		Ms LAU's views that –	
		(a) the Administration's latest proposal could not address the alleged mischief as by-election would be held in any event following the resignation of Members; and	
		(b) the proposed restriction on a resigning Member was not commonly adopted by other jurisdictions and the situation in Japan was not pertinent to that in Hong Kong. As such, there was no reason for Hong Kong to impose any restriction on a resigning Member to stand in any by-election as proposed in the Bill.	
		The Administration's response that –	
		(a) as the overseas jurisdictions under study had largely adopted the list proportional representation voting system, vacancies would not be filled by way of by-election. As no by-election would be held, there was no need to impose any restriction on resigning Members with respect to by-election there;	
		(b) by-elections had been held to fill mid-term vacancies in Geographical Constituencies ("GCs") notwithstanding the adoption of the list proportional representation voting system for GCs since 1998;	
		(c) members of the public generally considered that by-elections should be retained and legislative amendments should be introduced to plug the loophole whereby Members could resign at will in order to trigger a by-election in which they intended to stand and sought to be re-elected; and	
		(d) although the Administration's latest proposal would not be able to entirely address the mischief arising from Members resigning at will in order to trigger by-elections, it would convey a very strong message about the community's disapproval of triggering a by-election by way of resignation and deter Members from abusing the system.

		(a) the decision to support or not the resigning Member in a by-election rested with the community and it should be up to the Member to decide whether to resign and stand in the ensuing by-election;

		(c) if the Bill was to be enacted, the right of the public to vote in a by-election would be compromised.

		(b) The latest proposal had been drawn up having regard to the view that while legislative amendments should be introduced to address the loophole in the existing electoral system,	

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		a by-election should continue to be held so that electors could exercise their right to vote when a mid-term vacancy arose.	required
		Mr LEUNG Kwok-hung's enquiry on whether similar restriction had been imposed on resigning Members on overseas jurisdictions and whether the Administration had sought legal advice other than Lord David Pannick's.	
		The Administration's responded that –	
		(a) the Department of Justice had carefully considered the latest proposal and concluded that it was constitutional. Lord David Pannick had also confirmed its constitutionality. The Administration was confident that the latest proposal was legal and constitutional; and	
		(b) as a by-election would not be held in the overseas jurisdictions which adopted the list proportional representation voting system, a resigning Member would not have the opportunity to seek re-election to fill the arising vacancy.	
		Mr LEUNG Kwok-hung's remark that resigning Members of the United Kingdom ("UK") Parliament could stand in a by-election.

		The Administration's response that the procedures adopted in overseas jurisdictions for disqualifying a Member varied. In the case of UK, a Member of the House of Commons would be disqualified from holding office if he had accepted a public office.	
		Dr LEUNG's comments that while Article 79 of the Basic Law stipulated the conditions under which a Member would be disqualified from the office, no reference was made to the procedures for a Member to resign which were governed by section 14 of LCO.	
		The Administration's response that under section 14 of LCO, a Member could resign by giving a written notice to the Clerk of LegCo. Arising from the by-election triggered by the resignation of five Members in January 2010, the community generally considered that legislative amendments should be made to plug the loophole of the electoral system.

		(c) the legislative amendments proposed by the Administration were disproportionate and unconstitutional.

		(a) many countries would impose restrictions on the right to stand for election so long as the restrictions were proportionate and had a legitimate aim;	
		(b) the Administration had made legal assessment of its latest proposal and concluded that the proposed restriction was proportionate; and	
		(c) the legitimate aim of the latest proposal was to address the mischief arising from Members resigning at will in order to trigger by-elections in which they sought to stand and the proposed restriction was necessary.
