1. Cost Management for Capital Works Projects

At the Panel meeting on 15 October 2015, 18 July 2017 Hon Albert CHAN suggested that the Administration should update the Panel on the current trend of tender prices for the projects under the Capital Works Programme and the projected capital works expenditures for the current and the next financial years.

The Administration will brief the Panel on the cost management initiatives for capital works projects.

 Lifts and Escalators Ordinance (Cap. 618) Commencement Notices under Sections 14, 15, 19, 20, 21, 23, 25 and 26 of Schedule 16 in respect of Recognized Qualifications for Registered Engineer and Registered Worker

The Administration will brief the Panel on the 18 July 2017 arrangement for phasing out the transitional arrangement for recognition of qualifications for registration of registered engineers and registered workers.

3. Revision of Fees and Charges under Mines (Safety) Regulations (Cap. 285B), Dangerous Goods (General) Regulations (Cap. 295B), and (Government Dangerous Goods **Explosives** Depots) Regulations (Cap. 295D) under the Purview of the Civil Engineering and **Development Department**

The Administration will brief the Panel on the proposal of revising 26 out of 27 government fees and charges related to services provided by the Civil Engineering and Development Department in respect of (i) mine blasting, (ii) manufacture, storage and discharge of dangerous goods, and (iii) explosives storage and delivery.

4. Pier Improvement Programme

The Administration will brief members on the Pier 18 July 2017 Improvement Programme, which was announced by Chief Executive in the 2017 Policy Address. The Programme aims to improve a number of remote public piers to facilitate public access to outing destinations and natural heritage. The first phase of the Programme will cover about 10 public piers in the New Territories and the Islands District.

5. PWP Item No. 7804CL — Site Formation and Infrastructure Works for Development at Kam Tin South, Yuen Long — Advance Works

The Administration plans to seek the Panel's support for upgrading the above project to Category A for carrying out the necessary infrastructure works in support of public and private housing developments in Kam Tin South.

6. Safety of drinking water

At the Panel meeting on 18 October 2016, Q3/Q4 of 2017 Dr Hon Helena WONG urged the Administration to update the Panel on the follow-up work on the incident of excess lead found in drinking water. On 30 March 2017, Hon CHAN Han-pan wrote to the Chairman (LC Paper No. 761/16-17(01)) making a similar suggestion.

The Administration will brief Panel members on the progress of the key follow-up work on the incident.

7. Proposed Construction Industry Security of Payment Legislation

An information paper prepared by the Administration Q4 of 2017 on "public consultation on proposed security of payment legislation for the construction industry" (LC Paper No. CB(1)1033/15-16(01)) was circulated to members on 14 June 2016.

The Administration plans to consult Panel members on the framework of the proposed Construction Industry Security of Payment Legislation.

8. Work of the Urban Renewal Authority and review of the Urban Renewal Strategy

On 21 November 2016, Hon SHIU Ka-chun wrote to the Panel Chairman suggesting that the Panel should discuss the implementation and review of the Urban Renewal Strategy ("URS") (LC Paper No. CB(1)165/16-17(01)).

The Administration plans to brief Panel members on the progress of the work of the Urban Renewal Authority and its work plan for the next financial year and the progress of the implementation of URS.

9. Progress report on heritage conservation initiatives

The Administration will update Panel members on Q3/Q4 2017 the progress made on the heritage conservation initiatives since its last report in June 2016, and invite members' views on its future work in this aspect.

10. Raising the construction operations levy threshold Construction Industry under the Council and Construction Workers Ordinance the Registration **Ordinance** from \$1 million to \$3 million

Under the Construction Industry Council Ordinance and the Construction Workers Registration Ordinance, a contractor is liable to payment of levy at a rate of 0.5% and 0.03% respectively to the Construction Industry Council ("CIC") for each construction operation carried out in Hong Kong with a total value exceeding \$1 million. The uniform threshold of \$1 million has remained Taking into account market unchanged since 1985. factors such as inflation over the years, CIC has proposed that the levy threshold should be increased from \$1 million to \$3 million.

11. Amendments to the Building (Minor Works) **Regulation** (Cap. 123N) and other related regulations

The Administration will brief Panel members on the legislative proposals to include more works items under the Minor Works Control System.

	At the Panel meeting on 15 October 2015, Dr Hon Helena WONG suggested that the Panel should follow up with the Administration its harbourfront enhancement initiatives. Dr Hon Kenneth CHAN said that the Administration should brief the Panel on the principles and approaches for planning and developing the waterfront areas in the western part of the Hong Kong Island and those outside Victoria Harbour. Hon Albert CHAN suggested that the Harbourfront Commission should be invited to discuss with the Panel the matters raised by Dr Kenneth CHAN.	To be decided						

16. Quality of Dongjiang water

At the Panel meeting on 15 October 2015, To be decided Dr Hon Helena WONG suggested that the Administration should brief the Panel on the control over the quality of Dongjiang water at source and the measures to deal with excessive lead content in drinking water.

A delegation of the Panel conducted a duty visit to the Dongjiang River Basin on 14 and 15 April 2017.

Seven Panel members visited the Muk Wu Raw Water Pumping Station and Tai Po Water Treatment Works on 22 May 2017 to better understand the treatment of water imported from Dongjiang.

17. Fresh water supply in remote villages

This issue was raised by Hon Alice MAK and Hon TANG Ka-piu in December 2013. Ms MAK and Mr TANG expressed their concerns on the lack of fresh water supply in remote villages in their two joint letters to the Panel Chairman (LC Papers Nos. CB(1)605/13-14(01) and 879/13-14(01)). The Administration's written response has been circulated to members vide LC Paper No. CB(1)732/13-14(01).

At the Panel meeting on 15 October 2015, Hon Alice MAK urged that the Administration should discuss the subject with the Panel as soon as possible.

At the Panel meeting on 18 October 2016, Hon Alice MAK reiterated her request that the Administration should discuss the subject with the Panel as soon as possible. In his letter to the Panel Chairman dated 28 October 2016 (LC Paper No. CB(1)50/16-17(01)), Hon Kenneth LAU suggested that matters related to the supply of fresh water, electricity and sewerage systems to remote villages be discussed by the Panel.

On 7 November 2016, Dr Hon Elizabeth QUAT wrote to the Chairman (LC Paper No. CB(1)87/16-17(01)) to make a similar suggestion.

On 18 April 2017, a paper from the Administration (LC Paper No. CB(1)827/16-17(01)) on treated water supply for remote villages was issued to members.

18. Replacement of aged water mains

On 30 March 2017, Hon CHAN Han-pan wrote to the Chairman (LC Paper No. 761/16-17(01)) suggesting that the above subject be discussed by the Panel. The Administration's written response to Hon CHAN Han-pan's letter has been circulated to members vide LC Paper No. CB(1)896/16-17(01).

19. Developing Hong Kong as a "sponge city"

Hon Kenneth LAU suggested that the above public works projects be discussed by the Panel.

21. Flooding problems in the rural areas

At the Panel meeting on 15 October 2015, To be decided Hon LEUNG Che-cheung suggested that the Administration should discuss with the Panel the measures to prevent flooding in the rural areas, including how to deal with the problems involving private land ownership.

22. Review of the policies on compensation and rehousing for people affected by land resumption

At the Panel meeting on 15 October 2015, To be decided Hon LEUNG Che-cheung opined that the Administration should conduct a review on its existing policies on compensation and rehousing for those affected by resumption of land, and should discuss the matter with the Panel.

At the Panel meeting on 18 October 2016, Hon LAU Kwok-fan said that the Administration should discuss the subject, including the policies on compensation and rehousing for those affected by resumption of industrial sites and open storage sites in the New Territories, with the Panel as soon as possible.

23. Unauthorized building works in New Territories Exempted Houses

At the Panel meeting on 15 October 2015, To be decided Dr Hon KWOK Ka-ki suggested that the Administration should update the Panel on the enforcement actions that had been taken against unauthorized building works in New Territories Exempted Houses and the way forward for dealing with these unauthorized works.

24. Problems arising from sub-divisions of flat units and measures to tackle the problems

meeting between Legislative Council At the To be decided Members and Yau Tsim Mong District Council members on 29 January 2015, the problems arising from sub-divisions of flat units (commonly known as "sub-divided units") and measures to tackle the problems were discussed. Yau Tsim Mong District Council members considered it important for the Administration to step up regulation of "sub-divided units" and suggested that, to enable the Buildings Department and other law enforcement authorities to take effective enforcement actions against irregularities, the Administration should draw up clear definitions in the relevant legislations (such as the Buildings Ordinance (Cap. 123) and the Building Management Ordinance (Cap. 344)) to differentiate "sub-divided units" from "cubicle apartments" and other accommodations.

Legislative Council Members attending the meeting agreed that the issues should be referred to the Panel on Development for consideration and follow-up. The referral memorandum has been circulated to Panel members vide LC Paper No. CB(1)704/14-15(01).

Panel members agreed at the meeting on 28 April 2015 that the subject matter be included in the Panel's "list of outstanding items for discussion", and wished to be briefed on the Administration's latest position on the issues.

25. Mandatory Building Inspection Scheme and Mandatory Window Inspection Scheme

At the Panel meeting on 18 October 2016, To be decided Hon CHAN Han-pan suggested that the Administration should update the Panel on the implementation of the above Schemes.

26. Cycle track sections at Sham Tseng

At the Panel meeting on 15 October 2015, To be decided Hon Michael TIEN suggested that the Administration should update the Panel on the way forward of the planning of the proposed cycle track sections at Sham Tseng.

Note: The Administration has advised that different options of the cycle track alignment and associated details are being reviewed to address the concerns of residents of Sham Tseng. The Coastal Affairs Committee of the Tsuen Wan District Council was consulted on the possible options of the preliminary cycle track alignment within the Tsuen Wan district on 4 January and 3 March 2017. The comments received are being reviewed by the Administration, and further consultation with DC members would be Meetings with the residents concerned required. will then follow. The Administration will arrange to update the Panel in due course after consulting the local residents.

27. Review of the Hong Kong Planning Standards and Guidelines

At the Panel meeting on 15 October 2015, To be decided WONG proposed Hon Helena Dr that the (Note) Administration should discuss with the Panel a review of the above guidelines. On 3 March and 11 April 2016, Hon Alice MAK and

Dr Hon Elizabeth QUAT wrote to the Chairman respectively urging for an early discussion on the subject (LC Paper Nos. CB(1)648/15-16(01) and CB(1)828/15-16(01)). Dr Hon Elizabeth QUAT made the same suggestion on 7 November 2016 (LC Paper No. CB(1)87/16-17(01)).

At the Panel meeting on 18 October 2016, Dr Hon Helena WONG and Hon LAU Kwok-fan urged that the Administration should discuss the item with the Panel as soon as possible. In particular, the Administration should accord priorities to reviewing the planning standards in relation to child care services, kindergarten places, caring services for the elderly, and public open space.

Note: The Administration has advised that the Hong **Standards** Kong Planning and Guidelines ("HKPSG") are a comprehensive and amalgamated set of standards and guidelines covering a wide and diverse range of land uses and facilities, as well as planning and land use related topics to guide reservation of sites for such purposes, cutting across various policy areas and involving vastly different considerations spanning over the purview of many bureaux and departments ("B/Ds"). According to the existing mechanism, topical reviews of specific standards and guidelines in the HKPSG are conducted by individual B/Ds as and when necessary, taking into account the concerned B/Ds' latest relevant policies and development Opportunities would also be taken reauirements. upon such topical reviews to assess the need to review relevant or related standards and guidelines, as well as the planning practices for their The Administration does not *implementation*. consider it necessary or practicable to conduct a review of the whole HKPSG. If revision of existing standards and guidelines or formulation of new

standards and guidelines is considered necessary, it could be taken forward at the request of relevant B/Ds in accordance with the established mechanism. According to the Administration, if Panel members have any question about specific areas of the planning standards and guidelines, the Development Bureau and the Planning Department stand ready to coordinate with the relevant B/Ds to provide specific responses as appropriate.

28. Review of the functions of the Town Planning Board and related issues

At the meeting of the Panel on 14 October 2008, Hon Cyd HO and Hon Abraham SHEK suggested that issues related to the review of the functions of the Town Planning Board, town planning procedures, and secretariat support for the Town Planning Board should be discussed.

Panel members also requested that the Administration should provide information about the details of the basis for determining the various fee items under the Town Planning Ordinance, the estimated costs incurred by the Administration in processing various types of planning applications each year, reconsider extending the fee waiver to all applications relating to "public causes". "public purposes" or "public interest" as a matter of policy, and consult Heung Yee Kuk on the fee items applicable to Small House applications.

On 24 November 2014, Dr Hon Kenneth CHAN wrote to the Chairman suggesting that matters related to amendments to the Town Planning Ordinance, functions of the Town Planning Board, the town planning procedure, etc. be discussed by the Panel as soon as possible. The letter and the Administration's responses circulated were to To be decided (Note)

Note: The Administration has advised that review of the Town Planning Ordinance is not a priority of the Development Bureau and it has not been factored into its current work plan.

29. Small House Policy and rural planning strategy

At the meeting of the Panel on 13 October 2011, To be decided Hon CHAN Kam-lam urged that the Administration should discuss the issues relating to the Small House Policy with the Panel. Hon Albert CHAN proposed the discussion should also cover that the Administration's rural planning strategy.

In the Public Accounts Committee ("PAC") Report No. 61 tabled in the Council on 12 February 2014, PAC urged the Administration to expedite the review of the Small House Policy and recommended that the issue be followed up by the Panel.

Note: The Administration has advised that it was unable to set a definite timetable for completing the review of the Policy due to the complexity of the issues involved.
