The Administration supplemented that under section 8(1) of the Telecommunications Ordinance ("TO") (Cap. 106), licences were required for establishing or maintaining any means of telecommunications, or possessing or using, or dealing in the course of trade or business, or demonstrating with a view to sale in the course of trade a business, radiocommunications apparatus. 		In response to members' enquiry on criminal liability, ALA advised that under section 20 of TO, any person who contravened section 8(1) would be guilty of an offence and would be liable on summary conviction, to a fine at level 5, i.e. \$50,000 and to imprisonment for 2 years; and on conviction on indictment, to a fine at level 6, i.e. \$100,000 and to imprisonment for 5 years.

Whilst he agreed that the licensing exemptions in respect of the sale or import of PHS apparatus be ceased, he suggested that the licensing exemptions in respect of possession or use of such apparatus be continued so as to minimize the impact on the existing users.	
		The Administration advised that most telecommunications apparatus certified by the Communications Authority ("CA") carried a label issued by the CA, and a search engine for certified telecommunications equipment for use in Hong Kong was provided on the website of OFCA. Members of the public who were unsure whether a telecommunications equipment was allowed to be

		used in Hong Kong were welcomed to bring the equipment to OFCA for free checking. A publicity campaign would be launched to educate the public on the implementation of the Amendment Order. However, the Administration considered that continuing the licensing exemptions in respect of possession or use of such apparatus would not be desirable, as the radio signals generated by such apparatus might cause interference to licenced telecommunications apparatus.	
		In response to Mr Wong Ting-kwong's enquiry on prosecution policy in relation to the possession or use of PHS apparatus after the withdrawal of the licensing exemptions upon the coming into effect of the Amendment Order, the Administration confirmed that a person, who committed without knowledge the offence in relation to the illegal possession or use of PHS apparatus for domestic purpose, would not be prosecuted. Only the PHS apparatus would be confiscated. The Administration advised that this practice would not apply to persons who knowingly did so.	
		ALA advised that there was no statutory defence in relation to an offence of possession or use under section 8(1)(b) of TO.

		The Administration advised that it was not desirable to extend the transitional period as radio spectrum was a scarce public resource. It was the Administration's policy objective to facilitate the most efficient use of radio spectrum. In fact, the potential interference caused by PHS apparatus to 3G and 4G telecommunications services was not limited to indoor environment. Signals from 3G and 4G base stations might also be subject to such interference.
