- (a) The posts created under Programme (2) of the ICAC in 2012-13 were filled by open recruitment, in-service recruitment and promotion respectively.
- (b) The ICAC will create 23 posts under Programme (2) of the ICAC in 2013-14. Of these, 14 will be filled by the aforesaid means. The remaining 9 posts are time-limited posts of two years. The ICAC will arrange these posts to be filled by experienced officers and vacancies resulted from such deployment will be filled by open recruitment and promotion.
- (c) The rank and job nature of the 23 posts to be created under Programme(2) of the ICAC in 2013-14 are as follows:
 - 5 Commission Against Corruption Officer (Middle/Lower) [CACO (M/L)] and 4 Assistant Commission Against Corruption Officer (ACACO) posts to be deployed for strengthening the investigative capabilities of the frontline in view of the increasing number of complaints and complexity of investigations.

The Operations Department coped with the increasingly sophisticated crimes through recruiting additional staff, training, and liaising with local and overseas law enforcement experts in 2012-13. In this regard, please advise on:

Reply:

- (a) In 2012-13, the Operations Department strengthened the capabilities of computer forensics through enhanced manpower, training and liaison with experts from local and overseas law enforcement agencies to rise to the challenge of fast-paced technological advancement. 1 Commission Against Corruption Officer (Middle/Lower) (CACO(M/L)) and 1 Assistant Commission Against Corruption Officer (ACACO) posts were created. The annual expenditure is estimated to be \$1.01M.
- (b) In 2012-13, the Operations Department arranged officers of the Computer Forensics Section to attend seven training courses organised by overseas and local law enforcement and professional agencies to equip them with the latest information technology and forensic techniques. The cost involved was about \$240,000. Separately, the officers of the Computer Forensics Section briefed new recruits and serving officers on the principles of computer forensics during the induction training for ACACOs and CACO(M/L)s and command courses to strengthen their capabilities in conducting relevant investigation work.
- (c) In 2012-13, officers of the Computer Forensics Section of the Operations Department attended experts' meetings with computer forensics professionals and management of the Police Force, the Customs & Excise Department and the Immigration Department covering the latest criminal practices involving computer crimes and investigative techniques. Separately, officers of the Computer Forensics Section made exchanges with computer forensics experts from Australia, India, Malaysia, Singapore, Turkey, the United Kingdom, and the United States during the year.

Reply:

- (a) As regards the corruption prevention work in 2013-14, the ICAC has formulated the following work plan to address the corruption risks in site supervision arising from the increasing construction of public housing:
 - (i) Conduct a series of assignment studies on the procedures adopted by the Housing Department (HD) for site supervision with a view to identifying any weaknesses and making recommendations to ensure that the procedures are corruption resistant. The assignment studies will cover the site supervision arrangement for the construction of piling foundations and superstructures of buildings. To assist the HD in strengthening the corruption prevention measures before the increase in construction activities, the ICAC issued the assignment study report on site supervision of superstructures to the HD in early 2013.
 - (ii) Conduct integrity management workshops for the site supervisory staff of the HD, consultants and contractors involved in public housing construction with a view to enhancing their integrity standard and awareness of corruption prevention.

The ICAC will complete the above corruption prevention work through the re-deployment of internal resources.

(b) In 2010, 2011 and 2012, the ICAC received 142, 177 and 190 corruption complaints related to the construction industry. Of which, 110, 140 and 142 were pursuable corruption complaints. In the past 3 years, 25, 7 and 11 persons alleged to be involved in corruption complaints related to the construction industry were respectively prosecuted.

Owing to the recent boom in the construction industry, a rise in the number of corruption complaints concerning the construction industry is expected. Corruption complaints in this respect will be closely monitored, and resources will be suitably deployed on a need basis to ensure that effective and thorough investigations are carried out. To reduce the corruption risks in construction, the ICAC has also adopted a thematic strategy in preventing corruption and been providing the following corruption prevention input to the construction sector:

- (i) Conduct assignment studies and offer corruption prevention advice to government works departments and public bodies on the procedures for the implementation of construction projects.
- (ii) Deploy officers to act as observers in tender assessment panels of major government capital works projects with a view to offering instant corruption prevention advice to help ensure the tendering assessment process is fair and proper.
- (iii) Organise integrity management training workshops for site supervisory staff of works consultants and contractors to raise their integrity standard and awareness in corruption prevention.
- (iv) Organise corruption prevention training for the undergraduates of the construction-related courses of the universities to help the future construction professionals better understand the corruption risks inherent in construction and to instil into them the principles of corruption prevention.

Under this Programme, the Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC) will launch a two-year prevention and publicity programme starting from 2013 to mark the 40th Anniversary of the ICAC in 2014. Activities include the production of a television drama series and joint projects with the District Councils (DCs), etc. Please advise this Committee on details of the programme and the estimated expenditure and manpower.

Reply:

To mark the ICAC's 40th Anniversary in 2014, the Community Relations Department (CRD) will organise a series of anti-corruption activities in all districts and produce a television drama series starting from mid-2013 to remind the public of the evils of corruption and enlist support from the community.

(i) Joint Projects with DCs

During the year, the CRD will continue to organise anti-corruption publicity projects in collaboration with the 18 DCs. The projects will include multi-faceted educational programmes to promote integrity among students. Also, district organisations, under the ICAC's community involvement programme, will be invited to organise activities to promote integrity messages to their members. To enhance the effectiveness of the projects, the CRD will hold a launching ceremony to kick off a series of district activities towards the end of 2013. Representatives of the district organisations from the 18 districts will be invited to attend the ceremony to demonstrate their determination to safeguard probity as the core value of Hong Kong. Moreover, the CRD will arrange a mobile exhibition truck to visit locations with high visitor flow as well as schools across the territory to publicise the evils of corruption and the work of the ICAC.

The district projects will be organised by the respective ICAC Regional Offices. The expenditure for the projects is estimated to be \$2.2 m, out of which \$0.7 m will be sponsored by the DCs. The CRD will also earmark \$1.3 m for the mobile exhibition truck.

(ii) "ICAC Investigators" Drama Series

Scheduled to broadcast in April 2014, the new series of "ICAC Investigators" features five 1.5-hour episodes based on real ICAC corruption cases which involved listed companies, the construction industry and government officers. It aims at hammering home the evils of corruption and displaying the professionalism of ICAC officers who carry out their duties without fear or favour. The drama series, which is a joint production with the Television Broadcasts Limited (TVB), will have the scripts, producer and director provided by the ICAC and the cast, equipment, other backstage support services and broadcast time slots arranged by the TVB. A number of well-known directors have been invited to direct the episodes. The total amount of expenditure for the drama series is about \$10 m.

CPD keeps close contact and meets annually with the management of FEHD to identify priority areas for conducting corruption prevention studies. In the last three years, CPD conducted 8 assignment studies (the titles of these studies are tabulated below) and 22 consultation activities (including provision of corruption prevention services such as prompt advice on the existing or newly revised system, review of the departmental code of conduct, and conducting of integrity management training, etc.) for FEHD with a view to providing recommendations to improve the practices and procedures which are conducive to corruption.

(e) The Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC) will regularly review the induction training for ACACOs and CACOs(M/L) to ensure that the training strengthens the officers' professionalism and caters for the investigative and operational requirements. At present, the induction for ACACOs consists of 3 stages covering 10, 3 and 4 weeks respectively. CACOs(M/L) receive a 14-week induction training course at the time of joining that includes leadership and management elements to prepare them for a junior leadership role. After 12 months' on-the-job training, they attend a 3-week Command Course to build on their experience. The above arrangements better merge the theory and practical experience to achieve the best results of training.

All newly recruited ACACOs and CACOs(M/L) undergo intensive training on a wide range of subjects, including law, rules of evidence, computer forensics, financial investigation, cognitive interview techniques, use of firearms, regulations and procedures, communication skills, and other subjects to enhance their professional portfolio. To further prepare the trainees for challenges at work, understanding of law enforcement, personal development and team building, and practical exercises are emphasized in induction training.

The Training and Development Group under the Operations Department of the ICAC provides induction training for new recruits as set out above and continuous professional training for serving officers to cope with the strategies of the Commission. Headed by 1 SCACO, the Group is staffed by 2 CACOs(U), 15 CACOs(M/L) and 2 ACACOs. The estimated salary expenditure for 2013-14 is \$14.70M. 1 CACO(U) and 8 CACOs(M/L) are responsible for preparation and teaching duties in respect of the inducting training. The ICAC will also engage external organisations for providing training on team building, stress management, personal effectiveness, etc. as and when required. The training expenditure in this respect for 2013-14 is estimated to be \$110,000.

- (a) The compilation of a corruption prevention guide for Chinese medicine practitioners (CMPs) does not mean that there are serious corruption problems in the trade. In fact, Chinese medicine services have become increasingly popular in Hong Kong, with over 9,000 registered and listed CMPs. The ICAC compiles this Corruption Prevention Guide to point out the corruption risks and integrity issues that the CMPs may face during their provision of services to patients and management of clinic operations. Effective measures will also be recommended in the Guide to help the CMPs raise their awareness of corruption prevention and prevent the profession's reputation from being tarnished by corruption or other malpractice.
- (b) In 2010, 2011 and 2012, the ICAC respectively received 3, 4 and 5 corruption complaints related to the Chinese medicine practice. No prosecution was made in respect of corruption complaints related to the Chinese medicine practice in the aforesaid years.
- (c) The ICAC will promulgate the Guide in the fourth quarter of 2013. The Guide will also be published at the ICAC's website for the reference and downloading of all interested parties. The ICAC will deploy internal resources to complete this task.

- 9 time-limited posts of two years, namely 1 Senior Commission Against Corruption Officer (SCACO), 1 Commission Against Corruption Officer (Upper) [CACO(U)], 4 CACO(M/L) and 2 ACACO posts to be deployed for the highly sensitive and exceptionally complex investigations, and 1 Personal Secretary (PS) I post to be deployed to provide secretarial and administrative support for the supernumerary post of Assistant Director / Special Duty created with the approval of the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council in late 2012.
- 1 CACO(M/L) and 4 ACACO posts to be deployed for reinforcing information technology support.

Reply:

Year 2014 will be the 40th Anniversary of the ICAC. The Community Relations Department will take the opportunity to remind citizens of the evils of corruption and call on the public to cherish the anti-corruption achievements jointly accomplished with the ICAC. To this end, the CRD will step up its publicity programmes in 2013/14. On top of collaboration with the 18 District Councils (DCs) in organising anti-corruption publicity projects, district organisations will also be invited to organise activities to promote integrity messages to their members. A mobile exhibition truck will be arranged to visit locations with high visitor flow as well as schools across the territory to publicise the evils of corruption and the work of the ICAC. In addition, the CRD will produce a 5-episode "ICAC Investigators 2014" television drama (with each episode extended from 1 hour to 1.5 hour). Besides, it will collaborate with the Hong Kong International Film Festival to organise a series of activities on the past "ICAC Investigators" drama series and also a premiere for the new television drama series.

The estimate for CRD's publicity activities for 2013-14 is \$20 m, while the expenditure for the past three years is stated below:

2012-13: \$16.50 m (revised estimate) 2011-12: \$17.09 m (actual expenditure) 2010-11: \$13.89 m (actual expenditure)

Reply:

- (a) In 2010, 2011 and 2012, the ICAC received 1 057, 1 117 and 1 192 corruption complaints involving government departments and 231, 229 and 257 corruption complaints involving public bodies respectively.
- (b) In 2000, the ICAC and the CSB launched a Sample Guide on Conduct and Discipline and assisted departments in drafting or updating their internal guidelines on conduct and discipline in line with their circumstances and operational needs.

All along, departments regularly review and update their internal guidelines taking into account those guidelines applicable to civil servants issued by the Administration. In reviewing their guidelines, the departments seek assistance from the ICAC and the CSB as and when required. When conducting corruption prevention studies for individual departments, the Corruption Prevention Department (CPD) also reviews the need to revise their internal guidelines.

To further enhance civil service integrity to meet public expectation, the ICAC will, in collaboration with the CSB, update the Sample Guide on Conduct and Discipline and proactively assist departments in reviewing their internal guidelines on conduct and discipline and help individual departments incorporate relevant content into their guidelines in light of their operational requirement.

- (c) The ICAC has joined hands with the CSB to launch the Ethical Leadership Programme for civil servants since 2007, with a view to entrenching integrity among civil servants through the leadership of the senior management of government bureaux/departments. Under the programme, directorate officers appointed by government bureaux/departments would act as Ethics Officers (EOs) responsible for leading and co-ordinating integrity promotion projects within their organisations, with Assistant Ethical Officers (AEOs) assisting in carrying out the relevant work. We now have a network of about 160 EOs and AEOs. In 2013-14, the ICAC and the CSB will provide them with the following support:
 - organise thematic workshops for exchanges of experience among bureaux and departments on topics such as integrity, conduct and discipline;
 - apart from the joint initiative of the CPD and the CSB in actively assisting government departments in reviewing their internal guidelines on conduct and discipline stated in (b) above, the Community Relations Department (CRD) has been co-operating with government departments to enhance civil servants' awareness of corruption risks and related laws and regulations through publicity and training, in particular to enhance their alertness to conflict of interest and the offence of misconduct in public office. In 2012, CRD produced a "Reference Package on Conflict of Interest for Managers in the Civil Service" and promoted the package to departments through the Ethics Officers. During 2012-13, the CRD had visited 26 government departments and joined hands with their management to examine their work nature and areas conducive to conflict of interest and to devise suitable training programmes for their staff. In 2013-14, the ICAC will continue to contact Ethics Officers and management of remaining bureaux and departments by various means for provision of services. Moreover, newly-produced comics and messages on the theme of managing conflict of interest will be uploaded onto "Online Community for Ethics Officers" for publication in staff newsletters or intranets of the departments; and
 - meet with the senior management of individual bureaux/departments to jointly examine the departments' work on corruption prevention and conduct and discipline, and assist them in promoting integrity management in their departments to entrench a probity culture.

- (a) The compilation of a corruption prevention guide for Chinese medicine practitioners (CMPs) does not mean that there are serious corruption problems in the trade. In fact, Chinese medicine services have become increasingly popular in Hong Kong, with over 9,000 registered and listed CMPs. The ICAC compiles this Corruption Prevention Guide to point out the corruption risks and integrity issues that the CMPs may face during their provision of services to patients and management of clinic operations. Effective measures will also be recommended in the Guide to help the CMPs raise their awareness of corruption prevention and prevent the profession's reputation from being tarnished by corruption or other malpractice.
- (b) In drafting the Guide, the ICAC will consult a representative Chinese medicine association, the Hospital Authority and the three local universities providing Chinese medicine degree courses so as to enhance the practicability of the Guide. The Guide will be promulgated in the fourth quarter of 2013 and published at the ICAC's website for the reference and downloading of all interested parties.

To enhance effectiveness of the projects, the CRD will hold a launching ceremony to kick off a series of district activities in late 2013. Representatives of district organisations from the 18 districts will be invited to attend the ceremony to demonstrate their determination to safeguard probity as the core value of Hong Kong. A mobile exhibition truck will also be arranged to visit locations with high visitor flow as well as schools across the territory to publicise the evils of corruption and the work of the ICAC.

- (a) What is the estimated increase in number of complaints and what is the reason for such an increase?

- There has been an increase in the number of complaints in recent years. As illustration, 2 535, 2 733, 3 074 and 2 950 pursuable corruption complaints (excluding election-related complaints) were respectively received from 2009 to 2012. The number of election-related pursuable complaints was 210, 35, 554 and 2 377 respectively. The quantity of corruption complaints is affected by various reasons and fluctuates with the circumstances each year. It is therefore not possible to estimate the number of corruption complaints. Rather than the quantity, the increasing complexity of the matters involved in corruption complaints is a more important reason for the increasing workload of investigating officers. There is hence a practical need to strengthen the manpower to cope with the investigative work.
- (b) and (c) The Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC) will newly create 23 posts under Programme (2) in 2013-14, and the rank and job nature of the posts are as follows:
 - 5 Commission Against Corruption Officer (Middle/Lower) [CACO (M/L)] and 4
 Assistant Commission Against Corruption Officer (ACACO) posts to be deployed
 for strengthening the investigative capabilities of the frontline in view of the
 increasing number of complaints and complexity of investigations
 - 9 time-limited posts of two years, namely 1 Senior Commission Against Corruption Officer, 1 Commission Against Corruption Officer (Upper), 4 CACO(M/L) and 2 ACACO posts to be deployed for the highly sensitive and exceptionally complex investigations, and 1 Personal Secretary I post to be deployed to provide secretarial and administrative support for the supernumerary post of Assistant

To reduce the corruption risk, CPD has been reviewing the procedures of the Housing Authority through the Housing Department over the years. These procedures include the letting and administration of works contracts. In the past five years, CPD completed nine assignment studies on works related procedures for the Housing Department.

As regards the corruption prevention work in 2013-14, CPD has formulated the following work plan to address the corruption risks in site supervision arising from the increasing construction of public housing:

- (a) Conduct a series of assignment studies on the procedures adopted by the Housing Department for site supervision with a view to identifying any weaknesses and making recommendations to help ensure that the procedures are corruption resistant. The assignment studies will cover the site supervision arrangement for the construction of piling foundations and superstructures of buildings. To assist the Housing Department in strengthening the corruption prevention measures before the increase in construction activities, CPD has issued the assignment study report on site supervision of superstructures to the Housing Department in early 2013.
- (b) Conduct integrity management workshops for the site supervisory staff of the Housing Department, consultants and contractors involved in public housing construction with a view to enhancing their integrity standard and awareness of corruption prevention.

CPD will complete the above corruption prevention work through the re-deployment of internal resources.

- 9 time-limited posts of two years, namely 1 Senior Commission Against Corruption Officer (SCACO), 1 Commission Against Corruption Officer (Upper) [CACO(U)], 4 CACO(M/L) and 2 ACACO posts to be deployed for the highly sensitive and exceptionally complex investigations, and 1 Personal Secretary I post to be deployed to provide secretarial and administrative support for the supernumerary post of Assistant Director / Special Duty created with the approval of the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council in late 2012.

The establishment includes 1 CACO(U) and 1 CACO(M/L). Investigations into election-related complaints are conducted by X Group of the Operations Department. The establishment includes 1 SCACO, 4 CACOs(U), 16 CACOs(M/L) and 24 ACACOs.

X Group under the Operations Department of the Independent Commission Against Corruption (ICAC) is responsible for investigating election-related corruption complaints. The establishment includes 1 Senior Commission Against Corruption Officer (SCACO), 4 Commission Against Corruption Officers (Upper) [CACOs(U)], 16 Commission Against Corruption Officers (Middle/Lower) [CACOs(M/L)] and 24 Assistant Commission Against Corruption Officers (ACACOs). The salary expenditure for 2013-14 is estimated to be \$23.93M. When processing relevant complaints, the Operations Department will suitably deploy resources based on practical needs in the first place to ensure that effective and thorough investigations are carried out. An illustration is that resources had been deployed to establish the Election Taskforce to centralise efforts in handling the large number of vote-rigging complaints related to the 2011 District Council Election between December 2011 and May 2012. Headed by 1 SCACO and 2 CACOs(U), the Taskforce comprised about 18 investigating officers at the rank of CACO(M/L) and ACACO. If the investigative work cannot be coped with through deployment of resources, the ICAC will seek additional resources through the established mechanism.

Separately, the 23 posts to be newly created in the ICAC in 2013-14 are under the Operations Department, and the rank and job nature are as follows:

- 5 Commission Against Corruption Officer (Middle/Lower) [CACO (M/L)] and 4 Assistant Commission Against Corruption Officer (ACACO) posts to be deployed for strengthening the investigative capabilities of the frontline in view of the increasing number of complaints and complexity of investigations.
- 9 time-limited posts of two years, namely 1 Senior Commission Against Corruption Officer, 1 Commission Against Corruption Officer (Upper), 4 CACO(M/L) and 2 ACACO posts to be deployed for the highly sensitive and exceptionally complex investigations, and 1 Personal Secretary I post to be deployed to provide secretarial and administrative support for the supernumerary post of Assistant Director / Special Duty created with the approval of the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council in late 2012.
- 1 CACO(M/L) and 4 ACACO posts to be deployed for reinforcing information technology support.

The estimated expenditure for the development of the New Generation Operations Department Information System is \$57.46M. The funding proposal was approved by the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council in May 2011. The estimated expenditure covers the cost of hardware, software, and implementation service. The cost of the following assessments by the contractor is included:

- Security risk assessment and initial privacy impact assessment in the system analysis and design phase; and
- Security audit and final privacy impact assessment in the user acceptance testing phase.

The assessments and recommendations will be duly addressed before system rollout. It is anticipated that the system would come into operation in May 2015.

- (a) Between 2010 and 2012, the Community Relations Department (CRD) of the ICAC collaborated with the District Councils and district organisations in 18 districts to organise some 430 multi-faceted activities to promote probity messages. These activities included carnivals, seminars, exhibitions, various types of school projects and activities for young people.
- (b) The CRD normally does not co-organise district activities with political parties as our district partners are mainly the 18 District Councils. Nevertheless, when the branch offices of political parties at district level or individual ward offices of District Councillors considered it appropriate to disseminate probity messages through their activities, the Regional Offices of the ICAC would upon request provide them with relevant support such as loan of game sets/exhibits or provision of quiz games and souvenirs carrying anti-corruption messages. Besides, representatives of the ICAC had, upon the invitation of individual political parties' branches/ward offices, served as speakers in seminars organised by them to promote clean building management messages to owners' corporations and owners/residents.
