Action

Scheduling additional meetings from 14 to 18 July 2015

<u>Mr Albert CHAN</u> pointed out that according to the outcome of the consultation with members regarding the Administration's request for scheduling additional Finance Committee ("FC") meetings between 14 and 18 July 2015, there were equal numbers of members who respectively supported or objected to the holding of additional meetings on some of the dates. He questioned the justification for the Chairman's decision to schedule additional meetings on those dates.

2. <u>The Chairman</u> said that in addition to members' views expressed in the consultation, he had taken into account other relevant factors such as the request by three members that 11 items from FCR(2015-16)29 related to the recommendations of the Public Works Subcommittee ("PWSC") be singled out for separate discussion and voting at the FC meeting. To allow sufficient time for the deliberation of all the outstanding agenda items, he had decided that additional meetings should be held during the above-mentioned period.

Item No. 1 – FCR(2015-16)29 RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PUBLIC WORKS SUBCOMMITTEE MADE ON 16, 24 AND 30 JUNE 2015

3. <u>The Chairman</u> said that the item invited the Committee to approve the recommendations of the PWSC made at its meetings on 16, 24 and 30 June 2015. Mr Albert CHAN, Mr LEUNG Kwok-hung and Mr CHAN Chi-chuen had requested that the items PWSC(2015-16)9, 19, 21, 22, 24, 26, 29, 30, 31, 32 and 33 should be considered and voted on separately at the FC meeting.

4. <u>The Chairman</u> put the remaining items in FCR(2015-16)29 (i.e. PWSC(2015-16)20, 23, 27, 28, 34, 35, 37, 38 and 39) to vote. At the request of Mr LEUNG Kwok-hung, <u>the Chairman</u> ordered a division and the division bell was rung for five minutes. <u>The Chairman</u> announced that 50 members voted for and no member voted against the item. The votes of individual members were as follows –

5. <u>The Chairman</u> declared that the Committee approved the items.

PWSC(2015-16)19

HEAD 703 – BUILDINGS

Environmental Hygiene – Burial grounds, columbaria and crematoria 19NB – Provision of columbarium and garden of remembrance at Tsang Tsui, Tuen Mun

6. <u>The Chairman</u> said that the item invited the Committee to approve the upgrading of 19NB to Category A at an estimated cost of \$2,874.3 million in money-of-the-day prices for the provision of a columbarium and garden of remembrance ("GoR") at Tsang Tsui, Tuen Mun.

Mr CHAN Chi-chuen expressed concern about the transportation 7. arrangements and the traffic impact of the proposed project, in particular during the two peak grave sweeping periods every year. Under Secretary for Food and Health ("USFH") and Acting Chief Traffic Engineer (New Territories West), Transport Department ("Atg CTE(NTW)/TD") advised that a traffic impact assessment ("TIA") study was conducted to assess the traffic impact of the proposed project. The study included the estimated traffic flow induced by the project, the traffic conditions of the new access road and the adjacent road network on peak grave sweeping days and other days. It concluded that the additional vehicular traffic arising from the proposed project would not adversely affect the performance of the key roads in the vicinity of the project site with the implementation of appropriate traffic improvement measures, and special transport, traffic and crowd control arrangements during the peak The Administration had consulted the Tuen Mun District Council periods. ("TMDC") on the project, and had addressed the concerns of TMDC members on traffic issues. TMDC members had no objection to the proposed project.

Motion to adjourn further proceedings of the Committee

8. <u>Mr CHAN Chi-chuen</u> moved, without notice, a motion under paragraph 39 of the FC Procedure that further proceedings of the Committee should then be adjourned. Thereupon <u>the Chairman</u> proposed the question on Mr CHAN Chi-chuen's motion to adjourn. <u>The Chairman</u> directed that a member when speaking on the question might not speak more than once and should not make a speech for longer than three minutes.

9. At the invitation of the Chairman, <u>Mr CHAN Chi-chuen</u> introduced his motion. He expressed grave dissatisfaction against the Administration's request for scheduling additional 14 FC meetings from 14 to 18 July 2015. He pointed out that according to the outcome of the consultation with members, there were equal numbers of members who respectively supported or objected to the holding of additional meetings on some of the above-mentioned dates. He criticized the Chairman's acceding to the Administration's request. He added that he and two other members made the request for separate discussion and voting of 11 PWSC items of the discussion paper FCR(2015-16)29 at the FC meeting only after the Administration had unreasonably requested the scheduling of the additional 14 FC meetings.

10. <u>Mr Gary FAN, Dr Fernando CHEUNG, Mr LEUNG Kwok-hung,</u> <u>Mr SIN Chung-kai, Ms Claudia MO, Ms Emily LAU, Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung,</u> <u>Mr Alan LEONG, Mr WONG Yuk-man, Mr Albert CHAN</u> and <u>Mr LEE</u> <u>Cheuk-yan</u> expressed grave dissatisfaction against the Administration's request for scheduling additional meetings, which they considered a means aimed at Action

forcing the Committee to approve the funding proposal for the establishment of the Innovation and Technology Bureau ("ITB") before the summer recess of the Legislative Council ("LegCo"), and was an act of disrespect to LegCo. <u>Mr Gary FAN</u> expressed support for Mr CHAN Chi-chuen's motion while <u>Dr Fernando CHEUNG</u> indicated that he did not support the motion.

11. In response to Mr James TO's enquiry, <u>the Chairman</u> advised that if the motion to adjourn further proceedings of the Committee was carried, the second and third meetings scheduled for the day would be cancelled. If the motion was negatived, no member would be allowed to move such a motion again in the second and third meetings of the day.

12. <u>Mr WONG Kwok-hing, Mr LEUNG Che-cheung, Dr Elizabeth QUAT,</u> <u>Mr CHAN Han-pan, Mr Steven HO</u> and <u>Dr CHIANG Lai-wan</u> spoke against the motion. They criticized that the adjournment motion was nothing more than a filibustering tactic aimed at procrastinating the funding process of the proposed ITB, and if passed, would defer the Committee's deliberation of the agenda items directly related to the livelihood of Hong Kong people.

13. The Administration did not have comments in response to the motion.

14. At the invitation of the Chairman, <u>Mr CHAN Chi-chuen</u> delivered concluding remarks.

15. <u>The Chairman</u> put to vote Mr CHAN Chi-chuen's motion that further proceedings of the Committee be then adjourned. At the request of Mr CHAN Chi-chuen, <u>the Chairman</u> ordered a division and the division bell was rung for five minutes. Six members voted in favour of and 45 members voted against the motion. The votes of individual members were as follows –

16. <u>The Chairman</u> declared that the motion was negatived.

17. The Committee resumed deliberation on the item PWSC(2015-16)19.

18. Pointing out that there was a large demand for public niches, <u>Mr WONG</u> <u>Kwok-hing</u> expressed support for the proposal and called on members of the opposition camp to stop filibustering the funding proposal.

Transport arrangements for visitors to the columbarium

19. <u>Mr Albert CHAN</u> and <u>Mr CHAN Chi-chuen</u> supported the development of more columbarium facilities to meet the demand for public niches. <u>Mr Albert CHAN</u> enquired about the results of TIA in terms of the estimated maximum number of columbarium visitors during peak hours, as well as the special transport arrangements in grave sweeping periods. He was concerned that the traffic to Lung Kwu Tan Village, which was in the vicinity of the proposed columbarium, would be affected during peak grave sweeping periods.

20. <u>USFH</u> and <u>Atg CTE(NTW)/TD</u> responded that it was estimated that there would be a maximum of 16 000 columbarium visitors during peak hours in grave sweeping periods. Private cars would not be allowed to enter the proposed columbarium during peak grave sweeping periods, and feeder bus services would be provided between the proposed columbarium and the Tuen Mun West Rail Station, the Mass Transit Railway Tsing Yi Station and the Tuen Mun Road Bus-Bus Interchange. The consultants and the Transport Department had confirmed that there was sufficient space to provide pick-up and drop-off areas for feeder bus services at the above three locations during peak grave sweeping periods. The TIA study concluded that the additional vehicular traffic arising from the proposed project would not adversely affect the performance of the key roads in the vicinity of the project site with the implementation of appropriate traffic improvement measures, and special transport, traffic and crowd control arrangements during the peak periods.

Mr CHAN Chi-chuen enquired whether the above estimated maximum 21. number of columbarium visitors had included visitors to the GoR. Principal Assistant Secretary for Food and Health (Food) 2 replied that while the TIA covered the traffic data for the proposed columbarium at Tsang Tsui, the Food and Environmental Hygiene Department and the Transport Department had separate discussions, drawing reference from the number of visitors to other GoRs, and accepted the estimation of maximum number of visitors to the proposed GoR at Tsang Tsui. In response to Mr CHAN Chi-chuen's and Mr Albert HO's queries about the justifications for leaving out the number of visitors to the GoR in the TIA, <u>USFH</u> said that in line with the concept of green burials, the Administration had launched the Internet Memorial Service which provided users the way to pay tribute to the deceased anytime and anywhere Therefore, it was estimated that the number of visitors to GoR they wanted. would be lower than that of columbarium visitors. At the request of the Chairman, the Administration provided copies of the TIA report to Mr Albert CHAN and Mr CHAN Chi-chuen for their reference.

Facilities in the GoR and columbarium building

22. <u>Mr CHAN Chi-chuen</u> sought information on the design and size of the plaques to be mounted on the designated walls in GoR in memory of the deceased, and enquired whether the Administration would consider building more designated walls for mounting of plaques. <u>USFH</u> responded that information on the plaque sample used in the Diamond Hill GoR was provided to PWSC members upon Mr CHAN Chi-chuen's request at the PWSC meeting held on 16 June 2015. The Administration would keep in view the demand for facilities of GoR and consider building more designated walls when necessary.

23. In response to Mr CHAN Chi-chuen's enquiry about the number of niches in the columbarium building, <u>USFH</u> advised that the initial design of the columbarium building involved the provision of 110 000 niches. In response to TMDC's suggestion for the provision of more niches to optimize the use of the site, the Administration had conducted an additional TIA on the basis of housing 160 000 niches, and revised the detailed design accordingly.

Traffic arrangements

24. <u>Dr Fernando CHEUNG</u> and <u>Mr Albert HO</u> were concerned about the access to the proposed columbarium by persons with disabilities and the elderly with mobility problems. They suggested that the Administration should consider allowing access to the columbarium by private cars bearing "Disabled Person's Parking Permit" and private vans carrying columbarium visitors during peak grave sweeping periods. <u>Mr HO</u> pointed out that private vans were more efficient than taxis in terms of the number of passengers they carried. <u>Dr CHEUNG</u> also suggested that the Administration should provide suitable facilities to assist persons with disabilities in paying respect to the deceased.

25. <u>USFH</u> responded that according to the relevant TIA, there would be a large number of visitors to the proposed columbarium during the peak grave sweeping periods. Given the limited space in the facility and to better manage the vehicular and pedestrian flows entering and leaving the facility, the Administration planned to allow entry of franchised buses and taxis only during such periods. Upon completion of the project, the Administration would review the situation in the light of the actual operation and make appropriate traffic arrangements when necessary.

26. <u>Mr Albert CHAN</u> and <u>Mr Albert HO</u> expressed concern about the long term traffic planning of Lung Kwu Tan and the vicinity. <u>Mr CHAN</u> urged the Administration to construct a new road connecting Nim Wan Road to Lau Fau Shan in Yuen Long so as to improve the road network and access to the area. <u>USFH</u> responded that the consultancy studies for the West New Territories landfill extension project would include a feasibility study on connecting Nim Wan Road with Ha Pak Nai. The Administration would brief TMDC and the Yuen Long District Council on the consultancy studies in due course.

27. <u>The Chairman</u> announced that the meeting be adjourned and deliberation on the agenda items would continue at the next meeting after a break of 10 minutes.

28. The meeting was adjourned at 4:29 pm.
