II. Meeting with deputations and the Administration

2. The Bills Committee deliberated (index of proceedings attached at **Annex**).

3. The Bills Committee received oral representation from 28 deputations on the Bill, and noted ten written submissions from an organization and nine individuals not attending the meeting.

Admin 4. Members noted that the Administration would consult the relevant stakeholders to address the concern of some members of the medical profession on the need to maintain an equal ratio of appointed members and elected members in the Medical Council of Hong Kong ("the Medical Council"); and in consultation with the major patient groups and patient support groups, work out a nomination mechanism for the organizations concerned to nominate certain number of lay persons, say, two lay persons, representing the interests of patients for appointment by the Chief Executive to fill the additional lay member seats of the Medical Council as proposed under the Bill.

Admin 5. The Administration was requested to provide in writing the details, including the implementation timetable, of the additional manpower resources to be provided to the Medical Council Secretariat to strengthen its administrative support to the Medical Council and its committees and sub-committees, in particular the support required of for expediting the process for conducting complaint investigation and disciplinary inquiry concerning the professional misconduct of registered medical practitioners.

6. Members agreed that the next two meetings of the Bills Committee would be held on 19 April 2016 at 8:30 am and 25 April 2016 at 4:30 pm respectively.
