at 108% to maximise the utilisation of the day care places.

Of the additional 80 day care places to be provided in 2007-08, 40 will be attached to two new contract homes in Kwun Tong and Yuen Long respectively. Another 40 will be provided in a Day Care Centre for the Elderly in the Eastern District. The Centre will not be attached to a contract home.

(2) As at early March 2007, there were 707 elders waiting for day care places. The average waiting time is four months. Four districts do not have waitlisted cases. For the remaining 14 districts, the average number of waitlisted cases is 50.

We will monitor the district demand and will, subject to the availability of suitable venues, provide additional day care places where necessary.

There will not be displacement of elders from the participating homes as conversion will be vacancy-led, which enables existing elders to stay in their existing homes for as long as necessary. If their health condition deteriorates, they will be given priority to occupy the C&A places providing continuum of care created in their homes.

In parallel, we have also been increasing the supply of subsidised residential care places through other means elsewhere. In 2007-08, about 600 additional subsidised residential care places for the elderly will be created in new purpose-built premises and through purchasing places from private residential care homes for the elderly.

As at to-date, 39 out of the 75 RCHEs have already started converting their places into C&A places providing continuum of care. We project that another 18 RCHEs will kick-start their conversion in 2007-08. Therefore, there will be 57 participating RCHEs in 2007-08.

(1) The re-engineering of residential child care services is a joint effort of the Social Welfare Department (SWD) and the non-governmental organisations (NGOs). The aim is to better re-distribute existing resources to services that will benefit more children and better suit their needs, thereby achieving a better match between service demand and provision.

Through this exercise, the overall number of places available in the residential child care services has increased in 2006-07. Specifically, while there was a reduction of 16 regular small group home places and 24 residential nursery places, the decrease was more than made up by the provision of 10 more foster care places, 12 more places in residential homes for children as well as 23 more emergency/short-term small group home places, resulting in a net increase of five places. The exercise involves a large number of NGO service providers and no information on the changes in their manpower is readily available. The financial resources for the residential services for children are \$367 million in 2006-07.

Upon harmonisation of pre-primary services in 2005, "child care centre" is re-defined as a centre serving children aged under three. A child care centre may consist of a day crèche section for children aged under two and a day nursery section for children aged two to under three. The reduction of eight places is proposed by the centre operator to convert them to become 28 half-day nursery places in view of the low demand for crèche service and increasing demand for half-day service for children aged two to under three. Arising from this conversion of places, the operator has to employ an additional child care worker at its own cost. The conversion results in an annual savings in subvention of \$0.03 million for the Social Welfare Department (SWD).

The reduction of two occasional child care units is the net effect of the closure of three child care centres initiated by the service operators as a result of low utilisation, with one of the three concerned units to be re-provisioned to another district with service demand. Each IFSC has a minimum of 12 social workers apart from a supervisor and supporting staff. The actual manpower in individual IFSC varies according to district needs. Individual IFSCs may have more social workers depending on the population served and the complexity of social problems in the district.
  - (2) The number of 82 425 intensive counselling/brief counselling/supportive casework cases estimated to be handled by IFSCs in 2007-08, as compared with that in 2005-06 (i.e. 73 044) represents an increase of about 13%. - <u>Reply</u>: (1) The ND Project, launched in April 2006, is an 18-month trial project. It aims to help single parents and child carers with their youngest child aged 12 to 14 receiving Comprehensive Social Security Assistance (CSSA) build up their capacity for work, integrate into society and move to self-reliance through engagement in employment as early as possible. In order to assess the effectiveness of the ND Project, Social Welfare Department has commissioned an evaluation study at the cost of \$0.8 million. The study is in progress. The study is expected to be completed in mid-2007.
  - (2) The study is underway and the results are not yet available at this stage. In March 2002, we introduced the Ending Exclusion Project (EEP) to assist single parents on CSSA with young children to seek employment. However, participation under EEP was voluntary and the outcome was not encouraging. In view of our experience with the EEP, our aim is to better help the recipients to end social exclusion, to build up their capacity for joining the labour market and start the process of becoming self-reliant through paid employment as soon as their family circumstances permit. Hence, participation in the ND Project is mandatory for all single parents and child carers on CSSA with the youngest child aged 12 to 14 to seek employment entailing not less than 32 hours a month. Exemptions from joining the ND Project are allowed

- Reply :(1) The exercise is to monitor and review, on an on-going basis, the existing<br/>arrangements to help and motivate unemployed able-bodied CSSA<br/>recipients, especially the long-term ones, to move into work and become<br/>self-reliant. It aims to evaluate the effectiveness of the existing<br/>arrangements and explore whether new measures should be tried out.<br/>We make use of the existing in-house resources, involving one Chief<br/>Social Security Officer, one Senior Social Security Officer, one Social<br/>Security Officer I and two Social Security Officers II, to conduct the<br/>exercise.
  - (2) There is presently no plan to separate unemployment assistance from the current CSSA system. Able-bodied CSSA recipients already receive a lower standard rate when compared with other recipients and are required to take part in the Support for Self-Reliance (SFS) Scheme.
  - (3) Under the existing arrangements, Social Welfare Department has dedicated teams of staff to provide specialised services to the unemployed able-bodied CSSA recipients on an individual and personal basis. Upon receipt of an application for CSSA from an unemployed person, Senior Social Security Assistants (SSSAs) conduct an

investigation and verification of their circumstances. Under the SFS Scheme, which an unemployed able-bodied CSSA recipient is required to join, the Employment Assistance (EA) Co-ordinators conduct in-depth interviews with the participants every fortnight to check the progress of their search for work, provide information on job vacancies and provide job matching and post-placement services to help them re-enter the workforce. Information on job vacancies is provided by Labour Department's Vacancy Search Terminal set up at Social Security Field Units (SSFUs). Job Developers have also been created since 2003 to facilitate job matching under the SFS Scheme. They liaise with local organisations and employers to obtain more information on job opportunities for the SFS participants and pass on such information to the EA Co-ordinators for arrangements of job matching for the participants. The EA Co-ordinators would also refer participants for the Intensive Employment Assistance Programmes if they are considered to be in need of additional help to move into work. The SSSAs, EA Co-ordinators and Job Developers work closely in the SSFUs to provide financial and employment services to the unemployed able-bodied CSSA recipients.

<u>Reply</u>: (1) In 2005, we undertook to review the existing arrangements of DE under the CSSA Scheme which came into effect on 1 June 2003 as a package to promote self-reliance. The Financial Secretary announced in his 2007-08 Budget Speech on 28 February that the Administration will raise the 'no-deduction' limit for DE from \$600 to \$800; and relax the criteria for allowing CSSA recipients to be eligible for DE from not less than three months on CSSA to not less than two months.

We plan to consult the LegCo Panel on Welfare Services in March 2007 and then make a submission to the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council in April 2007 to seek funding approval for this proposed arrangement.

The financial implications for implementing the whole package will be around \$30 million per annum. Manpower resources for implementing the proposed measures on DE will be absorbed by the existing staffing provisions.

(2) We consider that the proposed improvements should be able to strike a balance between encouraging able-bodied CSSA recipients to work and not delaying their exit from the CSSA system.

(1) The SWD has commissioned non-governmental organisations (NGOs) Reply : to run three DEAT Projects, one each in Tsuen Wan/Kwai Tsing, Tung Wai districts, from October 2006 to Chung and Tin Shui September 2008 to help 300 long-term Comprehensive Social Security Assistance (CSSA) able-bodied unemployed recipients move into work. The operating NGOs provide a comprehensive package of employment assistance services including soft skills training, job-search assistance, employment-related and non-employment-related counselling, job matching, job attachment, work-focused training and post-employment support services. To further encourage participants to seek and remain in employment, in addition to the provision of Temporary Financial Aid which helps participants the needy meet the short-term employment-related needs such as travelling expenses to attend job interviews, a one-off incentive of \$1,500 for 'return-to-work' is granted to those who have secured full-time job. Participants are required to refund the incentive if they leave the job within the first four months without good reasons.

The estimated total cost of the three trial projects is \$4.5 million. No additional staff is required by SWD.

(2) The operating NGOs would consider the working ability of individual participants and the current market demand in arranging the job skills training courses. The courses that have been organised include skills training on pest control, exhibition venue lighting installation and

<u>Reply</u> :

(1) In line with the principle that subsidised residential care places for the elderly should provide long term care (LTC) and continuum of care, the Social Welfare Department has since 2005-06 implemented the programme of converting self-care hostel (S/C) and home for the aged (H/A) places which have no LTC element, and some existing care-and-attention (C&A) places not providing continuum of care, into C&A places providing continuum of care. The welfare sector supported the conversion proposal and the Legislative Council Panel on Welfare Services was consulted on the programme in 2005.

The conversion programme involves 75 residential care homes for the elderly (RCHEs). As at to-date, 39 of them have already started converting their places into C&A places providing continuum of care. We project that another 18 RCHEs will kick-start their conversion in 2007-08. Therefore, there will be 57 participating RCHEs in 2007-08.

(2) The conversion exercise is conducted on a subventions-neutral basis. The C&A places created under the programme will provide

continuum of care which will better meet elders' need for LTC services. As the unit cost of a C&A place providing continuum of care is higher than the unit cost of a place not providing continuum of care, the number of C&A places to be created under the programme will be smaller than the number of places being replaced. There will not be displacement of elders from the participating homes as conversion will be vacancy-led, which enables existing elders to stay in their existing homes for as long as necessary. If their health condition deteriorates, they will be given priority to occupy the C&A places providing continuum of care created in their homes.

In parallel, we have also been increasing the supply of subsidised residential care places through other means elsewhere. In 2007-08, about 600 additional subsidised residential care places for the elderly will be created in new purpose-built premises and through purchasing places from private residential care homes for the elderly.

As the population ages, the demand for subsidised residential care places will increase. The Commission on Poverty and the Elderly Commission will continue to explore ways of responding to the challenges effectively.

- Reply:(1) District Elderly Community Centres (DECCs) and Neighbourhood<br/>Elderly Centres (NECs) provide integrated services comprising<br/>promotion of active and healthy ageing, counselling and case<br/>management, outreaching and networking support to vulnerable<br/>elders, development of volunteerism among elders, and support for<br/>carers. Social Centres for the Elderly (S/Es) organise mainly social<br/>and recreational activities for elders in the community and provide<br/>them with a platform for building social network.

In 2007-08, the estimated expenditure for DECCs, NECs and S/Es is \$368.9 million.

The notional staffing for a DECC, NEC and S/E is 17, 6 and 5 staff respectively. That said, the service providers have the flexibility to adjust the staff mix according to the service needs under the Lump Sum Grant subvention mode.

(2) Currently, there are 41 DECCs, 115 NECs and 58 S/Es which form a territory-wide social support network for the elders in the community and their carers. Over 170 000 elders are members of the DECCs, NECs and S/Es. We will monitor the service demand for new centres in individual districts.

Taking into account the enhanced functions of DECCs and NECs, we have enhanced the area provision of a DECC to  $572m^2$  and a NEC to  $394 m^2$  when launching the re-engineering exercise for upgrading the

- (1) The figures of 628 612 and 649 400 refer to the actual number of SSA cases served in 2005-06 and the estimated number of SSA cases to be served in 2007-08 respectively. In terms of authorised cases, the average number for 2005-06 is 552 011 and the estimated average numbers for 2006-07 and 2007-08 are 574 800 and 609 400 respectively. The estimated expenditure for 2007-08 is \$5.9 billion. There are 1 166 staff in 37 Social Security Field Units who are responsible for processing and reviewing Comprehensive Social Security Assistance (CSSA) and SSA cases.
  - (2) The projection for 2007-08 is based on the recent trend of SSA caseload. Although we have seen a decreasing trend in the Normal Old Age Allowance cases during the past year, we expect that there will still be increases in other categories of cases including Higher Old Age Allowance and Disability Allowance. We therefore estimate that there will be an overall increase in the number of SSA cases in 2007-08.




Reply:

To promote gender mainstreaming, the Administration has, with the assistance of the Women's Commission, established a network of Gender Focal Points (at directorate rank in most cases) in all bureaux and departments. The Gender Focal Points serve as the contact and resource persons within their organisations and are tasked to help raise awareness and understanding of gender-related issues, and promote the use of the Gender Mainstreaming Checklist (Checklist) within their respective organisations.

To further promote gender mainstreaming within the Government, a core group of Gender Focal Points has been set up to devise plans and strategies to facilitate the proactive application of the Checklist by bureaux/departments. On the suggestion of the core group, we are strengthening gender-related training for civil servants to enhance understanding of gender mainstreaming and are planning to produce an information leaflet on gender mainstreaming for distribution to all civil servants. In the coming year, we will continue to strengthen the network of Gender Focal Points through regular meetings and experience-sharing.

#### Reply:

With the assistance of the Women's Commission, the Administration has kept under review policies and services related to women, while promoting also the development of new or improved services for women. Key areas reviewed over the years include health care services, public housing, information technology training, employment services and job-related training, adult and continuous education, welfare services and family services, services for victims of domestic and sexual violence and violence prevention programme. In terms of new services or service model developed following the reviews, the Administration has, for instance, strengthened collection of sex-disaggregated data and started the annual publication of Women and Men Statistics since 2001; and introduced a territory-wide Cervical Screening Programme in March 2004 to better prevent cervical cancer. Besides, the Women's Commission has also introduced in March 2004 the Capacity Building Mileage Programme, which adopts a new and flexible model for promoting continuous learning and the empowerment of women.

In 2007-08, the Administration will work with the Women's Commission to conduct further reviews of policies and services, including on women's participation in the advisory and statutory bodies, family-friendly employment policies and practices, and employment services and protection for women etc. and where appropriate recommend areas for enhancement.

Resources arising from development of new or improved services are absorbed from within the existing resources of the bureaux and departments concerned.

Reply:

The Administration has set a gender benchmark of 25% as an initial working target for appointment to advisory and statutory bodies (ASBs). A proactive approach has been taken to achieve the target, including –

- (a) increasing the number of female candidates in the Central Personality Index managed by the Home Affairs Bureau;
- (b) requiring all submissions making recommendations for appointments to ASBs to include a paragraph on gender consideration; and
- (c) encouraging bureaux and departments to reach out, identify and cultivate women who are able and willing to contribute to the work of ASBs.

As a result, women's participation in ASBs has reached the target of 25% in December 2005, against the level of 20.3% in December 2002. As at end December 2006, about 26% of the appointed members were women.

The Administration would continue to work closely with the Women's Commission and women's organisations to enhance women's participation in ASBs.

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#### Reply:

- (1) The Administration has set a gender benchmark of 25% as an initial working target for appointment to advisory and statutory bodies (ASBs). A proactive approach has been taken to achieve the target, including
  - (a) increasing the number of female candidates in the Central Personality Index managed by the Home Affairs Bureau;
  - (b) requiring all submissions making recommendations for appointments to ASBs to include a paragraph on gender consideration; and
  - (c) encouraging bureaux and departments to reach out, identify and cultivate women who are able and willing to contribute to the work of ASBs.

As a result, women's participation in ASBs has reached the target of 25% in December 2005, against the level of 20.3% in December 2002. As at end December 2006, about 26% of the appointed members were women.

Resources required for carrying out the above measures are absorbed from within the existing resources of bureaux and departments concerned.

(2) The Home Affairs Bureau will consider the suggestion of the Women's Commission to raise the target further, having regard to local experience and international practices. Meanwhile, we will continue to work closely with the Women's Commission and women's organisations to enhance women's participation in ASBs.

Reply:

(1) Gender mainstreaming means incorporating women's as well as men's needs, concerns and experiences in the policy-formulation process. Since 2002, the Administration has, with the assistance of the Women's Commission, applied the Gender Mainstreaming Checklist (Checklist) developed by the Commission to 24 policy areas or programmes, covering areas which are of relevance to women such as health care reform, secondary school places allocation, review of the Domestic Violence Ordinance, and services for victims of domestic violence and sexual violence etc. In 2007-08, the Administration will continue to follow up on the five programme areas that have commenced application of the Checklist in 2006-07. We will work with the Women's Commission to roll out the Checklist to more policy areas or programmes in 2007-08.

Resources required for carrying out the above measures are absorbed from within the existing resources of the bureaux and departments concerned.

(2) Gender mainstreaming is still a relatively new concept in Hong Kong. For it to become an integral part of the policy-formulation and service delivery process, it is crucial to first develop a better understanding and awareness of the concept across the civil service. To this end, we have been providing training on gender-related issues on a regular basis to different levels of civil servants, from the senior officials involved in the formulation of

policies, to the frontline civil servants who are involved in the delivery of the services. These efforts will continue.

(3) To further promote the application of the Checklist within the Administration, the Health, Welfare and Food Bureau supported the Women's Commission's initiative to publish an experience-sharing booklet in January 2006. The booklet was widely distributed to all bureaux and departments, all Legislative Council Members, all female District Councillors, and over 250 women's groups and non-governmental organisations. The general public can also have access to the booklet and Checklist, which are available on the websites of the Women's Commission and of HWFB. The Administration will continue to work with the Women's Commission on ways to promote better public understanding of the concept of gender mainstreaming and the Checklist.

- (1) C&A homes for the aged blind provide residential service with an Reply : appropriate level of care for aged blind persons. In 2006-07, the expenditure on the service of C&A homes for the aged blind is \$82.1 million. Under the current mode of lump sum grant, these homes, other than being required to have registered social workers and qualified nurses on their staff, enjoy the flexibility in recruiting other suitable staff to meet the service need.
  - (2) Currently, there are 11 C&A homes for the aged blind providing a total of 825 places. As at 28 February 2007, there were 90 aged blind persons on the waiting list, and the waiting time is about 7 months on average. Applicants without location preference could receive service sooner. The Administration will monitor the service demand and the need for increasing the provision of C&A places for the more frail aged blind.

(1) Social Welfare Department (SWD) set up the "Enhancing Employment Reply : of People with Disabilities through Small Enterprises" Project in 2001 with a one-off grant of \$50 million. Through payment of grants as seed money to non-governmental organisations (NGOs), this Project supports the creation of small enterprises/businesses by NGOs to provide employment for people with disabilities (PWD) in a carefully planned and sympathetic working environment. The number of employees with disabilities should not be less than 50% of the total number of employees in each business. As at February 2007, a total sum of \$22 million had been granted to support 21 NGOs to set up 42 businesses of various nature, including cleaning, catering, car beauty, mobile massage, retail shops, vegetable supply and processing, household service, travel agency. These businesses created about 510 jobs in which over 370 were tailor-made for PWD.

> (2) The Project has been a forerunner of social enterprises in Hong Kong. SWD will continue to encourage NGOs to set up more social enterprises through provisions of grants under the Project.

On the part of Social Welfare Department, the development and implementation of the BIP is undertaken by staff of the Clinical Psychology Units and FCPSUs. There is no breakdown on funding specifically allocated for this purpose.

A wide range of family education programmes were implemented by different Government bureaux and departments through different channels in 2006-07. Graduates will have to work in the Welfare Sector for at least a consecutive two years after graduation. The financial provision for the third batch is \$5.2 million.

- Reply : In line with the principle that subsidised residential care places for the elderly should provide long term care (LTC) and continuum of care, the Social Welfare Department has since 2005-06 implemented the programme of converting self-care (S/C) hostel and home for the aged (H/A) places which have no LTC element, and some existing care-and-attention (C&A) places not providing continuum of care, into C&A places providing continuum of care. The welfare sector supported the conversion proposal and the Legislative Council Panel on Welfare Services was consulted on the programme in 2005.

The conversion exercise is conducted on a subventions-neutral basis. The C&A places created under the programme will provide continuum of care which will better meet elders' need for LTC services. As the unit cost of a C&A place providing continuum of care is higher than the unit cost of a place not providing continuum of care, the number of C&A places to be created under the programme will be smaller than the number of places being replaced. There will not be displacement of elders from the participating homes as conversion will be vacancy-led, which enables existing elders to stay in their existing homes for as long as necessary. If their health condition deteriorates, they will be given priority to occupy the C&A places providing continuum of care created in their homes.

To cope with the increase in service demand, the Administration has over the years increased resources to the non-governmental organisations operating young people services. A summary of the major initiatives is given below -

- (a) \$20.9 million per annum effective from 2005-06, comprising \$12.9 million and \$8 million to enhance respectively the outreaching services for young night drifters rendered by the designated Integrated Children and Youth Services Centres and the Community Support Service Schemes for young persons cautioned under the Police Superintendents' Discretion Scheme;
- (b) \$3.7 million per annum earmarked to enhance the staffing and programme provisions of the Counselling Centres for Psychotropic Substance Abusers in 2007-08; and

- (1) Between December 2005 and October 2006, the Social Welfare Department (SWD) has increased the service capacity of the frailty-tested home care services for the elderly provided by the EHCCS Teams in districts which have high demand. The number of EHCCS users is projected to increase from 2 885 in 2005-06 to 3 385 in 2006-07. As at end February 2007, the utilisation rate was 82.5%. SWD will continue to monitor the service demand for EHCCS in 2007-08 and increase the service volume for districts with high service demand where necessary.

The expenditure on EHCCS in 2007-08 is estimated to be \$96 million.

(2) Including the unfilled quota for the frailty-tested home care cases available in the Integrated Home Care Services (IHCS) Teams, there were 490 vacancies as at end February 2007.

There were about 2 800 cases waiting for the non-frailty tested home care services provided by the IHCS Teams . All of them are not urgent cases. The waiting time varies on a case by case basis, ranging from a few days to a few months.

Making use of the additional recurrent funding of \$20 million secured in 2006-07, the SWD has increased the capacity of the non-frailty tested home care services for the elderly. The additional capacity has started coming into place since January 2007. SWD projects that about 2 000 additional new cases will be served. With the additional capacity, the waiting list will be markedly reduced.

As a guiding principle, the IHCS Teams will continue to accord priorities to elders who have urgent needs for services and provide the most needed services (e.g. meal delivery) to them almost instantly.

A total of \$30 million has been allocated to launch, improve and partially extend the Comprehensive Child Development Service (CCDS) pilot. The pilot has been implemented in Sham Shui Po, Tin Shui Wai, Tuen Mun and Tseung Kwan O in phases since 2005. We have completed a review of the pilot run and plan to extend CCDS to all districts in phases and strengthen social services support.

- (1) In 2007-08, we will extend the CCDS to Tung Chung, the whole district of Yuen Long and Kwun Tong. We will take into account the social needs of different districts and the operational readiness of relevant health, social service and pre-primary service providers in considering the further roll-out plan. Subject to additional resources, it is our preliminary plan to complete the territory-wide extension of the CCDS by 2012. Amongst others, additional resources will be required in time for the employment of medical doctors, nurses and clinical psychologists.
- (2) CCDS aims to identify at an early stage and provide timely support to at-risk pregnant women, mothers with postnatal depression (PND), families with psychosocial needs and pre-primary children with physical, developmental and behavioural problems. The relevant service indicators include: the number of high-risk pregnant women identified and provided with multi-disciplinary intervention; the number and proportion of mothers with probable PND identified and provided with support services; the number and proportion of families

assessed for and identified with psychosocial needs and recommended for support services; and the number of children with physical, developmental or behaviour problems referred to the Maternal and Child Health Centres for assessment.

(3) CCDS is not a poverty alleviation initiative *per se*. It aims to identify children and families with health and social needs, including but not restricted to those from the low-income group, and provide them with assistance at an early stage. Families identified to be in need of further support services are offered appropriate assistance, including social services in the Integrated Family Service Centres. Moreover, referrals for employment, accommodation or financial assistance are also made when necessary.

The provision of \$5.1 million under Programme (5) covers the Guardianship Board and Environmental Advisory Service. Provision for the former is \$3.755 million, with breakdown as follows:

- (a) Staff cost : \$1.921 million
- (b) Accommodation Rental/Rate/Management fees: \$0.885 million
- (c) Other charges (utilities, publicity, honoraria, office expenses, etc): \$0.949 million

The functions and powers of the Guardianship Board are specified in the Mental Health Ordinance (Cap. 136). Its main statutory functions are to determine applications for guardianship orders for mentally incapacitated persons who have attained 18 years of age, to make guardianship orders in respect of mentally incapacitated persons and to review guardianship orders. The breakdown of the number of hearings conducted by the Guardianship Board in performing its statutory functions during the past three years is summarized as follows:

- allocate an additional \$96 million in the next four years to implement a trial scheme in two districts to provide one-stop support services to elderly dischargees who have difficulty taking care of themselves;
- allocate an additional \$38 million to 156 elderly centres to enhance their outreach programmes, so as to encourage and assist more elderly singletons, particularly the unidentified ones, to develop their social life, and provide referral and supporting services to those in need;
- allocate an additional \$16 million to provide additional subsidised residential care places in new purpose-built residential care homes for the elderly (RCHEs); and
- create another 450 subsidised residential care places through purchasing places from private RCHEs at a recurrent amount of \$30 million.

Supportive services, including training for carers/families to enhance their caring capacities, are essential components of this service.

Under this new service, a Community Rehabilitation Day Centre has been set up in Wan Chai in 2006, catering for discharged patients with physical impairments. In addition, CRDS for discharged mental patients is provided at five Training and Activity Centres. The total number of target beneficiaries for the CRDS already in operation is 1 800 per year. As the services were implemented only in October 2006, statistics on the utilisation of the service are not yet available. The annual expenditure for these services is \$8.1 million.

Women who have newly arrived in Hong Kong and are living in poverty are facing grave difficulties in living, family relationships and employment. They are also a group subject to discrimination. In this respect, does the Administration have any plans or activities specially dedicated to them under this Programme in 2007-08 to empower them and help them fully understand their own rights? If yes, what are the expenses involved? If no, what are the reasons?

#### Asked by: Hon. Chan Yuen-han

#### Reply:

The Administration is committed to promoting the interests and well-being of women in Hong Kong. On the advice of the Women's Commission, the Administration has adopted a three-pronged strategy to promote advancement of women development, viz. providing an enabling environment, empowering women and public education.

On empowerment of women, the Women's Commission has since March 2004 launched the Capacity Building Mileage Programme (CBMP). The CBMP aims to remove barriers to women's learning opportunities, help them build up their inner strength and fully realise their potential. In the past three years, the CBMP recorded a registered enrolment of 14,200, made up of women from different walks of life, including those newly arrived in Hong Kong and/or those in the lower income group. Feedback from different channels is that participants of CBMP have developed an interest in learning and have acquired more knowledge after joining the programme. They have also become more confident and empowered in tackling problems in daily life. Also, the changes in their mindsets have brought about positive impact on their families. In 2007-08, the Administration will devote about \$10 million to continue the running of the CBMP over the next three years, and to strengthen course contents in the four broad subject areas, viz. health, financial management, interpersonal relationships and daily-life.

In parallel, different bureaux and departments within the Administration have been providing, under their respective purviews, assistance to women in need. These include the services related to employment, education, training, social security, family support, health and medical support. In addition, the 61 Integrated Family Service Centres (IFSCs) across the territory also provide a

wide range of preventive, support and remedial services for people in need, including low-income families and new arrivals and their children. Extended hours of services have been provided at IFSCs to meet clients' needs. These efforts will continue.

In respect of the protection of the rights of women including newly arrived women and women living in poverty, the Sex Discrimination Ordinance and the Family Status Discrimination Ordinance, enforced by the Equal Opportunities Commission and under the policy responsibility of the Home Affairs Bureau, make it unlawful to discriminate against women on grounds of sex, marital status or pregnancy and family status in specified areas of activity including employment and education.

It is a conscious and voluntary decision of individual NGOs to opt for the LSG mode, taking into consideration their own circumstances and service nature.
  - (2) Since the implementation of the LSG subvention system on 1 January 2001, SWD has received a total of 19 complaints concerning different aspects of the remuneration of NGO staff, such as salary, provident fund scheme, job-related allowance, etc. Under the LSG mode, there is enhancement of NGOs' corporate governance and autonomy in the deployment of funds to meet service needs in a flexible manner. SWD will continue to work closely with the welfare sector to identify areas that require fine-tuning.

Phase one of the services to be launched in late March 2007 will include a 24-hour hotline, arrangement of immediate intervention and follow services. after office up hours outreaching/crisis intervention services and case consultation services. Short-term accommodation services will be provided in Phase two, tentatively scheduled to come on stream in early 2008. In addition to serving victims of sexual violence, the Centre will complement existing service for victims of domestic violence and individuals/families in crisis or distress and provide after-office hours outreaching service for elder abuse cases etc. This will create synergy among related services and optimise utilisation of resources.

The Centre, operated by a non-governmental organisation, is funded by the Lotteries Fund on a pilot basis. The estimated total operating cost is \$20 million for three years. The Centre will employ a team of 29 registered social workers and supporting staff to provide round-the-clock service throughout the year.

(2) The Centre will adopt a comprehensive and one-stop service model involving multi-disciplinary assistance for victims. A designated telephone line to enable fast track contact by professionals or referrers

For those who have long term care needs and cannot be adequately taken care of at home, we provide them with subsidised residential care services.

In 2007-08, the Government will allocate an additional \$150 million to strengthen elderly care and support services, which include:

- an additional \$38 million to 156 elderly centres to enhance their outreach programmes to provide assistance to elderly singletons, particularly the hidden ones, to develop their social life, and provide referral and supporting services to those in need;

The bulk of the new allocation will be used to support non-governmental organisations (NGOs) to form a total of 12 CMHIP Teams to deliver the new service at the 12 Social Welfare Department (SWD) administrative districts. Other than new resources for NGOs, additional manpower will also be allocated for Medical Social Work Units (Psychiatric) of SWD to strengthen the liaison with HA and NGOs, including to follow up on new cases.
- (2)(3)&(4)The CMHIP aims to provide intensive and outreaching social work intervention to persons with suspected mental health problems who have yet to receive any specialised social work intervention or psychiatric treatment. The CMHIP Teams will provide initial assessment and specialised social work interventions, including casework. therapeutic/supportive group services, to such newly identified psychiatric cases. Where necessary, the CMHIP Teams will refer cases to the Hospital Authority (HA) for more detailed assessment and follow up services. SWD will work out the implementation details including apportionment of funds, manpower involved, output and outcome indicators, etc. in consultation with the relevant stakeholders.
  - (5) The prompt engagement of persons with early signs of mental distress can help promote better mental health of the community. Hence, the Project per se should not further lengthen the waiting time for HA's psychiatric outpatient services. SWD will, in collaboration with HA, review in time the effectiveness of the Project and monitor the service demand and resource implication.

The SFS<br/>comprises an Active Employment Assistance Programme, community work<br/>and provision of disregarded earnings. In addition, SWD has commissioned<br/>NGOs to operate Intensive Employment Assistance Projects (IEAPs). In<br/>2006-07 (up to January 2007), 2 698 SFS participants have left CSSA and<br/>10 219 participants have changed their status to low earners under CSSA as<br/>a result of paid employment. As at end January 2007, there were 37 959<br/>participants in the Scheme.

In 2007-08, SWD will continue to implement and monitor the following projects.

- (a) The fourth batch of 40 IEAPs has been launched in October 2006 to help able-bodied employable CSSA recipients and 'near CSSA' recipients rejoin the workforce and move towards self-reliance. The services provided include basic skills training, skills upgrading training, employment and non-employment counselling as well as post-employment services. Up to January 2007, there was a total of 2 599 participants, including 2 267 CSSA participants and 332 'near CSSA' participants. Up to the end of January 2007, a total of 68 participants have been recruited.
- (d) Three 24-month District Employment Assistance Trial (DEAT) Projects have been launched since October 2006. They aim to help 300 long-term CSSA able-bodied unemployed recipients living in three districts, namely Tsuen Wan/Kwai Tsing, Tung Chung and Tin Shui Wai to return to workforce. The Government-subsidised home-based community care services and day care places for the elderly operated by the non-governmental organizations, as well as the Community Geriatric Assessment Teams and the Community Nurses of the Hospital Authority, are part and parcel of our community-based care services for elders.

To strengthen elderly care and support services, the 2007-08 Budget earmarked \$96 million in the next four years to implement a trial scheme in two districts to provide one-stop support services to elderly discharged from hospitals who have difficulty taking care of themselves. This will further enhance the support for elderly dischargees in the community.

The 2007-08 Budget also earmarked an additional \$38 million to 156 elderly centres to enhance their outreach programmes to provide assistance to more singleton or hidden elders in the community.

Apart from the additional allocation aforementioned, we have enhanced the existing community-based services as follows :

(a) the Social Welfare Department (SWD) has over the past two years increased the service capacity of the frailty-tested Enhanced Home and Community Care Services (EHCCS) from 2 885 places in 2005-06 to 3 385 places in 2006-07. As at end February 2007, the utilisation rate of EHCCS was 82.5%. SWD will continue to keep in view the service demand for EHCCS and increase the service volume for districts with high service demand where necessary;

- (b) making use of the additional recurrent funding of \$20 million secured in 2006-07, SWD has increased the capacity of the non-frailty tested home care services for the elderly provided by the 60 Integrated Home Care Services (IHCS) Teams. The additional capacity has started coming into place since January 2007. SWD projects that about 2 000 additional new cases will be served; and
- (c) the number of day care places for the elderly will increase from 1 975 in 2006-07 to 2 055 in 2007-08.

The expenditure on EHCCS, IHCS and day care places for the elderly is estimated to be \$629.8 million in 2007-08 Estimate as compared to \$576.0 million in 2006-07 Revised Estimate.

- Reply :In its advanced unedited concluding comments on the Second Report of the<br/>HKSAR submitted under the CEDAW, the United Nations Committee on<br/>the Elimination of Discrimination against Women commended the efforts<br/>made by the HKSAR Government to protect women against violence. It<br/>has recommended the HKSAR to continue to, inter-alia, allocate sufficient<br/>resources to combat domestic violence. In this connection, additional<br/>resources of \$31 million will be provided in 2007-08 to enhance support<br/>for victims of domestic violence and families in need.

We will set up a Multi-purpose Crisis Intervention and Support Centre (the Centre) to provide support to victims of sexual violence through better co-ordination between the service units of the Social Welfare Department and other departments concerned like the Police. Phase one of the services to be launched in late March 2007 will include a 24-hour hotline, arrangement of immediate intervention and follow up services, after office hours outreaching/crisis intervention services will be provided in Phase two, tentatively scheduled to come on stream in early 2008.

In addition to serving victims of sexual violence, the Centre will complement existing service for victims of domestic violence and individuals/families in crisis or distress, and provide after office hours outreaching service for elder abuse cases etc. This will create synergy among related services and optimise utilisation of resources.

The Centre, operated by a non-governmental organisation, is funded by the Lotteries Fund on a pilot basis, and the estimated total operating cost is \$20 million for three years.

These compare with 27 radio courses and 9 face-to-face courses developed and offered, and a registered enrolment of 14 200 in the past three years.

The Steering Committee has not reached any firm view on institutional structure or resultant resource requirements.
- (b) The institutional arrangements have yet to be considered. No conclusion has been reached at this stage.

Reply:

In 2006-07, the Health, Welfare and Food Bureau (HWFB) commissioned an external independent survey agency to conduct a survey on the travelling characteristics of persons with disabilities (PWDs) who are recipients of Disability Allowance or assistance under the Comprehensive Social Security Assistance Scheme with 100% loss in earning abilities. The cost incurred was \$885,000.

The survey was conducted in response to a request by the LegCo Subcommittee to Study the Transport Needs and Provision of Concessionary Public Transport Fares for Persons with Disabilities set up under the House Committee. It aimed at collecting data on the general travel behaviour of the above group of PWDs for fare concession and possible financial impacts on the part of public transport operators upon offer of fare concession to this group of PWDs.

The survey was completed in December 2006, and its findings were first reported to the above Subcommittee in January 2007. Discussion on the survey findings is continuing between the Subcommittee, the public transport operators and the two Bureaux concerned, viz. HWFB and the Environment, Transport and Works Bureau.

In 2007-08, the resources reserved by the Health, Welfare and Food Bureau for the welfare policy area have increased by \$25.4 million as compared with the revised estimate for 2006-07. The increase in provision is made up mainly of several one-off expenditure items, which include an additional \$10 million for family education publicity activities, \$3 million for enhancing public education on mental health, \$2 million for enhancing an existing interactive telephone information service for the elderly, \$1.2 million for increase in publicity expenses relating to the Community Investment and Inclusion Fund, and provisions for promoting active ageing and recognition for carers of the elderly, as well as continuation of researches and possible commissioning of further researches on welfare-related policies.

- <u>Reply</u>: The Comprehensive Social Security Assistance (CSSA) payment rates are reviewed annually to take account of price changes as reflected by the movement of the Social Security Assistance Index of Prices (SSAIP) to ensure recipients' purchasing power is maintained. The SSAIP is specially compiled by the Census and Statistics Department on a monthly basis to measure inflation/deflation insofar as the goods and services covered under the CSSA standard rates are concerned.

In addition to annual adjustment and the regular monitoring of the changes of SSAIP, a Household Expenditure Survey (HES) for CSSA Households is conducted every five years for the purpose of updating the weighting system of the SSAIP to ensure that the index can more accurately reflect the impact of price changes experienced by CSSA recipients.

We have completed the 2004/05 HES on CSSA Households in 2006. Upon the completion of the 2004/05 HES on CSSA Households, we have compiled a new series of SSAIP with October 2004 to September 2005 as the base period. The adoption of the new series reflects more accurately the impact of price changes experienced by CSSA recipients.

The next HES for CSSA Household is scheduled for 2009-10.

- <u>Reply</u>: From time to time, the Administration would carry out studies on young people as necessary, either on its own or through subvented non-governmental organisations (NGOs). We also provide services seeking specifically to help enhance the personal development of young people as appropriate. Some examples are set out below :
  - (a) the Home Affairs Bureau (HAB) commissions youth-related studies from time to time on the advice of the Commission on Youth (COY), an advisory body to the Government on youth matters. HAB also operates through the COY an "International Youth Exchange Programme" to broaden the horizon and international perspective of our youth; and a "Community Participation Scheme for Organising Study Tours to the Mainland" to enhance their understanding of and respect for Chinese culture and heritage;
  - (b) to address the multifarious and changing needs of the youth, the Integrated Children and Youth Services Centres under the Young People Programme of the Social Welfare Department (SWD) have been providing, among others, preventive and developmental services to our young people including personal guidance and counseling, supportive services for those in disadvantaged circumstances, socialization programmes as well as activities on the development of social responsibility and competence;
  - (c) to promote the holistic development of adolescents in Hong Kong, the Hong Kong Jockey Club, with the Education and Manpower Bureau and SWD as co-organisers, has provided a one-off amount of \$400 million to implement a four-year project, namely, "P.A.T.H.S. to Adulthood: A Jockey Club Youth Enhancement Scheme" for secondary schools effective from the 2005/06 school year. The Project aims to promote the holistic development of young people by

Cases for the Integrated Vocational Rehabilitation Services Centre (IVRSC) are selected from the waiting lists of SW and SE. There is therefore no separate waiting list for IVRSC. For Training and Activity Centre for Ex-mentally III Persons, Home-based Training and Support Services, Integrated Vocational Training Centre, On the Job Training Programme for People with Disabilities and Sunnyway - On the Job Training Programme for Young People with Disabilities, the current service capacity is able to meet service demand and there is no waiting list for the service. The Occasional Child Care Service for Disabled Children is a short-term service operated within the Special Child Care Centre (SCCC) and EETC. The aim is to meet the ad hoc, temporary and usually immediate care needs of disabled children and no waiting list is kept for the service. - (1) Halfway House With the additional provision of 80 places in 2005-06, the current provision of Halfway House places is 1 509. As reflected from the drop in the number of people on the waiting list for the service, i.e. from 602 by end March 2004 to 495 by end December 2006, the demand for this service seems to be on the decrease. While there is no new planned provision in 2007-08, the Social Welfare Department (SWD) would continue to monitor the service demand for Halfway House closely.
  - (2) Long Stay Care Home With the additional provision of 402 places in 2005-06, the current provision of long stay care home places is 1 407. As there are still 861 persons on the waiting list, SWD would continue to identify resources to strengthen the provisions for this service.
  - (3) Integrated Vocational Training Centre In the annual recruitment exercises conducted by the two centres, all applications were accepted and could be absorbed by existing vacancies. The current provision of 453 day places and 170 residential places can meet the service demand adequately and no new provision will be considered for the time being.
  - (4) Training and Activity Centre for Ex-mentally Ill Persons There are currently a total of 230 training places for this service. The central

waiting list for the service was suspended in 2004 as applications could be absorbed by existing vacancies. Therefore, new provision for this service will not be considered for the time being.

- (5) Home-based Training and Support Service provides interim service to people with disabilities pending admission to regular day training or residential care service. Since it has a relatively high turnover rate (24.5% in 2006-07), new referrals could normally be absorbed. SWD would continue to monitor the service demand and needs for service expansion.
- (6) Special Provision Programme for Autistic Children in Special Child Care Centres – A range of services are already available in these centres to cater for the specific training needs of disabled pre-school children including those with autism admitted to special child care centres. There is no plan for further expansion for this Programme.
- (7) Supported Employment (SE) The Integrated Vocational Rehabilitation Services Centre (IVRSC) was formed in April 2004 by pooling the resources of sheltered workshop (SW) and SE to provide people with disabilities with a series of seamless and integrated vocational services in one service setting. A review conducted by SWD in 2005 concluded that IVRSC is the preferred direction of development and future provision of SE would be subsumed under the IVRSC. New provision of 383 IVRSC places (including 160 converted from SW) are planned in 2007-08.
- (8) On the Job Training Programme for People with Disabilities (OTJ) Under this programme, the trainees would go through a series of training as well as counselling with a view to achieving open employment. The current 432 training places can meet the service demand. SWD would continue to monitor the utilisation of this service and need for expansion.
- (9) Sunnyway On the Job Training Programme for Young People with Disabilities The programme content is similar to OTJ but is designed specifically for young people with disabilities. The current 311 places can meet the service demand. SWD would continue to monitor the utilisation of this service and the need for expansion.

For example, some elders may be using CSSA to stay in private RHCEs while waiting for subsidised RCHE places. Some may be receiving subsidised community support and care services while staying at home to wait for subsidised RCHE places.

In 2007-08, 662 additional subsidised residential care places will become available. 515 of them will be subsidised care-and-attention (C&A) places. 147 will be subsidised nursing places.

Besides, an additional \$16 million recurrent funding has been earmarked in the 2007-08 Budget to provide more subsidised residential care places in new contract homes.

As the population ages, the demand for subsidised residential care places will increase. The Commission on Poverty and the Elderly Commission will continue to explore ways of responding to the challenges effectively.

The new measures will involve increase in manpower. In Social Welfare Department (SWD), there will be an increase of 21 social work officer grade posts and 5 clinical psychologist grade posts. For non-governmental organisations (NGOs), we will work out the details with the operators concerned.

Separately, an annual provision of \$1.041 million has been allocated to an NGO to launch a pilot project on Batterer Intervention Programme (BIP) between January 2006 and March 2008. - Reply :The re-engineering of residential child care services is a joint effort of the<br/>Social Welfare Department (SWD) and the non-governmental<br/>organisations (NGOs). The aim is to better re-distribute existing resources<br/>to services that will benefit more children and better suit their needs,<br/>thereby achieving a better match between service demand and provision.

Through this exercise, the overall number of places available in the residential child care services has increased in 2006-07. Specifically, while there was a reduction of 16 regular small group home places and 24 residential nursery places, the decrease was more than made up by the provision of 10 more foster care places, 12 more places in residential

homes for children as well as 23 more emergency/short-term small group home places, resulting in a net increase of five places. The exercise involves a large number of NGO service providers and no information on the changes in their manpower is readily available. The financial resources for the residential services for children are \$367 million in 2006-07.

Upon harmonisation of pre-primary services in 2005, "child care centre" is re-defined as a centre serving children aged under three. A child care centre may consist of a day crèche section for children under two and a day nursery section for children aged two to under three. The reduction of eight places is proposed by the centre operator to convert them to become 28 half-day nursery places in view of the low demand for crèche service and increasing demand for half-day service for children aged two to under three. Arising from this conversion of places, the operator has to employ an additional child care worker at its own cost. The conversion results in an annual savings in subvention of \$0.03 million for SWD.

The reduction of two occasional child care units is the net effect of the closure of three child care centres initiated by the service operators as a result of low utilisation, with one of the three concerned units to be re-provisioned to another district with service demand. The net annual amount saved is about \$0.16 million which includes staff cost and other charges. As at December 2006, the overall utilisation rate of the occasional child care service is 62.4%.

In 2006-07, the cost per place per month for small group home is \$12,312, while the cost per place per month for foster care is \$8,202. For residential services for children other than the aforesaid two services, the cost per place per month for the 2006-07 revised estimate is \$10,284.

As for the waiting time for small group home and residential home services, it will normally range from one to three months if there is no location and home preference. Emergency placements are available for urgent cases.

All places in residential child care services and child care centres are provided for children in need, including victims of domestic violence. There is no separate quota reserved for victims of domestic violence, and we do not have separate breakdown on the enrolment of this group.

  - (v) all the subsidised care and attention places in contract homes have to provide long term care and continuum of care. There are also nursing places in contract homes; and

Reply :The reduction in the number of subsidised residential care places for the<br/>elderly between 2006-07 and 2007-08 is mainly attributed to the<br/>programme of converting self-care (S/C) hostel places, home for the aged<br/>(H/A) places and care-and-attention (C&A) places without continuum of<br/>care into C&A places providing continuum of care. The welfare sector<br/>supported the conversion proposal and the Legislative Council Panel on<br/>Welfare Services was consulted on the programme in 2005. The Social<br/>Welfare Department has implemented this conversion programme since<br/>2005-06.

The conversion exercise is conducted on a subventions-neutral basis. The C&A places created under the programme will provide continuum of care which will better meet elders' need for LTC services. As the unit cost of a C&A place providing continuum of care is higher than the unit cost of a place not providing continuum of care, the number of C&A places to be created under the programme will be smaller than the number of places being replaced. There will not be displacement of elders from the participating homes as conversion will be vacancy-led, which enables existing elders to stay in their existing homes for as long as necessary. If their health condition deteriorates, they will be given priority to occupy the C&A places providing continuum of care created in their homes.

In 2007-08, we project that a total of 1 980 S/C and H/A places and 670 C&A places not providing continuum of care will be taken in for conversion. The reduction in the number of S/C and H/A places from 3 099 in 2006-07 to 1 119 in 2007-08 and C&A places from 9 933 in 2006-07 to 9 263 in 2007-08 reflects this. These places will eventually be transformed into 1 435 C&A places providing continuum of care to better meet elders' need for LTC services.

Also, LORCHE has strengthened the information exchange and referral network with relevant departments and organisations, including the Community Geriatric Assessment Teams and the Toxicology Reference Laboratory of the Hospital Authority and the Labour Department. It has also revamped the Health Worker Training Course to enhance the course contents, the training hours and the entry requirements.

The CMS has strengthened its database system for more effective monitoring of the service output of the contract homes and the EHCCS Teams.

To cope with the increasing workload, SWD has started strengthening the manpower of LORCHE and CMS in phases in 2006-07 and will continue to do so in 2007-08, taking into account the operational needs.

In 2006-07, five additional nursing staff were recruited to strengthen the Health Inspectorate Team of LORCHE. Also, four additional staff (including a nursing staff) were recruited to strengthen the CMS.

In 2007-08, there will be an addition of Social Work Officer grade posts in LORCHE to strengthen the manpower of its Social Work Inspectorate Teams. Reply : (1) To implement the VRS for private residential care homes for the disabled (private homes), the SWD set up the Registration Office of Private Residential Care Homes for the Disabled (ROPRCHD) in through September 2006 internal redeployment of resources. ROPRCHD is a multi-disciplinary team consisting of eight members, including social work officer, nurse, building surveyor and fire officer. The total operating expenses of ROPRCHD in 2006-07 is \$1.3 million. As in February 2007, there were 37 private homes known to SWD, 23 of which had applied for joining the VRS. Site inspections to all 23 homes have been completed. All applicant homes are required to carry out improvement works in order to meet the requirements of the VRS. By end February 2007, two private homes have completed all the improvement works and joined the VRS.

- (2) The objective of the VRS is to encourage private homes to improve their service quality. To join the VRS, the private homes are required to comply with the requirements in terms of general management, fire safety, building safety and health care. The multi-disciplinary team of ROPRCHD will conduct regular inspections to the private homes to ensure that their service quality meets the VRS requirements.
- (3) A full-year provision of \$7.1 million has been secured to support the operation of the ROPRCHD in 2007-08. The number of staff of ROPRCHD will be increased to 12 comprising social work officers, nurses, building surveyor and fire officer. The ROPRCHD will continue to monitor the successful implementation of the VRS by paying regular site inspections to the private homes to ensure that their service quality meets the requirements. It is estimated that by mid-2007, around eight PRCHDs providing a total of 600 private home places will have completed the improvement works and can register under the VRS.
- (4) Apart from monitoring the implementation of the VRS, ROPRCHD is also tasked to prepare for the licensing of all residential care homes for the disabled following the introduction of legislation and related administrative work. In 2007-08, the ROPRCHD will consult stakeholders, including service operators and parents, on the licensing requirements and the information gathered will form the basis of the necessary legislative proposals on the licensing of such homes.

(1) The Visiting Medical Practitioners Scheme (the Scheme) is <u>Reply</u>: implemented in residential care homes for the disabled (RCHDs) operated by or under the subvention of the SWD. A total of 145 RCHDs, i.e. 82% of all SWD/subvented RCHDs, have implemented the Scheme in 2006-07. Private RCHDs are not included in this Scheme.

- (2) The general medical practitioners engaged in the Scheme is required to visit the RCHDs, generally on a weekly basis, to provide on-site services including medical consultation, health assessment, advice on maintenance of patient records, advice on measures regarding infectious disease prevention, training/health talks for staff and residents, etc. For ex-mentally ill persons living in halfway houses and supported hostels, medical consultation is not included in the Scheme. These residents are encouraged to attend medical consultation in clinics to promote their independence. A total of 7 367 of the residents in the 145 RCHDs, i.e. 78% of all residents of SWD/subvented RCHDs in operation, benefited from the Scheme in 2006-07. As the Scheme is only newly implemented, statistics on the average frequency of service per person is not yet available.
- (3) In 2006-07, a total of 50 medical practitioners participated in the Scheme. The total fund for implementing the Scheme in the 145 RCHDs in the year was \$6.4 million.
- (4) All SWD/subvented RCHDs (including newly set-up homes) are eligible for funding to implement the Scheme. The objective of the Scheme is to enable service operators of each SWD/subvented RCHD to establish a service network with private general medical practitioners to provide primary medical care and support to people with disabilities living in these homes for the improvement of their general health and promotion of preventive care. Funding available in 2007-08 for the operation of the Scheme is \$10.4 million.

> These five specialised teams comprise a total of ten social workers, one clinical psychologist, one project officer and five project assistants. They work jointly with the five Child and Adolescent Psychiatric Teams of the Hospital Authority (HA) in the territory and receive clinical support (including that of doctors, nurses and other allied health professions) from the latter.

> The annual funding earmarked for the project was \$2.5 million in 2005-06 and \$5.5 million each in 2006-07 and 2007-08 respectively. As in December 2006, the total number of cases handled by these five specialised teams was 531 and the total number of persons attended the educational activities was 5 086.

The CMHIP aims to provide intensive and outreaching social work intervention to persons with suspected mental health problems who have yet to receive any specialised social work intervention or psychiatric treatment. The bulk of the new allocation will be used to support non-governmental organisations (NGOs) to form a total of 12 CMHIP teams to deliver the new service at the 12 Social Welfare Department (SWD) administrative districts. The CMHIP Teams will provide initial assessment and specialised social work interventions, including casework, therapeutic/supportive group services, to such newly identified psychiatric cases. Where necessary, the CMHIP Teams will refer cases to the Hospital Authority (HA) for more detailed assessment and follow up services.

Other than new resources for NGOs, additional manpower will also be allocated for Medical Social Work Units (Psychiatric) of SWD to strengthen the liaison with HA and NGOs including the follow up on new cases. The CMHIP Teams, comprising mainly social workers, will work with different professionals, including medical practitioners and nurses to provide well co-ordinated services. SWD will work out the implementation details including apportionment of funds, manpower involved, output and outcome indicators, etc. in consultation with the relevant stakeholders.

Once confirmation is to hand, we will arrange to distribute copies of the Convention together with the final concluding comments on HKSAR's Second Report to women's groups and non-governmental organisations (NGOs) which concerned with women issues.

To promote public awareness of the CEDAW, we have launched in 2005-06 a 9-month long roving exhibition in 19 government office buildings and public libraries across the territory on the progress made in the implementation of CEDAW and the advancement of women



We have also produced a leaflet, and a video on this and distributed them to members of the public, Legislative Council Members and public libraries, as well as over 250 women's groups and NGOs. The Social Welfare Department and non-governmental organisations provide various services to support victims of domestic violence including post-trauma counselling, individual and group psychological treatment and other support services for children witnessing domestic violence. The services are mainly provided by the Family and Child Protective Services Units (FCPSUs) and Clinical Psychology Units (CPUs). In 2007-08, additional resources will be provided to strengthen the manpower of FCPSUs and CPUs to enhance support for these victims.

Reply :There has been a steady increase in the number of subsidised nursing<br/>places in the past few years. At present, there are 1 864 subsidised nursing<br/>places. 1 574 of them are in six subvented nursing homes. The remaining<br/>290 are in seven contract homes in purpose-built premises.

In view of the demand for subsidised nursing places, SWD will continue to provide additional subsidised nursing places in new contract homes. An additional 147 subsidised nursing places will be provided in three contract homes which will commence operation in 2007-08.

All the care-and-attention (C&A) places in the existing and new contract homes provide continuum of care including nursing level of care. Also, in line with the principle that subsidised residential care places for the elderly should provide long term care (LTC) and continuum of care, SWD has since 2005-06 implemented the programme of converting self-care hostel and home for the aged places which have no LTC element, and some existing C&A places not providing continuum of care, into C&A places providing continuum of care including nursing level of care to better meet elders' need for LTC services.

- Reply : In line with the principle that subsidised residential care places for the elderly should provide long term care (LTC) and continuum of care, the Social Welfare Department has since 2005-06 implemented the programme of converting self-care (S/C) hostel and home for the aged (H/A) places which have no LTC element, and some existing care-and-attention (C&A) places not providing continuum of care, into C&A places providing continuum of care. The welfare sector supported the conversion proposal and the Legislative Council Panel on Welfare Services was consulted on the programme in 2005.

The conversion exercise is conducted on a subventions-neutral basis. The C&A places created under the programme will provide continuum of care which will better meet elders' need for LTC services. As the unit cost of a C&A place providing continuum of care is higher than the unit cost of a place not providing continuum of care, the number of C&A places to be created under the programme will be smaller than the number of places being replaced. There will not be displacement of elders from the participating homes as conversion will be vacancy-led, which enables existing elders to stay in their existing homes for as long as necessary. If their health condition deteriorates, they will be given priority to occupy the C&A places providing continuum of care created in their homes.

To meet the challenges of an ageing population, we have been promoting and facilitating elders to age in the community through subsidised home-based and centre-based community care and support services. Also, we have been increasing the supply of subsidised residential care places for the elderly. In 2007-08, about 600 additional subsidised residential care places for the elderly will be created in new purpose-built premises and through purchasing places from private residential care homes for the elderly.

A child care<br/>centre may consist of a day crèche section for children aged under two and<br/>a day nursery section for children aged two to under three. The reduction<br/>of eight places is proposed by the centre operator to convert them to<br/>become 28 half-day nursery places in view of the low demand for crèche<br/>service and increasing demand for half-day service for children aged two to<br/>under three. Arising from this conversion of places, the operator has to<br/>employ an additional child care worker at its own cost. The conversion<br/>results in an annual savings in subvention of \$0.03 million for the Social<br/>Welfare Department (SWD).

The reduction of two occasional child care units is the net effect of the closure of three child care centres initiated by the service operators as a result of low utilisation, with one of the three concerned units to be re-provisioned to another district with service demand. The net annual amount saved is about \$0.16 million which includes staff cost and other charges. As at December 2006, the overall utilisation rate of the occasional child care service was 62.4%.

SWD will continue to monitor the service need of day child care services taking into account factors such as the population profile, and work out service re-engineering plans with non-governmental organisation operators when necessary.

Under the FSP, through telephone contacts, home visits and other outreaching programmes, we aim to introduce the families at risk, including families at risk of domestic violence, psychiatric problems and social isolation, to various support services available and motivate them to receive services to prevent further deterioration of their problems. Volunteers including those who have overcome family/personal problems or crises will be recruited and trained to contact these families and to provide them with support and assistance. Programme Assistants have also been employed to provide logistical support to the social workers. As the FSP has just been launched since early 2007, service statistics are not vet available.

Reply:

A total of \$30 million has been allocated to launch, improve and partially extend the Comprehensive Child Development Service (CCDS) pilot. The pilot has been implemented in Sham Shui Po, Tin Shui Wai, Tuen Mun and Tseung Kwan O in phases since 2005. We have completed a review of the pilot run. The review shows that the CCDS has strengthened cross-sectoral collaboration and enhanced access to health and social services. With needy cases identified and tackled at an early stage, it is hoped that the costs imposed on the society for providing support services at a later stage could be reduced in the long run. We plan to extend CCDS to all districts in phases and strengthen social services support.

Meanwhile, improvement measures have been undertaken to address the issues identified during the pilot run, including enhancing the structural facilities at the Maternal and Child Health Centres and strengthening relevant manpower support. In 2007-08, we will extend the CCDS to Tung Chung, the whole district of Yuen Long and Kwun Tong. We will closely monitor the impact of the CCDS on social services support and when necessary, follow up on the resource requirements.

<u>Reply</u>: In terms of funding mode, there are three types of subsidised residential care places for the elderly, namely places in homes run by non-governmental organisations (NGOs) under the subvention mode, places in contract homes under service contracts, and purchased places under service contracts in private residential care homes for the elderly (RCHEs) under the Enhanced Bought Place Scheme (EBPS).

For subsidised places in NGO-run RCHEs under the subvention mode and subsidised places in private RCHEs participating in EBPS, the amount of Government's recurrent subsidy to the service providers is calculated by adding up the "Personal Emoluments" of the notional staff establishment (including care staff) set at prescribed salary points making reference to the civil servant pay scale and "Other Charges" for operating the service, and deducting the prescribed "Fee Income" which the service operators will receive from the elderly users.

For subsidised places in contract homes, the same formula is adopted in the calculation of Government's recurrent subsidy. However, reference will be made to the market wages in setting the Personal Emoluments for all the staff, including care staff. The amount of Government's recurrent subsidy in a particular year will also be adjusted upwards or downwards according to the Composite Consumer Price Index.

Specifically, while there was a reduction of 16 regular small group home places and 24 residential nursery places, the decrease was more than made up by the provision of 10 more foster care places, 12 more places in residential homes for children as well as 23 more emergency/short-term small group home places, resulting in a net increase of five places. The financial resources for the residential services for children are \$367 million in 2006-07.

Upon harmonisation of pre-primary services in 2005, "child care centre" is re-defined as a centre serving children aged under three. A child care centre may consist of a day crèche section for children aged under two and a day nursery section for children aged two to under three. The reduction of eight places is proposed by the centre operator to convert them to become 28 half-day nursery places in view of the low demand for crèche service and increasing demand for half-day service for children aged two to under three. The conversion results in an annual savings of \$0.03 million for the SWD.

The reduction of two occasional child care units is the net effect of the closure of three child care centres initiated by the service operators as a result of low utilisation, with one of the three concerned units to be re-provisioned to another district with service demand. The net annual amount saved is about \$0.16 million which includes staff cost and other

Up to the end of January 2007, 7 349 participants joined the Project. Of these, 1 744 participants have secured paid employment with no less than 32 working hours in a month.

My STEP, a 12-month project, has been launched since October 2006. It aims to provide a comprehensive package of employment assistance services as well as motivational/disciplinary training to no less than 50 long-term CSSA able-bodied unemployed youth aged between 15 and 24 to motivate and assist them to rejoin the workforce or return to mainstream schooling. The additional \$38 million will be<br/>allocated to these centres to recruit an additional social worker to enhance<br/>their outreach efforts to hidden and singleton elders.

We expect the DECCs/NECs to mobilise volunteers and other social capital in the districts to carry out the outreaching work, whereas the additional social worker will plan for the outreaching arrangements, provide supervision to the volunteers and oversee the follow up actions. We would further discuss with the DECCs/NECs the output requirements and the outreaching arrangements.

There will be an increase of 21 social work officer grade posts and 5 clinical psychologist grade posts in SWD. For non-governmental organisations (NGOs), we are working out the details with the operators concerned.

#### Reply:

A total of \$30 million has been allocated to launch, improve and partially extend the Comprehensive Child Development Service (CCDS) pilot. The pilot has been implemented in Sham Shui Po, Tin Shui Wai, Tuen Mun and Tseung Kwan O in phases since 2005. We have completed a review of the pilot run and plan to extend CCDS to all districts in phases and strengthen social services support.

Meanwhile, improvement measures have been undertaken to address the issues identified during the pilot run, including enhancing the structural facilities at the Maternal and Child Health Centres and strengthening relevant manpower support. For example, additional resources have been allocated to the Integrated Family Service Centres and other social service units in 2006-07 to launch a Family Support Programme to reach out to vulnerable families which are unwilling to seek help, including those identified under the CCDS. We will closely monitor the impact of the CCDS on social services support and when necessary, follow up on the resource requirements.





In 2006, a total of 413 applications for SR service were received. As at end February 2007, no people with disabilities (PWDs) having no alternative means of transport to travel to their work place were put on the waiting list for SR service. Some PWDs who can use public transport or have access to other means of transport do apply for rehabus service. The number of PWDs awaiting SR service was 47 as at end February 2007. For non-scheduled dial-a-ride (DAR) service, a total of 88 213 applications were received, of which 8 173 applications were declined.

To meet changing needs, and for continuous service improvement, three rehabuses for DAR service and one rehabus for SR service will be added in 2007-08 to increase the overall carrying capacity of services. Assuming the demand for services remains at the current level, the three additional rehabuses could help reduce the number of DAR declined orders by about 30%, and reduce the SR waiting list by 10 places. The Transport Department will review regularly the fleet size of rehabuses and the routes covered having regard to the demand for the services.

Reply Serial No. HWFB(WW)281 Question Serial No. 2090 contract homes as stated above. 450 will be purchased places in private residential care homes for the elderly under the Enhanced Bought Place Scheme.

Besides, an additional \$16 million recurrent funding has been earmarked in the 2007-08 Budget to provide more subsidised residential care places in new contract homes.

As the population ages, the demand for subsidised residential care places will increase. The Commission on Poverty and the Elderly Commission will continue to explore ways of responding to the challenges effectively.
