Further discussion on the obstetric service charge for non-eligible persons whose spouses are Hong Kong residents	30 April 2007	<p>The Administration was requested to provide a written response to the motion passed by the Panel at the meeting on 16 April 2007 by early June 2007 at the latest. The wording of the motion reads as follows -</p> <p>"本委員會對於衛生福利及食物局及醫院管理局於今年 2 月初推行公立醫院內地孕婦的新收費政策(39,000 元／48,000 元)未有考慮對港人家庭(即父親為香港居民而母親為準來港婦女之家庭)的影響表示遺憾，並要求當局豁免港人家庭按新收費政策繳費。"</p>	<p>The effectiveness of the new obstetric service arrangements (including the obstetric service package charge) and complementary immigration measures are being closely monitored.</p> <p>A refund mechanism on the new obstetric package charge was introduced on 29 October 2007 by the Hospital Authority (HA). The Administration's response on the refund mechanism was issued vide LC Paper No. CB(2) 533/07-08(01) on 6 December 2007.</p>

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		<p>(Translation)</p> <p>"That this Panel expresses regret that the new obstetric package charge (\$39,000/\$48,000) implemented by the Health, Welfare and Food Bureau and the Hospital Authority in early February this year for Mainland women giving birth in public hospitals has failed to take into account its impact on Hong Kong families (i.e. those with the father being a Hong Kong resident and the mother a Two-way Permit holder), and urges the Government to exempt these families from the new fee charging policy."</p> <p>The Administration was also requested to include in its written response to the Panel the suggestion of refunding fees paid at the time of booking for public obstetric services if the delivery did not take place eventually due to valid reasons such as a miscarriage.</p>

Progress report on promoting healthy eating among school children	9 February 2009	<p>The Administration was requested to provide findings of the following two surveys once they became available -</p> <p>(a) Child Health Survey conducted by the University of Hong Kong; and</p> <p>(b) Food Consumption Survey conducted by the Chinese University of Hong Kong.</p>	<p>The Administration will provide the findings of the two surveys in due course.</p>

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3. Development of a territory-wide electronic healthcare record sharing system	9 March 2009	<p>The Administration was requested to provide the following information in writing before seeking the support of the Finance Committee and the Establishment Sub-committee for funding and staffing resources to take the electronic healthcare record (eHR) programme forward -</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">(a) detailed breakdown of the estimated capital costs of \$702 million for the First Stage eHR Development Programme;(b) timetable on putting in place a legal framework for safeguarding the data privacy and security of the eHR sharing system; and(c) estimated capital and recurrent costs to be borne by private healthcare providers participating in the eHR sharing system.	The Administration's response was issued to members vide LC Paper No. CB(2)1724/08-09(01) on 1 June 2009.

Regulation and control of pharmaceutical products in Hong Kong	31 March 2009	The Administration was requested to provide the revised checklist used by the inspectors of the Department of Health when conducting inspections on pharmaceutical manufacturers once they were finalised.	The Administration will provide a written response in due course.

Redevelopment of Caritas Medical Centre, Phase Two	20 April 2009	<p>The Administration was requested to provide the following information in writing -</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">(a) whether there was any precedent case that the Administration had cancelled the tender exercise for a capital works project because of a higher-than-expected tender outturn price and split up the single works contract into smaller contracts to be tendered out separately thereafter;(b) the bureaux and departments involved in arriving the decision of withholding the capital works project on the phase two redevelopment of the Caritas Medical Centre and formulating a revised procurement strategy for its delivery;(c) a detailed comparison of the original and the updated building design of the new ambulatory/rehabilitation block in terms of floor area; and(d) an explanation as to why the decanting works for demolition of Wai Ming Block would be carried out by HA's Term Contractor, instead of awarding the works through open tender.	The Administration will provide a written response in due course.

Prevention and control of human swine influenza infection in Hong Kong	13 May 2009	The Administration was requested to provide a written response to the suggestion of drawing up a guideline on administration of Tamiflu to passengers on board the airplanes bound for Hong Kong should they display symptoms suggestive of human swine influenza, subject to the advice of onboard health professional and/or medical support from the ground.
