Members are invited to recommend to Finance Committee the deletion of the following permanent post in the Independent Police Complaints Council with immediate effect –

1 Administrative Officer Staff Grade C (D2) (\$117,950 - \$129,000)

PROBLEM

The Independent Police Complaints Council (IPCC) appointed its own Secretary-General on contract terms in January 2011. It no longer needs the post of Secretary-General pitched at Administrative Officer Staff Grade C (AOSGC) (D2) level filled by a seconded civil servant during the initial period of the operation of IPCC as an interim arrangement.

PROPOSAL

2. IPCC proposes to delete the permanent AOSGC post in IPCC with immediate effect upon approval by the Finance Committee.

JUSTIFICATION

3. IPCC has its origin in the Police Group of the Office of the Unofficial Members of the Executive and Legislative Councils, which evolved into the Police Complaints Committee (PCC), an independent body commissioned by the then

Governor in 1986. The body was renamed IPCC in December 1994 and became a statutory body on 1 June 2009 with the commencement of the Independent Police Complaints Council Ordinance (IPCCO) (Cap. 604). Section 6 of IPCCO empowers IPCC to appoint a Secretary-General and a Legal Adviser on terms of employment approved by the Chief Executive on the advice of IPCC, and also to appoint, on terms of employment determined by IPCC, such other employees as it requires to assist in performing its functions. Since then, through active recruitment, IPCC has replaced the majority of civil servants seconded from the Government. As at 1 May 2011, the majority of the current 36 posts in IPCC are filled by its own staff and only eight posts by seconded civil servants. It is IPCC's intention to replace all civil servants by IPCC employees within three years of the establishment of the statutory body, i.e. no later than end May 2012.

4. The AOSGC post proposed for deletion was created upon the establishment of PCC secretariat vide FC Item B.123 in 1986. When the statutory IPCC was established on 1 June 2009, the post-holder of Secretary-General was seconded from the civil service. With the successful recruitment and appointment of IPCC's own Secretary-General in January 2011, the AOSGC post is no longer required and can be deleted. The job description of the AOSGC post and an organisation chart of the secretariat of IPCC are respectively at Enclosures 1 and 2.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

5. At present, the full staff costs, including on-costs, of the civil service posts in IPCC are recoverable from IPCC. Therefore, the deletion of the AOSGC post itself does not have any financial implications on the Government. IPCC will continue to absorb the salary and related costs arising from the appointment of the Secretary-General on contract terms with its existing resources.

PUBLIC CONSULTATION

6. We consulted the Legislative Council Panel on Security on the proposal vide an information paper issued on 29 March 2011. Members made no comment on the proposal.


