		Members noted that while the phrase "directly or indirectly" was deleted under section 5(2) in relation to prohibition against making available funds or other financial assets or economic resources, the said phrase was retained under sections 2(2)(c) and 8(1)(a)(iii) in respect of prohibition against the supply, delivery or carriage of certain goods. Members enquired about the rationale and the legal implications of the deletion or otherwise of the phrase "directly or indirectly", if any, and whether clarifications had been sought with the UN and/or the Central People's Government (CPG).	
		The Administration explained that the Regulation was made pursuant to the instruction of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs to implement sanctions decided by the Security Council of the United Nations (UNSC). As such, the amendments would mainly follow the wording of the UNSC resolutions and were intended to reflect the requirements of the UNSC resolutions. It was considered that the deletion or otherwise of the phrase "directly or indirectly" in respect of funds or
