Updated background brief on trade relations between Hong Kong and Taiwan

Purpose

1. This paper provides background information on trade relations between Hong Kong and Taiwan, and a summary of views and concerns expressed by Members during previous discussions on the subject.

Background

- 2. Over the years, Hong Kong and Taiwan have established close economic and trade ties. According to the Administration, Hong Kong and Taiwan was each other's fourth largest trading partner in 2013 with total bilateral merchandise trade amounting to over HK\$339.2 billion. From 2009-2013, the average annual growth rate in bilateral trade between Hong Kong and Taiwan was 10%. For trade in services, Taiwan was Hong Kong's fifth largest trading partner in 2012, with the total value of trade in services reaching HK\$55.9 billion. Taiwan is also a major source of inward direct investment for Hong Kong.
- 3. The Chief Executive (CE) set out in the 2009-2010 Policy Address new strategies for advancing the development of relations between Hong Kong and Taiwan, including the establishment of a new co-operation framework to promote multi-faceted, multi-level exchanges with Taiwan. CE proposed that Hong Kong should play an active role in financial, economic and trade, tourism and other exchanges among the Mainland, Taiwan and Hong Kong.

- 4. With the concerted efforts of the Hong Kong and Taiwan authorities, the Hong Kong-Taiwan Economic and Cultural Co-operation and Promotion Council (ECCPC) and the Hong Kong-Taiwan Business Co-operation Committee (BCC) were established on 1 April 2010. During the past years, the ECCPC and the BCC had worked closely with their respective Taiwan counterparts, namely the Taiwan-Hong Kong Economic and Cultural Co-operation Council (THEC) and the Economic Co-operation Committee under the THEC to promote and deepen co-operation between the two sides in the areas of economic and trade, culture and other areas of mutual interests, to facilitate direct communication on issues relating to bilateral trade and investment, and to foster closer co-operation in trade, investment and tourism.
- 5. Following the Finance Committee's approval, the Hong Kong Economic, Trade and Cultural Office in Taiwan (HKETCO) commenced operation in Taipei in December 2011. It was tasked to promote economic, trade and investment exchanges between Hong Kong and Taiwan, and to foster exchanges in culture, education and other fronts. Since its establishment, the HKETCO had been establishing contacts with the authorities in charge of economic and trade affairs, various economic and trade bodies and Hong Kong businessmen in Taiwan, and handling enquiries relating to Hong Kong-Taiwan economic and trade affairs.

Discussion by the Panel on Commerce and Industry (the Panel)

6. The Panel has followed closely the development on the co-operation between Hong Kong and Taiwan in a number of key areas including trade and investment promotion, tourism, cultural exchanges and co-operation of creative industries, etc. The major views and concerns expressed by members were summarized in the ensuing paragraphs.

Trade promotion

7. To enhance bilateral trade and economic relations between Hong Kong and Taiwan, some Panel members called on the Administration to actively explore the feasibility of establishing a comprehensive framework for economic and trade co-operation between Hong Kong, the Mainland and Taiwan, thereby facilitating the direct export of products manufactured by Hong Kong enterprises in the Mainland to Taiwan. Members noted that the Administration would continue to follow-up with the Taiwan side through the ECCPC-THEC platform with a view to starting substantive discussions on forging a closer economic and trade co-operation arrangement as early as possible.

Some members were concerned that the signing of the Cross-Straits 8. Economic Co-operation Framework Agreement (ECFA) between Taiwan and the Mainland might undermine the intermediary role of Hong Kong as the gateway to the Mainland for Taiwan enterprises. These members called for a new positioning of Hong Kong amid the improved cross-Strait economic co-operation, and urged the Administration to leverage on the combined advantages of the Mainland and Hong Kong Closer Economic Partnership Arrangement and ECFA to achieve greater synergy in tapping the vast business potential of the Taiwan market and developing the Mainland market. urged the Invest Hong Kong and the Hong Kong Trade Development Council to continue to step up their promotional work to facilitate Hong Kong companies' entry into the Taiwan market and encourage Taiwan enterprises to leverage on Hong Kong's service platform to explore business opportunities in both The Administration advised that Hong Kong Mainland and overseas markets. remained an important entrepôt for Cross-Strait indirect trade. HK\$268.5 billion worth of trade between the Mainland and Taiwan was routed through Hong Kong, representing 17.5% of the total trade between the Mainland and Taiwan.

Tourism

- 9. Members called on the Administration to leverage on the commissioning of the Kai Tak Cruise Terminal and step up co-operation with Taiwan tourism authorities in promoting cruise tourism so as to strengthen Hong Kong's position as one of Asia's cruise hubs.
- 10. Members also called on the Taipei Office of the Hong Kong Tourism Board (HKTB) to strengthen co-operation with the local travel trade and media and to ride on the advantages of the free-of-charge online Pre-arrival Registration arrangement for Taiwan visitors to further promote Hong Kong as a tourist destination for Taiwan. Members also suggested the HKTB to step up its promotion work in the second-tier cities in Taiwan (such as Taichung and Kaohsiung) to attract more visitors.

Exchanges and co-operation in key areas

11. Members called for further co-operation between various industries of Hong Kong and Taiwan, including promoting mutual recognition of testing and certification results, as well as promoting Hong Kong's legal services in the areas of arbitration, intellectual property and company law to Taiwan businesses. Members also called on the Administration to strive for the recognition of Hong Kong legal qualifications to enable Hong Kong legal practitioners to practise in Taiwan.

12. On cultural front, the Administration was urged to strengthen cultural exchanges and enhance co-operation with the creative industries sectors in Taiwan to promote Hong Kong's animation, comics and filming industry, which were the flagship of the local creative industries.

Council question

13. In view of the protests in Taiwan against the implementation of the Cross-Strait Agreement on Trade in Services signed by the Mainland and Taiwan, Hon TAM Yiu-chung raised a question at the Council meeting on 7 May 2014 about the impact of the protests in Taiwan on the economic and trade co-operation between Hong Kong and Taiwan.

Latest position

14. The Administration will brief the Panel on 21 October 2014 on the latest developments of the trade relations between Hong Kong and Taiwan, including trade promotion, investment promotion, tourism etc.
