Panel on Food Safety and Environmental Hygiene List of Follow-up Actions

Implementation of the trawl ban

At the Panel meeting held on 9 June 2015, the Government was requested to provide the following supplementary information for Members' reference:

- (a) since the implementation of the trawl ban, the respective number of fishermen who -
 - (i) were engaged in fishing operations in distant waters outside Hong Kong;
 - (ii) took up aquaculture and recreational fisheries in Hong Kong; and
 - (iii) were staying put (i.e. neither engaged in fishing operations in distant waters outside Hong Kong nor switched to aquaculture and recreational fisheries); and
- (b) whether there were support services provided to assist those fishermen affected by the trawl ban who fall outside the above three modes of fishing operations.

Our response is set out in the ensuing paragraphs.

Operators of the some 269 inshore trawlers¹ which used to be engaged in trawling within Hong Kong waters were the group of fishermen most affected by the trawl ban. Since the implementation of the trawl ban, depending on their own choice and individual circumstances, some of them have turned to the Mainland waters to continue their operation while others have switched to alternative modes of operation. Their current mode of operation is as follows²:

Modes of operation		Number
(i)	trawling operations outside Hong Kong waters	127
(ii)	aquaculture and recreational fisheries in Hong Kong	4
(iii)	operations in Hong Kong waters using other fishing methods	32
(iv)	others (who are still in the course of exploring other options or have retired from the industry)	106

The Government has been providing various technical support services, training and credit facilities to assist those affected by the trawl ban to switch to other sustainable modes of fishing operations. Details of the support services have been set out in the paper submitted to the Panel at the meeting on 9 June. Among other things, after the meeting held in June 2015, two more applications made under the \$500 million Sustainable Fisheries Development Fund have been approved, bringing

the number of approved projects to four. These projects are related to aquaculture and recreational fisheries, involving grants of up to \$14 million.
