 - (b) provide a list of statutory functions presently exercised by the Secretaries of Department, which might be exercised by DSoDs if the posts were created, through delegation of authority.

The Administration's explanation that the proposed resolution had contained no reference to the posts of DSoDs. Hence, exclusion of DSoDs from the re-organisation proposals would not affect the resolution. H/CEEO's explanation on the division of work of Deputy Chief Secretary for Administration ("DCS") and Deputy Financial Secretary ("DFS") as outlined in its paper [LC Paper No. CB(2)2158/11-12(01)], emphasising that coordination of cross-cutting policy areas did not

003123 - 004219	Chairman Mr CHEUNG Man-kwong Administration H/CEEO	Mr CHEUNG Man-kwong queried why the posts of DSoD were not made an established public office through local legislation, pointing out that DSoDs were important officials which were above the rank	

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		of Director of Bureau ("DoB"), and Secretaries of Department ("SoDs") might delegate their powers to them.	•
		The Administration's explanation that –	
		(a) Most public offices were exercising executive responsibility (as opposed to statutory powers or duties) but their offices were not necessarily established by local legislation;	
		(b) Section 8 of the Public Finance Ordinance (Cap. 2) provided that the Finance Committee ("FC") might approve changes to the estimates of expenditure upon a proposal of FS. Establishment Subcommittee ("ESC") under FC examined and made recommendations to FC on the Administration's proposals for creating new ranks and/or posts; and	
		(c) the organisational structure of the Government (including the hierarchy and relations between SoDs / Bureax / Departments) was not provided for in the legislation.	
		Mr CHEUNG Man-kwong's enquiry and Administration's clarification that statutory functions would continue to be carried out by the relevant SoDs or DoBs unless the DSoDs were delegated with the authority to do so.	
		H/CEEO assured the meeting that the appointment of DSoDs was constitutionally provided for under the Basic Law ("BL") and was legally in order.	
Mr CHAN Mr WONG SALA2 Mr CHEU	Dr Margaret NG Mr CHAN Kin-por Mr WONG Ting-kwong	Concerns were raised by members about the constitutional propriety of the process to appoint DSoDs which were not public offices stipulated in local legislation. Discussion on whether SALA2 should be requested to give views on the matter without compromising his neutral stance.	
		Referring to the LegCo Brief issued by the Administration [CMAB F19/6/3/2], SALA2's explanation that –	
		(a) after the resolution had been passed, the Chief Executive-in-Council would make an order under section 62(3) of the Interpretation and	

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		General Clauses Ordinance (Cap. 1) to amend the list of Public Officers set out in Schedule 6 to Cap. 1 ("the Order"). The amendments to Schedule 6 would include the post titles of the two DSoDs and the post titles of the relevant public officers after the re-organisation of the policy bureaux; and	
		(b) Section 62(1) of Cap. 1 provided that where any Ordinance conferred a power or imposed a duty upon the Chief Executive ("CE"), the exercise of such power or the performance of such duty might be signified under the hand of any public officer specified in Schedule 6 to Cap. 1.	
		Mr CHEUNG Man-kwong's views that no appointment should be made to the posts of DSoDs on 1 July 2012 given that it was not a public office created by local legislation. He asked whether a judicial review could be sought against the decision of the Administration.	
		The Administration's reiteration that the public office of DSoD did not have to be created in local legislation, citing the example that Permanent Secretaries were similarly not expressly created under the law.	
		H/CEEO's remark that having regard to the roles and functions of DCS and DFS as set out in LC Paper No. CB(2)2158/11-12(01), the performance of such duties basically did not involve the exercise of statutory powers, and thus there was no need to transfer the statutory powers of SoDs to the two DSoDs.	
005546 - 010547	Chairman Mr KAM Nai-wai H/CEEO Administration Ms Emily LAU	Referring to item 6 of the duty list of DFS at Annex B to LC Paper No. CB(2)2158/11-12(01), Mr KAM Nai-wai's enquiry about the scope of power to be exercised by DFS and the procedure to confer such power. H/CEEO's response that the duty list was a broad description only, and such powers or duties might be conferred or imposed upon DSoDs by virtue of section 43(1) of Cap. 1.	
		Considering that the duties of FS might be delegated to DFS in future, Mr KAM's request that the Subcommittee should be advised on the statutory functions currently exercised by FS.	

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		Ms Emily LAU requested the Administration to confirm in writing the legality of creating the rank and post of DSoD as a public office, and the functions to be delegated to him or to be entrusted by law, and to whom he would be accountable, and which officer would deputise the post of DSoD while the substantive post-holder was absent. H/CEEO undertook to provide the requisite information.	Admin (para. 2(a) of the minutes)
010548 - 012542	Chairman Dr Margaret NG Administration Mr LEUNG Kwok-hung	Dr Margaret NG's views that the Order would seek to establish the public offices of DCS and DFS in local legislation and hence attenuating the statutory functions currently exercised by CS/FS respectively upon delegation of authority. Dr NG's view that the transfer of statutory functions amongst DoBs would suffice in the present exercise	
		and DSoD should be deleted from the Order. Dr NG asked whether the Order could still be proceeded with even if the resolution was not passed by the Legislative Council ("LegCo"). Dr NG requested the Administration to provide a list of statutory functions presently exercised by SoDs which might be exercised by DSoDs in future through delegation of authority.	Admin (para. 2(b) of the minutes)
		The Administration's explanation that the resolution would only affect the transfer of statutory functions of DoBs, not DSoDs. As regards the Order, it would be issued subject to the creation of DSoDs posts following the ESC/FC processes. The Administration's further explanation that when FC had approved the creation of two DSoD posts and Central People's Government ("CPG") had appointed the persons concerned as DSoDs pursuant to BL and on nominations made by CE, those persons who had taken up the posts of DSoD were "public officers". Under section 43(1) of Cap. 1, a specified public officer might, when the need arose, delegate any other public officer to exercise the powers conferred or perform the duties imposed upon the specified public officer by an Ordinance. The proposed creation of DSoD rank and posts was therefore in conformity with BL and local laws.	
		Mr LEUNG Kwok-hung's views that while the DSoD was explicitly provided in BL, it should be established through local legislation.	

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012543 - 013619	Chairman Mr CHEUNG Man-kwong Administration H/CEEO	Mr CHEUNG Man-kwong's views that DSoDs were important officials who were above the rank of DoB, and SoDs might delegate their powers to them. These two DSoDs might also give directives to DoBs which were not under their direct purview. He considered that there was actually no legal basis for creating the posts of DSoDs and queried why statutory functions were not conferred upon DSoDs before 1 July 2012.	
		The Administration and H/CEEO pointed out that under the existing law, any powers conferred or duties imposed by any Ordinance were generally conferred or imposed upon the head of the organisation concerned who might delegate the exercise of those powers and performance of those duties to his/her subordinates by virtue of section 43(1) of Cap. 1. The proposed arrangements with regard to the statutory powers and duties of two DSoDs were in line with current practice.	
013620 - 014141	Chairman Mr Alan LEONG H/CEEO	Mr Alan LEONG queried why the creation of an additional layer of administration would achieve more efficiency. He shared the concerns of Mr CHEUNG Man-kwong and Dr Margaret NG that creation of the two DSoDs was to check and balance, or even undermine, the powers of CS and FS. His suggestion that those controversial issues should be removed from the re-organisation proposals.	
014142 - 015928	Chairman Mr Albert HO Administration Mrs Sophie LEUNG Mr LEUNG Kwok-hung	Mr Albert HO held the view that it was inadequate to introduce DSoDs by way of a resolution given that its legal basis was the decision of CE-in-Council but the decision concerned was not formally promulgated. He cautioned that subsequent to FC's approval of the creation of the two DSoD posts, there was a potential risk that CE might change their duties and responsibilities by administrative means.	
		The Administration's response that any such change of major duties of FC approved posts would have to be reported to LegCo in accordance with the established procedures.	
		Mrs Sophie LEUNG expressed agreement with the Administration's position concerning the constitutionality and legality of creating the rank and post of DSoD.	

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		Mr LEUNG Kwok-hung's view that the issue of duties to be exercised by DSoD should require further examination.	•
015929 - 021023	Chairman Dr Margaret NG H/CEEO Administration Dr Priscilla LEUNG	Dr Margaret NG's enquiry on whether and how the resolution could be amended to the effect that the scope of power of DSoDs be limited. Her suggestion that the scope of the re-organisational proposals should be reduced.	
		The Administration's response that while amendments could be introduced to the resolution, there was no reference to the posts of DSoDs in the resolution. The Order would take effect following its gazettal and the negative vetting procedure by LegCo.	
		Extension of meeting.	
		Dr Priscilla LEUNG's view that the question at issue was that whether members would support the CE-elect to put in place a suitable Government structure to implement his policies.	
021024 - 021847	Chairman Mr CHEUNG Man-kwong Administration H/CEEO	Mr CHEUNG Man-kwong pointed to the fact that an amendment to the resolution did not touch upon the DSoD posts. He requested an explanation for the legal basis for creating the posts.	
		H/CEEO's explanation that Section 8 of the Public Finance Ordinance provided that FC might approve changes to the estimates of expenditure upon a proposal of FS. ESC under FC examined and made recommendations to FC on the Administration's proposals for creating new ranks and/or posts. The Administration had, in accordance with the above procedures, put forth proposals for the establishment changes arising from the re-organisation of the Government Secretariat to ESC, including the creation of DSoD rank and posts.	
		H/CEEO's further advice that under the existing law, any powers conferred or duties imposed by any Ordinance were generally conferred or imposed upon the head of the organisation concerned who might delegate the exercise of those powers and performance of those duties to his/her subordinates by virtue of section 43(1) of Cap. 1.
