Submission to the Subcommittee on Children's Rights of the Legislative Council Proposal for establishing a central database for children

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Key concern for the establishment of the central database for children

- A coherent and regular updated database coordinated by a centralised system is crucial for effective follow-up actions.
- A multidimensional measure of child well-being should be adopted (including material well-being, health and safety, educational well-being, family and peer relationships, behaviours and risks and subjective well-being (see <u>UNICEF Innocenti Report Card 7</u>)
- The complex social reality of poverty should be illuminated by using a combined low income and *deprivation* poverty¹.
- An internationally comparable databank should be established to compare how children in Hong Kong fare against children from other advanced economies/cities. Empirical evidence show data gaps for a comparative study of the child well-being in the Pacific Rim², and East and Southeast Asia³.
- Children's views on their lives and well-being should be incorporated (see also <u>The Good Childhood Report 2017</u>, the Children's Society; <u>Children's Worlds</u>; <u>The Australian Child Wellbeing Project</u>).
- Child well-being measure requires age-specific indicators, including early childhood (e.g. <u>Child Trends</u>), middle childhood (e.g. <u>Children's Worlds</u>; <u>The Australian Child Wellbeing Project</u>) and adolescence (e.g. <u>Health Behaviour in School-Aged Children</u>).
