<u>The Subcommittee</u> deliberated (index of proceedings attached at **Annex**).

Admin 2. <u>Subcommittee members</u> made the following suggestions and requested the Administration to provide written response -

- (a) the Administration should make reference to the experience of Singapore and consider introducing a new category of vehicle licence for restricted use only during non-peak hours (e.g. on weekends) in order to ease traffic congestion of Hong Kong;
- (b) the Motor Vehicles (First Registration Tax) (Amendment) Bill 2011 (the Bill) to be introduced should include the following proposals -

- (i) tax rebate would be granted to buyers of newly registered private cars if they have their old private cars scrapped;
- (ii) buyers of newly registered environment-friendly petrol private cars as approved by the Environmental Protection Department (EPD) be exempted from the proposed First Registration Tax (FRT) increase;
- (iii) private cars which had been pre-ordered before the Public Revenue Protection (Motor Vehicles First Registration Tax) Order 2011 (the Order) took effect be exempted from the increase in FRT, subject to documentary proof of the specific date of the transaction or payment of deposit; and
- (c) the existing FRT concessions for environment-friendly petrol private cars as approved by EPD should be increased.
- Admin 3. <u>The Administration</u> was also requested to provide detailed information on the following issues -
  - (a) information and data on the seriousness of traffic congestion of Hong Kong;
  - (b) reasons for the large increase in the number of imported used private cars in the past few years and information on the exporting countries of these vehicles;
  - (c) the numbers of imported used private cars, home-delivery private cars and brand new private cars newly registered for the past few years;
  - (d) distribution of the imported used private cars and home-delivery private cars in terms of taxable values;
  - (e) the increases in the numbers of franchised buses and trucks in the past 10 years;
  - (f) whether the "importer" in paragraph 8 of the Administration's paper [LC Paper No. CB(1)1827/10-11(01)] referred to a natural person or a legal person; and

- whether the "6 057 cases" referred to by the Motor Traders Association of Hong Kong in its email to the Subcommittee [CB(1)1827/10-11(03)] had included the 4 917 private cars in Annex VII to the Administration's paper [CB(1)1780/10-11(01)].
- 4. <u>The Subcommittee</u> completed scrutiny of the Order.

### **Motion**

5. <u>Mr WONG Sing-chi</u> moved the following motion on behalf of Mr KAM Nai-wai, who was unable to attend the meeting due to other urgent commitments –

6. <u>The Chairman</u> put the motion to vote. The motion was negatived, with one member voted for the motion, seven members voted against the motion and one member abstained from voting.

- 7. The Subcommittee agreed to report its deliberations to the House Committee on 15 April 2011. The Chairman requested members to note that the scrutiny period of the Order would expire on 4 May 2011, and the deadline for giving notice of motion to repeal the Order was 26 April 2011.

  Members also noted that Mr KAM Nai-wai had given notice to move a motion to repeal the Order at the Council meeting of 4 May 2011.
  - 8. <u>Members</u> noted that the Bill would be introduced into LegCo on 13 April 2011 and the House Committee would consider whether a Bills Committee should be formed at its meeting on 15 April 2011 to study the Bill.
