Joint Subcommittee to Monitor the Implementation of the West Kowloon Cultural District Project

Meeting on 14 January 2011

A summary of issues/suggestions raised by the Joint Subcommittee on the development of cultural software in relation to the West Kowloon Cultural District project

The Administration and the West Kowloon Cultural District Authority ("WKCDA") will update the Joint Subcommittee to Monitor the Implementation of the West Kowloon Cultural District Project ("the Joint Subcommittee") on the development of cultural software to promote the West Kowloon Cultural District ("WKCD") on 14 January 2011. This paper highlights the relevant views and concerns expressed by members of the Joint Subcommittee since April 2010. Their views and concerns expressed before April 2010 on the same subject are contained in LC Paper No. CB(2)1283/09-10(02).

(2) Support for arts groups and budding artists

- Development Kong Arts Council ("HKADC") should be increased to strengthen support for budding artists and small and medium-sized arts HKADC should groups. assume a more proactive role in audience building and programme development.
- (b) Funding support for various arts groups should aim at promoting diversity and balanced development of the local arts scene.
- (a) The subvention to the Hong (a) LCSD had been playing a key role in building audience and bringing culture and the arts to the public. The core mission of HKADC was to nurture budding artists and support the development of small medium-sized arts groups through its funding schemes various and programmes.
 - (b) The Administration would inject \$3 billion into the Arts and Sport Development Fund as seed money and use the annual investment returns subsidize the long-term development of culture and the arts and sports.

(3) Public participation in the arts and culture

- (a) Unsold tickets for performances should be distributed to students for free to enhance their exposure to and participation in arts and cultural programmes. quota of student concessionary tickets for programmes offered in the Hong Kong Arts Festival ("HKAF") should also increased.
- (b) Ticket discount should not be restricted to the performances organized in a specific arts event or by a particular arts group, but be extended to all events/programmes staged throughout a year to provide an incentive for public participation in a variety of arts programmes.

- arts (a) Members' suggestions regarding the arrangements for the unsold tickets and the discount mechanism for arts programmes would be conveyed to the relevant authorities/bodies.
 - (b) The Government was planning to provide additional resources HKAF for supporting the production by local artists and arts groups. With more local productions, the tickets for HKAF might become more affordable.

(5) Training of arts personnel/professionals

The Administration should set a specific target for the training and development of arts personnel/professionals.

An additional funding of \$32 million would be earmarked in the next five years to launch training programmes for the development some 140 of arts administrators. These programmes would be organised by LCSD and its venue partners to provide training and internship opportunities for people aspiring to a career in the arts and culture. For the nurturing of museum professionals, WKCDA was planning to organize a six-month museum internship programme to provide on-the-job training for students of arts and cultural fields in local universities.
