In addition to managing and monitoring the Equal Opportunities (Sexual Orientation) Funding Scheme (Funding Scheme), and handling enquiries and complaints on issues relating to gender identity and sexual orientation, the GISOU also organises publicity and education activities, including promotion of the Code of Practice

against Discrimination in Employment on the Ground of Sexual Orientation. Under Programme (4), the revised estimate for promotion of equal opportunities for people of different sexual orientations and transgenders in 2013-14 is \$2.98 million, of which \$0.93 million is the staff cost of the GISOU. In 2014-15, the corresponding estimate is \$3.5 million, of which the staff cost of the GISOU remains unchanged.

(2) In 2013-14, over \$830,000 has been granted to eligible organisations under the Funding Scheme to organise community projects to promote equal opportunities for people of different sexual orientations and transgenders, or provide support services for sexual minorities. In 2014-15, the estimate for the Funding Scheme will be increased by 51% to \$1.25 million. The sponsorship may be used to meet the cost of additional manpower recruited directly for the project on the condition that such cost incurred shall not exceed a specified limit.

(3) The GISOU has received a total of 49 enquiries and 5 complaints in 2013, the handling of which has been completed. Enquiries and complaints received are mainly handled by the GISOU; other senior officers will offer assistance when needed.

Upon receipt of an enquiry/a complaint, the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data (PCPD) will clearly inform the enquirer/complainant its functions and powers as necessary.

2. PCPD has earlier conducted a comprehensive review of the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance (the Ordinance) and put forward proposals for legislative amendments to the Government. After public consultations and detailed scrutiny by the Legislative Council, the Ordinance was amended in 2012. PCPD has no plan to conduct a further comprehensive review of the Ordinance for the time being.

Where possible, when handling complaints related to discrimination, the EOC will encourage conciliation between parties in dispute. In respect of sex discrimination and pregnancy discrimination, the EOC investigates complaints lodged under the Sex Discrimination Ordinance (SDO) and encourages conciliation between the parties in dispute. Where conciliation fails, a complainant may apply to the EOC for other forms of assistance including legal assistance. Reply:

As a general rule, all politically appointed officials and civil servants should observe the same principles in the provision of official meals. They are required to exercise prudent judgement and economy in order to avoid any public perception of extravagance and act in accordance with the relevant regulations and administrative guidelines. According to the existing guidelines, the expenditure limits on entertainment in the form of official meals should not exceed \$450 per person for lunch or \$600 per person for dinner, inclusive of all expenses incurred on food and beverages consumed on the occasion, service charges and tips. Official entertainment provided by the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) and the Registration and Electoral Office (REO), which is under the purview of CMAB, is also subject to the same principles and guidelines. In 2011-12, 2012-13 and 2013-14 (as at 28 February 2014), the actual expenses under the Departmental Entertainment Vote for local entertainment incurred by CMAB are \$168,000, \$139,000 and \$116,000 respectively. The estimated expenditure for 2014-15 is \$130,000. As for REO, the actual expenses on official entertainment incurred in 2011-12 and 2012-13 are \$3,450 and \$1,130 respectively. No expenses on official entertainment have been incurred by REO in 2013-14 and the Office has not earmarked any provision for such purpose in 2014-15.

2. In line with the Government's green policy, public officers should as far as possible refrain from bestowing gifts/souvenirs to others during the conduct of official activities. According to the existing guidelines, where bestowal of gifts/souvenirs is necessary or unavoidable due to operational, protocol or other reasons, the gift/souvenir items should not be

lavish or extravagant and the number should be kept to a minimum. Also, the exchange of gifts/souvenirs should only be made from organisation to organisation. As CMAB and REO do not specifically maintain separate accounts for the expenses on the procurement of gifts and souvenirs, relevant statistics are not available.

Reply:

In both 2012-13 and 2013-14, the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) has set aside about \$16 million each year respectively for organising various promotional activities to enhance public awareness and understanding of the Basic Law, including the importance of the Basic Law to Hong Kong's implementation of the principles of "One Country, Two Systems", "Hong Kong people administering Hong Kong" and high degree of autonomy. We have been adopting the following three promotional strategies:

- (a) using electronic media targeted at the general public, such as Announcement in the Public Interest on television and radio, radio quiz programmes, Internet and smart-phone applications;
- (b) enhancing public awareness and understanding of the Basic Law through promotional activities at the district level, such as roving exhibitions; and
- (c) strengthening co-operation with community organisations in staging promotional activities, such as seminars and debate competitions, in order to reach a wider audience through their extensive community networks.

The above work is undertaken by a team responsible for the promotion of the Basic Law headed by a Principal Assistant Secretary and supported by 4 officers.

2. In 2014-15, CMAB will continue to set aside about \$16 million for the promotion of the Basic Law. The focus of our promotional efforts will include constitutional development on the basis of the Basic Law.

3. Besides, the Government has been promoting the Basic Law through civic education, school education and training for civil servants. The Government has also set up the Basic Law Promotion Steering Committee (BLPSC) to provide necessary steer on the overall programme and strategy for promoting the Basic Law. Based on the steer of the BLPSC and its working groups (namely Local Community; Teachers and Students; Civil Servants; Industrial, Commercial and Professional Sectors; and Overseas Community Working Groups), relevant bureaux/departments, including the Home Affairs Bureau, Education Bureau, Civil Service Bureau, Trade and Industry Department and Information Services Department, assist in organising related Basic Law promotional activities in their respective sectors. Regarding non-government organisations, CMAB accepts applications from non-profit-making organisations for funding support under the Basic Law Promotion Sponsorship Scheme to organise various Basic Law promotional activities.

In 2014-15, we have set aside \$7.18 million under Programme (3) "Constitutional and Mainland Affairs" to take forward the work of setting up a liaison unit in the Northern Region of the Mainland this year, to be followed by another one in the Eastern Region next year. The setting up of these 2 liaison units involve creation of 4 posts, namely 2 Senior Administrative Officer and 2 Trade Officer posts.

2. The liaison units in the Northern Region and Eastern Region are set up to strengthen the work of the Beijing Office (BJO) and the Hong Kong Economic and Trade Office (ETO) in Shanghai (Shanghai ETO) of the HKSAR Government in their service area. In particular, these two liaison units will assist BJO and Shanghai ETO in liaising with a province under the coverage of the respective office, and their main functions include strengthening liaison and communication with the relevant local government authorities, enhancing economic and trade relations, fostering co-operation between Hong Kong and the relevant provinces/municipalities, promoting Hong Kong, supporting Hong Kong residents and enterprises in the service area, etc.

- (b) enhancing public awareness and understanding of the Basic Law through promotional activities at the district level, such as roving exhibitions; and
- (c) strengthening co-operation with community organisations in staging promotional activities, such as seminars and debate competitions, in order to reach a wider

audience through their extensive community networks.

The above work is undertaken by a team responsible for the promotion of the Basic Law headed by a Principal Assistant Secretary and supported by 4 officers.

2. CMAB evaluates the effectiveness of the promotional activities through different means, such as listenership of radio programmes; number of downloads of the smart-phone applications and Internet games; participation rates at events and public feedback, etc.

3. In 2014-15, CMAB will continue to set aside about \$16 million for the promotion of the Basic Law. The focus of our promotional efforts will include constitutional development on the basis of the Basic Law.

Reply:

The Government's work on promoting human rights spans across a number of policy bureaux, notably the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB), the Education Bureau (EDB), the Home Affairs Bureau (HAB) and the Labour and Welfare Bureau (LWB).

2. The CMAB has been promoting the community's awareness of, respect for and protection of human rights through the allocations to the Programmes "Rights of the Individual" and "Subvention: Equal Opportunities Commission and Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data". Under these 2 Programmes, the revised estimates of expenditure for 2013-14, and the estimated expenditure for 2014-15 are \$178.8 million and \$193 million respectively.

3. The CMAB launched a series of activities for promoting human rights in 2013-14, as set out at the Annex.

4. In 2014-15, the CMAB will continue its work on promoting the rights of the individual in respect of protection for personal data privacy and human rights, promotion of equal opportunities irrespective of gender, family status, race and sexual orientation, and promotion of children's rights. The Equal Opportunities Commission and the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data will continue to carry out their publicity, promotion and education programmes and enforcement work for areas within their statutory framework.

5. The CMAB works closely with other government bureaux and departments for the promotion of human rights. For example, the EDB has been facilitating the promotion of human rights education in schools through measures such as embedding related learning elements in the curriculum, organising teacher professional development programmes, and developing learning and teaching resources, while the HAB has been promoting civic education, (including human rights) outside schools, in collaboration with the Committee on the Promotion of Civic Education (CPCE), through means such as providing sponsorship to community organisations to organise civic education activities and producing publicity programmes and materials. In tandem, the LWB organises territory-wide public education activities and provides sponsorship to 18 District Councils and community organisations to organise publicity programmes in the community for promoting the spirit and core values enshrined in the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities as well as the message of building a barrier-free and inclusive society.

6. After consulting relevant bureaux, the information provided by them is summarised as follows. Regarding the expenditure incurred in 2013-14, expenditure related to human rights education constitutes an integral part of the EDB's expenditures, and a separate breakdown of the expenditures for human rights education is not available from the EDB. Similarly, the CPCE does not maintain a separate breakdown on the promotion of specific civic values. In 2013-14, LWB's expenditure on the aforementioned public education activities was about \$13 million.

Hard copies of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region's (HKSAR) reports as required under the seven United Nations (UN) human rights treaties are published in accordance with the reporting cycles of the respective treaties, and are distributed to the Executive Council, the Legislative Council, District Councils and stakeholders through various channels; they are

also available to members of the public upon request. Hard copies of the Concluding Observations made by UN treaty bodies on the reports of the HKSAR Government are attached to the papers for discussion at the relevant Legislative Council Panel meetings. To facilitate public access to the HKSAR Government's reports under these UN human rights treaties, the texts of these treaties, the HKSAR's respective reports, as well as the Concluding Observations by the relevant UN treaty bodies are available in bilingual versions on the websites of the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau and (as necessary) the Labour and Welfare Bureau. The General Comments made by the UN treaty bodies are available in different official languages of the UN at those bodies' websites.

2. The expenditure on publishing promotional materials on the human rights treaties concerned in hard copy (including texts of the treaties, the HKSAR's reports and other promotional materials) was \$111,000, \$70,000 and \$44,000 in 2011-12, 2012-13 and 2013-14 respectively. In 2014-15, the Administration has earmarked about \$65,000 for publishing such materials. (The relevant expenditures are incurred having regard to whether the HKSAR's reports have to be published in the concerned years and the length of the reports. Also, on the basis of environmental consideration, in addition to disseminating HKSAR's human rights reports through the Government's website, after consulting relevant parties, hard copies are distributed upon request.)

The Mainland and Taiwan Offices (namely the Beijing Office, the Hong Kong Economic and Trade Offices in Guangdong, Shanghai and Chengdu, as well as the Hong Kong Economic, Trade and Cultural Office in Taiwan) serve as important bridges between Hong Kong and the Mainland/Taiwan. Their major responsibilities include enhancing liaison and communication with the counterparts in the areas under their coverage; representing and promoting Hong Kong's trade and commercial interests; encouraging and attracting investments to Hong Kong, promoting Hong Kong's many advantages as an investment and business hub in Asia; promoting the strengths of Hong Kong through appropriate channels; providing information and other

appropriate support to Hong Kong residents in the Mainland/Taiwan; and providing assistance to Hong Kong residents in distress. To perform its roles and functions, the Beijing Office maintains necessary working relationships with the ministries of the State Council (such as the Hong Kong and Macao Affairs Office and the Ministry of Commerce). The Mainland and Taiwan Offices also maintain necessary working relationships with the provincial and municipal governments and other local authorities (such as the provincial Hong Kong and Macao Affairs Offices and Commerce Departments) in the Mainland, and relevant authorities and organisations in Taiwan under their coverage as appropriate.

2. A number of regional co-operation platforms with the Mainland provinces and municipalities have been established to promote closer exchanges and co-operation in various aspects between the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region and the Mainland. In the past three calendar years from 2011 to 2013, 16 meetings on regional co-operation with the Mainland under these platforms were convened.

3. Discussions on co-operation in various policy areas between Hong Kong and Taiwan are conducted through the Hong Kong-Taiwan Economic and Cultural Co-operation and Promotion Council (ECCPC) and the Taiwan-Hong Kong Economic and Cultural Co-operation Council (THEC) platform. The ECCPC and the THEC hold a joint meeting every year. From 2011-12 to 2013-14, the Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC) has been promoting equal opportunities in education and employment for ethnic minorities through initiatives in different aspects, including handling complaints and conducting public education programmes, as well as setting up an internal working group to conduct a study on education for ethnic minorities. These efforts are an integral part of the EOC's work, and hence no separate breakdown of resources and manpower is available.

2. The actual expenditure of the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data (PCPD) on promotion, publicity and education activities to enhance awareness and understanding of, and compliance with the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance in 2011-12 and 2012-13 is \$1.36 million and \$5.18 million respectively (the latter includes the expenditure for a 6-episode television docudrama on protection of personal data "Privacy Beyond Price" and expenditure for promoting and publicising the provisions of the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance as amended in 2012). The revised estimated expenditure for such activities in 2013-14 is \$2.38 million.

2. The PCPD has set aside \$2.13 million for promotion, publicity and education activities in 2014-15. Major activities include:

- (a) professional workshops on personal data protection – a series of professional workshops tailored for the needs of professionals in different fields dealing with personal data;
- (b) free seminars introducing the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance and seminars on



privacy concerns arising from the use of information technology for members of the public;

- (c) with respect to privacy issues associated with the increased use of mobile applications, partnering with relevant professional bodies to provide training courses and simple guides to mobile applications developers;
- (d) Privacy Awareness Week 2014 – an annual regional promotional event;
- (e) Student Ambassador Programme – a learning opportunity provided for secondary school students to foster a culture of respect for personal data privacy;
- (f) University Privacy Days – on-campus promotion of privacy protection to staff and students of the universities in Hong Kong;
- (g) activities for Data Protection Officers’ Club members, including regular meetings, introductory talks and seminars;
- (h) revamping the landing page and content of PCPD’s website, strengthening the content of the thematic websites “Think Privacy! Be Smart Online” and the “Youth Privacy Portal” launched last year; and
- (i) disseminating the messages of online privacy protection and smart use of smartphones through various channels, including exhibition roadshow, the mass media , Youtube channel and Facebook page.

- (b) The additional provision is mainly for meeting the expenses on printing, publicity, etc.

Reply:

In 2014-15, we have set aside \$7.18 million to take forward the work of setting up a liaison unit in the Northern Region of the Mainland this year, to be followed by another one in the Eastern Region next year. These two liaison units will assist the Beijing Office (BJO) and the Hong Kong Economic and Trade Office in Shanghai (Shanghai ETO) in liaising with a province under the coverage of the respective office, and their main functions include

strengthening liaison and communication with the relevant local government authorities, enhancing economic and trade relations, fostering co-operation between Hong Kong and the relevant provinces/municipalities and promoting Hong Kong, and supporting Hong Kong residents and enterprises in the service area, etc. The setting up of these two liaison units will facilitate the work of BJO and Shanghai ETO in strengthening liaison with the relevant host province as well as promoting and supporting Hong Kong residents and enterprises, etc.

2. In 2014-15, the Mainland and Taiwan Offices will continue to adopt a multi-pronged approach in promoting Hong Kong and strengthening Hong Kong's economic and trade liaison with the Mainland and Taiwan through appropriate channels, including attending meetings and calling on the Mainland/Taiwan counterparts; organising/participating in seminars, exhibitions and workshops; organising/participating in public relations, cultural exchange functions and events; giving public speeches, media interviews and briefings; as well as gathering relevant information on new laws and regulations, policies and latest economic developments in the Mainland and disseminating such information to the Hong Kong business sector through circulars/newsletters/press releases etc.

3. For the coming year, the Mainland Offices will continue to promote the economic interest of Hong Kong, and enhance investment promotion in the Mainland through various channels. These include attending meetings and calling on the Mainland counterparts, as well as organising/participating in seminars, exhibitions and workshops.

4. The Mainland Offices also work closely with the Hong Kong Trade Development Council (TDC), which conducts thematic studies on investment environment in the Mainland. The related reports are available online at TDC's website, which is hyperlinked to the websites of Mainland Offices for easy access by the public. The Mainland Offices will also assist Hong Kong businessmen operating in the Mainland in liaising with the relevant local authorities if they wish to obtain more in-depth information about the investment potential of a particular city in the Mainland.

5. In promoting inward investment, the Investment Promotion Units of the Mainland Offices, working together with the Headquarters of Invest Hong Kong, will continue to identify potential Mainland companies in the areas that they cover; proactively approach and visit the companies identified; provide one-stop information and consultation services; and assist in organising incoming visits to facilitate the Mainland companies to set up or expand their business operations in Hong Kong.

Over the past year, the Beijing Office and the three Hong Kong Economic and Trade Offices respectively in Guangdong, Shanghai and Chengdu (Mainland Offices), as well as the Hong Kong Economic, Trade and Cultural Office (HKETCO) in Taiwan have taken continuous efforts to assist in enhancing cultural and arts exchanges between Hong Kong and the Mainland/Taiwan. The initiatives include organising, co-organising or supporting the launching of film festivals, dance performances, theatrical shows, concerts, arts exhibitions, photo exhibitions, comics exhibitions, book fairs, etc., to showcase Hong Kong's unique culture and arts.

2. Over the past year, a number of Hong Kong cultural and arts organisations such as the Hong Kong Philharmonic Orchestra, Hong Kong Repertory Theatre, City Contemporary Dance Company, Hong Kong Dance Company, Hong Kong Designers Association, Hong Kong Arts Centre, Asian Youth Orchestra, etc. approached the Mainland Offices and HKETCO, with a view to conducting cultural exchange activities in the areas under their coverage. Reply:

In 2013-14, the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) has set aside about \$16 million for organising various promotional activities to enhance public awareness and understanding of the Basic Law, including the importance of the Basic Law to Hong Kong's implementation of the principles of “One Country, Two Systems”, “Hong Kong people administering Hong Kong” and high degree of autonomy. We have been adopting the following 3 promotional strategies:

- (a) using electronic media targeted at the general public, such as Announcement in



the Public Interest on television and radio, radio quiz programmes, Internet and smart-phone applications. About \$4.3 million was provided for this purpose;

- (b) enhancing public awareness and understanding of the Basic Law through promotional activities at the district level, such as roving exhibitions. About \$10 million was provided for this purpose; and
- (c) strengthening co-operation with community organisations in staging promotional activities, such as seminars and debate competitions, in order to reach a wider audience through their extensive community networks. About \$0.9 million was provided for this purpose.

In addition, we have provided about \$1.1 million for necessary administrative support for the promotion of the Basic Law.

2. CMAB evaluates the effectiveness of the promotional activities through different means, such as listenership of radio programmes, number of downloads of the smart-phone applications and Internet games, participation rates at events and public feedback, etc. To promote the Basic Law message, CMAB has conducted 60 quiz shows (via radio programmes) which were broadcast from March to June 2013. The relevant radio programmes (part of which were the quiz shows) yielded an average listenership of some 25 000 audience per episode.

3. In 2014-15, CMAB will continue to set aside about \$16 million for the promotion of the Basic Law by adopting the above 3 promotional strategies. The focus of our promotional efforts will include constitutional development on the basis of the Basic Law.

Hong Kong is a multi-cultural city and a harmonious community with heterogeneous diversity. The Government attaches great importance to promoting social and racial harmony among different groups of people in the city, and is committed to promoting the core values such as mutual respect for people from different backgrounds in the community and equality for all, through its public education efforts.

2. Various policy bureaux and departments have been providing a range of services in line with their respective policies to meet the needs of new arrivals from the Mainland, such as education support, employment counselling, social welfare, housing etc., to help them adapt to life in Hong Kong and facilitate their early integration into the community.

3. With regard to receiving tourists, the Administration will strengthen promotion of attractions in different districts in Hong Kong so as to offer more choices to visitors and help alleviate congestion at traditionally popular areas. The Administration will also make greater efforts to enhance our capacity to receive tourists, and endeavour to balance the impact of the tourism sector on economic development and the livelihood of our community. In addition, the Hong Kong Tourism Board will continue to promote Hong Kong's hospitality culture and, through the Internet and publicity materials, etc., advise tourists on matters they should pay attention to when visiting Hong Kong so as to enhance their understanding of the Hong Kong society.

4. As for the existing 4 anti-discrimination ordinances, there are no specific provisions on new arrivals and Mainland tourists.

5. On part (c) of the question, the Administration will promote racial equality through enhanced publicity and public education in 2014-15. The Administration will co-operate with Radio Television Hong Kong to produce a TV series and conduct a school outreach programme to help the public understand the cultures and customs of ethnic minorities, overcome barriers and eliminate discrimination. The estimated provision for the above work is about \$3.35 million.

In 2013-14, a revised estimate of around \$7.2 million (excluding staff cost) was provided for the public consultation on the methods for selecting the Chief Executive in 2017 and for forming the Legislative Council in 2016. In 2014-15, we have set aside about \$12 million (excluding staff cost) for this item. The expenditures for the public consultation on the two electoral methods in 2013-14 and 2014-15, together with breakdowns, are tabulated as follows:

2. In 2013-14, an official delegation organised by the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) visited Beijing and Shenyang at the invitation of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The visit was conducted under the established arrangement for reciprocal visits between the HKSARG and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. In November 2013, the delegation called on various departments of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and was briefed on the current foreign policies of our nation as well as the Ministry's latest work. The delegation also called on the Hong Kong and Macao Affairs Office and the Taiwan Affairs Office of the State Council. In Shenyang, the delegation called on the provincial and municipal officials, and conducted site visits to learn about the latest developments in the region. The 11-member delegation was composed of officials from CMAB and other related policy bureaux. The total cost of the visit was about \$105,000. Such reciprocal visits help enhance communication and mutual understanding between the HKSARG and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. CMAB does not yet have any specific plan for exchange visit to the Mainland in 2014-15.

A total of 13 new posts will be created, to be partly offset by the deletion of one post in the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau in 2014-15. As a result, there will be a net increase of 12 posts. Details of the new posts are as follows -

- (a) two Senior Executive Officer posts for supporting work on promotion of the Basic Law and regional co-operation; the annual cost involved is \$1.69 million;
- (b) seven posts at the new Economic and Trade Office to be set up in Wuhan, namely one Administrative Officer Staff Grade C, one Senior Administrative Officer, three Trade Officer, one Senior Information Officer and one time-limited Executive Officer I; the annual cost involved is \$6.83 million; and
- (c) four posts at the liaison units to be set up in the Northern and Eastern Regions of the Mainland, namely two Senior Administrative Officer and two Trade Officer; the annual cost involved is \$4 million.

Of the public enquiries received by the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data (PCPD) in 2013, PCPD called back within 2 working days upon receipt of a telephone enquiry in 88% of the cases, which is lower than the target of 99%. This is mainly due to a surge in telephone enquiries in April and May 2013 after commencement of the provisions in the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance regulating the use of personal data in direct marketing on 1 April 2013, and as a result, in some cases, PCPD was unable to call back within 2 working days of receipt of the telephone enquiry. The number of telephone enquiries stabilised after June 2013 and PCPD resumed calling back within 2 working days upon receipt of an enquiry.

In 2014-15, the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) has set aside about \$16 million for organising various promotional activities to enhance public awareness and understanding of the Basic Law. We have been adopting the following three promotional strategies:

- (a) using electronic media targeted at the general public, such as Announcement in the Public Interest on television and radio, radio quiz show, Internet and smart-phone applications;
- (b) enhancing public awareness and understanding of the Basic Law through promotional activities at the district level, such as roving exhibitions; and
- (c) strengthening co-operation with community organisations in staging promotional

activities, such as seminars and debate competitions, in order to reach a wider audience through their extensive community networks.

The focus of our promotion efforts in 2014-15 will include constitutional development on the basis of the Basic Law.

2. Under the “One Country, Two Systems” principle, the HKSAR Government has commenced the groundwork to complement the drafting of the National 13<sup>th</sup> Five-Year Plan. At this stage, relevant bureaux and departments will consult the relevant sectors and advisory committees to solicit their views on the initially identified topics for study, with a view to formulating HKSAR’s formal proposal on the National 13<sup>th</sup> Five-Year Plan for possible submission. CMAB will assist in co-ordinating the efforts of relevant bureaux and departments, and the necessary administration expenses will be absorbed by existing resources.

3. In 2014-15, the CMAB will continue to strengthen our exchanges and co-operation with Taiwan by:

- (a) proactively liaising with the Taiwan side through the Hong Kong-Taiwan Economic and Cultural Co-operation and Promotion Council (ECCPC) and the Taiwan-Hong Kong Economic and Cultural Co-operation Council (THEC) platform, to take forward the priority co-operation areas between the two places concerning public policies on the economic, trade, cultural, social livelihood and other fronts;
- (b) supporting the ECCPC in organising, participating and sponsoring activities to further enhance exchanges with Taiwan, including a joint meeting with the THEC, and funding non-governmental bodies in organising activities which promote Hong Kong-Taiwan economic, trade and cultural exchanges;
- (c) facilitating Taiwan visitors from different sectors to understand the latest developments of Hong Kong and the implementation of “One Country, Two Systems”;
- (d) liaising with Taiwan organisations in Hong Kong; and
- (e) advising and assisting other bureaux and departments on economic, trade, cultural and other exchanges with Taiwan.

The CMAB has earmarked about \$12 million under this Programme in 2014-15 for supporting the activities of the ECCPC and exchanges with Taiwan.

In 2014-15, the respective provision set aside for the five Mainland Offices are: \$70.7 million for Beijing Office, \$54.9 million for Hong Kong Economic and Trade Office (ETO) in Guangdong, \$34.8 million for Shanghai ETO, \$36.9 million for Chengdu ETO and \$30.3 million for Wuhan ETO.

2. A major role of the Mainland Offices is to promote Hong Kong's many advantages as a trade, investment and business hub in the region, and to attract Mainland enterprises to invest in Hong Kong. For the coming year, the Mainland Offices will continue to promote the economic interest of Hong Kong, and enhance investment promotion in the Mainland through various channels. These include attending meetings and calling on the Mainland counterparts, as well as organising/participating in seminars, exhibitions and workshops.

3. The Mainland Offices also work closely with the Hong Kong Trade Development Council (TDC), which conducts thematic studies on investment environment in the Mainland. The related reports are available online at TDC's website, which is hyperlinked to the websites

of Mainland Offices for easy access by the public. The Mainland Offices will also assist Hong Kong businessmen operating in the Mainland in liaising with the relevant local authorities if they wish to obtain more in-depth information about the investment potential of a particular city in the Mainland.

4. In promoting inward investment, the Investment Promotion Units of the Mainland Offices, working together with the Headquarters of Invest Hong Kong, will continue to identify potential Mainland companies in the areas that they cover; proactively approach and visit the companies identified; provide one-stop information and consultation services; and assist in organising incoming visits to facilitate the Mainland companies to set up or expand their business operations in Hong Kong.

5. As commercial relations and investment promotion activities all aim to showcase and promote Hong Kong's strengths, they complement each other. General promotion work conducted by the Investment Promotion Units also supports the Mainland Offices' work on liaison and economic and trade affairs.

6. Invest Hong Kong has earmarked around \$2.5 million for promoting investment through the Investment Promotion Units in the Mainland in 2014-15. In 2014-15, we will continue to promote equal opportunities for sexual minorities through education and publicity, including organising various publicity and promotion programmes, sponsoring worthwhile community projects through the Equal Opportunities (Sexual Orientation) Funding Scheme, promoting the Code of Practice against Discrimination in Employment on the Ground of Sexual Orientation to public and private sector organisations, etc. The estimated provision for the above work (including the staff cost of the Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation Unit) is \$3.5 million. In addition, we have earlier commissioned a consultant to study whether sexual minorities are discriminated against in Hong Kong and, if so, the discrimination they experienced including the domains and forms of discrimination, and how they responded to it. 2. We commissioned a consultant to study the experience of overseas jurisdictions in implementing anti-stalking legislation, and consulted the Panel on Constitutional Affairs on the consultant's findings and recommended formulation of the offence and exemptions on 16 December 2013. The Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC) has advised that it is reviewing the Code of Practice on Employment under the Sex Discrimination Ordinance, and the initial draft report is expected to be completed by the end of 2014. The preliminary review work will be absorbed within the EOC's internal resources. After completion of the preliminary work, stakeholders and the public will be consulted. The estimated expenditure involved is unavailable for the time being.

2. In 2014-15, the EOC will set aside \$4.69 million for conducting new public education and promotion programmes and studies to promote the messages of inclusion and diversity, fostering social integration and building a caring society. The EOC's preliminary plan is to set up an Ethnic Minority Taskforce to promote the work of the EOC. The Taskforce will conduct publicity campaigns and education programmes, including new training services on cultural sensitivity and the Race Discrimination Ordinance, and organise more partnership programmes with different organisations (including the business sector) to promote equal opportunities for ethnic minorities. The Taskforce will liaise with relevant government bureaux, schools, stakeholders and service organisations, and will follow up with relevant government bureaux to enhance support for meeting the needs of ethnic minorities in education and employment.

3. In 2014-15, the EOC will enhance public knowledge of policy on integrated education. The related work will be undertaken by an internal working group which will put forth a specific work plan and budget to the EOC Board for consideration. The EOC will continue to actively maintain dialogue with stakeholders.

4. In 2014-15, the EOC will continue to enhance its internal management and operation capabilities. Specific initiatives include (a) putting in place structured training and development programmes to help its staff acquire the necessary competencies, such as management capability and leadership, and increase their knowledge of equal opportunities; (b) conducting an annual Customer Satisfaction Survey in respect of its statutory complaint handling mechanism, and following up with the findings of the survey and putting forward recommendations; and (c) conducting regular reviews to improve its policies, systems and procedures, and implementing improvement measures accordingly. Reply:

To implement the new provisions of the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance on direct marketing and legal assistance scheme which came into operation on 1 April 2013, the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data (PCPD) launched a wide range of publicity and education activities since January 2013. In 2014-15, the PCPD will continue with its public education and publicity efforts through its website, guidance notes and information leaflets, as well as organising professional workshops on data protection for data users. On the legal assistance scheme, the PCPD will, upon settling a complaint case and in accordance with procedures, inform the complainant whose privacy has been invaded of the legal assistance that

could be made available. The PCPD has set aside \$2.13 million for promotion, publicity and education programmes in 2014-15 which includes publicity and education relating to direct marketing and legal assistance.

2. In 2014-15, PCPD's planned promotion, publicity and education activities include:
  - (a) professional workshops on personal data protection – a series of professional workshops tailored for the needs of professionals in different fields dealing with personal data;
  - (b) free seminars introducing the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance and seminars on privacy concerns arising from the use of information technology for members of the public;
  - (c) with respect to privacy issues associated with the increased use of mobile applications, partnering with relevant professional bodies to provide training courses and simple guides to mobile applications developers;
  - (d) Privacy Awareness Week 2014 – an annual regional promotional event;
  - (e) Student Ambassador Programme – a learning opportunity provided for secondary school students to foster a culture of respect for personal data privacy;
  - (f) University Privacy Days – on-campus promotion of privacy protection to staff and students of the universities in Hong Kong;
  - (g) activities for Data Protection Officers' Club members, including regular meetings, introductory talks and seminars;
  - (h) revamping the landing page and content of PCPD's website, strengthening the content of the thematic websites "Think Privacy! Be Smart Online" and the "Youth Privacy Portal" launched last year; and
  - (i) disseminating the messages of online privacy protection and smart use of smartphones through various channels, including exhibition roadshow, the mass media, Youtube channel and Facebook page.

3. The increased subvention for the PCPD in 2014-15 includes \$4.21 million for the creation of 7 posts (1 Legal Counsel, 5 Assistant Personal Data Officer and 1 Assistant Information Technology Officer posts) to handle the increased number of complaints and enquiries arising from the newly amended Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance.

2. Firstly, we intend to set up a liaison unit under BJO in the Northern Region this year. Having studied the matter, we consider that Shenyang City of Liaoning Province is the preferred location to set up the liaison unit, so as to facilitate Hong Kong residents and enterprises in capitalising on the opportunities brought about by the rapid development of the Northeast Region.

3. As the next step, we plan to set up a liaison unit in the Eastern Region under Shanghai ETO next year. As the geographical coverage of the office will be adjusted upon the establishment of the Wuhan ETO, we will decide the location of the liaison unit in the Eastern Region in light of the new coverage at a later stage.

4. In 2014-15, we have set aside \$7.18 million under Programme (3) "Mainland and Taiwan Offices" for the establishment of a liaison unit each under BJO and Shanghai ETO, of which \$4.38 million is for meeting recurrent expenditure while \$2.8 million is for meeting the



one-off setting up cost.

After each annual joint meeting, the ECCPC and the THEC will hold a press conference and issue press releases to report on the discussion topics and outcomes.

2. The financial implications of convening a joint meeting on this Bureau depend on which side is hosting it. If the meeting is hosted by the ECCPC in Hong Kong, the relevant

expenditures will include the venue and facilities rental. Taking the annual joint meeting hosted by the ECCPC in Hong Kong in 2013 as an example, the relevant expenditure was about \$140,000. If the meeting is to be hosted by the THEC in Taipei, the expenditures will include the costs of air tickets, accommodation, etc. for relevant members of the ECCPC delegation visiting Taipei. The performance indicators for the HKETCO in 2013 are set out in the **Annex**. The HKETCO will continue with the above efforts in the coming year.

2. One of the HKETCO's functions is to provide assistance to Hong Kong residents in Taiwan to the extent possible. As such, the Office has been maintaining close liaison with associations of Hong Kong people and students to keep abreast of their living situation; visiting those Taiwan tertiary institutions with more Hong Kong students to better understand their learning experience; and assisting in the handling of enquiries and requests for assistance from Hong Kong people. In 2014-15, the HKETCO will continue with these efforts.

3. On officials who visited Taiwan in 2013-14, the Financial Secretary, the Secretary for Constitutional and Mainland Affairs, the Secretary for the Environment and the Secretary for Development visited Taipei in June 2013 to attend the “Hong Kong-Taipei Inter-city Forum” jointly organised by the HKETCO and the Taipei City Government. Separately, the Secretary for Transport and Housing led a delegation to Taiwan in October 2013 to promote Hong Kong’s maritime services and contacts between the trades of the two places. The Secretary for Home Affairs visited Taipei in November 2013 to officiate at the opening ceremony of “Hong Kong Week 2013: Legacies & Innovations”. During their visits, the above principal officials also called on their counterparts of the relevant Taiwan authorities to promote exchanges and co-operation between the two places on their respective policy areas. In 2014-15, the HKETCO will continue to assist in planning the visit programmes of principal officials to Taiwan and provide support as necessary.

We plan to set up a liaison unit in the Northern Region of the Mainland, to be followed by another one in the Eastern Region in the coming two years to strengthen the work of the Beijing Office (BJO) and the Hong Kong Economic and Trade Office in Shanghai (Shanghai ETO). In deciding the location of the liaison units, we will take into account relevant factors, including the positioning, development situation and potential of the provinces/municipalities concerned, their economic and trade relations with Hong Kong and room for complementarities, views of the industries, synergy with offices of the Hong Kong Trade Development Council and Hong Kong Tourism Board in the Mainland.

2. Firstly, we intend to set up a liaison unit under BJO in the Northern Region this year. Having studied the matter, we consider that Shenyang City of Liaoning Province is the preferred location to set up the liaison unit, so as to facilitate Hong Kong residents and enterprises in capitalising on the opportunities brought about by the rapid development of the Northeast Region.

3. As the next step, we plan to set up a liaison unit in the Eastern Region under Shanghai ETO next year. As the geographical coverage of the office will be adjusted upon the



establishment of the Wuhan ETO, we will decide the location of the liaison unit in the Eastern Region in light of the new coverage at a later stage.

4. In 2014-15, we have set aside \$7.18 million under Programme (3) “Mainland and Taiwan Offices” for the establishment of a liaison unit each under BJO and Shanghai ETO, of which \$4.38 million is for meeting recurrent expenditure while \$2.8 million is for meeting the one-off setting up cost.

- (b) broadcasting five television one-minuters to promote VR and emphasise the civic responsibility for registered electors to update their residential addresses;
- (c) broadcasting a new series of Announcements in the Public Interests (“APIs”) on



television and radio appealing for new registrations and reminding registered electors to notify the REO of change of residential address;

(d) placing advertisements in newspapers and popular websites and displaying posters to encourage new registrations and timely updating of registered particulars;

(e) setting up registration counters at the five Registration of Persons Offices of the Immigration Department to facilitate and encourage young people applying for or collecting adult identity cards at those Offices to register as electors; and

(f) issuing appeal letters to households which have moved into newly developed residential buildings to remind them to report change of address or register as electors.

In 2013-14, all VR-related work was carried out by a team comprising 86 civil servants and 46 non-civil service contract staff in the REO. Their work included handling applications, carrying out the above publicity activities, compiling and publishing the provisional and final registers, as well as implementing the checking measures. The staff cost and the related operational expenses were around \$39 million.

2. Regarding the 2014 VR campaign, the REO will through different media continue to encourage eligible persons to register as electors if they have yet to do so and remind electors to fulfill their civic responsibility to update their registered particulars. Publicity measures include:

Since the various practical arrangements for the 2015 DC ordinary election are subject to review and planning, we cannot provide information on the overall expenditure for such election at this stage.

2. Preparations for the 2015 DC ordinary election include amendments to relevant electoral legislation, delineation of 2015 DC constituency areas, review and updating of guidelines on election-related activities, and other electoral arrangements such as reviewing practical arrangements for polling, identifying suitable venues for use as polling and counting stations, reviewing and planning recruitment exercises for the appointment of polling and counting staff and organising training programmes for them, acquiring electoral materials and support services, etc.

3. Regarding the 2014 VR campaign, the REO will, through different media, encourage eligible persons to register as electors if they have yet to do so and remind electors to fulfil their civic responsibility to update their registered particulars. Publicity measures include:

- (a) follow-up inquiries on undelivered poll cards arising from elections;
- (b) cross-matching of data with the Housing Department, the Hong Kong Housing Society and the Home Affairs Department for verification of electors' registered addresses;

- (c) checks on multiple electors or multiple surnames of electors registered with the same residential address;
- (d) random sample checks on existing electors;
- (e) checks on addresses with incomplete information, commercial addresses or suspected non-residential addresses;
- (f) checks on addresses in buildings already demolished or to be demolished based on the information provided by the Buildings Department; and
- (g) sample checks on new voter registration (VR) applications.

In the 2013 and 2014 VR cycles, the REO conducted checking on the registered particulars of around 140 000 electors which made up about 4% of the number of electors in the register of electors in each cycle through the above measures.

2. The REO plans to increase manpower and resources in 2014-15 to handle the large number of applications for VR and the updating of particulars expected to be received before the District Council election in 2015, and to further enhance the checking work. The work related to VR and checking will be carried out by a team comprising 92 civil servants (including 6 newly added time-limited civil service posts) and around 200 non-civil service contract staff. On 4 December 2013, the HKSAR Government formally commenced the public consultation on the methods for selecting the Chief Executive (CE) in 2017 and for forming the Legislative Council (LegCo) in 2016 to prepare for the "Five-step Process" of constitutional development. The 5-month consultation will end on 3 May 2014. After the consultation period, we will summarise and consolidate the views received. The CE will submit a report to the Standing Committee of the National People's Congress (NPCSC) in accordance with the Interpretation made by the NPCSC in 2004 and the NPCSC will determine whether there is a need to amend the methods for selecting the CE and for forming the LegCo. After the NPCSC has made the decision, we expect the second stage public consultation can be launched in the second half of 2014, and the package of proposals to amend the annexes to the Basic Law can be put forward to the LegCo after the completion of the consultation.

2. In respect of the abovementioned public consultation exercise, the revised estimate for 2013-14 is about \$7.2 million (excluding staff cost) and the breakdown of the estimate is at Table 1.

Currently, Immigration Divisions are set up under the Beijing Office (BJO) and the Hong Kong Economic and Trade Offices (ETO) in Guangdong and Chengdu to provide assistance to Hong Kong residents in distress in all provinces/regions in the Mainland. Among these Immigration Divisions, the one in Chengdu ETO commenced operation on 21 October 2013. The Administration will review the services concerned from time to time, with a view to rendering appropriate assistance to Hong Kong residents in distress.

For example, the EDB has been facilitating the promotion of human rights education in schools through measures such as embedding related learning elements in the curriculum, organising teacher professional development programmes, and developing learning and teaching resources, while the HAB has been promoting civic education, (including human rights) outside schools, in collaboration with the Committee on the Promotion of Civic Education, through means such as providing sponsorship to community organisations to organise civic education activities and producing publicity programmes and materials.

3. When preparing the report in the light of the ICCPR, the CMAB consults different sectors of the community on the report outline. Following submission of the report to the United Nations, hard copies of the report are distributed to members of the public, Councillors, relevant non-government organisations and stakeholders, and the report is uploaded onto the CMAB's website for public inspection. The Legislative Council Panel on Constitutional Affairs is also consulted on the relevant report as appropriate. A separate breakdown of the expenditure for the work involved is not available.

Reply:

Work on promoting racial harmony and racial equality is undertaken mainly by the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB), the Home Affairs Department (HAD), and the Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC).

2. Since 2011-12, support services for ethnic minorities to facilitate integration into the community have been transferred from the CMAB to the HAD. Since then, the HAD has implemented a number of measures to assist ethnic minorities to integrate into the community. In 2011-12, the enhanced support measures included implementing district-based integration programmes and an ambassador scheme. In 2012-13, an additional support service centre for ethnic minorities and 2 sub-centres were set up in Yau Tsim Mong, Sham Shui Po and Tung Chung respectively, and 2 additional radio programmes in ethnic minority languages (i.e. Hindi and Thai) were produced. In 2014-15, the enhanced support measures include setting up a new support service centre for ethnic minorities in Kwai Tsing; setting up youth units in all support service centres and sub-centres to provide dedicated programmes for ethnic minority youths; implementing a youth ambassador scheme to reach out to ethnic minority youths to understand their needs and difficulties and make referrals as necessary; and recruiting additional staff familiar with ethnic minority cultures and languages to implement relevant initiatives. The expenditure on the above support services to help ethnic minorities integrate into the community is \$24.26 million, \$28.40 million, \$22.70 million, \$31.70 million and \$34.90 million for

2009-10, 2010-11, 2011-12, 2012-13 and 2013-14 respectively. The estimated budget for 2014-15 is \$48.20 million.

3. The CMAB oversees the operation of the Race Discrimination Ordinance (RDO), and promotes racial equality by issuing in April 2010 the Administrative Guidelines on Promotion of Racial Equality (the Guidelines). The Guidelines provide general guidance to relevant Government bureaux and departments and public authorities to promote racial equality and ensure equal access by ethnic minorities to public services in key areas concerned, and to take this into account in their formulation, implementation and review of relevant policies and measures. The Guidelines have been implemented smoothly so far. In 2013, the scope of application of the Guidelines has been extended to cover a total of 21 government bureaux and departments and public authorities. The CMAB will keep the implementation of the Guidelines under review and continue to listen to feedback from stakeholders. The Guidelines are implemented by the CMAB with its own resources and a separate breakdown of the related expenses is not available.

4. The EOC enforces the RDO and implements publicity and public education programmes to promote public awareness of the RDO and racial equality. Expenditure on the enforcement aspect is not available because this function is an integral part of the EOC's enforcement of the 4 anti-discrimination ordinances. For publicity and public education relating to racial equality, the expenditure (including manpower expenditure) is \$4.57 million, \$4.29 million, \$5.15 million, \$6.17 million and \$4.85 million for 2009-10, 2010-11, 2011-12, 2012-13 and 2013-14 respectively. The estimated budget for 2014-15 is \$5.61 million. The major publicity and public education programmes relating to racial equality in 2014-15 will include a funding programme for non-profit making organisations to organise programmes to promote equal opportunities, weekly radio programmes, radio programmes in ethnic minority languages, drama performances in schools, youth mentorship programmes, outreaching programmes for ethnic minorities, roving exhibitions on the 4 anti-discrimination ordinances, and seminars and trainings for employers, employees, educational institutions, non-government organisations and community groups, etc.

Reply:

Since the establishment of the Children's Rights Forum (the Forum) in 2005, 23 meetings have been convened. These meetings were held after school hours or during weekends in various districts to facilitate children from different areas to participate. There were about 30 to 50 participants at each meeting. The venues and discussion topics of past meetings are set out at the Annex. Generally speaking, the secretariat will, in respect of different topics, invite representatives from relevant bureaux and departments (usually pitched at senior level / directorate officer) to the meeting. The views of the participants on various topics such as implementation of the Sexual Conviction Record Check Scheme, implementation of "Joint Parental Responsibility Model" by legislative measure, and establishment of the Centre of Excellence in Paediatrics, have been reflected to relevant policy bureaux.



2. The Children's Rights Forum has been serving as a platform for exchange of views among children bodies, children and the Administration on matters that concern children. It encourages members of the public who take an interest in children's affair (including children) to propose topics for discussion and participate in the Forum's discussions. Starting from 2014, the Administration has endeavoured to enhance the co-operation between the Family Council and the Forum. For example at its meeting in January this year, the Forum has, at the request of the Family Council, discussed the rehabilitation services for pre-school children to facilitate the Family Council to gauge the views of the Forum before it discussed the same topic in February. The Forum will relay to the Family Council the views of children on various government initiatives expressed at the Forum, so as to facilitate the Family Council's work in assessing the impact of these policies on family. This will help to facilitate the collection of views concerning children's interests for reference by bureaux and departments.

2. As regards the collection of opinions when formulating policies relating to children, it is the current practice for policy bureaux to seek views from the relevant advisory bodies. With effect from 1 April 2013, a mandatory assessment of family implications has been introduced to the process of formulating policies and amendment of existing policies. Bureaux and departments are required to use the 3 sets of family core values (i.e., "love and care", "respect and responsibilities" and "communication and harmony") as identified by the Family Council, as well as the impact on family's structure and functions as the basis for assessing the impact of their policies on families.

3. In case there are matters which involve a number of policy areas, policy bureaux will co-ordinate among themselves. We will also suitably co-ordinate and support through high level

set-up such as the Policy Committee. For example, the 2014 Policy Address has set out a range of measures to be implemented by different bureaux and departments to promote the well-being of children, notably those children who are disadvantaged, such as children with disabilities, ethnic minority children and children from low-income families. These measures have taken into consideration the views of, inter alia, the Legislative Council, the public and the United Nations Committee on the Rights of the Child on children's affairs.

**Progress Report on the Motion  
“Setting up a commission on children”**

**Background**

At the Legislative Council meeting on 20 November 2013, members passed the following motion moved by Dr Hon Fernando CHEUNG, as amended by Dr Hon Kenneth CHAN –

“That, in the process of formulating public policies, children’s perspectives are very often neglected; at its meeting of 6 June 2007, the Legislative Council passed a Members’ motion urging the Government to set up a commission on children to fulfill the obligations under the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child, safeguard the well-being of children, and ensure that children’s perspectives were fully taken into account in the process of formulating policies; subsequently, the Government only established the Family Council in response to the demands, but the Family Council does not focus on children’s rights and well-being as its major areas of work; in this connection, this Council urges the Government to expeditiously set up a commission on children, so as to ensure that children’s well-being and perspectives are fully taken into account in the process of formulating policies, protect the legitimate rights under the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child, and convene summits annually on children development policies and strategies.”

This paper reports the Administration’s latest position on the subject.

**The Administration’s position**

2. The Administration is firmly committed to promoting children’s rights. Our society generally recognises that family is the important and fundamental group unit of society which provides the natural environment for the growth and well-being of all its members including children. Against this backdrop, we have been adopting a family-based approach in promoting children’s well-being, by providing necessary and appropriate services to children as well as families.

3. Children’s affairs straddle across different policy areas, e.g., education, healthcare and welfare, etc. The relevant policy bureaux will handle matters under their respective purviews, such as formulating specific legislation for protecting the rights of children, and earmarking resources for implementing various policies. Relevant policy bureaux have been implementing extensive measures to enhance children’s rights and well-being.

4. In case there are matters which involve a number of policy areas, policy bureaux will co-ordinate among themselves. We will also suitably co-ordinate and support through high level set-up such as the Policy Committee. For example, the 2014 Policy Address has set out a range of measures to be implemented by different bureaux and departments (B/Ds) to promote the well-being of children, notably those children who are disadvantaged. Highlights of these measures are set out in **Annex**. These measures have taken into consideration the views of, inter



alia, the Legislative Council, the public and the United Nations Committee on the Rights of the Child on children's affairs.

5. As regards the collection of opinions when formulating policies relating to children, it is the current practice for policy bureaux to seek views from the relevant advisory bodies. Forum participants' views on different topics (e.g., legislation on the implementation of the Joint Parental Responsibility Model and the Centre of Excellence in Paediatrics) have been reflected to relevant bureaux accordingly.

8. The Administration will endeavour to enhance the co-operation between the Council and the Forum. In particular, the Forum will relay to the Council the views of children on various government initiatives expressed at the Forum, so as to facilitate the Council's work in assessing the impact of these policies on family. Views reflecting children's interest will thus be more systematically collected in policy formulation by B/Ds and the Council. The Council will also invite policy bureaux to brief and consult the Council on children-related policies and initiatives being formulated.

9. We consider that the current arrangement for handling children affairs provides us the necessary flexibility in addressing the concern of various sectors on children matters, and is in line with our policy objective of strengthening the role of family. The Administration remains of the view that there is no imminent need to duplicate ongoing efforts and establish a commission on children.

- i) Earmark \$300 million in the next financial year to ensure the sustainability of the Child Development Fund and help more students from needy families.

Since its establishment, the Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC) has been working steadily to advance the Equal Pay for Work of Equal Value (EPEV) principles. These efforts include incorporating EPEV into the Code of Practice on Employment issued under the Sex Discrimination Ordinance (SDO) in 1996; conducting a Feasibility Study on EPEV and releasing a report on Consultancy Study on EPEV in the Public Sector afterwards; and producing a Guide to Employers on Equal Pay between Men and Women under the SDO to help employers draw up pay practices that are free of sex bias and to realise the concept of equal pay in the workplace. In addition, the EOC also arranges talks and training programmes for employers, women groups, stakeholders and members of the public to, inter alia, introduce to them EPEV principles and practices. Over the past 3 years, there is an annual average of 41 000 participants taking part in these talks and training programmes.

2. The EOC advised that it is reviewing the Code of Practice on Employment and the initial draft report is expected to be completed by the end of 2014. While conducting the review, the EOC will also revise and revamp the chapter on ways to promote EPEV principles.



3. The work on promoting the concept of EPEV includes conducting research studies, preparing consultancy reports, organising conferences, preparing and printing EPEV guides, etc. These are integral parts of the EOC's efforts in promoting the concept of equal opportunities for all and a separate breakdown on the expenditure involved is therefore not available.

The reality is that the Guidelines have failed to help ethnic minority residents gain equal access to public services. Will the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau specifically request participating departments or organisations to conduct public opinion surveys on the level of satisfaction and / or recommendations for improvement of the ethnic minority residents who speak neither Chinese nor English and are using the public services of the departments or organisations concerned? If so, what are the expenditure and details? If not, what mechanism does the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau have in place to find out about the use of public services by ethnic minorities?

Reply:

The Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) issued in April 2010 the Administrative Guidelines on Promotion of Racial Equality (the Guidelines) to provide general guidance to relevant Government bureaux and departments and public authorities to promote racial equality and ensure equal access by ethnic minorities to public services in key areas concerned, and to take this into account in their formulation, implementation and review of relevant policies and measures.

2. The Guidelines cover the key public services which are particularly relevant to meeting the special needs of ethnic minorities and facilitating their integration into the community, namely, medical, education, vocational training, employment and major community services. According to the Guidelines, the departments should draw up checklists of measures that would assist in promoting racial equality and equal access to key public services to enhance the transparency of their work. The checklists contain contact information of the departments and have been uploaded onto the CMAB website. Where necessary, the departments will issue updates on the information of the checklists.
3. The Guidelines have been implemented smoothly so far. In 2013, the scope of application of the Guidelines has been extended to cover a total of 21 Government bureaux and departments and public authorities.
4. Government departments should ensure that ethnic minorities' access to public service is not affected by language barriers. To this end, the departments may, in accordance with the provisions of the Stores and Procurement Regulations, engage service providers to provide translation and interpretation services, or recruit staff who are proficient in ethnic minority languages to provide assistance to ethnic minorities in accessing public services. For example, the Housing Department (HD) has been covered by the Guidelines since September 2013. To facilitate ethnic minorities' access to various public housing services, HD has put in place a number of measures which include uploading leaflets in various ethnic minority languages onto the Housing Authority (HA) / HD website to set out in detail the general information concerning application for public housing; employing 2 Pakistani Hall Attendants to offer reception and simple interpretation service in the HA Customer Service Centre to the ethnic minorities public housing applicants and providing translation service through the Centre for Harmony and Enhancement of Ethnic Minority Residents at the request of the ethnic minority public housing applicants; and promoting racial harmony through estate newsletter, promotional video, poster and partnering community functions jointly organised by the Estate Management Advisory Committee and non-governmental organisations.

The majority of the frontline staff of government departments does not take the initiative to apply for the use of the existing Telephone Interpretation Service (TELIS) or On-site Interpretation Service (OSIS) provided by the Centre for Harmony and Enhancement of Ethnic Minority Residents (CHEER) to the ethnic minorities. For example, in 2012-13, the Housing Department and Labour Department only made 3 and 11 applications for OSIS respectively throughout the year. At present, only government departments can apply for the use of OSIS of CHEER. Will the Government consider allowing ethnic minority users of public services to apply for the use of OSIS at their own will? If not, what are the reasons?

Reply:

In general, government departments will, through various means, ensure that ethnic minorities' access to public services is not affected by language barriers. These measures include publishing pamphlets, leaflets and promotional materials in ethnic minority languages and uploading the electronic version of such publications on relevant webpages.

2. With regard to interpretation services, departments will also, based on their actual needs and in accordance with established procurement procedures, provide interpretation services as required through means such as engaging service providers to provide interpretation service, staff proficient in ethnic minority languages, and part-time court interpreters, etc. Measures put in place by the Housing Department (HD) and the Labour Department (LD) include: HD employs 2 Pakistani Hall Attendants to offer reception and simple interpretation service in the Housing Authority Customer Service Centre to ethnic minority public housing applicants; LD

engages part-time court interpreters as necessary to provide on-site interpretation service when adjudicating minor employment claims related to ethnic minorities. In addition, these two departments also use the translation and interpretation service offered by the Centre for Harmony and Enhancement of Ethnic Minority Residents, which is only one of the interpretation services used by the two departments.

Reply:

To ensure that ethnic minorities' access to public services is not affected by language barriers, government departments may, in accordance with the provisions of the Stores and Procurement Regulations, engage service providers to provide translation or interpretation services, or recruit staff who are proficient in ethnic minority languages to provide assistance to ethnic minorities in accessing public services.

2. In respect of the application forms related to poverty alleviation as stated in the question (i.e. application for public housing, the Work Incentive Transport Subsidy, Student Financial Assistance Agency (SFAA)'s subsidies for primary and secondary school students), information provided by the departments concerned is as follows:

- (a) The Housing Authority (HA) provides public housing to applicants with housing need through the Waiting List System. Applicants may obtain the application forms and Information for Applicants which are available in both English and Chinese from the Housing Department (HD). To facilitate ethnic minorities with housing need to apply for public housing, the HD has put in place a number of

measures which include uploading leaflets in ethnic minority languages onto the HA/HD website to set out in detail the general information concerning application for public housing; employing 2 Pakistani Hall Attendants to offer reception and simple interpretation service in the HA Customer Service Centre to ethnic minority public housing applicants; providing translation service through the Centre for Harmony and Enhancement of Ethnic Minority Residents (CHEER) at the request of the ethnic minority public housing applicants.

- (b) The Labour Department (LD) has published leaflets of the Work Incentive Transport Subsidy Scheme in ethnic minority languages to provide details of the Scheme and to encourage ethnic minorities to apply for the subsidy. Although application forms for the Scheme are not available in ethnic minority languages, the LD will continue to arrange interpretation service for ethnic minority applicants in need through CHEER.
- (c) Application forms for various assistance schemes for primary and secondary school students administered by the SFAA are currently published in Chinese and English. Given that some ethnic minority students' parents with financial need may have difficulties in understanding the content of the application form, while schools would always have a better understanding of their students, the SFAA cooperates closely with schools to provide necessary assistance to students (including ethnic minority students) and their parents in need to facilitate them to apply to the SFAA for financial assistance. For those students who have received financial assistance in the past school year, the SFAA will provide their families with pre-printed application forms every year to remind them to apply for assistance for the coming year. Special assistance will be provided to individual families which have experienced special difficulties in the application process.

3. The above initiatives are an integral part of the work of the departments concerned and a separate breakdown of the related expenditures is not available.

The expenditure of the Personal Data (Privacy) Advisory Committee is included in the Government subvention for the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data (PCPD), and the total subvention for PCPD for the past five years amounted to \$277.18 million. Details of and provision for the work items mentioned in the question in 2014-15 are as follows:

- (a) The Administration will promote racial equality through enhanced publicity and public education. The Administration will co-operate with Radio Television Hong Kong to produce a TV series and conduct a school outreach programme to help the public understand the cultures and customs of ethnic minorities, overcome barriers and eliminate discrimination. The estimated provision for this work is about \$3.35 million.
- (b) The Administration will continue its efforts in promoting children's rights through implementing the Children's Rights Education Funding Scheme, organising the Children's Rights Forum, publicity and public education programmes, etc. The estimated provision for this work is about \$1.25 million.

- (c) The Administration will continue to promote equal opportunities for sexual minorities through education and publicity, including organising various publicity and promotion programmes, sponsoring worthwhile community projects through the Equal Opportunities (Sexual Orientation) Funding Scheme, promoting the Code of Practice against Discrimination in Employment on the Ground of Sexual Orientation to public and private sector organisations, etc. The estimated provision for this work is about \$2.6 million.
  - (d) The Administration has commissioned a consultant to study whether sexual minorities are discriminated against in Hong Kong and, if so, the discrimination they experienced including the domains and forms of discrimination, and how they responded to it. The estimated provision for the study is about \$0.45 million.
  - (e) The Administration commissioned a consultant to study the experience of overseas jurisdictions in implementing anti-stalking legislation, and consulted the Panel on Constitutional Affairs on the consultant's findings and recommended formulation of the offence and exemptions on 16 December 2013. The Administration will carefully consider the findings and recommendations of the study and also listen to the views of stakeholders, with a view to formulating an appropriate way forward.

The Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) issued in April 2010 the Administrative Guidelines on Promotion of Racial Equality (the Guidelines) to provide general guidance to relevant Government bureaux and departments and public authorities to promote racial equality and ensure equal access by ethnic minorities to public services in key areas concerned, and to take this into account in their formulation, implementation and review of relevant policies and measures.

2. The Guidelines cover the key public services which are particularly relevant to meeting the special needs of ethnic minorities and facilitating their integration into the community, namely, medical, education, vocational training, employment and major community services. In 2010, the scope of application of the Guidelines covered 14 Government bureaux and departments and public authorities. In 2013, the scope of application of the Guidelines has been extended to cover a total of 21 Government bureaux and departments and public authorities.

3. According to the Guidelines, the departments should draw up checklists of measures that would assist in promoting racial equality and equal access to key public services to enhance the transparency of their work. The checklists contain contact information of the departments and have been uploaded onto the CMAB website. Where necessary, the departments will issue

updates on the information of the checklists.

4. The Guidelines have been implemented smoothly so far. The Administration will continue to review the implementation of the Guidelines in a timely manner and consider further extending the coverage of the Guidelines.

In 2014-15, we have set aside about \$12 million (excluding staff cost) and have created 7 time-limited posts, including 1 Administrative Officer Staff Grade C post for about 2 months and 6 posts (1 Administrative Officer, 1 Senior Executive Officer, 1 Executive Officer II and 3 Assistant Clerical Officers) for 1 year for the public consultation on the 2 electoral methods. After the first-stage consultation period ends in May 2014, the Government will summarise and consolidate the views received. The Chief Executive (CE) will submit a report to the Standing Committee of the National People's Congress (NPCSC) in accordance with the Interpretation made by the NPCSC in 2004 and the NPCSC will determine whether there is a need to amend the methods for selecting the CE and for forming the Legislative Council (LegCo). After the NPCSC has made the decision, we expect the second stage public consultation can be launched in the second half of 2014, and the package of proposals to amend the annexes to the Basic Law can be put forward to the LegCo after the completion of the consultation.

Reply:

The Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) attaches great importance to enhancing co-operation between Hong Kong and the Mainland. There is general consensus in our community that co-operation with Guangdong is mutually beneficial and complementary. The Legislative Council (LegCo), for example, reaffirmed its strong support by passing 2 motions entitled “Proactively implementing the Framework Agreement on Hong Kong/Guangdong Co-operation” and “Promoting regional economic integration between Guangdong and Hong Kong” on 26 May 2010 and 5 May 2011 respectively. The motions urged the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (HKSAR) Government to formulate and implement the specific policies and measures outlined in the Framework Agreement on Hong Kong/Guangdong Co-operation (Framework Agreement) as early as possible, and to promote economic integration between Guangdong and Hong Kong on various fronts.



2. The Administration has briefed the House Committee and different Panels of LegCo on individual aspects of the Framework Agreement on various occasions. The full text of the Framework Agreement was issued on the day it was signed (7 April 2010) and details were announced in a press release. While CMAB is responsible for co-ordinating the efforts of the HKSAR Government in promoting co-operation with Guangdong, specific projects are initiated and taken forward by the relevant policy bureaux and departments. Where necessary, relevant parties such as advisory boards and LegCo would be briefed or consulted in accordance with established practice.

3. Since the Framework Agreement was signed in 2010, good progress has been made in its implementation. The 2014 Work Plan setting out the work programme of Hong Kong/Guangdong co-operation for the year was agreed and signed in March this year.

4. Policy matters on deepening regional co-operation under Programme (2) “Constitutional and Mainland Affairs” are mainly handled by 2 teams of staff in CMAB. (1) In 2014-15, we have set aside about \$12 million (excluding staff cost) and created 7 time-limited posts, including 1 Administrative Officer Staff Grade C post for about 2 months and 6 posts (including 1 Administrative Officer, 1 Senior Executive Officer, 1 Executive Officer II and 3 Assistant Clerical Officers) for 1 year for the public consultation on the methods for selecting the Chief Executive in 2017 and for forming the Legislative Council in 2016. The breakdown of the above estimate is as Table 1:

3. On 4 December 2013, the HKSAR Government formally commenced the public consultation on the methods for selecting the Chief Executive (CE) in 2017 and for forming the Legislative Council (LegCo) in 2016 to prepare for the "Five-step Process" of constitutional development. The 5-month consultation will end on 3 May 2014. At this stage, the Government will continue to listen to the views and suggestions from different sectors of the community and the public at large with an open, inclusive and pragmatic mind. After the consultation period, the Government will summarise and consolidate the views received. The CE will submit a report to the Standing Committee of the National People's Congress (NPCSC) in accordance with the Interpretation made by the NPCSC in 2004 and the NPCSC will determine whether there is a need to amend the methods for selecting the CE and for forming the LegCo. After the NPCSC has made the decision, we expect the second stage public consultation can be launched in the second half of 2014, and the package of proposals to amend the annexes to the Basic Law can be put forward to the LegCo after the completion of the consultation. The Government's public education and promotion activities on human rights are taken forward by a number of policy bureaux, notably the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB), the Education Bureau (EDB), the Home Affairs Bureau (HAB) and the Labour and Welfare Bureau (LWB).

2. Education and promotion activities in respect of children, people with disabilities, sexual minorities, ethnic minorities and fundamental human rights organised by the Government in 2013-14 are detailed at the Annex.

3. As education and promotion activities of various bureaux and departments are an integral part of their daily work, separate breakdowns of expenditures for each of such activities are not available. For example, the EDB has been facilitating the promotion of human rights education in schools, through measures such as embedding related learning elements in the curriculum, organising teacher professional development programmes, and developing learning and teaching resources, while the HAB has been promoting civic education, (including human rights) outside schools, in collaboration with the Committee on the Promotion of Civic Education, through means such as providing sponsorship to community organisations to organise civic education activities and producing publicity programmes and materials.

4. Activities where breakdowns of expenditure are available include:

(a) Under Programme (5), the CMAB has set aside provision for the Equal Opportunities Commission and the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data to carry out promotion and education programmes and enforcement work within their statutory framework to promote rights of the individual with respect to personal data privacy, promote equal opportunities and eliminate discrimination; in 2014-15, the estimated expenditure is \$169.8 million.

(b) Under Programme (4), the CMAB is committed to promoting rights of the individual, increasing the community's awareness of, respect for and protection of human rights; in 2014-15, the estimated expenditure is \$23.20 million. The CMAB will promote racial equality through enhanced publicity and public education including co-operating with Radio Television Hong Kong (RTHK) to produce a TV series and conduct a school outreach programme to help the public understand the cultures and customs of ethnic minorities, overcome barriers and eliminate discrimination. The Administration will continue to promote children's rights through, inter alia, the Children's Rights Education Funding Scheme, the Children's Rights Forum, publicity and public education. It will also continue to promote equal opportunities for sexual minorities through education and publicity, including organising various publicity and promotion programmes, sponsoring worthwhile community projects through the Equal Opportunities (Sexual Orientation) Funding Scheme, promoting the Code of Practice against Discrimination in Employment on the Ground of Sexual Orientation to the public and private sector organisations, etc.

(c) The LWB organises territory-wide public education activities and provides sponsorship to the 18 District Councils and community organisations to organise publicity programmes in the community for promoting the spirit and core values enshrined in the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD) as well as the message of building a barrier-free and inclusive society. In 2014-15, the estimated expenditure of the LWB for the above public education activities is about \$13.50 million.

The Mainland and Taiwan Offices (namely the Beijing Office, the Hong Kong Economic and Trade Offices in Guangdong, Shanghai, Chengdu and Wuhan, as well as the Hong Kong Economic, Trade and Cultural Office in Taiwan) serve as important bridges between Hong Kong and the Mainland/Taiwan. Their major responsibilities include enhancing liaison and communication with the counterparts in the areas under their coverage; representing and promoting Hong Kong's trade and commercial interests; encouraging and attracting investments to Hong Kong; promoting Hong Kong's many advantages as an investment and business hub in Asia; and promoting the strengths of Hong Kong through appropriate channels. These channels include attending meetings and calling on the Mainland/Taiwan counterparts; organising/participating in seminars, exhibitions and workshops; organising/participating in public relations functions and cultural exchange events; giving public speeches, media interviews and briefings; and issuing circulars, newsletters and press releases to showcase the positive image and attractions of Hong Kong in the Mainland and Taiwan. As the related work is an integral part of the duties and functions of the Mainland and Taiwan Offices, the estimated expenditure involved cannot be singled out and separately quantified.

2. In 2014-15, the Mainland and Taiwan Offices will continue to promote the strengths of Hong Kong through appropriate channels, including the following public relations functions and cultural events:

- (a) producing thematic video programmes to promote Hong Kong's arts and culture;

The major responsibilities of the Beijing Office and the 4 Hong Kong Economic and Trade Offices in Guangdong, Shanghai, Chengdu and Wuhan (Mainland Offices) as well as the Hong Kong Economic, Trade and Cultural Office in Taiwan (HKETCO) include supporting Hong Kong residents and enterprises in the service area, promoting economic and trade relations, enhancing liaison and communication with the counterparts under their geographical coverage, promoting co-operation between Hong Kong and the service area, promoting Hong Kong, etc.

2. On supporting Hong Kong residents and enterprises in the service area, the Mainland Offices and HKETCO collect practical information such as medical care, education, legal

services etc., and disseminate such information through production of information booklets and the offices' websites to assist Hong Kong residents to adapt to living in the area.

3. In 2014-15, the Mainland Offices and HKETCO will continue to provide practical information to Hong Kong residents in the Mainland and Taiwan. Reply:

The Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC) has been organising a number of training programmes on preventing sexual harassment over the years. In 2003, the EOC's Policy and Research Committee set up a Working Group on Anti-Sexual Harassment Campaign (Working Group). The Working Group has conducted a series of questionnaire surveys, workshops and seminars targeting the education and business sectors to understand the prevalence of sexual harassment in these sectors, promote greater awareness of sexual harassment among school management, teachers and students, as well as employers and employees, and assist them in formulating sexual harassment policies in schools and corporations to improve the handling of sexual harassment issues and hence achieving the purpose of preventing sexual harassment.

2. With regard to the education sector, the EOC has completed a survey entitled "Sexual Harassment – Questionnaire Survey for Education Sector" in 2013 and has conducted a series of promotion and training programmes including compiling the Framework for Sexual Harassment Policies in Schools and organising seminars, workshops and training courses. In 2014-15, the EOC will conduct a follow-up questionnaire survey to see if there is any improvement in the formulation of sexual harassment policies in primary and secondary schools. Besides, it will

continue to provide training for schools to promote greater awareness of the education sector on the prevention and handling of sexual harassment issues, as well as publicise relevant messages through publications of the teachers' unions to increase the education workers' understanding of sexual harassment issues.

3. With regard to the business sector, the EOC has carried out a survey entitled "Sexual Harassment – Questionnaire Survey for Business Sector" in 2013. It has also prepared the Framework for Corporate Policy on Sexual Harassment and organised related workshops to raise the awareness of employers and management of corporations on sexual harassment. The Working Group has proposed conducting surveys on service industries to study the prevalence of sexual harassment in various service industries of which employees are susceptible to sexual harassment. Following the questionnaire survey on sexual harassment experienced by flight attendants, the EOC will, in 2014-15, conduct questionnaire surveys targeted at employees of other service industries (including healthcare, catering and retail industries) and conduct similar survey for foreign domestic helpers in Hong Kong.

4. The EOC is reviewing the Code of Practice on Employment under the Sex Discrimination Ordinance and the initial draft report is expected to be completed by the end of 2014. The preliminary work of the review will be absorbed within the EOC's internal resources. After completion of the preliminary work, stakeholders and the public will be consulted. The estimated expenditure involved is unavailable for the time being.

Reply:

The Civil Service Regulations (CSRs) set out the principles, rules and approval procedures relating to official entertainment. Heads of Departments have the delegated authority to authorise expenditures from the departmental entertainment vote. In addition, according to the existing guidelines, the expenditure limits on entertainment in the form of official meals should not exceed \$450 per person for lunch or \$600 per person for dinner, inclusive of all expenses incurred on food and beverages consumed on the occasion, service charges and tips. Government officers are required to exercise prudent judgement and economy when entertaining guest(s) for official purposes in order to avoid any public perception of extravagance. Where there are sufficient justifications for exceeding the expenditure limits, departments are required to consider those applications according to the established mechanism



and to document properly the detailed justifications for granting such approval.

2. In line with the Government's green policy, public officers should as far as possible refrain from bestowing gifts/souvenirs to others during the conduct of official activities. According to the existing guidelines, where bestowal of gifts/souvenirs is necessary or unavoidable due to operational, protocol or other reasons, the gift/souvenir items should not be lavish or extravagant and the number should be kept to a minimum. Also, the exchange of gifts/souvenirs should only be made from organisation to organisation.

3. Over the past three years, no officer in the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) and the Registration and Electoral Office, which is under CMAB's purview, was subject to disciplinary action for alleged contravention of the CSRs or other government requirements in relation to claiming reimbursement of entertainment expenses or offering gifts/souvenirs.

Reply:

- (1) The Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) will formulate information technology (IT) project portfolio and plan for related IT projects so as to ensure that these IT projects can practically and effectively meet the business needs and operational arrangements of the Bureau. With regard to the planning for IT replacement projects, CMAB is required to examine and assess various potential risks and devise associated mitigation measures. From the technology perspective, the potential risks that should be taken into consideration include product compatibility, maintenance and support, replacement products for ensuring continuity and availability of market supply. In procuring or replacing computer hardware and software, CMAB will follow the government procurement guidelines to make the most cost-effective purchase through open and fair competition, and take into account the importance and priority of the IT projects.
- (2) With respect to the version of computer operating systems, the relevant information is provided below-
  - (i) Given that Microsoft, the computer software and hardware provider, will terminate support services for its Windows XP operating system, CMAB is replacing all relevant computer software with Windows 7. The replacement exercise will be completed by 31 March 2014.
  - (ii) CMAB is not using any operating system launched by Microsoft before 2001.
  - (iii) CMAB is not using any other outdated version of operating systems.
- (3) In procuring tablet computers, CMAB follows the government procurement guidelines to make the most cost-effective purchase through open and fair competition. The tablet computers procured are mainly used to support and improve the Bureau's internal operations including sending and receiving emails, short message service, calendaring and Internet browsing.

In accordance with the guidelines issued by the Office of the Government Chief Information Officer (OGCIO), CMAB will not store confidential information in the tablet computers. We have, in accordance with the OGCIO guidelines, deployed mobile device management solutions and taken appropriate security measures, such as enabling the password lock on mobile devices, wiping device data after a specific number of failed login attempts, etc. Since the expenditure for installing information security software in tablet computers is normally included in the procurement cost, we do not have the breakdown on such expenditure.

The increasing use of information technology has allowed service providers or other related persons to obtain a lot of personal data. What measures will be taken by the Administration to prevent unscrupulous people from selling or using the personal data obtained? How many related cases were received last year and in what ways were they handled? Please advise on the manpower and provision allocated for handling such cases. What specific measures will be taken by the Administration to promote public awareness of the importance of protecting personal data to reduce the risk of leakage of important data? What are the relevant manpower provision and intended results?

Reply:

Section 64 of the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance (the Ordinance) provides that a person commits an offence if the person discloses any personal data of a data subject which was obtained from a data user without the data user's consent, with an intent to obtain gain in money or other property or to cause loss in money or other property to the data subject, or the disclosure causes psychological harm to the data subject, and is liable to a maximum penalty of a fine of \$1,000,000 and imprisonment for 5 years. The Ordinance also provides that a person commits an offence if the person sells personal data of a data subject to third parties for use in direct marketing without the data subject's consent, and is liable to a maximum penalty of a fine of \$1,000,000 and imprisonment for 5 years. In addition, Data Protection Principle 4 provides that all practicable steps shall be taken to ensure that the personal data held by a data user is protected against unauthorised or accidental access, processing, erasure, loss or use.

2. In 2013, the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data (PCPD) received a

total of 6 complaint cases about unauthorised sale of personal data, and another 10 complaint cases involving the failure of telecommunications service providers or information technology sector to take all practicable steps, resulting in access to, processing or use of / possible access to, processing or use of customers' personal data by unscrupulous people. Among these 16 cases, 5 complainants had not responded to enquiries from PCPD, 2 complainants were not the data subjects concerned, 1 complainant withdrew the complaint, 1 complainant merely requested the PCPD to relay his concern to the organisation being complained against, 4 cases were found to have no prima facie evidence or to be unsubstantiated, 1 case was resolved through mediation, 1 case related to suspected contravention of provision regulating direct marketing and was referred to the Police for criminal investigation and prosecution, and 1 case is still under investigation.

3. A breakdown of the expenditure incurred for handling such cases is not available from the PCPD.

4. The PCPD plans to conduct promotion, publicity and education activities in 2014-15 to raise the awareness of the public, the relevant sectors/industries on protection of personal data. Major activities include:

- (a) professional workshops on personal data protection – a series of professional workshops tailored for the needs of professionals in different fields dealing with personal data;
- (b) free seminars introducing the Ordinance and seminars on privacy concerns arising from the use of information technology for members of the public;
- (c) with respect to privacy issues associated with the increased use of mobile applications, partnering with relevant professional bodies to provide training courses and simple guides to mobile applications developers;
- (d) Privacy Awareness Week 2014 – an annual regional promotional event;
- (e) Student Ambassador Programme – a learning opportunity provided for secondary school students to foster a culture of respect for personal data privacy;
- (f) University Privacy Days – on-campus promotion of privacy protection to staff and students of the universities in Hong Kong;
- (g) activities for Data Protection Officers' Club members, including regular meetings, introductory talks and seminars;
- (h) revamping the landing page and content of PCPD's website, strengthening the content of the thematic websites "Think Privacy! Be Smart Online" and the "Youth Privacy Portal" launched last year; and
- (i) disseminating the messages of online privacy protection and smart use of smartphones through various channels, including exhibition roadshow, the mass media, Youtube channel and Facebook page.

5. The PCPD has set aside \$2.13 million for the above promotion, publicity and education activities. As far as manpower is concerned, since organising these activities is part of the duties of the Corporate Communications Division of the PCPD, a breakdown of the manpower provision incurred is not available from the PCPD.

Since the provisions regulating the use of personal data in direct marketing in the Ordinance came into operation on 1 April 2013, the Office of the Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data (PCPD) has, as at 28 February 2014, received a total of 513 related complaints, of which 12 cases have been referred to the Police for consideration of prosecution. No conviction

is recorded for the time being. A breakdown of the manpower and expenditure incurred for handling such cases is not available from PCPD.

2. As at 28 February 2014, PCPD has not received any complaint about the use of personal data collected by mobile application developers for other purposes.

3. In 2014-15, PCPD will take the following measures to improve protection of personal data privacy in the use of mobile applications with its existing resources and manpower:

- (a) organising more talks to share with members of the public how to protect their personal data privacy when using mobile applications;
- (b) disseminating educational messages through strengthening the content of the thematic websites “Think Privacy! Be Smart Online” and the “Youth Privacy Portal”;
- (c) organising talks/seminars for the mobile applications development industry (the industry) to enhance their knowledge on personal data privacy protection;
- (d) collaborating with the industry to develop more practical guidance on compliance with provisions in the Ordinance;
- (e) continuing to conduct random checks on mobile applications to ascertain the availability, accessibility and readability of privacy policy, and taking enforcement actions as appropriate; and
- (f) co-operating with other privacy protection authorities through sharing of views, intelligence and knowledge, to facilitate PCPD to keep abreast of latest developments on mobile applications and the implications on personal data privacy protection.

Reply:

- (1) In 2013-14, we printed about 695 000 copies of consultation documents, flyers and posters for the public consultation on the methods for selecting the Chief Executive (CE) in



2017 and for forming the Legislative Council (LegCo) in 2016. The expenses incurred were around \$860,000. In 2009-10, we printed about 103 000 copies of consultation documents, flyers and posters for the public consultation on the methods for selecting the CE and for forming the LegCo in 2012. The expenses incurred were around \$300,000.

(2) In 2013-14, no consultant or non-governmental organisation (NGO) was engaged or invited for the public engagement and promotion of the public consultation on the methods for selecting the CE in 2017 and for forming the LegCo in 2016.

(3) In 2013-14, the revised estimate for the public consultation on the methods for selecting the CE in 2017 and for forming the LegCo in 2016 is about \$7.2 million (excluding staff cost) and its breakdown is as follows:

The abovementioned \$200,000 expenditure on other items already includes the approximately \$100,000 used on the relevant website (including design, maintenance, updating, etc). The manpower involved included 1 Administrative Officer and 2 project officers. Relevant work was handled by a contractor selected by tender, and no NGO participated in the work concerned.

(4) As shown in the table in section (3) of the reply, in 2013-14, the publicity cost for the public consultation on the methods for selecting the CE in 2017 and for forming the LegCo in 2016 was about \$6.1 million, accounting for about 85% of the total cost (\$7.2 million) of the public consultation. The publicity cost includes the production costs for the television and radio Announcements in Public Interest, costs for advertising in MTR stations and train compartments, as well as on various websites. The purpose of the publicity work is to promote the public consultation and to encourage the public to express their views on the related issues. The publicity activities were held at different times during the public consultation period (i.e. from 4 December 2013 to 3 May 2014) and no sponsorship was involved.

Under Matters Requiring Special Attention in 2014-15, the Equal Opportunity Commission says it will promote equal opportunities in education and employment for ethnic minorities. In this connection, will the Administration inform this Administration:

- a) the effectiveness of promoting equal opportunities in employment for ethnic minorities in each of the past 5 years in terms of success rate of ethnic minority job seekers registered with Labour Department for employment services to secure employment;
- b) the effectiveness of promoting equal opportunities in education for ethnic minorities in each of the past 5 years in terms of dropout rates of 16 through 24-year-olds, by sex; undergraduate enrollment rates and graduation rates among ethnic minorities; and
- c) the work plan and strategies to promote equal opportunities in education and employment for ethnic minorities for 2014, inclusive of the provision and manpower to be allocated.

Reply:

- (a) As advised by the Labour Department (LD), job seekers who have registered with the LD for employment services may be placed into employment either through the referral services of the LD or by direct application to employers who advertise their vacancies at the LD. Currently, over 90% of the vacancies advertised through the LD are open for direct application by job seekers. Those who have found work through direct application are not required to report their placement positions to the LD, and hence statistics on cases where job seekers have secured employment through direct application to

employers are not available. In respect of the LD's referral services, the LD did not prepare separate statistics of ethnic minority job seekers who have found work through the referral services of the LD in 2009 and 2010. In 2011, 2012 and 2013, the number of ethnic minorities who registered with the LD for employment services was 901, 981 and 787 respectively. During the same period, 72, 61 and 57 placements were secured for ethnic minority job seekers through the referral services of the LD.

- (b) As advised by the Education Bureau (EDB), the Government is committed to supporting the early integration of non-Chinese speaking (NCS) students into the community, including facilitating their adaptation to the local education system and mastery of the Chinese Language. Pursuant to the revamp of the Primary One Admission system in 2005 for NCS students at the Central Allocation stage, NCS students may choose public sector primary schools in their residing school net on par with their local counterparts. To cater for the needs of some ethnic minority parents, they may also choose the 8 primary schools traditionally admitting more NCS students. In tandem, the EDB has put in place a series of support measures since the 2006/07 school year to help NCS students master the Chinese Language and integrate into the community. For NCS student dropouts aged between 16 and 24, the EDB will, upon receiving reports of such cases, assist them to resume schooling. In handling these cases, the EDB will not collect information on the students' ethnicity, and hence dropout rate of ethnic minority students aged between 16 and 24 is not available. Besides, starting from the 2008/09 school year, the Government has extended free education to include senior secondary education provided by public sector secondary schools. The number of NCS students studying at senior secondary levels in the past 5 years (i.e. 2009/10 to 2013/14 school years) is tabulated at the Annex.

According to the information provided by the University Grants Committee (UGC), the number of local NCS students (who are not of Chinese ethnicity and/or whose spoken language at home is not Chinese) admitted to the UGC-funded undergraduate programmes in the past 5 years (i.e. the 2009/10 to 2013/14 school years) was 92, 141, 145, 249 and 227 respectively. Statistics with breakdown by local and non-local NCS students are not available for self-financing undergraduate programmes.

- (c) According to EDB, as announced in the 2014 Policy Address, a provision of \$200 million has been earmarked per year to step up support for NCS students to facilitate their effective learning of the Chinese Language and create an inclusive learning environment in schools. Specifically, the EDB will, starting from the 2014/15 school year, provide the "Chinese Language Curriculum Second Language Learning Framework" ("Learning Framework") with supporting learning and teaching materials to help NCS students in primary and secondary schools overcome the difficulties in learning Chinese as a second language with a view to enabling them to bridge over to mainstream Chinese Language classes. Besides, an Applied Learning (Chinese Language) subject pegged at the Qualifications Framework Levels 1 to 3 will be provided by stages starting from the 2014/15 school year for NCS students with different aspirations at senior secondary levels to articulate under the multiple pathways. To facilitate schools' implementation of the "Learning Framework", the EDB will, starting from the 2014/15 school year, enhance the additional recurrent funding for schools admitting 10 or more NCS students to adopt appropriate teaching strategies, including

different intensive teaching and learning modes like pull-out teaching, split-class/group learning, after-school consolidation, etc. with a view to helping NCS students bridge over to mainstream Chinese Language classes, and to strengthen communication with NCS parents to motivate NCS students to learn Chinese. In tandem, schools admitting less than 10 NCS students may apply for additional funding, if necessary, to provide after-school support to reinforce their NCS students' learning of Chinese. Other complementary measures including teachers' professional development programmes to enhance teachers' professional capabilities in teaching Chinese as a second language and provision of enhanced school-based professional support to primary and secondary schools as well as kindergartens admitting NCS students are also in the pipeline. In the meantime, the EDB is consulting stakeholders about the implementation details and will finalise the details in April 2014.

On the part of the LD, continuous effort will be made to proactively help ethnic minority job seekers find work, and promote their working abilities to private sector organisations so as to enhance their employment opportunities. The LD will continue to set up special counters in the 12 job centres of the LD to provide job referral services for ethnic minorities; besides, tailor-made briefing will be organised by each job centre once every month to help ethnic minorities understand the local employment market situation and improve job search skills. Ethnic minorities can also meet the employment advisors to obtain advice and customised employment services. The LD will continue to canvass suitable vacancies for ethnic minority job seekers and organise large-scale and district-based job fairs to help them secure employment. The LD will also gauge the views of job seekers, including ethnic minority job seekers, on the employment services of the LD to ensure effectiveness in helping them find work. In 2014-15, 2 large-scale job fairs targeting ethnic minority job seekers and 9 district-based job fairs will be organised to help ethnic minorities find work. Expenditures for providing employment services to ethnic minorities and organising district-based job fairs will be absorbed in the operating costs of the LD, and hence no separate breakdown is identifiable. As for organisation of large-scale job fairs, the estimated expenditure for 2014-15 is \$0.36 million.

In addition, the Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC) will set aside \$4.69 million in 2014-15 for conducting new public education and promotion programmes and studies to promote the messages of inclusion and diversity, fostering social integration and building a caring society. The EOC's preliminary plan is to set up an Ethnic Minority Taskforce which will liaise with relevant government bureaux, schools, stakeholders and service organisations, and will follow up with relevant government bureaux to enhance support for meeting the needs of ethnic minorities in education and employment.

The Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC) is an independent statutory body responsible for the implementation of the Sex Discrimination Ordinance, the Family Status Discrimination Ordinance, the Race Discrimination Ordinance and the Disability Discrimination Ordinance to eliminate discrimination on the grounds of sex, family status, race and disability. All these ordinances bind the Government, and the Government is also committed to using its best endeavours to follow the best practices set out in the Code of Practice against Elimination in Employment on the Ground of Sexual Orientation. Generally speaking, public services

currently provided by the Government are available to all members of the public irrespective of gender, family status, race or sexual orientation.

2. Implementation and review of the above ordinances are the responsibilities of the EOC. The estimated provision earmarked for the EOC in 2014-15 is \$101.4 million.

3. In 2013-14 (as at end of February 2014), the number of complaint cases relating to the above 4 anti-discrimination ordinances received by the EOC is set out below:

We plan to set up a liaison unit in the Northern Region of the Mainland, to be followed by another one in the Eastern Region in the coming two years to strengthen the work of the Beijing Office (BJO) and the Hong Kong Economic and Trade Office in Shanghai (Shanghai ETO).

2. Firstly, we intend to set up a liaison unit under BJO in the Northern Region this year. Having studied the matter, we consider that Shenyang City of Liaoning Province is the preferred location to set up the liaison unit, so as to facilitate Hong Kong residents and enterprises in capitalizing on the opportunities brought about by the rapid development of the Northeast Region.

3. As the next step, we plan to set up a liaison unit in the Eastern Region under Shanghai ETO next year. As the geographical coverage of the office will be adjusted upon the establishment of the Wuhan ETO, we will decide the location of the liaison unit in the Eastern Region in light of the new coverage at a later stage.

4. In 2014-15, we have set aside \$7.18 million under Programme (3) “Mainland and Taiwan Offices” for the establishment of a liaison unit each under BJO and Shanghai ETO, of which \$4.38 million is for meeting recurrent expenditure while \$2.8 million is for meeting the one-off setting up cost. The setting up of these 2 liaison units involve creation of 4 posts, namely 2 Senior Administrative Officer and 2 Trade Officer posts. The establishment of these 2 liaison units will not affect allocation of resources to the other Mainland Offices and the Hong Kong Economic, Trade and Cultural Office in Taiwan.

In 2014-15, the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) will continue to set aside about \$16 million for organising various promotional activities to enhance public awareness and understanding of the Basic Law, including the importance of the Basic Law to Hong Kong's implementation of the principles of "One Country, Two Systems", "Hong Kong people administering Hong Kong" and high degree of autonomy. The focus of our promotional efforts this year will include constitutional development on the basis of the Basic Law.

2. We have been adopting the following 3 promotional strategies:

- (a) using electronic media targeted at the general public, such as Announcement in the Public Interest on television and radio, radio quiz programmes, Internet and smart-phone applications;
- (b) enhancing public awareness and understanding of the Basic Law through promotional activities at the district level, such as roving exhibitions; and
- (c) strengthening co-operation with community organisations in staging promotional



activities, such as seminars and debate competitions, in order to reach a wider audience through their extensive community networks.

3. Besides, the Government has been promoting the Basic Law through civic education, school education and training for civil servants. The Government has also set up the Basic Law Promotion Steering Committee (BLPSC) to provide necessary steer on the overall programme and strategy for promoting the Basic Law. Based on the steer of the BLPSC and its working groups (namely Local Community; Teachers and Students; Civil Servants; Industrial, Commercial and Professional Sectors; and Overseas Community Working Groups), relevant bureaux/departments, including the Home Affairs Bureau, Education Bureau, Civil Service Bureau, Trade and Industry Department and Information Services Department, assist in organising related Basic Law promotional activities in their respective sectors.

Publicity measures include:

(a) broadcasting of Announcements of Public Interest on television, radio and the internet appealing for new registrations; and reminding registered electors to notify the REO of any change of residential addresses and to provide or update their email addresses;

(b) placing advertisements in newspapers, popular websites and mobile applications to encourage new registrations and timely updating of registered particulars by electors;

(c) setting up registration counters at Registration of Persons Offices of the Immigration Department to encourage and facilitate young people applying for or collecting adult identity cards at those Offices as well as other eligible persons to register as electors;

(d) displaying posters in universities, tertiary institutions and secondary schools to appeal to

students who have reached the age of 18 to register as electors;

(e) issuing appeal letters to households which have moved into newly developed housing estates to remind them to update their addresses with the REO or register as electors; and

(f) displaying posters at the advertising light boxes of bus stops over the territory and displaying posters and distributing VR forms at district offices, public housing estate management offices, government departments and social services institutions.

- (d) random sample checks on existing electors;
- (e) checks on addresses with incomplete information, commercial addresses or suspected non-residential addresses;

The operational expenses for the KTDC Ping Shek Constituency by-election and the YTMD King's Park Constituency by-election were about \$600,000 and \$700,000 respectively. Since the SDC South Horizons West Constituency by-election was just held on 23 March 2014 and part of the expenses has not yet been settled, the REO is unable to provide information on the actual expenditure for that by-election. According to the prevailing voter registration (VR) system, the eligibility of voter registration in functional constituencies (FCs) is, in some cases, based on the membership in bodies specified under the Legislative Council Ordinance (Cap. 542). In these cases, for the purposes of verifying the registration eligibility of electors in respective FCs and removing those who are no longer eligible for registration as electors, the Registration and Electoral Office (REO) will seek information on membership from the specified bodies concerned in each VR cycle.

2. According to the current legislation, an amendment or substitution to the constitution of a specified body, which relates to (1) the objects of the body; (2) the criteria and conditions of membership of the body; or (3) the eligibility of members of the body to vote at a general meeting of the body, has to be approved by the Secretary for Constitutional and Mainland Affairs in writing.

3. Starting from the 2012 VR cycle, the REO has written to these specified bodies from time to time to appeal for their support in maintaining a proper and transparent membership administration system so that they can provide timely, up-to-date and accurate membership information to the REO. To sustain these efforts, the Independent Commission Against

Corruption (ICAC) has initiated a new and targeted visit-cum-advisory service programme starting from mid-2013 to further drive home the message of good corporate governance and transparent membership administration. Under the programme, the ICAC will proactively offer advisory service to individual specified bodies to help review and enhance their membership administration, ensure procedural compliance and enhance transparency.

4. In 2014-15, duties relating to VR and related checking work are will be carried out by a team of 92 civil servants (including 6 newly created time-limited civil service posts) and around 200 non-civil service contract staff in the REO. The tasks of this team include, among other things, processing of elector registration applications for FCs, and compilation and publication of the relevant registers of electors. The estimated expenditure on staff cost and the related operational expenses are around \$69 million.

The Registration and Electoral Office will create 75 posts in 2014-15 to commence the early planning work for the election cycle in 2015-17, including review of the overall electoral arrangements and preparation for the 2015 District Council ordinary election. The review will cover relevant electoral legislation, guidelines on election-related activities, venues for use as polling and counting stations, appointment of and training for polling and counting staff, voting procedures and various practical electoral arrangements. The estimated salary expenditure for these posts is around \$35 million.
