#### Discussion

- 2. <u>The Chairman</u> welcomed representatives of the Administration and academics/experts to the meeting and reminded them that their written submissions and views presented at the meeting would not be covered by the protection and immunity provided under the Legislative Council (Powers and Privileges) Ordinance (Cap. 382).
- 3. <u>The Subcommittee</u> received views from five academics/experts attending the meeting, and noted the written submission provided by an academic/expert who had not attended the meeting (Index of proceedings attached at **Appendix**).

(*Post meeting note:* A written submission from Mr CHOW Sung-ming, Department of Applied Social Sciences, the Hong Kong Polytechnic University (Chinese version only) was issued to members vide LC Paper No. CB(1)430/16-17(01) on 13 January 2017.)

- 4. <u>The Subcommittee</u> noted the following views expressed by academics/experts
  - (a) bazaars were part of Hong Kong's culture and could help diversify local economy and create job opportunities;
  - (b) bazaars provided a venue for non-purposive social interaction which could facilitate the development of social capital, communication network and local culture;
  - (c) bazaars formed an indispensible part of community facilities which could help people fulfill their needs in belongingness, esteem and self-actualization, and develop a low carbon community;
  - (d) bazaars could be regarded as a kind of informal economy that would allow the grass-root people, who were unable to participate in the formal economy, to support their living and shop for basic necessities at affordable prices;
  - (e) bazaars were indeed formed by hawkers and hawkers would share their knowledge and experiences during the selling process;
  - (f) timing was one of the crucial factors for setting up bazaars (e.g. during festive periods like Lunar New Year bazaars and early in the morning like morning bazaars);

- (g) the setting up of bazaars should be initiated by the community rather than determined by the Government, like the Tin Sau Bazaar in Tin Shui Wai which was unsuccessful;
- (h) diversified economic activities could be easily found in the community in the past which allowed grass-root people to make use of the public spaces to support their living; however, economic activities nowadays, particularly those in public rental housing estates, were centralized in shopping arcades and markets monopolized by the Link Real Estate Investment Trust;
- (i) the Government should consider releasing public spaces under the management of the Housing Department or idle sites under the management of the Lands Department for setting up bazaars;
- (j) the Government should consider including the development of bazaars in the Hong Kong Planning Standards and Guidelines; and
- (k) the Government should make reference to the concept of "Regulatory Sandbox" when formulating bazaar policies, in particular in considering issuing more hawker licences and allowing the setting up of bazaars "anywhere except the restricted areas".

#### **Motions**

5. At 5:49 pm, the Chairman informed the Subcommittee that she had received a motion proposed by Dr KWOK Ka-ki and seconded by Dr Fernando CHEUNG. The Chairman considered that the proposed motion directly related to the agenda item. The terms of the motion were as follows –

"本委員會就政府在出席會議,並無預備相關文件及資料,以及問責官員缺席會議,是漠視及不尊重立法會。就此本委員會表示遺憾及予以強烈譴責。"

#### (Translation)

"This Subcommittee regards the fact that relevant papers and information have not been prepared by the Government for the meeting to be attended coupled with the absence of political appointees from the meeting as an instance showing disregard for and disrespect to the Legislative Council. This Subcommittee expresses regret for and strong condemnation of this."

- 6. As the Subcommittee did not have a quorum at the material time, the Chairman requested the Clerk to ring the voting bell for five minutes. A quorum was presented at 5:55 pm. Members agreed to deal with the motion moved by Dr KWOK Ka-ki.
- 7. Upon the Chairman's invitation, <u>Dr KWOK Ka-ki</u> spoke on his motion.
- 8. <u>The Chairman</u> put Dr KWOK Ka-ki's motion to vote. Thirteen members voted for, six members voted against the motion, and no member abstained. <u>The Chairman</u> declared that the motion was passed.

(*Post-meeting note*: The terms of the motion were circulated to members vide LC Paper No. CB(1)426/16-17(01) on 11 January 2017.)

## Follow-up actions to be taken by the Administration

- 9. The Administration was requested to provide information on:
  - (a) progress of implementation of the five hawker management proposals (as listed below) put forward by the Administration to the Subcommittee on Hawker Policy in March 2015;
    - (i) Review the case for issue of new fixed-pitch hawker licences
    - (ii) Enhance the operating environment of existing hawker areas
    - (iii) Consider the issue of new "Dai Pai Tong" licences
    - (iv) Consider converting existing public market with low occupancy into off-street cooked food centre
    - (v) Set up district-led open-air hawker bazaars and night markets
  - (b) the Administration's views on the social roles, positioning and economic benefits of bazaars;
  - (c) the policies and resources of relevant government bureaux and departments (e.g. Food and Health Bureau, Home Affairs Bureau, Commerce and Economic Development Bureau, Lands Department, Housing Department, Leisure and Cultural Services Department, etc.) in facilitating the development of bazaars, such as identifying suitable public open space, including idle sports facilities, for setting up bazaars;

- (d) the Administration's response to the motion passed at the meeting; and
- (e) the Administration's response to the views raised by academics/experts at the meeting and in their submissions.

(*Post-meeting note*: The English version and Chinese version of the Administration's written response was issued vide LC Paper No. CB(1)252/16-17(02) on 6 February and 8 February 2017 respectively.)

Prof MA of LU suggested that the Administration should designate restricted areas where no bazaars were permitted, and allowed parties to set up bazaars in areas except the restricted areas. The Government should also consider issuing more hawker licences.  Mr LEUNG of HKPU remarked that —  (a) according to a report issued by the Indian Government in 2009, hawking was a fundamental human right;  (b) the Administration had not put forward concrete proposals on hawker policies for gauging public views, making it difficult for stakeholders to give views on the subject; and  (c) the number of fixed-pitch hawker licences had decreased substantially in recent years; and the Administration should examine measures to resolve the succession problem of "Dai Pai Tong" licences.
