The Real Solution to a Non-Existent Sham Problem - Waste is a Valuable Resource and a Commercial Business

A New Mindset and Thinking is urgently required to solve Hong Kong's purported Waste Problem in a fair, sustainable and cost-effective manner, in a fast-track time implementation period of 3 years or less. Waste must be treated as a valuable commercial resource not as dirty waste.

High cost, unsustainable, long-term and partial non-solutions, proposed by Government and the EPD, are at best unsustainable, irrational and unreasonable i.e. nonsense and contrary to common sense; or at worse smell of a large scale sham charade systemic infrastructure fraud that is being perpetrated on the people of Hong Kong. The Government's focus is on unnecessary, irresponsible and exorbitant large scale Capital Works, like the now proposed for the Mega Incinerator, Landfill Extensions and Biogas Organic Waste Treatment Facilities. Analysis of contract tender procedures and relative costs in Annex 1 shows how the 'shell game ' of this well-laid and well-practiced infrastructure fraud works for existing well-

connected vested pecuniary interests. The mechanism is used to plunder public funds beneath a veneer of officialdom, propriety and legitimacy. The works are always essential, urgently needed and subject to public tender, as a matter of course. The reality is in fact the reverse.

Infrastructure works for these proposed projects are measured by the two financial indicators of Capital Expenditure (Capex) and Operating Expenditure (Opex). All the Capex and Opex for the Government's projects are exorbitant, ill defined, unbounded and subject to potential massive future cost rises i.e. just like the fast rail link. Not only are they exorbitant in cost, but also irrelevant, unjustified, damaging to our environment and eco-system, and a threat to health. This is a shocking and appalling combination for a purported partial-solution, not designed to properly address Hong Kong's real waste problems.

The real solution is not profound, unexpected or difficult to understand. Waste in Hong Kong, whether Municipal Solid Waste (MSW), Construction or Hazardous Toxic Chemical Wastes is easy to define and address with proven large scale 'mature' green solutions. These are sustainable, and do not produce 'Carbon to Air' global warming, green house, climate change gases and dangerous air and ground pollutants that are harmful to health. These 'Carbon to Earth' Technologies can address Hong Kong's waste problems in a radical, faster, better and much more cost-effective manner. To produce a 'Think Green Go Clean, Live Cool' Zero Waste Zero Waste Pollution Hong Kong within 3 Years. The 'smoke and mirrors' real cost of change, which the Government has carefully hidden, is the bill for terminating the existing unsustainable long term waste to landfill contracts with the likes of Veolia and Sita.

Case Study - How the Pork Barrel and Gravy Train to Raid Public Funds Works

Organic Waste Treatment Facility 1 - The Lowest Tender Price HK\$1.53 Billion

A voluminous tender of around 2,700 plus pages, for a low volume 200 tons a day food waste plant, situated in a remote area of North Lantau. The plant is not designed to treat green waste i.e. it is specifically excluded, and can only treat food waste with an ultra high water content specification. This means that the plant is actually dealing with a dehydrated mass of around 40 tons a day of organic matter i.e. HK\$1,530 million for 40 tons a day of organic matter and 160 tons of waste water requiring treatment. The Capex Cost is stupendously high, as is the Opex Cost of HK\$70 million a year. Per ton per day Capex HK\$38.25 million. The plant will generate an undisclosed amount of global warming gases to air, has no notified agreement of any connection to a power utility and will produce unwanted fertiliser. Needless to say the EAP and CWSC Committees approved this Capex with almost no dissent.

This Biogas 'Carbon to Air' Plant is the most expensive in the world by a wide margin i.e By a Factor of 10 or around 1,000 % at US\$196 million. Comparisons with a number of recently constructed or tendered similar small scale biogas and fertiliser plants in a number of high labour cost economies, give an average price uplift in Hong Kong of 1,000 %. There would appear to be no real rationale behind this con (CON - a lie to the world) green facility and financial extravaganza. Not only is it environmentally unsustainable by producing global warming gases and putting 'Carbon to Air', with an energy loss of around 80%, but it has also inanely designed to produce energy that nobody wants and fertiliser, which from the experience of Cheung Chau, will be unwanted and have to be landfilled.

A direct comparison with proven 'Carbon to Earth' Food and Green Waste Plants in Taiwan is highly instructive and revealing. These food waste plants are modular and deal daily on average, in an 8 hour work day, with 200 to 1,000 tons of food and green waste. They occupy any industrial or agricultural premises of 15,000 to 30,000 sq. ft. No specialist adaptation or safety measures is required for these premises, since the processes are perfectly safe and sanitised. The plants produce high quality fish farm food, liquid and solid fertilisers i.e. to earth To reduce pollution logistics used in the same district where the food and green waste is produced. The abundance of fish farms is testament to their success.

A high tech fish and vegetable farming facility, integrated with a 300 tons a day food waste plant inclusive of water treatment facilities, premises adaptation, testing facilities and hybrid collection vehicles: Total Capex set up and operating is US\$20 million. This includes the high ROI fish farming facilities i.e. 10 % of the Capex of the OWTT 1 for a revenue generating facility. The facility's Opex is actually positive as a fish farm generates high revenues with an average minimum ROI of 150 % net a Year, depending on the mix of fresh and salt water fish species i.e. the facilities Opex is positive as it generates high revenues, compared to a Opex for the OWTF 1, equivalent to the Capex of a Taiwan Food and Green Waste Plant dealing with 50 % more Food Waste only working an 8 hour shift cycle!

A former Chief Engineer of a major construction company has examined the Tender for OWTF Phase 1. He states that a tender of such over complexity could in his opinion only have been produced in conjunction with a 'preferred' bidder. The Tender Board, responding to complaints on this tender of it being overly complex, extremely demanding in requirements and obstructive, has stated that it will now introduce a new procedure to employ a second consultant to examine the tender specification produced by the original consultant! In this case the first consultant would appear to be AECOM, who supplied the original Tender documents. It should be noted that OWTF Phase 2 is also now out to tender.

Note Well - The Capex of OWTF 1 is actually more than Capex to deal with HK's entire food and green waste using Taiwan 'Carbon to Earth.' technologies. OWTF 1 figures used pro-rata for the rest of HK's food and green waste gives a total Capex figure of HK\$38.25

Billion and Annual Opex of HK\$1.26 Billion at current prices! This illustrates the mind boggling scale of the waste infrastructure Capex and Opex misrepresentation, deception and fraud: Waste Mega Pork Barrel Capex and Opex Gravy Train' Literally this is the 'Great Waste Train Robbery.'

The same mechanism is now at work in the Government Incinerator and Landfill extension proposals before the Committee.

Members must be presumed to have full knowledge, information and awareness of their actions and therefore know when illegal acts have been and are being perpetrated and committed. The potential consequences for Hong Kong's global reputation and credibility are again mind boggling, as the Erwiana torture case clearly shows.

Hong Kong Waste for Global Warming

Waste sent to incinerators, landfills and waste-to-energy plants, is a major source of global warming gases

and chemical air, water and earth pollutants. Organic food and green waste converted to biogas and fuels,

exacerbate this harmful pollution while incurring energy losses up to 80 per cent.

These short-sighted solutions convert our so-called waste problem into the extremely dangerous global warming

climate change problem, which a recent UN report has said will increase the likelihood of severe, pervasive,

and irreversible impacts. This completely avoidable action is perverse and unsustainable, destroying nature, our environment and eco-systems.

The earth is sending its own warnings to us with increasing regularity. Nobel Prize laureate Joseph Stiglitz, told a joke at the recent Macau Eco

conference. There are two

planets, one happy and the other unhappy. The happy planet says, "What's wrong?" The unhappy planet says "People". The happy planet laughs and replies, "Don't worry, that's temporary."

Atmospheric research pioneer Ralph Keeling has talked about a "fossil carbon to air" problem. Private and public waste interests — which are inextricably linked — are deliberately blind to the catastrophic consequences of their activities.

Hong Kong's proposed mega-incinerator, landfill extensions, the exorbitant biogas unconnected energy plants producing unwanted fertiliser, and the world's largest sewage quad incinerator now being tested at Tuen Mun, all completely fail the global warming test by putting vast amounts of fossil carbon to air.

Two recent articles in the South China Morning Post referred to Holland's waste rates. The first quoted a recycling rate of 80 per cent, incineration 16 per cent and landfill 4 per cent. The second report gave different figures — recycling 68 per cent, waste to energy 30 per cent and landfill 2 per cent. If local recycling was 68 per cent to 80 per cent, then the direct conclusion is that there would be no need for any landfill extensions. This is clearly confirmed by the negligible Dutch landfill figures.

The European Union has mandated that by 2020 no recyclables and no organic food and green waste can be sent either to incinerators or landfills. This means that Dutch incineration, will be gradually phased out due to the lack of legal feedstock, as will the remaining landfills. Similarly, incineration is not sustainable and poses a threat to our environment. Combustion and landfills must be replaced by planet-friendly comprehensive recycling.

致特區政府及各議員:

商討擴建將軍澳堆填區之前,環境局可有做好以下10件事?

1. 履行落區承諾,收集受影響居民意見

去年政府擴建計劃「觸礁」後,政府曾公開承諾落區收集居民意見。唯黃錦星只到 過屯門及元朗兩區,卻從未到過「最受堆填區影響」的將軍澳。去年9月,黃錦星 更與西貢區議會閉門會議,禁止市民、傳媒旁聽,甚至阻止反擴堆填區的區議員進 場開會。

我們是最受害的一群,堆填區深深影響我及家人的健康。**我們要求擴建計劃放上立** 法會之前,環境局局長黃錦星必須履行承諾,落區與將軍澳居民接觸及商討改善措 施。

2. 落實新界東南堆填區關閉的時間表

環境局在新界東南堆填區操作年期上多次「亂估」:

- 2004 年西頁區議會文件 SKDC(M)18/04-05,環境運輸及工務局廖秀冬年代指堆 填區於 2011 年滿溢;
- 2005 年環境局的環評報告(合約編號: CE10/2005EP),指堆填區於 2012 年停止接收廢物;
- 2006 年立法會文件 IN37/05-06,同樣是環境運輸及工務局廖秀冬年代指堆填區 的操作至 2007 年完成;
- 2008 年立法會文件 CB(1) 88/08-09(06),環境局邱騰華年代指堆塡區於 2012 年至 2013 年滿溢;
- 2014 年立法會文件 CB1/SS/6/13,環境局黃錦星指堆填區於 2015 年尾滿溢。

作爲一個政策局,環境局在計算堆填區操作年期上毫不專業、甚爲兒戲,多次令將軍澳居民出現錯誤期望。由於多次被欺騙,**我們對環境局再次預計擴建後的新界東南堆填區使用壽命會延至**2020年表示「極度懷疑」,我們要求環境局向公眾交代確實關閉時間表,並刊登憲報確認。

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3. 改善進出堆填區的泥頭垃圾車所帶來的交通、環境、衛生問題

現時,環保大道是出入將軍澳多個屋苑、工業邨及堆填區的唯一通道,每天進出堆填區及填料庫的泥頭垃圾車多達4千部,引致環境及空氣嚴重污染、塵土飛揚、路面險象橫生,懸浮粒子PM2.5更嚴重超標。因此,唯有終極關閉堆填區、或所有垃圾透過水路運送至堆填區,才能撤底解決泥頭垃圾車造成的問題。

爲此,我們要求環境局安排以水路形式運送所有至堆填區的垃圾。若環境局向受影響居民釋出誠意、處理好以上問題後,屆時我們會考慮與局方商討堆填區計劃。

4. 廣泛獲得地區共識及支持

早於2010年西貢區議會已跨黨派及獨立議員通過動議「政府在未能解決臭味、交通、環境衛生問題,及未能在將軍澳所有屋苑全面諮詢,獲得居民支持前,本會堅決反對新界東南堆塡區之擴建計劃」(文件 SKDC(M)116/08 號)。 但環境局卻多次對外訛稱,指2011年5月3日西貢區議會上大部分區議員均支持或不反對堆塡區擴建。事實上,西貢區議會從未議決支持擴建方案。

相反,城市規劃委員會曾於 2011 年就新界東南堆填區(將軍澳分區計劃大綱草圖編號 S/TKO/18)諮詢公眾,結果收集到 2 千多項反對意見。由此可見,新界東南堆填區擴建方案從未獲地區的支持或共識。我們要求環境局就擴建方案先於將軍澳區作全面諮詢。

5. 支助將軍澳屋苑回收及改善配套

由於長年受堆填區問題滋擾,將軍澳居民有極高的環保意識,早已養成回收習慣。將軍澳多個屋苑早已推行各種有分類的回收計劃,如廚餘、廢紙、金屬、玻璃樽等,成效顯著。唯環境局對區內屋苑回收支援不足,「屋苑廚餘循環再造項目」成效不彰、「社區回收推廣車先導計劃」斷橛禾蟲。居民雖有心響應,但回收無以爲繼。

事實上,將軍澳屋苑絕對願意帶頭回收減廢,唯政府對屋苑回收可謂「零」支援, 現時多個屋苑(如將軍澳中心)只靠自發回收廚餘。我們要求環境局在徵收垃圾費、 推出堆填區擴建之前,先統籌全港屋苑的回收計劃,並把將軍澳納入試點之一。

6. 沼氣轉煤氣立即上馬

早於 2009 年,政府已完成跟煤氣公司討論,把新界東南堆填區的沼氣淨化用作生產煤氣之用。此舉可將堆填區沼氣轉爲有用的能源,同時可減少空氣污染物。至今已 5 年時間,但目前堆填區依然 24 小時燃燒沼氣,區內居民飽受堆填區所排放的二氧化碳、硫化氫和碳氫化合物等氣體之苦。

我們要求環境局在推出擴建方案之前,應先處理好區內原有堆塡區的排放沼氣問題, 立即把堆塡區的沼氣轉爲有用能源,惠及香港市民。

7. 環評落後,要求重新評估

新界東南堆填區擴建計劃的環評報告於 2005 年進行時,附近還未有民居,直至 2009 年始有居民陸續遷入。現時,鄰近的 85、86 區已發展了近 10000 個住宅單位,居住人口還不斷增加。2005 年的環評報告中所指的「輕微」影響早已不合實際,將軍澳堆填區及 137 填料庫運作帶來的污染、臭味對附近居民的實際影響比當時的環境評估大得多。

所有政府的大型工程上馬,必須製作與時並進且公正的環評報告。鑑於現時將軍澳 85 區、86 區的情況與 2005 年時截然不同,我們要求環境局不要自欺欺人,重做的新界東南堆填區環評報告。

8. 完善建築物廢料收費

近年大型基建項目、公共房屋陸續興建,令建築廢料大增。然而,政府對公私營的基建工程所製造的建築物廢料均無規管,對新界東南堆填區造成沉重壓力。

去年,政府妄顧西貢區議會及市民的強烈反對,「霸王硬上弓」把 137 填料庫的運作 延期至 2018 年。加上環境局計劃於擴建建築垃圾的堆填區,導致現時新界東南堆填 區及 137 填料庫處理全港近 70%的建築廢料。運載廢料的重型車對區內交通幹道的 衛生和安全構成沉重壓力,路面不時出現凹陷情況,釘板泥頭周街跌。將軍澳隧道 每日車流量已達 9 萬架次,設計上限為 7.8 萬架次,遠超負荷。

建築廢物處置收費已多年(自 2006 年)沒有調整,加上本港的收費水平比其他國家訂立爲低,因此調高收費、加強監管是必須的。**我們要求環境局完善建築物廢料收費**政策,減少堆填區的沉重壓力。

9. 防止循環再造物料運送往堆塡區

政府的減廢回收工作相當被動,在各方經年累月爭取下,當局方於今年 1 月擴大玻璃樽回收試行範圍,但未見推廣至全港的決心,還有大量玻璃樽需堆填處理。另外,建築廢料早應實行回收,木材、金屬製品、玻璃窗均可回收再造。現時可循環再造的物料以堆填處理,不單佔用了大量堆填空間、且浪費珍貴資源。

10. 政府部門帶頭採用循環再造物料

要確保本地環保及循環再造業可持續發展,政府應帶動整個社會使用循環再造物料的風氣,所有政府部門牽頭採用更多環保及循環再造產品,從而推動其市場發展,令再造產品有價。在所有新的公共工程、政府建築物及公共屋邨,我們要求政府普及使用循環再造物料,起示範作用。

總結

全港三個策略性堆填區之中,新界東南堆填區最接近民居,距將軍澳工業邨(TVB電視城、壹傳媒、香港電視等)更只有一街之隔,嚴重影居民健康,更爲醫療系統帶來沉重負擔。將軍澳居民爲香港整體利益,已肩起處理全港垃圾三十多年的責任。即使政府推出擴建計劃,我們也並不是盲目反對,而是「舊債未清,新債免問」。我們要求在商討擴建之前,政府必先妥善處理堆填區引伸出來的一連串問題。

在此促請全體立法會議員,請監督政府在民生議題上行駛「應有之義」,促使環境局 先做好以上 10 件事,展示政府解決問題的決心後,才商討擴建新界東南堆填區的申 請。

I write to ask for your consideration of the concerns I have regarding the proposal by the EPD to construct a giant incinerator on reclaimed land off Shek Kwu Chau.

The cost of the EPD proposal is excessive and wasteful – HK\$18 billion for a single incinerator, including huge land reclamation work and the destruction of natural habitats in an area of outstanding natural beauty. Of course, the money is not a problem for Hong Kong with its huge surplus, but should the Environment Bureau be allowed to be so wasteful of tax-payers money if it is not necessary?

Surely Government can tackle the problem of waste management in ways that are less wasteful of tax-payers money?

The EPD have consistently lied about the total tonnage of waste being recycled in Hong Kong, and they have totally misled us with the cost of building the Organic Waste Treatment plant in North Lantau. The current forecasts of the costs of this Project have risen far out of line with construction inflation. The information in the EPD Blueprint for Waste Management therefore lacks all credibility and should not be believed. The costs will simply escalate out of control and the incinerator operation may never achieve the tonnages forecast by the EPD.

My opinion is that tax-payers money will be better spent and will realise greater value for tax-payers by addressing the waste problems at source. Smaller-scale, fully integrated waste management facilities will provide solutions on a district by district basis, will be more effective and more manageable, and will encourage personal responsibility for the amounts of waste that we all produce.

I hope that you reject the EPD proposals and make the right decision for the future of Hong Kong – Asia's World City.

I write to express my concern for Hong Kong regarding the lack of effective strategies for managing waste in the SAR. It is indeed sad and disappointing that the Environment Bureau has not come up with a holistic approach to the SAR's waste problems, preferring instead the easy option of "just burn it all – problem solved!"

The Environment Bureau proposal for dealing with Hong Kong's waste problem does **not** represent an integrated process for our waste – despite the IWMF name they have given it. They are taking the easy and most expensive option which will involve minimal waste sorting and mass incineration of unsorted waste. There will be no incentive to reduce waste or sort waste if it is all going to be dumped in the furnace for disposal, regardless of the damage this does to the environment, air quality and human health.

Other countries, notably Taiwan, Japan and South Korea, have implemented effective processes for waste reduction at source, have applied waste charging where appropriate, encouraged practices for sorting of recyclables, are dealing effectively with recovered recyclables, and only as a last resort do they finally dispose of residual waste by landfill or thermal treatment? Hong Kong is lagging way behind these and other Asian countries in effectively dealing with its recyclable waste – and it appears that years of inactivity by the Environment Bureau are to blame. We are in the situation we are in because of a failure to act responsibly to manage waste. Why is it so difficult for the EPD? Building a huge incinerator will only benefit the construction industry and the operator of the plant. The people of Hong Kong will not benefit from this.

Why is it so difficult to implement effective waste sorting at high-rise housing estates? Are certain departments obstructing waste management solutions because it is "too hard" for them to do anything about it? Waste can be smelly and unpleasant, but dealing with waste at source and applying effective sorting and recovery of recyclables is the right thing to do, and it can be done.

I urge you to reject the EPD proposals for Incineration. Hong Kong deserves better than this.

EPD Proposed Integrated Waste Management Facility

I am writing to you to express my deep concern regarding the proposed Incinerator for which the Environmental Protection Department needs your approval before proceeding.

My main concerns are on the impacts on Climate Change and Human Health.

There are two levels of concern. Firstly, it is estimated that for every one tonne of waste that is incinerated, one tonne of carbon dioxide is released into the atmosphere. This means three thousand tonnes of CO2 will be released every day from the giant incinerator, according to EPD estimates of waste to be incinerated. Whilst not immediately threatening to human health, there is no doubt that this will have a negative effect on climate change. Should Hong Kong be endorsing this kind of approach when there are other less damaging options available?

My second concern is that the EPD proposal takes insufficient account of the Hong Kong AQO. Are there any statistics to prove scientifically exactly what toxins will be emitted from the Incinerator? Have the EPD compared the forecast emissions with the 2012 AQO's? If so, will they be kind enough to share the figures with us all? It is a fact that moving grate incinerators do emit toxic elements into the atmosphere. It is interesting that the Government Medical Department have not so far expressed any opinion on this matter regarding the impacts of the Incinerator releasing dioxins and particulates into the atmosphere. One wonders how many premature deaths are "acceptable" to Hong Kong as a consequence of large scale moving-grate incineration.

On 16th April 2012, the EPD produced a Discussion Paper for the Panel on Environment Affairs Sub Committee on Improving Air Quality. The purpose of the Paper was to seek "the views of Members on the proposed new Air Quality Objectives (AQOs) and air quality improvement measures for achieving these new Objectives". The Paper did not mention Incineration as a contributory cause of deteriorating air quality, but under the heading of Economic Implications, sections 11 and 12 discuss;

"The delivery of the proposed new AQOs and the air quality improvement measures would help combat air pollution, thereby improving quality of life, reducing medical cost and indirectly raising labour productivity. The consultant estimates that about 4,200 unnecessary hospital admissions and 7,400 statistical life years would be saved each year (or an improved average life expectancy of around one month for the entire population) upon attainment of the proposed new AQOs[2]. Other health benefits, such as less people contracting asthma or other respiratory diseases, would also be expected. In addition, better air quality and visibility would help attract more tourists and foreign investments, and are conducive to attracting talents to stay and work in Hong Kong. All these would contribute to reinforcing our position as a world city and leading international business hub. The proposal would also facilitate further collaborative efforts with Guangdong in improving regional air quality and the development of environmental industry in the region.

The impacts of individual proposed air quality improvement measures, which have to be assessed on a case-by-case basis, would be felt differently by different sectors of the economy. In particular, the more stringent standards and requirements to comply with the proposed AQOs would incur implementation costs for various businesses and raise their operating costs. Moreover, the proposed AQOs would raise the standards required for obtaining the EIA approval for infrastructural projects, which may lead to higher mitigation costs in order to comply with the standards. The consultant nevertheless advises that, for indicative purpose, the annualized cost incurred by the public for

implementing the proposed Phase I air quality improvement measures would be about HK\$ 596 million. This is, however, significantly lower than the anticipated benefit of HK\$ 1,228 million per year due to the improvement of public health."

The EIA Report for Incineration was carried out before the AQO's were revised. Does this mean that emissions from the Incinerator will not have to comply with the revised AQO's?

With the greatest of respect, I would ask that you reject the EPD proposal for incineration and insist that they carry-out proper evaluation of the waste issues and come up with a strategy that does not cause more damage to Hong Kong and her residents.

I appeal to the Legislators to investigate the impact that the reclamation works and the long term effects of the Integrated waste management facility (IWMF) will have on the Finless porpoise population whose habitat lies off Shek Kwu Chau and South Lantau.

Only two weeks ago I went on a research boat trip to south Lantau and Shek Kwu Chau and we saw an estimated 40 Finless porpoises in the waters around the Soko Islands and in the waters off Shek Kwu Chau which is the exact same location designated for the reclamation for the IWMF(otherwise known as the incinerator).

It was wonderful to see these mammals who are very important as top predators to help maintain a healthy marine habitat.

Finless porpoises are designated as a rare species with a status as vulnerable on IUCN red list and in Hong Kong an important part of their habitat is recognised and known as that being in same location as the proposed reclamation for the IWMF next to Shek Kwu Chau.

It appears the relevant Government Departments of the Agricultural, Fisheries and Conservation Department (AFCD) and the Environmental Protection Department (EPD) have conveniently and adequately failed to notify the legislators that if the reclamation along with the IWMF (incinerator) goes ahead then this will bring about catastrophic consequences for these mammals and could lead to their local extinction. We have already seen the consequences of what has happened to the Pink Dolphin population and it is already evident that there is a rapid decline in their reported sightings due to the construction of the Hong Kong –Zhuhai- Macau Bridge.

I appeal to the Legislators to investigate the impact that the reclamation works along with the long term effects of the incinerator will have on the Finless porpoise population whose habitat lies off South Lantau particularly off Shek Kwu Chau.

For information on the Hong Kong **Finless Porpoise** please refer to the booklet on the **Finless Porpoise** that were distributed during the Public presentation meeting.

Why should such a wonderful animal like this that has been here for millions of years which lives in the pristine quiet waters off Shek Kwu Chau be put a at such risk of extinction in just a few years due to Government incompetence and laziness.

Thank you in advance for your kind attention to our submission. Please see especially the attached recent Speech by the Nobel Prize winner Professor Joseph Stiglitz at the Macau MIECF the end of this e-mail. These videos require attention but will hopefully

give you a view that is position and life changing. This is not just a matter of the government and petty party politics.

Please also find below our submission for the Meeting of the Public Works Sub-Committee on Wednesday 7 May 2014. This is against the proposals for a Mega Incinerator and the landfill Extensions to the WENT and SENT Landfills. The objections are: No Proper Comprehensive Recycling; Global Warming Gases and Pollutant Emissions, replacing the Waste Problem with a Global Warming Climate Change and Health Threat Problems; Unnecessary, Inefficient and Costly Proposals that Mislead and Misrepresent, instead of Creating a Zero Waste Zero Pollution Society.

Re: Comprehensive 'Carbon to Ground' Recycling Education and Action can and should replace both the Mega Incinerator and Landfill Extensions, in a Shorter Time-scale, at Lower Cost, for 90% of the Waste currently sent to Landfills, in a Sustainable Manner.

We wish to make the strongest representations against both the proposals for funding of the Mega Incinerator and the remaining Two Landfill Extensions at the WENT and SENT Landfills.

We consider that both these proposals are completely unnecessary, irrational, unreasonable, irresponsible and unconscionable. The proposals are perverse and against all the evidence of the trend to official recycling as the most efficient and effective way of dealing with waste in most developed countries. The effective official recycling rate in Hong Kong is estimated to be effectively zero. This has been highlighted by the Green Wall erected around 'Dirty Hong Kong' by Shenzhen to stop 'fake recycling' of dirty plastics waste smuggled to China through and from Hong Kong.

It is brought to members attention that in Europe 510 million people will no longer send food or green waste and recyclables to either incineration or landfills by the mandatory deadline date of 2020. By the same date 2020 San Francisco and Taiwan will hit zero waste targets with 100% recycling of all waste. California will hitan 80% recycling rate and create 30,000 new jobs in the recycling and related bio-economy sectors.

Yet Hong Kong is proposing to build a Mega Carbon to Air Incinerator

and operate Landfill Extensions long after the same date at stupendous cost. **Separation at Source** methods with simple digital bar-coded biodegradable bags and affirmative waste charging. i.e. no charge for waste properly separated and only for that not properly separated, is widely proven with over 60 million people in Italy and Spain now using this 'mature' system for up to 85 % recycling rates in 3 years of operation.

Recent visits to Hong Kong and articles by a Dutch delegation and the Dutch Chamber of Commerce have highlighted this position. Figures for recycling in Holland are between 68% and 80%. Figures for waste sent to landfills is between 2% and 4%. Waste to incineration 16%. These figures show the direction correlation between recycling and waste sent to landfills. By 2020 Holland, with the implementation of the new EC standards of no recyclables and food and green waste being sent to either landfills and incineration, will close its remaining landfills and the reduced feedstock will most likely close its remaining dated incinerators due to the lack of any legal feedstock. This is a similar experience to Japan, where incinerator feedstock has directly declined with the increase in rigorous recycling rates. Combustion replaces a waste problem with a global warming gases and health threatening pollution problem.

We already have disastrous and dangerous air pollution affecting the health of all the people, and especially long term, the children, of Hong Kong. These 'carbon to air' proposals will put further massive amounts of global warming gases, heat and health damaging pollutants to air.

We now wish to bring to your attention the complete lack of comprehensive recycling education and action in our society and community.

It is our proposition that comprehensive recycling education and action using proven 'carbon to ground' techniques would be a major component of the solution to Hong Kong's waste. Our waste should be viewed as a valuable community resource opportunity not as a waste problem.

Our plea submission is therefore summarised below:

Pandora Hong Kong - A Plea for Comprehensive Recycling Education and Action to the Members of Legco Public Works Sub-Committee and the Chief Executive

For time almost beyond memory our waste has been black bagged and taken to landfills. A total official silence has existed on the different methods available to stop, separate and recycle waste. In effect a policy of 'no recycling.' Waste charging tests continue this silence with no mention of the crucial recycling requirement 'separation at source'. This omission can only be intentional and raises basic questions. Why has our society been kept so uninformed for so long on waste separation and recycling? Why has there been no rigorous education and training to transform public perception to waste as a valuable community resource? Who benefits from this inaction? Would intensive separation and recycling schemes make the proposed incinerator and landfill extensions unnecessary?

Anesidora (From the Earth - The alternative name for Pandora) Nature and Eco Education Association Ltd. has been set up to promote recycling education and training, the 'missing' soft infrastructure to support a 'Think Green, Go Clean and Live Cool' Hong Kong. This recycling education would be directly integrated with 18 district recycling schemes for the main waste categories: food and green organic, recyclables and construction, 90% of our waste. Recycling economies create good jobs, result in no waste being sent to landfills or for incineration, and stop harmful global warming gas and pollution emissions.

Our hidden resources:

Students: 830,000 full-time primary, secondary and tertiary students. Most never visit the country side, experience nature or even see the stars. They need at least a week each year ONE WORLD (Outdoor, Nature and Eco) education in our

remaining country side. These students would be a powerful resource to protect and transform Hong Kong's future, with practical experience to nurture social caring, vision, innovation and creativity.

People: 2.2 million households and 3.85 million workers in 18 Districts. Everyone should receive 8 or 9 R's education for participation and commitment. Rethink, Redesign, Relearn, Retrain, Remove, Reduce, Reuse and Recycle; Be Responsible. People are our greatest resource for the future 'Get all their brains in the game'.

Mr and Mrs Leung, during the Chief Executive Election you told us of your green interests. If you really 'Love Nature, the Country-Side and Hong Kong', please immediately rethink and change direction. We urgently need comprehensive recycling education and action. Stop the unsustainable, unnecessary, expensive, irresponsible and unconscionable incinerator and landfill extensions. Please be responsible. Separate at source and recycle.

Dear Members, your decision will effect the longterm future of Hong Kong for at least 30 years.

本人之前透過不同渠道向環境局表達對上述議題強烈反對的意向和提出很多實質和具體 的意見,只可惜他們仍然貫徹「意見接受,做事照舊」的官僚作風,還一一以「人肉錄音機」的 答案,將本人有建設性的建議拒諸門外.他們那種「固步自封」的心態和「庸碌無能」的表現,完全 不符合瞬息萬變的社會環境轉變和市民的期望.

本人的反對的理由和建議如下:-

- 1. 建築廢料含有很多重金屬和其他有害物質,兼且不能藏於垃圾袋內,加上體積龐大和當中有很 多廢料都有銳利的角位,因此很容易令堆填區內的防滲保護膜因受到破壞而造成滲漏,從而影響附 近居民的健康,尤其是最近將軍澳堆填區的將軍澳居民的健康更加是危在旦夕,因此建築廢料是應 該放置在一個遠離民居的荒島以作堆填,從而保障市民的健康;
 - 2. 環境局應該立即立法增加建築廢料處理費用和人閘費用,以祈改變市民浪費的習慣;
- 3. 環境局應該立即立法要求有提供外賣的飲食店舖徵收外賣飲食盒稅(可參考膠袋稅和澳門的 做法),從而大大減低堆填區的壓力;
 - 4. 環境局應該立即立法要求停止人口洋垃圾;
- 5. 環境局應該立即進行公眾諮詢研究在全港十八區安裝小型焚化爐的可行性(只會釋出無害的 蒸氣),從而大大減低堆填區的壓力. 每個小型焚化爐的成 本只需要港幣三十多萬元,兼且 能夠短時間內完成安裝,相比起環境局建議興建的超級焚化爐所涉及的公帑超過一百八十億元和需 要長時間才能完成興建,簡直是天壤之別(可參考日本的做法). 因此這個超級焚化爐絕對是勞民傷 財和浪費公帑的建議(附註:內地興建焚化爐的費用都只需要十四億至四十億人民幣不等).
- 一個負責任和重視市民健康的政府是應該先盡力推行所有可行的源頭減費措施以評估成效,假 若成效不彰,最後才考慮擴大末端處理的措施以免恨錯難返. 就以台灣和南韓為例, 他們實施了有 效的源頭減廢措施之後,根本就不需要擴大任何末端處理的措施,反而之前興建的大型焚化爐因不 是經常用得著,以致浪費資源和完全不符合成本效益.

環境局本末倒置,為擴堆填殺樹萬棵

將軍澳堆填區「環評報告」(EIA)嚴重過時及失誤,要求重做 環團同意將軍澳規劃出錯,要求環境局局長黃錦星立即向公眾解釋

A. 為擴堆填,環境局竟砍伐 10380 棵樹

據過往環境局為將軍澳堆填區所擬訂的環評報告(合約編號 CE 10/2005 及 CE45/99),並無提及擴建將軍澳堆填區需要砍伐 10380 棵樹。即使在 2011 年西貢區議會及城市規劃委員會審議堆填區擴建及過往幾年的區議會紀錄,環境局亦無提及殺樹的情況,令人懷疑環境局存心隱瞞。

事實上,堆填區附近的居民已慘遭環境及空氣污染的問題影響,但環境局不單沒有製造樹肺補償居民,反而進行大規模砍伐樹木,將嚴重導致水土流失、空氣及環境進一步惡化。

環境局表示需砍伐的均為非珍貴樹種,但事實上樹木並沒有貴賤之分。「十年樹木,百年樹人」,環境局為擴堆填區所砍伐樹木正值壯健之年,加上所砍伐的數量是10380棵,完全地違反了環保原則。過往,曾有私人發展商砍伐樹木 250 棵被政府罰款數千萬元。然而,那私人發展商砍伐量與是次環境局相比實在是「小巫見大巫」,政府難辭其咎。

B. 兩份環評報告(EIA)指標過時及無反映可致癌數據(PM2.5),理據不足

兩份將軍澳堆填區的環評報告分別為 2003 年及 2005 年制訂的。無論在人口、交通、民居距離等各方面,當年的情況與現時截然不同。今天,將軍澳堆填區距民居只有 800 米,距將軍澳工業邨(TVB 電視城、壹傳媒、香港電視等)更只有一街之隔,嚴重影響市民健康。

2005 年環評報告指出擴建堆填區時產生的塵埃對鄰近居民及「易受空氣污染影響的地方」(Air Sensitive Receivers, ASRs)並無大影響。環評報告指出: "there will be no adverse dust impacts to the identified ASRs" 事實上,環境保護署於 2003 及 2005 年進行的環境影響評估報告中,沒有就 PM2.5 所帶來的影響作出詳細評估。2013 年世界

衛生組織指出空氣中的懸浮粒子(Particulate Matters)屬致癌物,如肺癌。研究指出, 當空氣中 PM2.5 的濃度長期高於 10us/m³,就會帶來死亡風險的上升,濃度每增加 10us/m³,總死亡風險上升 4%,心肺疾病帶來的死亡風險上升 6%,肺癌帶來的死亡 風險上升 8%。PM2.5 對人體健康的影響不容忽視,由於環評過時及未有反映可致癌 物,為保障居民健康,環保署有必要重新評估堆填區對將軍澳居民所帶來的影響及 重做合符世界標準的環評。

環保署當年 2003-2005 批准的環評(EIA)所根據的空氣質素指標落後,政府於 2013 已修定空氣質素指標,故此環評所依據的指標不切合現時環境,更嚴重落後於其他 先進國家及地區。(見下表)

環保組織 WGO 余遠騁也承認,將軍澳堆填區是規劃出錯。由於兩份環評報告嚴重過時、與事實脫節,更隱瞞了擴建需要殺樹逾萬棵的情況,**將軍澳居民及地區人士一直要求環境局重新制訂新的環境評估。**

C. <u>嘈音超標,環評失誤</u>

環評報告表示堆填區運作時的日間嘈音介乎於 41dB(A)至 53dB(A), 夜間嘈音則介乎 33dB(A)至 47dB(A), 但主要嘈音來至重型車輛出入環保大道時產生。報告指出車輛行經環保大道時所產生的嘈音則較現時高不多於 1 分貝,並不符合事實。而根據實際量度,環保大道的噪音聲級曾分別錄得高達 65.7dB(A)及 67.7dB(A)。

D. 環境局在堆填區飽和年期亂篤數

根據環境局去年及今年向立法會提供的文件所示(文件 CB(1)1079/12-13(01)及(CB(1)931/13-14(01))(見下圖),2011年至2012年期間將軍澳堆填區耗用了100萬立方米容量,截至2012年年底還有剩餘700萬立方米的容量,加上環境局指未來數年的回收量將會增加,如此推算,將軍澳堆填區不可能在短期內飽和,環境局很大程度

在將軍澳堆填區的飽和年期上有亂篤數的情況。

在堆填區飽和年期上,環境局已多次欺騙了香港市民,更多次誇大擴建堆填區的迫切性,以「垃圾圍城」的虛言恫嚇環保團體、議員及市民,製造恐慌式的心理而迫使市民就範。事實上,全城推動減廢回收、做好配套及措施,比急於通過擴建 堆填區更為迫切及重要。



E. 總結

- 1. 我們堅決反對環境局為擴堆填區竟濫殺樹木過萬棵。
- 2. 兩份環評報告(EIA)指標過時及並無反映可致癌數據(PM2.5)
- 3. 嘈音超標,環評失誤
- 4. 環境局在堆填區飽和年期亂篤數,盲推「三堆一爐」

根據以上有力的分析,政府為擴將軍澳堆填區,已多番隱瞞實際情況及數據,完全與事實不符。任何政團或環團,不應胡亂支持政府擴建將軍澳堆填區的不合理方案。若日後司法覆核推翻政府的錯誤缺失,閣下今天的投票,將承擔問責及蒙受千古罪人的惡名。
