Having considered the views received, the Administration proposed introducing a two-year grace period for follow-up formula and prepackaged food for infants and young children. However, given infant formula was the sole source of nutrition for infants, a shorter grace period of 18 months was proposed for infant formula for better protection of infants' health. If the same grace period should be provided across the board, the Administration would only consider proposing a shorter grace period of 18 months for all;</p> <p>(b) the Administration had technical meetings with the trade in the past few months and had exchanged views on the technical guidance notes and testing methods. The Centre for Food Safety ("CFS") would consult the trade on the provisional draft of the technical guidance notes. The finalized guidance notes would be released after the completion of scrutiny of the Amendment Regulation;</p> <p>(c) the Administration noted that many deputations requested for early implementation of the Hong Kong Code and the regulation of health claims of formula products. At the meeting of the Panel on Health Services on 21 July 2014, the Administration had advised that CFS was studying the local and international situations on the use of nutrition and health claims of the formula products concerned and planned to study the regulation of health and nutrition claims. It was hoped that a public consultation would be conducted around</p>	

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		<p>the end of 2014. As for the Hong Kong Code, the Administration would need to refine the draft Code and would announce the modified Hong Kong Code;</p> <p>(d) the Administration had set up the Committee on Promotion of Breastfeeding under the purview of the Food and Health Bureau to oversee and coordinate breastfeeding promoting and supporting activities; and</p> <p>(e) the Administration would enhance breastfeeding support in workplaces and public venues and strengthen publicity and public education on breastfeeding as the best source of nutrition for infants.</p> <p>At the request of the Chairman, the Administration agreed to provide a consolidated written response to deputations' views.</p>	<p>Admin</p>

She took the view that the technical guidance notes should be ready for the trade's reference prior to the completion of the scrutiny of the Amendment Regulation.</p> <p>In response to Dr WONG's question about the length of grace period, Mr Peter SHIU pointed out that small-sized manufacturers/traders would have difficulties in selling out all stock products if the grace period was 18 months as the saleable period of most of the formula products was two to three years.</p>
