Listen. The ethnic equality is not based on social securities. Instead the discrimination is what we should bury into that abysmal inferno of brutality. We are *abled*; we can work as you do, and it is—but should not be—my colour that took us apart.

When it comes to “racial discrimination”, what you must recall is anything like, Rosa Parks, M. L. King, or a brutal one, Malcolm X, and so on. These are key figures about the racial discrimination, from the American soil to the rest of the world; admittedly, this is an indelible page of American history.

But what about the same page of Hong Kong? Admit it, it's not a part of history. No one has ever noticed such the injustice nearby, but they are only aware of the catastrophe of American Inglorious history, instead of *local* history of inequality!

“Respect, embrace, inclusion.” Making catchphrases is fine, as long as it works. When governing bodies are keeping advertising on inclusion and “anything beneficial” to ethnic minorities, they have never brought anything out when it comes to enforcing equality. Given that Chinese is our primary language,—and you

may think the English is exotic,—we learnt it for joining the circle; however, your reaction has given a message that my effort was in vain.

Report has it that a consensus from cuisine guilds has decided to exclude ethnic minorities from hiring, *with EOC disappeared*; a talented student, Asthma missed her chance of foreign exchange for the refusal of passport issue *without any reason given*, probably her colour; by the way, is your Chinese Proficiency necessary when applying for a hotel front-desk? Has English ceased to be the international sprache?

Hong Kong preaches integration and practices segregation. Nothing to do with Malcolm X's confession, but this is like what Hong Kong today seems to be. The increasing "hatred" towards ethnics minorities is expected by recent reports against asylum seekers. Not distinguishing the asylum and residing ones, their reports have revealed the expression of segregation, stigmatisation, aggravation, and allegation.
