 - (a) review the drafting of the proposed new sections 39(2A)(a)(i) and (ii) with a view to better reflecting the legislative intent;
 - (b) consider replacing "a by-election" by "any by-election" in the proposed new section 39(2A); and
 - (c) advise in writing its intention on the date for the Bill to resume its Second Reading debate.
