Committee on Members' Interests Paper for the meeting on 30 April 2013

Outcome of consultation with Members on whether an independent person should be appointed as a Commissioner to receive and investigate complaints against Members

Purpose

This paper reports on the outcome of consultation with Members on whether an independent person should be appointed as a Commissioner to receive and investigate complaints against Members which are within the remit of the Committee on Members' Interests ("CMI").

Background

2. CMI of the Fourth Legislative Council ("LegCo") conducted a review on the existing mechanisms under the Rules of Procedure for dealing with complaints against Members in their capacity as such and studied the mechanisms adopted by some selected overseas legislatures for handling complaints against their members. To address the public concern about Members conducting investigations into complaints made against their fellow legislators and having made reference to the mechanism for investigating complaints against Members of Parliament in the House of Commons of the United Kingdom ("UK"), CMI worked out a proposal of appointing an independent person as a Commissioner to receive and investigate complaints against Members which were within its remit, and consulted all Members of the Fourth LegCo on the proposal towards the end of the term. CMI agreed that its proposal and the consultation outcome should be reported to CMI of the Fifth LegCo for consideration.

Deliberations on the proposal by CMI of the current LegCo term

- At the meeting of CMI held on 28 January 2013, members deliberated on whether an independent person should be appointed as a Commissioner to receive and investigate complaints against Members which are within the remit of CMI¹. Members have expressed diverse The reasons given in support of appointing a views on the matter. Commissioner are that the appointment of a Commissioner will address the public concern about Members conducting investigation into the conduct of their fellow legislators, and the complaint handling process will be expedited by entrusting the investigatory work with the Commissioner. There are however reservations about appointing a Commissioner and the reasons given include: the appointment of a Commissioner will not absolve CMI from its role in handling complaints against Members (i.e. Members conducting investigation into the conduct of their fellow legislators) as CMI still has to decide whether to accept the Commissioner's findings and whether sanction should be recommended; CMI should be in a better position to decide whether sanction should be recommended if the investigation is conducted by its members; unlike the UK House of Commons which has 650 Members, LegCo has a membership of 70 only and the relatively small number of complaints may not justify the appointment of a Commissioner, at least for the time being; the appointment of a Commissioner may provide a ready channel for lodging frivolous complaints against Members; and the LegCo Secretariat has the expertise and manpower resources in handling matters relating to claims for reimbursement of operating expenses and providing services to CMI in conducting investigations against Members.
- 4. Given the diverse views expressed by members, CMI decided that before considering the matter further, all Members should be consulted, by way of a questionnaire, on whether an independent person should be appointed as a Commissioner to receive and investigate complaints against Members which are within its remit. Accordingly, the Clerk to CMI issued the questionnaire on 18 February 2013, inviting all Members to give their views on the matter².

Outcome of consultation with Members

5. A total of 69 Members, i.e. all Members except the President, responded to the questionnaire. The consultation outcome is set out in the **Appendix**, a summary of which is as follows:

The discussion paper for the meeting is LC Paper No. CMI/27/12-13.

The circular attached with the questionnaire is LC Paper No. CMI/30/12-13.

- (a) 23 Members (or 33.3%) agree that an independent person should be appointed as a Commissioner. Among them:
 - (i) nine Members consider that the appointment of a Commissioner should require the passage of a motion³ in the Council by a four-fifths majority of all Members of the Council, and one Member considers such a motion should require the passage by a four-fifths majority of the Members present;
 - (ii) one Member considers that CMI should propose a mechanism for the appointment of the Commissioner and consult Members again; and
 - (iii) one Member considers that the Commissioner should be appointed only when there is a case required to be followed up;
- (b) 34 Members (or 49.3%) disagree that an independent person should be appointed as a Commissioner. Among them, one Member indicates that he is not supportive of any proposed change before there is a clear mechanism for appointing the Commissioner; and
- (c) 12 Members (or 17.4%) have no view on the matter.

The way forward

6. Members are invited to note the outcome of consultation with Members as set out in paragraph 5 above, and decide the way forward.

⁽¹⁾ Except as otherwise provided in Rules 49B (Disqualification of Member from Office) and 66 (Bills Returned for Reconsideration) and Articles 52(2), 73(9) (in respect of a motion of impeachment) and 159 of and Annex I and Annex II to the Basic Law, the passage of all motions before the Council or a committee of the whole Council shall, subject to subrule (2), require a majority vote of the Members present.

⁽²⁾ The passage of a motion (other than a motion moved under any of the excepted Rules or Articles of the Basic Law referred to in subrule (1)) or bill introduced by a Member, or an amendment introduced by a Member to any motion or bill, shall require a majority vote of each of the following two groups of Members present –

⁽a) Members returned by functional constituencies (Group I); and

⁽b) Members returned by geographical constituencies through direct elections (Group II).


If the Council agrees to appoint a Commissioner, it is proposed that the appointment shall require the passage of a motion in the Council by a four-fifths majority of all Members of the Council.

The appointment of the Commissioner shall require the passage of a motion by a four-fifths majority of the Members present.

There should be a mechanism for appointing the independent person. CMI is invited to propose a mechanism for consultation with Members again.

The appointment should be made only when there is a case required to be followed up.

Any proposed change is not supported before there is a clear mechanism for appointing the Commissioner.
