## **Principal Economist (5)**

Rank: Principal Economist (D2)

Section: Section V

Responsible to: Government Economist

## Main Duties and Responsibilities -

- 1. To assist the Government Economist (G Econ) in providing strategic input to the policy areas in respect of population, poverty and welfare.
- 2. To develop appropriate analytical frameworks for policy deliberations in the areas of population, poverty and welfare.
- 3. To provide economic analysis and support to various high-level committees/ commissions chaired/ coordinated by Principal Officials or Heads of Bureaux in areas relating to population, poverty and welfare, including Commission on Poverty and its Task Forces, Steering Committee on Population Policy etc.
- 4. To carry out other duties as directed by G Econ.

## Specific tasks undertaken / to be undertaken by the new Principal Economist

- 1. To provide professional support and in-depth economic analyses to the work of the Commission on Poverty (CoP) and its Task Forces in the formulation of poverty and welfare policies
  - (a) To develop an analytical framework on poverty line in the Hong Kong context.
  - (b) To monitor Hong Kong's poverty situation including analyzing and monitoring the quantitative data of the poverty line.
  - (c) To measure the economic effectiveness of poverty alleviation policies.
  - (d) To strengthen research and strategic analysis on the underlying causes of poverty, including the elderly, the working poor, intergenerational poverty, poverty affecting new immigrants, and regional poverty.
- 2. To provide detailed research and in-depth economic analysis to the Steering Committee on Population Policy (SCPP) and the Administration in the formulation of population and welfare policy
  - (a) To provide research analyses and strategic inputs on the economic implications of the changing demographic profile based on population projections and labour force projections conducted by the Census and Statistics Department.
  - (b) To conduct research studies on the potential consequences of ageing on the Hong Kong economy, including its impact on Hong Kong's long-term growth potential; the build-up in manpower shortage and skills mismatch; and examining the fiscal sustainability over the long-term with growing welfare and medical spending yet with shrinking population of taxpayers.
  - (c) To conduct detailed research studies relating to population policy in accordance with the steer of SCPP.
- 3. To carry out in-depth policy research and analyses of the underlying socio-economic phenomenon from the economic angle on policy areas on population, poverty and welfare.
- 4. To attend meetings, briefings and presentation sessions at the CoP, its Task Forces and SCPP; and to brief and report research findings at meetings, briefings and presentation sessions.
- 5. To carry out other duties as directed by G Econ.
