

# 立法會行政管理委員會 2016-2017 年度 事務報告

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# 主席回顧

本報告標誌着第六屆立法會開展了 任期的首年。我很榮幸獲選為新一屆立法會主席,並出任立法會行政 管理委員會("行政管理委員會") 主席。

我很高興在此報告,去年是成果豐碩 的一年,隨着多項新措施相繼推行, 行政管理委員會優化了為議員和市民 提供的服務及設施。

行政管理委員會十分着重透過最新資訊科技的應用,優化為議員和市民提供的服務。秘書處已成功重新開發供立法會及其轄下委員會會議使用的電子表決系統,該系統已於第六屆立法會開始時啟用。除了會議廳及一個會議室之外,另外兩個會議室亦已安裝

電子表決系統,以便提供更多設備齊 全的會議場地供委員會使用,從而提 高委員會會議的效率。

第六屆立法會推出了數個網絡應用系 統,既方便議員的工作,亦促進公眾 參與立法會事務。市民及團體代表可 透過網上登記系統登記參加委員會舉 行的公聽會,亦可透過立法會網站提 交意見書。"示明加入委員會及出席 會議和其他活動系統"讓議員在網上 示明擬加入的委員會及擬出席的委員 會會議及活動。議員現時使用"議員 個人利益登記系統"在網上登記個人 利益,以代替以印文本登記個人利 益,同時亦方便公眾在立法會網站查 閱有關紀錄。此外,公眾亦可在立法 會網站透過"議員參與立法會事務紀 錄系統",查閱議員在立法會及其轄 下各委員會會議的出席率。

立法會於 2016 年 10 月推出為期一年的試驗計劃,為出席委員會會議的少數族裔團體代表提供 7 種少數族裔語言(即烏都語、印地語、尼泊爾語、尼泊爾語、印尼語、菲律賓語及旁遮普語)的翻譯/傳譯服務。過去一年,有多個少數族裔團體代表使用有關服務。經檢討後,行政管理委員會決定把為為實力。經檢討後,行政管理委員會決定把為別數族裔團體代表提供的翻譯/傳譯服務轉為常規服務。

由第六屆立法會開始,秘書處的資料研究組發出兩類全新的研究刊物,分別是《數據集》及《數據透視》。《數據集》章集從本地及國際官方來源取得的數據,《數據透視》則着重就委員會正在討論或跟進及範圍廣泛的熱點議題提供主要統計數據。這些刊物讓議員可快速閱覽有關選定課題的基本事實資料,方便議員的工作。

為立法會和市民建立更緊密的聯繫, 以及增進市民對議會工作的認識,一 直是行政管理委員會的首要工作。 立法會設有"與立法會議員暢談"的教 育活動,目的是讓學生有機會與議員 會晤及直接交談。為了豐富該活動的 內容,秘書處在年內推行試驗計劃, 邀請得獎學校於節日期間在立法會綜 合大樓舉行午間音樂表演。表演的學 生會參與由議員帶領的立法會綜合大 樓導賞團。該項計劃廣受議員、秘書 處職員和學校歡迎,每次音樂表演舉 行時,均吸引大批觀眾駐足欣賞。學 校和青年團體在立法會綜合大樓舉行 音樂表演,已成為"與立法會議員暢 談"活動不可或缺的環節。

為紀念香港回歸祖國 20 周年,並藉此提高市民對立法會自 1997年7月1日以來的工作,以及歷屆立法會議員的認識,立法會於2017年7月在立法會綜合大樓地下大堂及立法會圖書館舉行以"回顧與展望"為主題的展覽。展覽除了展示過去 20 年立法

會組成的演變及介紹議會工作外,亦 陳列具歷史價值的圖片、立法會圖書 館及檔案館的特選館藏資料,以及顯 要人物致送的禮品珍藏。展覽亦設有 互動遊戲及藝術裝置"花樹"。展覽十 分成功,吸引到多達約 6 000 名參觀 者。公眾透過是次展覽,有機會重溫 立法機關的歷史發展,並更了解議會 的工作。


行政管理委員會繼續透過利便公眾查閱立法會會議過程及紀錄的措施,提高公開透明度。自 2014 年 3 月 19 日實施立法機關文件及紀錄查閱政策後,截至 2017 年 3 月 31 日,立法會已處理及批准的查閱資料要求共有56 項,被拒絕的查閱要求只有一項。秘書處在立法會網站公布獲批及被拒的查閱資料要求一覽表,方便公眾參閱。

 暢順地處理事務,以及加強秘書處保安人員執行職務時的安全,行政管理委員會在諮詢全體議員後決定,由2016年12月中起,議員的職員不可進入立法會、內務委員會("內委會")及財務委員會("財委會")的會議場地,而每名議員可以有多少名職員在立法會、內委會或財委會會議舉行期間進入會議場地所在樓層,亦設定上限。

行政管理委員會繼續致力為立法會綜合大樓的使用者提供綠色環境。在秘書處的持續努力下,在 2016-2017年度,立法會綜合大樓的用電量減少0.8%,收集作循環再造的廢紙量亦較去年增加 12.5%。秘書處會繼續推行環保措施,以保護環境。

申訴及資源管理部轄下的會計組及人力資源組分別於 2016 年 8 月及2017年2月由立法會綜合大樓遷往位於金鐘道政府合署 23 樓及 2 樓的新辦公室。騰出的辦公室有助紓緩需要在立法會綜合大樓內為立法會及委員會議提供支援的秘書處職員辦工地方不足的情況。行政管理委員會會繼續物色合適的辦公地方,以應付秘書處的辦公地方需求及運作需要。

展望未來,儘管往後要面對的挑戰可 能不會減少,我有信心,在行政管理 委員會各位同事的支持下,加上秘書 處職員竭誠提供的專業服務,行政管 理委員會定能繼續妥善履行職能。



### 立法會行政管理委員會

立法會行政管理委員會("行政管理委員會")是根據《立法會行政管理委員會條例》(第 443 章)成立的法團。該條例於 1994 年 4 月制定,為行政管理委員會及獨立運作的立法會秘書處("秘書處")訂定法律架構,使其在運作上享有行政管理及財政方面的自主權。

行政管理委員會的會議須在行政管理 委員會或主席不時指定的時間及地點 舉行。在 2016-2017 年度,行政管理 委員會舉行了 10 次會議。 行政管理委員會委任了 5 個委員會, 執行若干轉委的職能。這些委員會 是:

- 人事委員會:負責處理聘任及其 他人事安排事官;
- 議員工作開支委員會:負責就處 理議員申領工作開支償還款額的 事官提供意見;
- 設施及服務委員會:負責監督向立法會及秘書處提供服務、辦公地方及設施的事宜,以及處理立法會綜合大樓展示藝術品的相關事宜;
- · 立法會廣場使用事宜委員會: 負責考慮和審批有關使用立法會 廣場的申請,以及在有需要時施 加使用條件;及
- 立法會廣場使用事宜上訴委員 會:負責考慮就立法會廣場使用 事宜委員會的決定而提出的上 訴。

上述 5 個委員會的職權範圍及成員名單載於**附錄 1**。

行政管理委員會透過香港特別行政區 政府周年預算的一個獨立開支總目獲 取撥款,以支援立法會的工作。經常 撥款透過營運開支封套提供,此封套 如需額外資源推行新服務和改善服務,行政管理委員會會在政府每年的資源分配工作中提交撥款申請。政府會根據該等撥款申請本身的理據作出考慮。如有關經常資源的撥款申請獲批,有關撥款會由下一個財政年度起在營運開支封套內提供。

行政管理委員會的帳目須交由審計署署長審核。審計署署長獲授權進行衡工量值式審計,研究行政管理委員會在履行其職能和行使其權力時,使用資源的方式是否合乎經濟原則和是否講求效率與效益。

在 2016-2017 年度,行政管理委員會獲得的撥款淨額為 8 億 7,440 萬元,其中 3 億 450 萬元用以支付議員的酬金及開支償還款額,另 5 億 6,990 萬

元則用以支付秘書處職員的薪酬及一般開支。一如經審計帳目(載於第 22 至 51 頁)所顯示,年度內的赤字為 20 萬元。

#### 立法會秘書處

秘書處在行政管理委員會督導下運作,負責為立法機關提供行政支援及服務。秘書處的使命是為立法會提供高效率的秘書服務、資料研究及行政支援,提高公眾對立法會事務的認識,以及確保提供有效的申訴途徑。

秘書長由行政管理委員會委任,是秘書處的最高行政人員,同時亦是立法會秘書。秘書長須就秘書處的有效行政管理,向行政管理委員會主席負責。

為施行《公共財政條例》(第 2 章)的 條文,秘書長被指定為行政管理委員 會所得撥款的管制人員。

秘書處職員通常按為期 3 年的合約受聘。職員的職級劃分、薪酬及其他服務條款和條件大致上與公務員所適用者相若。職員薪酬包括基本薪金(按適用於擔任相若職位的公務員的薪級表支取薪金)、現金津貼(代替公務員的某些附帶福利),以及約滿酬金。秘書處職員必須以完全政治中立的態度為立法會服務。

行政管理委員會定期考慮秘書處不同職系職員的接任規劃,以及培訓和發展需要。為此,秘書處已成立職員接任委員會,負責制訂職員接任規劃的整體策略。該委員會由秘書長擔任主席,成員包括副秘書長及所有部門主管。秘書處亦為以下職系設立 6 個事業發展小組委員會,以研究有關人員的事業發展需要:

- 議會秘書職系;
- 助理法律顧問職系;
- 翻譯主任及相關職系;
- 資訊服務支援職系;
- 機構傳訊職系;及
- 專業、一般及行政職系。

截至 2017 年 3 月 31 日,秘書處的編制共有 661 個職位。按人數和職級劃分的職員編制詳情載於**附錄 2**。秘書處持續採取措施,促進殘疾人士在秘書處的就業機會。截至 2017 年 3 月 31 日,在秘書處的實際員額中,10 名職員或約 2%為殘疾人士。

秘書處透過下列 10 個部門,為立法 會及其轄下各委員會提供行政支援及 服務:

- 議會事務部 1;
- 議會事務部 2;
- 議會事務部 3;
- 議會事務部 4;
- 法律事務部;

- 資訊服務部;
- 公共資訊部;
- 翻譯及傳譯部;

### 立法會行政管理委員會 2016-2017年度事務

#### 立法會秘書處的服務

#### 議會事務部

為立法會及其轄下各委員會的會議提 供服務的職責由 4 個議會事務部(即議 會事務部 1、2、3 及 4)負責。該 4 個 部門各由一名助理秘書長掌管。為立 法會會議提供服務的工作包括處理質 詢、法案、擬議決議案和議案,以及 法案、擬議決議案和議案的修正案。 為委員會提供的秘書及行政支援服務 包括擬備背景資料簡介、討論文件、 報告及會議紀要,以及整理和分析公 眾意見。該 4 個部門亦為立法會議員 與區議會議員及鄉議局議員舉行的會 議及午餐聚會提供服務。個別議會事 務部會把需要採取跟進行動的事項轉 交相關事務委員會,或在議員與政府 當局舉行的個案會議上處理。該 4 個 部門分別負責的職務載於下文。

#### 議會事務部1

議會事務部 1 為下述委員會提供秘書 及支援服務:財務委員會及其轄下兩 個小組委員會(即工務小組委員會及 人事編制小組委員會)、5 個事務委員 會,以及處理與該等事務委員會的職 權範圍有關的立法建議及政策事宜的 法案委員會和小組委員會。

在 2016 年 4 月 1 日至 2017 年 3 月 31 日期間,該部合共為 221 次會議提供服務。此外,該部亦為 3 次本地職務訪問提供服務。

年內,在上述 221 次會議中,11 次是 為聽取公眾意見而舉行的會議,共有 423 名個別人士及團體代表在席上發 表意見。在資料研究支援方面,該部 在本年內合共擬備了 101 份背景資料 簡介及 10 份討論文件,以利便相關 委員會詳細研究有關議題包括:跨 2030 年的規劃遠景與策略、廢電器判 河套地區港深創新及科技園。此外, 該部在本年報期內合共擬備了 30 份 委員會報告。

#### 議會事務部2

議會事務部 2 為下述委員會提供秘書 及支援服務:內務委員會、7 個事務 委員會,以及處理屬於該等事務委員 會職權範圍的立法建議及政策事宜的 法案委員會和小組委員會。年內,該 部亦為調查梁振英先生與澳洲企業 UGL Limited 所訂協議的事宜專責委 員會提供服務。

在 2016 年 4 月 1 日至 2017 年 3 月 31 日期間,該部合共為 201 次會議提供服務。此外,該部亦為 9 次本地職務訪問提供服務。

年內,在上述 201 次會議中,34 次是 為聽取公眾意見而舉行的會議,共有 1 122 名個別人士及團體代表在席上 發表意見。在資料研究支援方面,該 部在本年報期內合共擬備了 141 份背 景資料簡介及 76 份討論文件。該等 背景資料簡介及討論文件所涵蓋的一 些重要議題包括:規管外籍家庭傭工 職業介紹所;推廣綠色殯葬;檢討 《建築物管理條例》;警方為打擊電 話騙案而採取的措施;私營殘疾人士 院舍的質素和監察;在公共選舉中運 用社交媒體、設立冷靜期及進行選舉 調查所作的規管;在西九文化區興建 香港故宮文化博物館;以及規管醫療 儀器的建議架構。該部亦在本年報期 內合共擬備了 40 份委員會報告。

#### 議會事務部3

議會事務部 3 為立法會會議提供支援服務。在 2016年4月1日至 2017年3月31日期間,該部為 34次立法會

會議(其中兩次是行政長官答問會)提供服務,並處理兩份呈請書、647項質詢、28項法案及116784項就法案提出的修正案(其中112442項是一名議員就《2016年醫生註冊(修訂)條例草案》提出的修正案)、38項擬議決議案、48項議案及101項就議案提出的修正案,以及3項請求立法會給予許可就立法會會議程序提供證據的申請。

該部亦為議員個人利益監察委員會提供服務。年內,該部為議員個人利益 監察委員會的 1 次公開會議及 6 次閉 門會議提供服務,擬備了合共 7 份討 論文件及兩份報告,並推出議員個人 利益網上登記系統供議員在第六屆立 法會開始使用。

在本年報期內,該部亦為根據《議事規則》第 49B(2A)條就譴責鄭松泰議員的議案成立的調查委員會提供服務。調查委員會負責確立根據《議事規則》第 49B(1A)條(取消議員的資務)動議的譴責議案所述的事實,並就所確立的事實是否構成譴責議員的理據提出意見。調查委員會至今舉行了兩次閉門會議,並會在完成調查獲交付的事宜後立即向立法會作出報告。

#### 議會事務部4

議會事務部 4 為下述委員會提供秘書 及支援服務:政府帳目委員會、查閱 在 2016 年 4 月 1 日至 2017 年 3 月 31 日期間,該部合共為 154 次委員會會議提供服務。這些會議包括政府帳目委員會的 6 次公開聆訊,以及其他委員會為聽取公眾意見而舉行的19 次會議,共有 425 名個別人士及團體代表在席上發表意見。此外,該部亦為 10 次本地職務訪問提供服務。

 件的要求,其中 23 項獲得批准。其餘 13 項要求的申請人,經該部與他們釐清其要求或提供他們所要求而在公共領域可取得的資料後,已撤回有關要求。此外,該部協助立法會秘書就是否解封立法機關文件及紀錄進行覆檢,並已解封 23 套已存在超過 20 年的非保密檔案。

在本年報期內,該部繼續統籌製作《香港特別行政區立法會歷史、規則及行事方式參考手冊》("《參考手冊》")。《參考手冊》分為3部分,最後一部分已於2016年6月29日提交立法會省覽。《參考手冊》全文亦已上載立法會網站。

#### 法律事務部

法律顧問除掌管法律事務部外,亦是 立法機關的法律顧問。根據《議事規 則》,立法機關法律顧問的一般職 責,是就關乎立法會的事務或行政的 法律問題,向立法會主席及立法會秘 書提供意見。

#### 公共資訊部

公共資訊部為立法會及議員提供公共 關係意見及傳媒支援服務,並管理電 視廣播系統的運作,確保即時直播立 法會及其轄下委員會的所有公開會 議,同時亦透過教育、訪客及網上服 務,提高市民對立法會工作的認識。

在本年報期內,該部合共發出 237 份有關立法會事務和活動的新聞稿,並為立法會主席、委員會主席及議員安排了 78 次新聞簡報會和訪問。由該部負責拍攝及播放的立法會及其轄下委員會公開會議有 577 次,新聞簡報會有 41 次,總時數達 1 608 小時。該部亦接獲及處理 20 952 項透過電話、傳真及未經預約人士即場提出的查詢,以及 2 232 項電郵查詢。

該部除了把與立法會有關的影片和照片上載至立法會網站外,亦會在社交媒體平台上發布這些資料。在本年報期內,共有 3 070 段有關立法會會議及活動的視像紀錄上載至立法會YouTube 頻道,另有 1 709 幅有關議員官式活動的照片上載至立法會

Flickr 相簿。此外,該部為議員提供 每日網上報章剪輯服務,讓他們知悉 最新的時事報道及公眾對熱門時事的 意見。

年內,該部為議員與來自香港以外地方的貴賓舉行的 20 次會議提供服務。此外,該部為 52 703 名訪客(包括市民和學生)舉辦了 1 873 個教育導賞團。該部亦負責營運紀念品店,店內提供多款特色紀念品和有關立法會的刊物,藉以豐富訪客的體驗。

在教育活動方面,該部為學生舉辦了 811 個有關立法會工作的角色扮演環 節,並為幼童舉辦了 282 個講故事環 節。該部向青年機構提供支援,協助 有關機構在立法會綜合大樓舉行模擬 立法會辯論,而在本年報期內,該部 合共舉辦了 7 場辯論及 4 個培訓工作 坊。該部舉辦的"與立法會議員暢談" 活動,讓學生與議員就有關立法會工 作的話題及計會議題進行討論。為了 豐富"與立法會議員暢談"活動的內 容,該部推出試驗計劃,讓學校音樂 團體在立法會綜合大樓舉行午間音樂 表演。該部合共為 466 名學生及 25 名議員舉辦了 22 個暢談環節,包 括首場音樂表演。該部亦統籌暑期實 習計劃,安排 26 名專上院校學生到 秘書處不同部門實習,讓他們了解為 立法會提供的支援服務。

年內,該部重新設計位於立法會綜合 大樓地下大堂的展覽區,以充實展覽 內容,以及為訪客提供資訊更豐富的 體驗。立法會網站的"教育服務"一欄 亦已革新,以提供更完備和簡便易用 的資訊。

#### 資訊服務部

資訊服務部透過轄下的資料研究組、 立法會圖書館及檔案館,為立法會、 各委員會、議員和議員職員及秘書處 職員提供資訊服務。

資料研究組進行研究及資料搜尋工 作,並就各專題及議員關注的其他範 疇擬備文件。資料研究組為第五屆立 法會編製的刊物包括研究報告、資料 摘要、資料便覽、研究簡報及資訊述 要。研究報告根據海外經驗,詳盡分 析所研究的廣泛政策事宜。 資料摘要 就選定的關注議題進行聚焦研究。資 料便覽是較簡短的研究文件,當中載 有事實資料及數據。 研究簡報定期發 出,以簡明扼要的方式闡述議員感興 趣或關注的事項,資訊述要則是定期 發出的簡短研究文件,重點述明某議 題的要點。由 2016 年 10 月第六屆立 法會開始,資料研究組推出兩類全新 的刊物,分別是數據集和數據透視, 讓議員可快速閱覽有關選定課題的基 本事實資料。*數據集*彙集從本地及國 際官方來源取得的數據,數據透視則

着重就範圍廣泛的熱點議題提供主要 統計數據。

在本年報期內,資料研究組合共發表了 10 份資料摘要、19 份資料便覽、5 份研究簡報、21 份資訊述要、4 份數據集及 23 份數據透視。主要研究的課題一覽表載於**附錄 4**。

立法會圖書館透過其立法會紀錄館藏,以及憲制館藏、《基本法》館藏及一般參考資料,提供參考資料支援。立法會圖書館為憲制圖書館,截至 2017 年 3 月,館內的憲制及議會館藏達 25 684 項,相等於總藏書量的52%。圖書館亦出版兩份月刊,名為《時訊·新知—海外政策報告》及《時訊·新知—議會動向》,讓員知悉選定海外地方的最新政策文件、主要研訊報告、重要立法及財務建議,以及議會程序的轉變。

年內,圖書館的訪客人次為 9 340。 書籍查閱次數為 3 924 次,所處理的 查詢數目達 1 267 項。圖書館亦進行 了 50 項檢索工作。

圖書館亦負責管理立法會網站。在本年報期內,立法會網站的瀏覽人次為860萬,瀏覽頁次為1億2,060萬。自2016年7月起,圖書館訂閱了社交媒體資訊服務,讓議員和職員知悉社交媒體網站就不同熱點議題所作的討論。適逢香港回歸祖國20周年,

圖書館於 2017 年 7 月舉行以"回顧與展望"為主題的展覽,陳列了香港以外地方的顯要人物及其他議會機構致送的特選紀念品、議員撰寫的書籍、具有永久保留價值的檔案,以及記載這段時期所發生的大事的檔案。參觀者亦可了解有關立法會及委員會會議的規則及程序。

立法會檔案館負責挑選、蒐集和活員資歷史、商人工 () 的珍貴權案及材料。館內亦參考當案及對提供的人工 () 的過程 () 的過程

年內,檔案館為 617 名訪客舉辦 16 次參觀活動,答覆 1 094 項有關參考資料及研究的查詢,處理 10 項查閱資料要求,並覆檢 23 個已屆期限的歷史檔案以供公眾查閱。在5 085 個已達銷毀期限的檔案中,2 098 個共 80 直線米的檔案已被鑒定具歷史價值而須作永久保存,2 987 個檔案則獲授權銷毀。

檔案館亦建立了一個名為"立法機關歷 史檔案目錄"的新電子系統,提供便捷 的途徑,以供在網上搜尋及預約查閱 立法會檔案館的歷史檔案。該系統已 於 2015 年年中在立法會網站推出, 檔案館會繼續致力提升該系統的效 能。

#### 翻譯及傳譯部

翻譯及傳譯部為立法會及其轄下各委員會提供翻譯、傳譯及中文謄錄服務。

該部負責編製《立法會會議過程正式 紀錄》("正式紀錄"),又稱"立法會議 事錄",是立法會會議過程的逐字紀錄 本。該部會首先發布按議員發言時所 使用的語言編製的正式紀錄(即場紀錄 本),然後將之翻譯成中文及英文兩個 版本。正式紀錄的即場紀錄本及翻譯 本均可在立法會網站閱覽。該部為立 法會在本年報期內舉行的 34 次會議 編製了 10 133 頁正式紀錄的即場紀錄 本。即場紀錄本經整理及翻譯後,英 文本共有 12 832 頁,中文本共有 9 315 頁。該部持續致力確保立法會 議事錄的草擬本、確定本及翻譯本可 按照服務承諾,分別於3、7及24個 工作天內準時發出。

該部亦負責翻譯質詢、議案、委員會 文件、會議紀要及立法會其他文件。 年內,該部的翻譯總字數達 11 696 685 字。該部繼續透過精簡工作流程、有效運用資訊科技及以匯集人手的安排更靈活調配職員,致力提高工作效率和生產力。

英語、粵語及普通話即時傳譯是為立 法會及其轄下委員會所有會議提供的 常規服務,有關服務由該部負責監 督。由於合資格的手語即時傳譯員人 手供應不足,現時只有立法會會議有 提供手語即時傳譯服務。當市場上有 更多手語即時傳譯員時,該項服務將 擴展至委員會會議。

該部自第六屆立法會起推行試驗計劃,按需要為在委員會會議上作口頭陳述的團體代表及個別人士,提供7種少數族裔語言的即場翻譯服務,包括由英文或中文譯成少數族裔語言,或反之由少數族裔語言譯成英文或中文。該部會在有關服務推行一年後進行檢討。

#### 申訴及資源管理部

申訴及資源管理部包括公共申訴辦事處、會計組及人力資源組。

公共申訴辦事處負責向議員提供支援 服務,以處理市民透過立法會申訴制 度提出的申訴和意見。該辦事處協助 議員處理個案,以期使申訴事項得以 解決,以及找出政府政策及辦事程序 須予改善之處。該辦事處的工作包括 與申訴團體/個別市民會面和通信、 審視申訴人提出的個案、與政府當局 及相關公營機構溝通、協助議員決定 應採取的適當行動,以及為當值議員 與申訴團體的會晤、值勤議員與個關 公營機構舉行的個案會議及就該辦事 處所處理的個案進行的實地視察提供 服務。在本年報期內,該辦事處協助 議員處理的個案達 4 409 宗,其中 174宗個案由團體提出,4 235 宗由個 別人士提出。

人力資源組負責制訂及推行人力資源 策略,透過吸納、激勵及挽留人才, 應付各項服務需求。該組亦負責安 培訓及發展計劃,確保秘書處職員具 備所需的技能及專業知識,持續為議 員及立法會提供有效支援。此外,利 員及立法會提供有效支援。此外,利 組負責監督與職員關係及職員福利有 關的事務,並一直致力加強職員與管 理層之間的溝通。該組亦協助為行政 管理委員會轄下的人事委員會提供服 務。

年內,該組合共進行了 28 次招聘工作(包括公開及內部招聘),共有 41 名新職員及 22 名在職職員獲聘任或晉升。此外,該組舉辦了 38 個內部培訓工作坊,出席的職員共有 1 398 人次出席的職員共有 1 398 人次,另安排職員參加了 11 個外地培訓計劃。該組亦安排職員參加由公務員培訓處及其他本地培訓機構舉辦的培訓課程,共有 578 人次出席。這些培訓活動着重培育職員的專業知識的培訓活動着重培育職員的專業知識的培訓活動着重培育職員的專業知識的提升工作效率,以及促進職業安全及健康。

#### 總務部

總務部包括一般行政組、物業及保安 組和資訊科技組。一般行政組為行政 管理委員會及其轄下委員會提供秘書 服務,並為秘書處其他部門提供內部 行政支援。在本年報期內,該部為行 政管理委員會的 10 次會議提供服 務。

一般行政組提供文件收發服務,為秘書處所有部門提供採購及物料供應服務,以及在會議及議會聯繫活動舉行期間為議員提供管事及膳食服務。該組亦監督在立法會綜合大樓內進行的新造及改善工程和實施的環保措施。

該組亦負責為議員辦事處及秘書處職員提供辦公地方,包括與政府當局聯絡,為秘書處物色合適的辦公地方不由於立法會綜合大樓辦公地方不足的翻譯及傳譯部和資料研究組職員會對於金鐘道政府合署 46 樓。在本年報期內,會計組及人力資源組內之一。 遷往政府當局去年在金鐘道政府合署 2 樓及 23 樓為行政管理委員會提供的新辦公室。

物業及保安組負責在立法會綜合大樓 提供物業管理和樓宇及會議保安服 務。該組與政府部門及承建商保持密 切聯繫,確保立法會綜合大樓結構穩 妥,樓宇裝備運作良好。該組按照相 關法例及行政管理委員會發出的指示 及指引執行職務,確保立法會綜合大 樓、議員及立法會綜合大樓其他使用 者安全。

行政管理委員會致力並銳意提升立法 會綜合大樓的保安,以確保立法會的 運作不受阻礙及干擾,同時保持立法 會綜合大樓為一個開放和歡迎市民的 地方。經進行檢討及諮詢全體議員 後,行政管理委員會於 2016 年 12 月 中起就會議場地及會議樓層的出入管 理實施新安排。

資訊科技組為議員、議員職員及秘書 處職員提供資訊科技服務,並為立法 會及其轄下委員會的會議提供支援。 年內,該組推行了數個大型資訊科技 項目,包括革新電子表決系統和提升無線電通訊系統,以及優化撥款條例草案委員會審議階段修正案系統及財務委員會特別會議質詢輸入系統。多個行政系統(包括人力資源管理資料系統及例假申請系統)的優化工作,亦相繼完成。

### 就議員申領工作開支償還款額進行 審計監察

為提高議員申請發還因履行立法會職務而支付的工作開支的問責性和透明度,行政管理委員會委聘了一家獨立的審計師事務所,在議員辦事處進行審計。此項審計工作的主要目的,是確保議員的申請符合《立法會議員申請發還工作開支的指引》("《發還開

支指引》")中有關利益衝突及申報利益的條文。

涵蓋 2015-2016 發還工作開支年度(由 2015 年 10 月 1 日起至 2016 年 9 月 30 日止)的審計報告已於 2017 年 4 月提交行政管理委員會。報告載述,在所有重大方面上,該審計師事務所並未發現立法會議員就發還工作開支的申請違背了《發還開支指引》對有關利益衝突及利益申報的要求。按照行政管理委員會的指示,審計報告已存放於立法會圖書館,供市民查閱。

### 環境保護

秘書處致力在處理事務及運作時顧及對環境的影響,並會繼續致力採取秘書長提交的 2016-2017 年度環境保護報告(載於**附錄** 5)所載的一系列環保措施,以保護環境。

在本年報期內,秘書處繼續致力控制用電量及用紙量。與上一年度相比,立法會綜合大樓在 2016 年 4 月 1 日至 2017 年 3 月 31 日期間的用電量減少 0.8%。雖然用紙量輕微增加 0.6%,但收集作循環再造的廢紙量則較去年增加 12.5%。

繼完成立法會綜合大樓由 2013 年 4月1日至 2014年3月31日期間的 碳審計後,秘書處委聘顧問為立法會 綜合大樓進行年度碳審計,涵蓋2014-2015 至 2018-2019 年度。立法會綜合大樓由 2015 年 4 月 1 日至2016 年 3 月 31 日期間的碳審計報告顯示,大部分排放源的排放量均有不同程度的減幅,而立法會綜合大樓在2015-2016 年度的溫室氣體排放強度與 2013-2014 年度的基準年相比,亦減少了 2.2%。秘書處會跟進顧問的建議。

行政管理委員會於 2015 年 12 月參與 由環境局推出的《惜物·有"計"》約 章計劃。該計劃旨在集結各界在減廢 方面的動力,以便為日後實施都市固 體廢物收費作準備。行政管理委員會 作為約章的簽署機構,承諾會定期量 度立法會綜合大樓的廢物棄置及回收 量;盡力減少廢物,並回收可回收物 品;以及協助向公眾推廣惜物減廢。 為提高立法會綜合大樓使用者的減廢 意識,秘書處定期發布處理一般廢物 及源頭減廢的小貼士,亦增設了收集 可回收物品的設施(例如玻璃樽回收 箱)。約章計劃已於 2017 年 2 月圓滿 結束,行政管理委員會獲頒"至出力減 廢先鋒大獎一良好級別",以表揚其積 極推行有關減廢的宣傳和教育活動。

### 職員諮詢委員會

職員諮詢委員會的成員包括由秘書處 各職系(即議會秘書職系、助理法律顧 問職系、翻譯主任及相關職系、資訊 服務支援職系、機構傳訊職系,以及專業、一般及行政職系)推選的 23 名代表。職員諮詢委員會提供途徑,讓職員就影響他們的事宜直接向主持會議的秘書長提出意見。

年內,該委員會舉行了 4 次會議。透過各代表表達的意見,主要是關於服務條件、僱員權益、工作環境、員工福利等。職員提出的意見及建議由有關部門跟進。

#### 職員聯誼會

職員聯誼會的成立旨在增進秘書處職員之間的情誼和相互支持。在2016-2017年度,該會曾舉辦周年聖誕聯歡會,該活動讓職員可暫時擱下工作共進午餐,歡度佳節。該會在年內亦舉辦了多個興趣班,例如太極班、流動保鮮花瓶製作班等。

### 獨立審計師報告 致立法會行政管理委員會

#### 意見

我已審計列載於第22至51頁立法會行政管理委員會的財務報表,該等財務報表包括於2017年3月31日的資產負債表與截至該日止年度的收支結算表、全面收益表、累積基金變動表和現金流量表,以及財務報表的附註,包括主要會計政策概要。

我認為,該等財務報表已按照香港會計師公會頒布的《香港財務報告準則》真實而公平地反映立法會行政管理委員會於2017年3月31日的財務狀況及截至該日止年度的財務表現及現金流量,並已按照《立法會行政管理委員會條例》(第443章)第13(3)(a)條妥為擬備。

#### 意見的基礎

我已按照《立法會行政管理委員會條例》第13(3)(b)及13(4)條、《核數條例》(第122章)第15(1)(a)條及審計署的審計準則進行審計。我根據該等準則而須承擔的責任,詳載於本報告「審計師就財務報表審計而須承擔的責任」部分。根據該等準則,我獨立於立法會行政管理委員會,並已按該等準則履行其他道德責任。我相信,我所獲得的審計憑證是充足和適當地為我的審計意見提供基礎。

#### 立法會行政管理委員會就財務報表而須承擔的責任

立法會行政管理委員會須負責按照香港會計師公會頒布的《香港財務報告準則》及《立法會行政管理委員會條例》第13(3)(a)條擬備真實而公平的財務報表,及落實其認為必要的內部控制,使財務報表不存有因欺詐或錯誤而導致的重大錯誤陳述。

在擬備財務報表時,立法會行政管理委員會須負責評估其持續經營的能力,以及在適用情況下披露與持續經營有關的事項,並以持續經營作為會計基礎。

#### 審計師就財務報表審計而須承擔的責任

我的目標是就整體財務報表是否不存有任何因欺詐或錯誤而導致的重大錯誤陳述取得合理保證,並發出包括我意見的審計師報告。合理保證是高水平的保證,但不能確保按審計署審計準則進行的審計定能發現所存有的任何重大錯誤陳述。錯誤陳述可以由欺詐或錯誤引起,如果合理預期它們個別或滙總起來可能影響財務報表使用者所作出的經濟決定,則會被視作重大錯誤陳述。

在根據審計署審計準則進行審計的過程中,我會運用專業判斷並秉持專業懷疑態度。我亦會:

- 一 識別和評估因欺詐或錯誤而導致財務報表存有重大錯誤陳述的風險;設計及執行審計程序以應對這些風險;以及取得充足和適當的審計憑證,作為我意見的基礎。由於欺詐可能涉及串謀、偽造、蓄意遺漏、虛假陳述,或凌駕內部控制的情況,因此未能發現因欺詐而導致重大錯誤陳述的風險,較未能發現因錯誤而導致者為高;
- 一 了解與審計相關的內部控制,以設計適當的審計程序。然而,此舉並非旨在對立法會行政管理委員會內部控制的有效性發表意見;
- 一 評價立法會行政管理委員會所採用的會計政策是否恰當,以及其 作出的會計估計和相關資料披露是否合理;
- 一 判定立法會行政管理委員會以持續經營作為會計基礎的做法是否 恰當,並根據所得的審計憑證,判定是否存在與事件或情況有 關,而且可能對立法會行政管理委員會持續經營的能力構成重大 疑慮的重大不確定性。如果我認為存在重大不確定性,則有必要 在審計師報告中請使用者留意財務報表中的相關資料披露。假若 所披露的相關資料不足,我便須發出非無保留意見的審計師報 告。我的結論是基於截至審計師報告日止所取得的審計憑證。然 而,未來事件或情況可能導致立法會行政管理委員會不能繼續持 續經營;及

一 評價財務報表的整體列報方式、結構和內容,包括披露資料,以及財務報表是否公允反映交易和事項。

## 財務報表附註

#### 1 總論

立法會行政管理委員會("行政管理委員會")根據《立法會行政管理委員會條例》 (第 443 章)成立,是一個財政及行政自主的法團。行政管理委員會透過立法會秘書處,為香港特別行政區("香港特區")立法會提供行政支援及服務。

#### 2 主要會計政策

#### 2.1 符合準則聲明

本財務報表是按照香港公認的會計原則及所有適用的香港財務報告準則(此詞是統稱,當中包括香港會計師公會頒布的所有適用的個別香港財務報告準則、香港會計準則及詮釋)編製。行政管理委員會採納的主要會計政策摘要如下。

#### 2.2 財務報表的編製基礎

除可供出售證券(附註 2.3.2.3)是以公平值列帳(闡釋見於下述的會計政策)外,本財務報表的編製基礎均以原值成本法計量。

編製符合香港財務報告準則的財務報表需要管理層作出判斷、估計及假設。該等判斷、估計及假設會影響會計政策的實施,以及資產與負債和收入與支出的呈報款額。該等估計及相關的假設,均按經驗及其他在當時情況下被認為合適的因素而制訂。倘若沒有其他現成數據可供參考,則會採用該等估計及假設作為判斷有關資產及負債的帳面值的基礎。估計結果或會與實際價值有所不同。

#### 2.2.1 會計判斷及估計

行政管理委員會會持續檢討該等估計及其所依據的假設。如修訂會計估計只會影響當年的會計期,會在當年的會計期內確認有關修訂;如修訂會影響當年及未來的會計期,則會在當年及未來的會計期內確認有關修訂。

行政管理委員會在實施會計政策方面並不涉及任何影響重大的會計判斷。無論現時 對未來作出的假設,或在結算日估計過程中所存在的不明朗因素,皆不足以構成重 大風險,導致資產和負債的帳面金額在來年大幅修訂。

#### 2.3 金融資產及金融負債

#### 2.3.1 初始確認

行政管理委員會會按起初取得資產或引致負債的目的將金融資產及金融負債作下列 分類:貸出款項及應收帳款、持至期滿的證券、可供出售證券及其他金融負債。

金融資產及金融負債最初按公平值計量,公平值通常相等於成交價加上直接交易 成本。

行政管理委員會在成為任何金融工具的合約其中一方之日,會確認有關金融資產及金融負債。常規買賣(即須於法規或市場慣例所設定的時間內交付資產的買賣)的金融資產於交易日確認。

#### 2.3.2 分類

#### 2.3.2.1 貸出款項及應收帳款

貸出款項及應收帳款為非衍生金融資產,它們具有固定或可以確定的金額,但在活躍市場並沒有報價,而行政管理委員會亦無意將之持有作買賣用途。此類別包括預支予立法會議員("議員")的營運資金、應收帳款、銀行存款及銀行結存。

在初始確認後的每個結算日,貸出款項及應收帳款採用實際利率法計算攤銷成本值,經扣除任何減值虧損(如有的話)後列帳(附註 2.3.6)。實際利率是指可將金融工具在預計期限(或適用的較短期間)內的預計現金收支,折現成該金融資產或金融負債的帳面淨值所適用的利率。行政管理委員會在計算實際利率時,會考慮金融工具的所有合約條款以估計現金流量,但不會計及日後的信貸虧損。有關計算包括與實際利率息息相關的所有收取自或支付予合約各方的費用,交易成本及所有其他溢價或折讓。

#### 2.3.2.2 持至期滿的證券

持至期滿的證券為非衍生金融資產。該等證券具有固定或可以確定的金額及有固定 到期日,而且行政管理委員會有明確意向及能力將之持有直至到期日,惟符合貸出 款項及應收帳款定義的金融資產則除外。

在初始確認後的每個結算日,持至期滿的證券採用實際利率法計算攤銷成本值,經 扣除任何減值虧損(如有的話)後列帳(附註 2.3.6)。

#### 2.3.2.3 可供出售證券

可供出售證券為指定可供出售或沒有被列入上述任何其他分類的非衍生證券,包括沒有指定持有期限,但可能會因應流動資金需求或市場環境變化而出售的證券。

在初始確認後的每個結算日,可供出售證券按公平值列帳。公平值變動所產生的未 實現損益在其他全面收益內確認,並分錄於投資重估儲備內。外幣換算所產生的損 益則在收支結算表內確認。

出售可供出售證券損益包括出售所得淨額與帳面值的差額,以及從投資重估儲備撥 入收支結算表的累計公平值調整數額。

#### 2.3.2.4 其他金融負債

其他金融負債採用實際利率法得出攤銷成本值後列帳。

#### 2.3.3 公平值計量原則

行政管理委員會於每個結算日按公平值計量若干金融工具,而按攤銷成本值計量的 金融工具的公平值則在附註 17.2 披露。 公平值指市場參與者在計量日有秩序地交易時,就出售資產或轉讓負債所收取或支付的價格。計量公平值時,會假定出售資產或轉讓負債的交易在下述其中一種情況下進行:(a)在有關資產或負債的主要市場進行,或(b)如沒有主要市場,則在對有關資產或負債最為有利的市場進行;而行政管理委員會於計量日能參與此等市場。

計量資產或負債的公平值所用的假設是市場參與者為該等資產或負債定價時所用的假設,並假設市場參與者會以最符合其經濟利益的方式行事。

行政管理委員會在計量公平值時,會按情況採用適合和具充分數據的估值方法,盡可能運用相關可觀察到的參數,並盡量少用不可觀察到的參數。

行政管理委員會按以下公平值等級劃分計量所得的公平值,有關等級反映計量時所 用重要參數的類別:

- 第1級 金融工具的公平值為相同的金融工具在交投活躍的市場上的報 價(未經調整);
- 第 2 級 金融工具的公平值按與該金融工具有關而可觀察到的參數釐 定,當中包括可直接觀察到的參數(價格)及不可直接觀察到的參 數(引申自價格),但不包括第 1 級所運用的報價;及

就經常於財務報表中確認的資產及負債,行政管理委員會於結算日透過重新評估分類(根據對整體公平值計量而言屬最重要及相關的參數等級作出),決定財務報表中各等級之公平值應否作出轉撥。

#### 2.3.4 註銷確認

當從金融資產收取現金流的合約權屆滿時,或已轉讓該金融資產及其絕大部分風險和回報的擁有權,該金融資產會被註銷。

行政管理委員會在註銷金融資產時採用加權平均法決定須於收支結算表內確認的已 實現損益。

當合約指明的債務被解除或取消,或到期時,該金融負債會被註銷。

#### 2.3.5 對銷

當行政管理委員會在法律上有權強制對銷某些金融資產及金融負債所涉及的已確認金額,而行政管理委員會亦有意以淨額結算或準備同時變現資產和償付債務,有關金融資產及金融負債會作對銷,以淨金額列入資產負債表內。

#### 2.3.6 金融資產減值

貸出款項及應收帳款、持至期滿的證券及可供出售證券的帳面值會在每個結算日作出評估,以確定是否有客觀的減值證據。

若有客觀證據證實貸出款項及應收帳款或持至期滿的證券出現減值虧損,虧損會在 收支結算表內確認,虧損額為該資產的帳面值與按其在初始確認時的實際利率所計 算的預期未來現金流折現值之間的差額。如其後減值虧損降低,並能客觀地證實與 確認減值虧損後出現的事件相關,則該減值虧損會在收支結算表內回撥。

若有客觀證據證實可供出售證券出現減值虧損,即使有關的金融資產並未註銷,以往記錄在投資重估儲備內的相關累計虧損,會從投資重估儲備轉撥往收支結算表內確認。累計虧損額為購入價與減值時的公平值之間的差額,而差額會扣除以往在收支結算表內就該金融資產所確認的任何減值虧損。如可供出售債務證券的公平值其後有所增加,並能客觀地證實與確認減值虧損後出現的事件相關,則該等投資的減值虧損會作出回撥。就可供出售股票及交易所買賣基金而言,以往在收支結算表內確認的減值虧損,不會經其後的收支結算表回撥,而是將其後增加的公平值在其他全面收益內確認,並在投資重估儲備內記錄。

#### 2.4 紀念品存貨

立法會綜合大樓設有紀念品店。

紀念品存貨以成本值及淨實現價值兩者中的較低者列出。成本值由紀念品的設計費、模具費及其他製作費組成,並以加權平均法計算。淨實現價值是在一般業務運作下預計的售價,減去預計完工時的成本和為出售該紀念品所需的預計費用。

#### 2.5 固定資產

- 2.5.1 固定資產的計量
- 2.5.1.1 預計使用年期超逾一年的固定資產項目均予以資本化,但所費少於 3,000 元的項目 則即時支銷。
- 2.5.1.2 藝術品以成本值扣除減值虧損(如有的話)(附註 2.5.3)後在資產負債表上以資本項目形式予以確認。該等藝術品不予折舊或重估。
- 2.5.1.3 其他固定資產以成本值扣除累計折舊及減值虧損(如有的話)(附註 2.5.3)後列出。折舊 額的計算方式,是將固定資產的成本值減去預計剩餘價值,然後按預計可用年期以 直線法逐年攤銷。各項固定資產的預計可用年期如下:
  - 家具及固定裝置 10年
  - 車輛及辦公室設備 5年
  - 電腦及軟件 3年

尚在進行的工程不予折舊。

#### 2.5.2 固定資產的註銷確認

當固定資產被出售或預期其使用或出售不再產生任何經濟利益時,該固定資產的帳面值即被註銷確認。

出售固定資產的損益以出售所得淨額與資產的帳面值之間的差額來決定,並於出售時在收支結算表內確認。

#### 2.5.3 固定資產的減值

固定資產的帳面值在每個結算日評估,以確定有否出現減值跡象。倘出現減值跡象,並當資產的帳面值高於其可收回數額時,則有關減值虧損會在收支結算表內確認。資產的可收回數額為其公平值減出售成本後的數值與使用值兩者中的較高者。

#### 2.6 等同現金項目

就現金流量表而言,等同現金項目包括銀行結存及原有期限不超過 3 個月的銀行 存款。

#### 2.7 職員福利

#### 2.7.1 約滿酬金

行政管理委員會所有全職職員均按定期合約條款受聘,合約期大部分為 3 年,在順利完成合約時可獲發放一筆約滿酬金。應承擔但尚未到期支付的職員約滿酬金,均全數撥備並記入收支結算表內。須於結算日起計一年內支付的約滿酬金列為流動負債,其他則列為非流動負債。

#### 2.7.2 強制性公積金("強積金")供款

為符合《強制性公積金計劃條例》(第 485 章)的規定,行政管理委員會已透過加入由獨立強積金服務提供者提供的集成信託計劃,設立強積金計劃。所有已付及應付的強積金供款均記入收支結算表內。

#### 2.7.3 職員可享有的年假

職員就截至結算日前所提供的服務而享有但尚未過期的有薪年假,會按個別職員的 薪酬福利條件記入收支結算表內。

#### 2.8 收入及開支的確認

#### 2.8.1 政府的財政撥款

香港特區政府的財政撥款於到期應收的期間內確認。

#### 2.8.2 利息收入

利息收入採用實際利率法以應計方式確認。實際利率法是計算金融資產或金融負債的攤銷成本值以及攤分期內利息收入或支出的方法。

#### 2.8.3 其他投資收入

來自上市股票的股息收入於該項投資的股價除息時予以確認。

金融工具的已實現損益在有關金融工具被註銷時在收支結算表內確認。

#### 2.8.4 紀念品銷售

售賣紀念品的所得收入會在紀念品售予顧客時予以確認。

#### 2.8.5 開支

議員酬金、職員薪酬及秘書處營運開支,會在須承擔該等開支時記入帳目內。議員可申請發還的工作開支及醫療津貼,在議員提出申請時記入帳目內;支付予議員的任滿酬金,則在每屆立法會任期結束並從政府取得對銷的財政撥款時記入帳目內。

#### 2.9 外幣換算

年度內的外幣交易按交易日的即期匯率換算為港元。以外幣為本位的貨幣資產與負債於結算日按收市匯率換算為港元。匯兌損益在收支結算表內確認。

#### 2.10 新訂及經修訂香港財務報告準則的影響

香港會計師公會頒布了多項在本會計期內生效的新增或經修訂的香港財務報告準 則。行政管理委員會的會計政策並未因此等發展而有任何改變,其營運業績及財務 狀況亦未因此等發展而受到影響。

行政管理委員會並沒有採納在本會計期尚未生效的任何新準則(附註 18)。

## 16 財務風險管理

行政管理委員會在日常業務中承受信貸和流動資金風險。行政管理委員會所承受的 此等風險和市場風險,以及其採取的金融風險管理政策及做法載述如下。

#### 16.1 總則

行政管理委員會按照其訂定的投資組合的目標比例,將現金盈餘投放於多項金融資產,包括定期存款、債務證券、股票及信託基金,藉以提供額外的收入來源。根據 行政管理委員會的政策,除股票及信託基金外,所有投放於金融資產的投資均應 保本。

行政管理委員會的金融資產載於附註 6。

#### 16.2 信貸風險

信貸風險指金融工具的一方持有者會因未能履行責任而引致另一方蒙受財務損失的 風險。

行政管理委員會並無信貸風險相當集中的情況。在結算日,在未計所持有的任何抵 押品或其他改善信貸質素的措施時,最高信貸風險額如下:

在結算日,按金及其他應收帳款主要包括相關信貸風險極低的應計利息,以及預支予梁頌恆先生及游蕙禎小姐的酬金及營運資金(見附註 10)。行政管理委員會會持續監察這些應收帳款的結餘,待有關梁先生及游小姐所作立法會誓言的有效性的司法程序完結後,行政管理委員會將會展開法律行動,向他們追討有關酬金及預支款項。

#### 16.3 流動資金風險

流動資金風險指某一機構或難以履行其金融負債的相關責任的風險。

行政管理委員會採用預期現金流量分析來管理流動資金風險,即透過預測所需的現金款額及監察行政管理委員會的營運資金,確保可以償付所有到期負債及應付所有已知的資金需求。由於行政管理委員會維持充裕的流動資金,其流動資金風險極低。

#### 16.4 市場風險

行政管理委員會就其投放於金融工具的投資會面對市場風險。市場風險包括利率風險、貨幣風險和股價風險。

#### 16.4.1 利率風險

利率風險指因市場利率變動而引致虧損的風險。利率風險可進一步分為公平值利率 風險及現金流量利率風險。

- (a) 公平值利率風險指金融工具的公平值會因市場利率變動而波動的風險。由於行政管理委員會的銀行存款和持至期滿的證券均以定息計算利息,當市場利率上升時,其公平值便會下跌。然而,由於它們全部均按攤銷成本值列示,市場利率變動不會影響其帳面值和行政管理委員會的盈餘及累積基金。
- (b) 現金流量利率風險指金融工具的未來現金流量會因市場利率變動而波動的風險。由於行政管理委員會在銀行儲蓄之外,並無重大的浮動利率投資,其面對的現金流量利率風險偏低。

#### 16.4.2 貨幣風險

貨幣風險指金融工具的公平值或未來現金流量會因匯率變動而波動的風險。

根據行政管理委員會的政策,必須就任何以港元、人民幣或美元以外貨幣為本位的金融工具訂立一份對銷的遠期外匯合約,用以將所涉投資款項兌回港元。此外,以人民幣及美元為本位的金融工具的所涉金額及其在投資組合中的比重,必須維持於既定水平之內。

在結算日,以美元為本位的金融資產總計有 16,300,000元(2016年:16,000,000元),而以人民幣為本位的金融資產總計有 500,000元(2016年:113,000,000元)。剩餘的金融資產及所有金融負債均以港元為本位。就以美元為本位的金融資產而言,由於港元與美元匯率掛鈎,行政管理委員會所面對的貨幣風險極低。

就以人民幣為本位的金融資產而言,在 2017 年 3 月 31 日,在所有其他可變因素保持不變的情況下,如人民幣兌港元的匯率上升/下跌 5%,匯兌淨虧損估計會減少/增加 20,000 元(2016年:5,700,000元)。

#### 16.4.3 股價風險

股價風險是因股價變動而引致虧損的風險。行政管理委員會就其投放於在香港交易及結算所有限公司上市的股票和交易所買賣基金的投資會面對股價風險。

行政管理委員會的股價風險主要集中於恒生指數成分股或以金融機構及公用事業為經營業務的股票,以及旨在提供投資回報與恒生指數表現、恒生中國企業指數表現或在中國公開買賣的股票表現貼近的交易所買賣基金。行政管理委員會為投放於股票及交易所買賣基金的投資設定上限。在行政管理委員會轄下成立的投資工作小組,負責就行政管理委員會的投資策略向行政管理委員會提供意見。

如股價較結算日的股價高/低 10%,其他全面收益會因可供出售證券的公平值有所變動而增加/減少 3,200,000 元(2016年:其他全面虧損減少/增加 3,000,000 元)。

#### 17 金融工具的公平值計量

列入第 1 級的金融工具的公平值是根據此等金融工具於結算日的市場報價而釐定, 此公平值並無扣除將來出售該等工具時涉及的預計成本。

由於列入第 2 級的金融工具沒有此等報價,估算其公平值時,所採用的估值方法是 盡可能運用可觀察到的數據,包括同類產品的市場回報率。




# 立法會秘書處的組織架構圖(截至 2017 年 3 月 31 日)

立法會秘書處的環境政策要求全體職員特別致力透過下列措施,保護環境:

- 節省資源,特別是紙張及電力
- 減少廢物,使用只用了一面的紙張、收集可循環再用的物料及在可行情況下根據環保原則進行採購
- 確保室內空氣質素良好及盡量減少在辦公時間內進行發出噪音的工程,藉以**保持 舒適的室內工作環境**
- 選擇適當的交通工具及採用良好的駕駛模式,辦免及盡量減少空氣污染

#### 環境管理

繼完成立法會綜合大樓由 2013 年 4 月 1 日至 2014 年 3 月 31 日期間的碳審計後,秘書處委聘顧問為立法會綜合大樓進行 2014-2015 至 2018-2019 年度的周年碳審計。立法會綜合大樓由 2015 年 4 月 1 日至 2016 年 3 月 31 日期間的碳審計報告顯示,大部分排放源的排放量均有不同程度的減幅,而立法會綜合大樓在 2015-2016 年度的溫室氣體排放強度與 2013-2014 年度的基準年相比,亦減少了 2.2%。顧問報告載有多項建議,包括聯絡不同的持份者制訂減碳目標、實施溫室氣體減排措施、食水減量,以及舉辦更多互動的公眾參與活動。秘書處會研究和跟進顧問提出的建議。

# Report on the Activities of The Legislative Council Commission 2016-2017

Prepared for tabling in the Legislative Council in accordance with section 13(5) of The Legislative Council Commission Ordinance (Cap. 443)

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## The Chairman's Review

This report marks the first year of the Sixth Legislative Council ("LegCo"). I am greatly honoured to be elected President and become the Chairman of The Legislative Council Commission ("the Commission") in this new term.

I am pleased to report that the year under review was a fruitful one with the introduction of a number of new initiatives that enhanced the services and facilities for Members and the public.

It has always been the Commission's policy to facilitate news organizations to cover and report LegCo news in the LegCo Complex. Having regard to the operational experience and the evolvement of media landscape over the years, the Commission reviewed the "Guidelines and Arrangements for Media Representatives in the LegCo Complex" with a view to rationalizing the guiding principles on issuing admission passes to media representatives who need frequent access to the LegCo Complex to cover LegCo meetings and events, and updating the conditions on use of the various facilities by media representatives. Under the amended Guidelines which took effect from the Sixth LegCo, online news organizations, which were only issued Temporary Admission Passes in the past, are issued Term Admission Passes that are

valid for a LegCo term, if they meet the eligibility criteria.

The Commission attaches great importance to enhancing its services to Members and the public through applying the latest information technology. Electronic Voting System ("EVS") of the Council meetings its committees was successfully redeveloped and rolled out at the commencement of the Sixth LegCo. In addition to the Chamber and a conference room, EVS was also installed in two other conference rooms to provide more well-equipped meeting venues for use by committees, thereby increasing the efficiency of committee proceedings.

Several web-based applications were launched in the Sixth LegCo to facilitate the work Members and the engagement of the public in LegCo business. Through the Online Registration System, members of the public and deputations can register their attendance at public hearings held by provide committees and written submissions via the LegCo Website. The System for Signification of Membership and Attendance at Meetings and other Activities enables Members to signify their committee membership and attendance at committee meetings and

activities online. Instead of registering interests in hardcopy, Members use the System for Registration of Members' Interests to register their interests online which also facilitates public inspection of such records on the LegCo Website. Besides, the attendance rates of Members at meetings of the Council and its committees were made accessible to the public on the LegCo Website through the Members' Participation Records System.

The one-year trial scheme of providing translation/interpretation services in seven ethnic minority ("EM") languages (i.e. Urdu, Hindi, Nepali, Thai, Bahasa Indonesia, Tagalog and Punjabi) for EM deputations attending committee meetings was launched in October 2016. Over the past year, a number of EM deputations used the services which had facilitated their participation in LegCo business. The Commission decided after a review to formalize the provision of translation/interpretation services for EM deputations at committee meetings.

Starting from the Sixth LegCo, two new categories of publications, namely *Numbers and Figures* and *Statistical Highlights* were issued by the Secretariat's Research Office. While *Numbers and Figures* are a collection of data sets taken from official local and international sources, *Statistical Highlights* provide

major statistics on a wide range of topical issues under deliberations or being followed up by committees. These publications facilitate Members' work by providing quick reference for basic facts about a chosen topic.

It has always been the Commission's priority to build a closer link between LegCo and members of the public and promote public understanding of our work. To enrich the "Meeting with Members" Programme, an education activity with the objective of giving students opportunities to meet with Members and communicate with them directly, the Secretariat implemented a pilot initiative during the year to invite award winning schools to stage lunch time music performance at the LegCo Complex in festive seasons. The student performers participated in a guided tour of the LegCo Complex conducted by The initiative was well Members. received by Members, Secretariat staff and schools alike with the music performances invariably attracting a large audience. Music performance by schools and youth organizations in the LegCo Complex has now become an integral part of the "Meeting with Members" Programme.

To mark the 20th anniversary of Hong Kong's return to our Motherland and to

enhance public understanding of the work of LegCo and its Members since 1 July 1997, a thematic exhibition entitled "Looking Back and Ahead" was staged in July 2017 at the Main Lobby and the LegCo Library of the LegCo Complex. Apart from highlighting the changes of the composition and the work of LegCo in the two decades, the exhibition past displayed valuable historical photos and selected items from the LegCo Library, Archives, and the Gift Collection from dignitaries. There were also game booths and an "Art Tree". The exhibition, which was successfully held with a high attendance of around 6 000 visitors, afforded members of the public an opportunity to revisit the historical development of the Legislature and gain a better understanding of our work.

The Commission continued to enhance the openness and transparency of the work of the Council by facilitating public access to the Council's proceedings and records. Since the implementation of the Policy on Access to the Legislature's Documents and Records on 19 March 2014 and up to 31 March 2017, a total of 56 information access requests were processed and approved, while only one request was denied. The lists of approved and denied access requests are published on the LegCo Website for public information.

Turning to security issues, it is incumbent upon the Commission to provide a safe environment for all users of the LegCo including Members, Complex, reporters and visitors. The security challenges arising from the procedural issues and Members' conduct at Council and committee proceedings in beginning of the Sixth LegCo were unprecedented. Unfortunately, storming of the venue of the Council in early November 2016 meeting resulted in the injury of six security staff of the Secretariat. Having reviewed the storming incident and the causes for the injuries, the Commission considered it necessary to refine the arrangements for management of access to meeting venues meeting floors in the and Complex. For the purpose of enabling LegCo to conduct its business smoothly enhancing the safety Secretariat's security staff in executing their duties, the Commission decided after consulting all Members not to allow Members' staff to enter the meeting venue of the Council, House Committee ("HC") and Finance Committee ("FC"), and set a ceiling on the number of staff of each Member who may enter the floor of the meeting venue during a meeting of the Council, HC or FC with effect from mid-December 2016.

The Commission remained committed to achieving a green environment for users of the LegCo Complex. With the Secretariat's continued efforts, during 2016-2017, electricity consumption in the LegCo Complex decreased by 0.8% and the amount of waste paper collected for recycling increased by 12.5% over the previous year. The Secretariat would continue to implement green measures to protect the environment.

In August 2016 and February 2017, the Accounts Office and Human Resources Office of the Complaints and Resources Management Division were relocated from the LegCo Complex to the new office on 23/F and 2/F of the Queensway Government Offices respectively. offices vacated have helped to relieve the underprovided work space for the Secretariat staff who need to support Council and committee meetings in the LegCo Complex. Suitable office space will continue to be identified to meet the Secretariat's accommodation and operational needs.

Looking forward, while the years ahead may be of no lesser challenges, I am confident that with the support of my colleagues in the Commission and the dedication and professional service of the Secretariat staff, the Commission will continue to perform its functions successfully.

## **The Legislative Council Commission**

The Legislative Council Commission ("the Commission") is a body corporate established under The Legislative Council Commission Ordinance (Cap. 443). The Ordinance, which was enacted in April 1994, provides the legal framework for the Commission and the independent Legislative Council ("LegCo") Secretariat ("the Secretariat") to operate with managerial and financial autonomy.

The membership of the Commission as at 31 March 2017 is set out below:

Meetings of the Commission shall be held at such time and place as the Commission or the Chairman may from time to time appoint. In 2016-2017, 10 meetings were held.

Five committees have been appointed by the Commission to carry out certain delegated functions. These are:

- the Committee on Personnel Matters which deals with appointment and other personnel matters;
- the Committee on Members'
   Operating Expenses which advises on the processing of Members' operating expenses reimbursement claims;
- the Committee on Facilities and Services which oversees the provision of services, accommodation and facilities to the Council and the Secretariat, and deals with matters relating to the display of artworks in the LegCo Complex;
- the Committee on the Use of Legislative Council Square which considers and approves applications for the use of the LegCo Square and imposes conditions of use where necessary; and

 the Appeals Committee on the Use of Legislative Council Square which considers appeals against the decisions of the Committee on the Use of Legislative Council Square.

The terms of reference and membership of the five committees are set out in **Appendix 1**.

Through a separate head of expenditure in the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region Government's annual Estimates, the Commission is provided with funds to support the work of LegCo. Recurrent funding is provided through an Operating Expenditure Envelope ("OEE") which sets the ceiling for each year's funding. The OEE is sub-divided into two subheads in Estimates: one for Members' remuneration and operating expenses reimbursements, and the other Secretariat expenses which comprise staff emoluments and general expenses. Basically, the funding for Members' remuneration and operating expenses reimbursements is adjusted annually according to the movement of Consumer Price Index (C), while that for Secretariat expenses is adjusted according to the target expenditure level of the Government. Only savings in subhead for Secretariat expenses may be put into an Operating Reserve for future deployment at the discretion of the Commission. In addition, non-recurrent funding is obtainable for capital and time-limited projects.

Where additional resources are required for the introduction of new and improved services, the Commission will put forward bids under the Government's annual Resource Allocation Exercise. The bids will be considered by the Government on their own merits. If the proposed bids for recurrent resources are successful, funds will be provided in the OEE, starting from the forthcoming financial year.

The Commission's accounts are subject to examination by the Director of Audit. The Director is empowered to conduct value-for-money audits and examinations into the economy, efficiency and effectiveness with which the Commission uses its resources in performing its functions and exercising its powers.

The net financial provisions for the Commission in 2016-2017 amounted to \$874.4 million, which comprised \$304.5 million for Members' remuneration and expenses reimbursements, and \$569.9 million for the Secretariat's staff emoluments and general expenses. As shown in the audited accounts on pages 92 to 121, the deficit for the year was \$0.2 million.

#### The Legislative Council Secretariat

Administrative support and services to the Legislature are provided by the Secretariat which operates under the Commission. The mission of the Secretariat is to provide efficient secretariat, research and administrative support for the Council, enhance understanding community of the activities of the Council and ensure an effective avenue for redress.

The Secretary General, who is appointed by the Commission, is the chief executive of the Secretariat. The Secretary General is also the Clerk to LegCo. The Secretary General is responsible to the Chairman of the Commission for the effective management and administration of the Secretariat.

For the purposes of the Public Finance Ordinance (Cap. 2), the Secretary General is designated as the Controlling Officer responsible for the financial resources afforded to the Commission.

Appointment of Secretariat staff is normally on a three-year agreement basis. Grading, remuneration and other terms and conditions of service of staff are broadly in line with those applicable to civil servants. Remuneration comprises a basic salary paid in accordance with the salary scale applicable to civil servants

holding comparable jobs, a cash allowance in lieu of certain fringe benefits enjoyed by civil servants, and an end-of-agreement gratuity. Secretariat staff are required to serve the Council with complete political impartiality.

The Commission regularly considers succession planning for as well training and development needs different grades of staff. Α succession committee, chaired by the Secretary General and comprising the Deputy Secretary General and all Heads of Divisions as its members, has been set up to develop overall staff succession planning strategies. Six career development subcommittees have also been formed for the following grades to consider the career development needs of officers concerned:

- Council Secretary grade;
- Assistant Legal Adviser grade;
- Translation Officer and related grades;
- · Information services support grades;
- Corporate communication grades; and
- Professional, general and administration grades.

As at 31 March 2017, there were 661 posts on the establishment of the Secretariat. The staff establishment by number and rank is set out in **Appendix 2**. The Secretariat has continued to adopt measures to promote

the employment of persons with disabilities in the Secretariat. As at 31 March 2017, 10 staff members or about 2% of the Secretariat's strength are persons with disabilities.

Administrative support and services are provided for the Council and its committees through the following 10 functional Divisions:

- Council Business Division 1;
- Council Business Division 2;
- Council Business Division 3;
- Council Business Division 4;
- Legal Service Division;
- Information Services Division;
- Public Information Division;
- Translation and Interpretation Division;
- Complaints and Resources Management Division; and
- · Administration Division.

The organization structure of the Secretariat as at 31 March 2017 is shown in **Appendix 3**.

# Activities of The Legislative Council Commission in 2016-2017

# Services of the Legislative Council Secretariat

#### **Council Business Divisions**

Servicing of meetings of the Council and its committees is undertaken by four Divisions: Council Business Divisions 1, 2, 3 and 4. The four Divisions are each headed by an Assistant Secretary Servicing work of Council General. meetings includes processing questions, bills, proposed resolutions and motions as well as amendments to bills, proposed resolutions and motions. The secretariat administrative support services and provided for committees include preparing background briefs, discussion papers, reports and minutes of meetings as well as collating and analyzing public views. These four Divisions also provide services for meetings-cum-luncheons held between Members and District Council members and councillors of Heung Yee Kuk. Matters which require follow-up actions are referred by the respective Divisions to the relevant Panels or dealt with in case conferences with the Administration. The respective responsibilities of these four Divisions are described below.

#### Division 1

Council Business Division 1 provides secretariat and support services for the Finance Committee and its two subcommittees (i.e. the Public Works Subcommittee and the Establishment Subcommittee), five Panels as well as Bills Committees and subcommittees dealing with proposed legislation and policy issues relating to the terms of reference of these Panels.

During the period from 1 April 2016 to 31 March 2017, the Division serviced a total of 221 meetings. In addition, the Division also provided services for three local duty visits.

During the year, 11 of the 221 meetings were held to receive public views, at which a total of 423 individuals and deputations had given views. On research support, the Division prepared a total of 101 background briefs and 10 discussion papers this year to facilitate detailed study of the subject matters by the relevant committees. The major subjects covered in those briefs included Towards a Planning Vision and Strategy Transcending 2030, **Producer** Responsibility Scheme on Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment and Hong Kong/Shenzhen Innovation and Technology Park in the Lok Ma Chau addition, Loop. ln a total of 30 committee reports were prepared by the Division in the period.

#### Division 2

Council Business Division 2 provides secretariat and support services for the House Committee, seven Panels as well as Bills Committees and subcommittees dealing with proposed legislation and policy issues within the terms of reference of these Panels. During the year, the Division also serviced the Select Committee to Inquire into Matters about the Agreement between Mr LEUNG Chun-ying and the Australian firm UGL Limited.

During the period from 1 April 2016 to 31 March 2017, the Division serviced a total of 201 meetings. In addition, it also provided services for nine local duty visits.

During the year, 34 of the 201 meetings were held to receive public views, at which a total of 1 122 individuals and deputations had given views. On research support, the Division prepared a total of 141 background briefs and 76 discussion papers during the report period. Some of the major subjects covered in the background briefs and discussion papers included regulation of employment agencies placing foreign domestic helpers; promotion of green

burial: review of the Building Management Ordinance; measures adopted by the Police to combat telephone deception; quality and monitoring of private residential care homes for persons with disabilities; regulation of the use of social media, the imposition of a cooling-off period and the conduct of election polls in public elections; development of the Hong Kong Palace Museum in the West Kowloon Cultural District; and proposed regulatory framework of medical devices. The Division also prepared a total of 40 committee reports during the period.

#### **Division 3**

Council Business Division 3 provides support services for meetings of the Legislative Council. During the period from 1 April 2016 to 31 March 2017, the Division serviced 34 Council meetings (two of which were the Chief Executive's Question and Answer Sessions) processed, among other things, petitions, 647 questions, 28 bills and 116 784 amendments thereto (112 442 of which were proposed by a Member to the Medical Registration (Amendment) Bill 2016), 38 proposed resolutions, 48 and 101 amendments motions thereto, and three requests for leave of the Council to give evidence of Council proceedings.

The Division also services the Committee on Members' Interests. During the year, the Division serviced one open meeting closed and six meetings of the Committee. of prepared total a seven discussion papers and two reports, and launched an online System for Registration of Members' Interests for use by Members starting from the Sixth Legislative Council.

During the report period, the Division also serviced the Investigation Committee established under Rule 49B(2A) of the Rules of Procedure in respect of the motion to censure Dr Hon CHENG Chung-tai. The Investigation Committee is responsible for establishing the facts stated in the censure motion moved under Rule 49B(1A) (Disqualification of Member from Office), and giving its views on whether or not the facts as established constitute grounds for the censure. It had so far held two closed meetings, and would report to the Council as soon as it had completed investigation of the matter referred to it.

#### **Division 4**

Council Business Division 4 provides secretariat and support services for the Public Accounts Committee, the Committee on Access to the Legislature's Documents and Records, the Committee on Rules of Procedures, the Parliamentary Liaison Subcommittee of the House Committee, six Panels as well as Bills Committees and subcommittees dealing with the proposed legislation and policy issues within the terms of reference of these Panels. During the year, the Division also serviced the Select Committee to Inquire into the Background of and Reasons for the Delay of the Construction of the Hong Kong section of the Guangzhou-Shenzhen-Hong Kong Express Rail Link ("the Select Committee"). The Select Committee tabled its Report in the Council on 6 July 2016.

During the period from 1 April 2016 to 31 March 2017, the Division serviced a total of 154 committee meetings, including six public hearings held by the Public Accounts Committee and 19 meetings by other committees to receive public views, at which a total of 425 individuals and deputations gave views. In addition, the Division also provided services for 10 local duty visits.

On research support, the Division prepared a total of 102 background briefs and 54 discussion papers. Some of the subjects covered in the major background briefs and discussion papers included the new air traffic control Territory-wide system, System Assessment & Basic Competency issues related to student Assessment,

suicide, taxi fare adjustments and the franchise for the bus network of The Kowloon Motor Bus Company (1933) Limited. A total of 29 committee reports were prepared by the Division, including two reports of the Public Accounts Committee submitted to the Council on its examination of the Director of Audit's value for money audit reports. Division also processed a total of 36 requests for closed access to documents of the Legislature, and 23 of them were approved. The applicants of the remaining 13 requests withdrew their requests after the Division had clarified the requests with them or provided them with the requested information, which is available in the public domain. Furthermore, the Division assisted the Clerk to LegCo in conducting reviews of disclosure of documents and records of Legislature, and 23 sets the of unclassified files which have been in existence for over 20 years have been disclosed.

During the report period, the Division continued to coordinate the production of "A Companion to the history, rules and practices of the Legislative Council of the Special Administrative Hong Kong Region" ("the Companion"). The Companion comprises three parts and the last part was tabled in the Council on 29 June 2016. The full Companion was also uploaded onto the LegCo Website.

#### **Legal Service Division**

The Legal Service Division provides legal advice and support for the Council and its committees in their scrutiny of bills and subsidiary legislation, examination of public policies, inquiries into matters of public interest, and the handling of complaints, and other legal matters. The Division also renders legal advice to individual Members on matters relating to the business of the Council. In addition, the Division provides in-house legal service for the Commission and the Secretariat. It is the Division's mission to provide independent, comprehensive and reliable legal advice, analysis, research, and information services that are timely, objective, non-partisan, and where necessary, confidential, thereby contributing to an informed Legislature.

Apart from being head of the Legal Service Division, the Legal Adviser is also the Counsel to the Legislature. Under the Rules of Procedure, the Counsel to the Legislature has the general duty of advising the President and the Clerk to LegCo on legal issues in relation to the business or administration of the Council.

#### **Public Information Division**

The Public Information Division provides public relations advice and media support services for the Council and Members, manages the operation of a televising system to broadcast live all open meetings of the Council and its committees, and enhances public understanding of the work of the Council through education, visitor and online services.

During the period, the Division issued a total of 237 press releases on the business and activities of the Council organized 78 media briefings and interviews for the President, committee chairmen and Members. The Division filmed and televised 1608 hours of 577 open meetings of the Council and its committee and 41 media briefings. handled also received and 20 952 telephone, walk-in fax and enquiries as well 2 232 email as enquiries.

Apart from uploading Council related videos and photos onto the LegCo Website, the Division also disseminates

these materials on social media platforms. During the period, 3 070 video records of Council meetings and events were uploaded to the LegCo YouTube Channel and 1 709 photos of Members' official events and activities were posted on the LegCo Flickr photo album. In addition, the Division provides an online daily newspaper clipping service for Members to keep them abreast of current affairs and public views on topical issues.

During the year, the Division serviced 20 meetings held between Members and visiting dignitaries from places outside Hong Kong. In addition, 1 873 guided educational tours were conducted for 52 703 visitors including members of the public and students. The Division also operates a Souvenir Shop which offers a variety of unique souvenirs and publications about the Council to enrich visitors' experience.

Regarding education activities, 811 roleplay sessions on the work of the Council for students and 282 story-telling sessions for young children were held. Support was given to youth organizations to conduct mock Council debates in the LegCo Complex, with a total of seven debate sessions and four training workshops organized during the period under review. Under the "Meeting with Members" programme organized by the

Division, students hold discussions with Members on topics relating to the work of the Council and social issues. Lunch time music performance in the LegCo Complex given by school music groups was launched as a pilot initiative to enrich the "Meeting with Members" A total of 22 meeting programme. sessions, including the inaugural session of music performance, were organized for 466 students and 25 Members. Division also coordinated a summer internship programme for 26 post-secondary students attaching to different Divisions of the Secretariat to understand the support services provided for the Council.

During the year, the Exhibition Area in the Main Lobby of the LegCo Complex was redesigned by the Division to enrich the content and provide an enhanced informative experience for visitors. The "Education" section of the LegCo Website was also revamped to provide better and more accessible information.

#### **Information Services Division**

The Information Services Division provides information services for the Council, committees, Members, Members' staff and Secretariat staff through the Research Office as well as the LegCo Library and Archives.

The Research Office conducts research studies, undertakes search tasks and produces write-ups on topical issues and other areas of Members' concern. The publications prepared by the Research Office for the Fifth LegCo comprised Research Reports, Information Notes, Fact Sheets. Research Briefs Essentials. Research Reports provide indepth analysis of the broad policy issues under study in the light of overseas experience. Information Notes are focused studies on selected issues of concern. Fact Sheets are short research papers containing factual information and Research Briefs are issued statistics. periodically provide concise summaries on subject matters of interest or concern to Members, while Essentials short research papers periodically to highlight the essentials of a subject matter. Starting from the Sixth LegCo in October 2016, two new publications, categories of namely Numbers and Figures and Statistical Highlights are launched, aiming to provide quick reference for basic facts about a chosen topic. While Numbers and Figures are a collection of data sets taken from official local and international sources, Statistical Highlights provide major statistics on a wide range of topical issues.

During the period, the Research Office issued 10 *Information Notes*, 19 *Fact Sheets*, five *Research Briefs*, 21 *Essentials*, four *Numbers and Figures* and 23 *Statistical Highlights*. A list of the major subjects studied is in **Appendix 4**.

The LegCo Library provides reference support through its collections of LegCo records as well as constitutional, Basic Law, and general reference materials. The LegCo Library is a constitutional library. As of March 2017, constitutional and parliamentary collections have reached 25 684 items, equivalent to 52% of the total number of books. The Library also publishes two monthly publications entitled "Stav informed - Latest overseas policy reports" and "Stay informed – Latest parliamentary news" to keep Members abreast of the latest policy papers, major inquiry reports, important legislative and financial proposals, as well as changes in parliamentary procedures in selected overseas places.

During the year, the number of visits made to the Library was 9 340. The number of books accessed was 3 924 while the number of enquiries handled was 1 267. The Library also conducted 50 search tasks.

Library is also responsible for managing the LegCo Website. During the period, the LegCo Website was 8.6 million visited times. with 120.6 million pages viewed. Since July 2016, the Library has subscribed to the Social Network Sites Monitoring service to keep Members and staff informed of discussions on topical issues on social network sites. In July 2017, the Library held a thematic exhibition entitled "Looking Back and Ahead" featuring the 20th anniversary of Hong Kong's return to the Motherland. Selected souvenirs received from visiting dignitaries and other parliamentary organizations, books written by Members, archival records of enduring value and records denoting significant events during this period were displayed. Visitors could also learn about the rules and procedures relating to the proceedings of the Council and committees.

The LegCo Archives selects, acquires and preserves valuable records and materials which document the history, core functions and activities of the Council. It also provides records reference, research and access services for Members and staff as well as the public. The Archives now preserves about 930 linear metres of archival records in different formats, including paper files, bound volumes, photographs, audiovisual materials and artifacts. To promote public interests in

and appreciation of archival heritage of the Legislature, group visits to the Archives for schools and professional associations are regularly organized. The Archives also assists in handling access requests for closed LegCo records and documents, and conducts reviews of closed archival records upon expiry of their respective closure periods to confirm that public access to such records is not prohibited by law.

During the year, the Archives held 16 organized visits, served 617 visitors, answered 1 094 reference and research enquiries, handled 10 access to information requests and reviewed 23 time-expired archival records for open access. Among the 5 085 records due for disposal, 2 098 records which add up to 80 linear metres were appraised of possessing archival value for permanent preservation and 2 987 records were authorized for destruction.

The Archives has also developed a new electronic system, Catalogue for Archival which Records of the Legislature, provides convenient online search and reservation of archival records for access. The system was launched on the LegCo Website in mid-2015 and continuous efforts are made to improve its performance.

#### Translation and Interpretation Division

The Translation and Interpretation Division provides translation, interpretation and Chinese transcription services for the Council and its committees.

The Division is responsible for the production of the Official Record of Proceedings of the Legislative Council ("the Official Record"), also known as the Hansard, which is the verbatim report of proceedings of the Council. The Official Record is published, in the first instance, in the language of the speeches delivered on the floor, i.e. the floor version, and then translated into two versions, one in Chinese and the other in English. Both the floor and translated versions of the Official Record are available on the LegCo Website. For the 34 Council meetings held during the period under the Division produced review, 10 133 pages of the floor version of the Official Record. The floor version was subsequently rendered into 12 832 pages of English text and 9315 pages of Chinese text. Sustained efforts were made to ensure the timely release of draft, confirmed and translated versions of the Hansard within three, seven and 24 working days respectively under the Division's performance pledges.

The Division also translates questions, motions, committee papers, minutes of meetings and other Council papers. During the year, its translation output totalled 11 696 685 words. The Division continues to strive for enhanced efficiency and productivity through streamlining of work processes, effective use of information technology and more of staff flexible deployment pooling arrangements.

Under the supervision of the Division, simultaneous interpretation in English, Cantonese and Putonghua is provided for all meetings of the Council and its committees as a regular service. Owing to insufficient supply of qualified interpreters, simultaneous sign language interpretation is now only available at Council meetings. The service will be extended to committee meetings when more sign language interpreters are available.

Since the Sixth LegCo, on-site interpretation from English or Chinese to seven ethnic minority languages and vice versa is provided under a trial scheme for deputations and individuals making oral representation at committee meetings on a need basis. A review of the service will be made one year after implementation.

# Complaints and Resources Management Division

The Complaints and Resources Management Division comprises the Public Complaints Office, the Accounts Office and the Human Resources Office.

The Public Complaints Office provides support services for Members to deal with complaints and representations lodged under the LegCo Redress System. The Office assists Members in processing cases to redress grievances and identify the areas in government policies and procedures where improvement is needed. The work of the Office includes meeting and corresponding with deputations/individual members of the public, examining the cases lodged, communicating with the Administration relevant public organizations, and assisting Members in determining appropriate courses of action, as well as servicing Duty Roster Member interviews Duty with deputations and Ward Member interviews with individual members of the public, case conferences with the Administration and/or relevant public organizations and site visits arising from cases handled by the Office. During the period, the Office assisted Members in handling 4 409 cases, comprising 174 group representations and 4 235 individual cases.

The Accounts Office is responsible for all accounting matters of the Secretariat. It coordinates the preparation of the budget of the Commission, exercises budgetary control, prepares the payroll, processes and arranges all payments, compiles financial reports, invests the Commission's funds and reserves. implements the Commission's financial policies and assists in preparing each vear's Resource Allocation Exercise submissions. In addition, the Office administers Members' remuneration and operating expenses reimbursements and assists in servicing the Subcommittee on Members' Remuneration and Operating Expenses Reimbursement.

Office The Human Resources is responsible for formulating and implementing a manpower strategy to service needs meet by attracting, motivating and retaining talents. It is also responsible for arranging training and development programmes to ensure that Secretariat staff will have the necessary skills and expertise to maintain effective support for Members and the Council. In addition, the Office oversees matters relating to staff relations and staff welfare, and makes constant efforts in enhancing communication staff between management. The Office also assists in servicing the Committee on Personnel Matters under the Commission.

During the year, a total of 28 recruitment exercises were conducted, including both open and internal recruitment. A total of 41 new staff and 22 serving staff were appointed or promoted. In addition, the Office organized 38 in-house training workshops with a total of 1398 staff attendance, and made arrangements for staff to attend 11 training programmes outside Hong Kong. It also arranged staff members to participate in training courses organized by the Civil Service Training and Development Institute and other local training institutes, with a total of 578 attendance. These training activities focused on developing staff members' professional expertise, strengthening management capabilities, enhancing work efficiency, as well as promoting occupational safety and health.

#### **Administration Division**

The Administration Division comprises the General Administration Office, the Estate and Security Office and the Information Technology Office. The General Administration Office provides secretariat service for the Commission and its committees as well as internal administrative support for other Divisions of the Secretariat. During the period, the Division serviced 10 meetings of the Commission.

The General Administration Office provides receipt and despatch services; procurement and supplies services for all Divisions of the Secretariat; and steward and catering services for Members during meetings and corporate liaison functions. It also oversees the implementation of new and improvement works as well as environmental protection measures in the LegCo Complex.

The Office is also responsible for providing accommodation for Members' Offices and Secretariat staff, which include liaising with the Administration to identify suitable accommodation for the Secretariat. As there is a shortage in office space in the LegCo Complex, staff of the Translation and Interpretation Division and the Research Office are housed on 46/F of the Queensway Government Offices ("QGO"). the year under report, the Accounts Office and Human Resources Office also moved to the new office on 2/F and 23/F of QGO which was provided to the Commission by the Administration in the previous year.

Estate management as well as building and conference security services in the LegCo Complex are provided by the Estate and Security Office. The Office maintains close liaison with government departments and works agents to ensure the structural integrity as well as sound

operation of building services in the LegCo Complex. It follows relevant legislation as well as the instructions and guidelines issued by the Commission in carrying out its duties to ensure the security of the LegCo Complex and the safety of Members and other users of the LegCo Complex.

The Commission has devoted much effort and attention to enhancing the security of the LegCo Complex, with a view to ensuring that the operation of LegCo is free from hindrance and disruption while the LegCo Complex remains an open and welcoming place for members of the public. After conducting a review and consulting all Members, the Commission implemented new arrangements for managing access to meeting venues and meeting floors from mid December 2016.

The Information **Technology** Office provides information technology services for Members, their staff and Secretariat staff and support to meetings of the Council and its committees. During the vear, several large-scale information technology projects were implemented, including the revamp of the Electronic Voting System and upgrade of the Radio Communication System, as well as the enhancement of the Committee Stage Admission for Appropriation Bills System

and the Special Finance Committee Question Input System. The enhancements of administrative systems, including the Human Resources Management Information System and Vacation Leave Application System, were also completed.

The Office also implemented three new business web-based applications facilitate the daily work of Members. The System for Signification of Membership and Attendance at Meetings and other Activities provides online service for Members to signify their committee membership and attendance at committee meetings and activities, while the System for Registration of Members' Interests enables Members to register their interests online and facilitates central management and public inspection of such records on the LegCo Website. The Office also continued with the deployment of the Electronic Voting System to other conference rooms in the LegCo Complex to further enhance IT services for Council business. In addition, the Online Registration System has been developed to enable members of the public to register their attendance at public hearings of committees and provide submissions written to committees.

## Compliance Audit on Members' Claims for Reimbursement of Operating Expenses

To enhance the accountability and transparency in Members' claims for reimbursement of operating expenses that arise out of their LegCo duties, independent audit firm has been appointed to conduct audits at Members' The primary objective of the audit is to ensure that Members' claims made in compliance with provisions on conflict of interest and declaration of interest as stipulated in "A Guide for Reimbursement of Operating Expenses for Members of the Legislative Council" ("the Reimbursement Guide").

The audit report covering the 2015-2016 reimbursement year (from 1 October 2015 to 30 September 2016) was presented to the Commission in April 2017. It stated that nothing had come to the audit firm's attention that caused it to believe that there was any material violation to the provisions of the Reimbursement Guide on conflict of interest and declaration of interest. On the instruction of the Commission, the audit report is available for public inspection at the LegCo Library.

#### **Environment Protection**

The Secretariat is committed to conducting all activities its and environmentally operations in an responsible manner and will continue to make efforts to protect the environment through the green measures set out in the Secretary General's environmental report for 2016-2017 in **Appendix 5**.

The Secretariat continued with its efforts to control electricity consumption and paper consumption during the year under review. Electricity consumption in the LegCo Complex decreased by 0.8% during the period from 1 April 2016 to 31 March 2017 over the previous year. While paper consumption slightly increased by 0.6%, the amount of waste paper collected for recycling increased by 12.5% over the previous year.

Following completion of the carbon audit for the LegCo Complex for the period from 1 April 2013 to 31 March 2014, a consultant was commissioned to conduct annual carbon audits for the LegCo Complex from 2014-2015 to 2018-2019. The report on the carbon audit for the LegCo Complex during the period from 1 April 2015 to 31 March 2016 shows different levels of reduction in most of the

sources of emission and the greenhouse gas emission intensity of the LegCo Complex in 2015-2016 has reduced by 2.2% as compared to that of the base year of 2013-2014. The Secretariat will follow up the consultant's recommendations.

In December 2015, the Commission participated in the "Waste Check Charter" launched by the Environment Bureau which aims to gather momentum from various sectors on waste reduction so as to prepare for the future municipal solid waste charging. Being a signee of the Charter, the Commission pledges to regularly measure the quantity of waste disposal and recyclables generated in the LegCo Complex, try its best to reduce waste, recycle the recyclables, and help to promote waste reduction to the public. To enhance awareness of the users of the LegCo Complex on waste reduction, the Secretariat issues tips on handling general wastes and waste reduction at source Additional facilities regularly. collecting recyclables (e.g. recycling bins for glass bottles) were also provided. The Charter concluded successfully in February 2017 and the Commission was presented with the "Waste Check Promotional Partner Award - Class of Good" in recognition of its efforts in holding waste reduction publicity and educational activities.

#### **Staff Consultative Committee**

The Staff Consultative Committee, comprising 23 elected representatives of various grades (namely the Council Secretary grade, Assistant Legal Adviser grade, Translation Officer and related information services support grades. grades, corporate communication grades, as well as professional, general and administration grades), provides channel for staff to directly express their views on matters affecting them to the General who Secretary chairs the meeting.

The Committee held four meetings during the year. Views expressed through these representatives mainly concerned conditions of service, employees' benefits, work environment, staff welfare, etc. Views and suggestions raised by staff are followed up by the Divisions concerned.

#### **Staff Recreation Club**

A Staff Recreation Club is formed to promote friendship and mutual support among Secretariat staff. In 2016-2017, the Club organized the annual Christmas Party which provided a forum for staff to put aside their work and celebrate together the festive occasion at a lunch gathering. The Club also organized

interest classes (such as Tai Chi, making of preserved flower with glass dome, etc.) during the year.

## Report of the Director of Audit



# **Independent Auditor's Report To The Legislative Council Commission**

#### **Opinion**

I have audited the financial statements of The Legislative Council Commission set out on pages 92 to 121, which comprise the balance sheet as at 31 March 2017, and the income and expenditure account, statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in accumulated funds and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of The Legislative Council Commission as at 31 March 2017, and of its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards ("HKFRSs") issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants ("HKICPA") and have been properly prepared in accordance with section 13(3)(a) of The Legislative Council Commission Ordinance (Cap. 443).

#### Basis for opinion

I conducted my audit in accordance with section 13(3)(b) and 13(4) of The Legislative Council Commission Ordinance, section 15(1)(a) of the Audit Ordinance (Cap. 122) and the Audit Commission auditing standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements* section of my report. I am independent of The Legislative Council Commission in accordance with those standards, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with those standards. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

#### Responsibilities of The Legislative Council Commission for the financial statements

The Legislative Council Commission is responsible for the preparation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with HKFRSs issued by the HKICPA

and section 13(3)(a) of The Legislative Council Commission Ordinance, and for such internal control as The Legislative Council Commission determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, The Legislative Council Commission is responsible for assessing its ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting.

#### Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the Audit Commission auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with the Audit Commission auditing standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control;
- obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of The Legislative Council Commission's internal control:

However, future events or conditions may cause The Legislative Council Commission to cease to continue as a going concern; and

 evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

#### **Notes to the Financial Statements**

(Amounts expressed in thousands of Hong Kong dollars unless otherwise stated)

#### 1 GENERAL

The Legislative Council Commission ("the Commission") is a financially and administratively autonomous body corporate established by The Legislative Council Commission Ordinance (Cap. 443). It provides administrative support and services for the Legislative Council ("LegCo") of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region ("HKSAR") through the Legislative Council Secretariat.

#### 2 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### 2.1 Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in Hong Kong and all applicable Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards ("HKFRSs"), a collective term which includes all applicable individual Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standards, Hong Kong Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants ("HKICPA"). A summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the Commission is set out below.

#### 2.2 Basis of preparation of the financial statements

The measurement basis used in the preparation of these financial statements is historical cost, except that available-for-sale securities (note 2.3.2.3) are stated at fair value as explained in the accounting policies set out below.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with HKFRSs requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, as well as income and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the results of which form the basis for judgements about the carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

#### 2.2.1 Accounting judgements and estimates

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

There are no critical accounting judgements involved in the application of the Commission's accounting policies. There are also no key assumptions concerning the future, or other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the balance sheet date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the coming year.

#### 2.3 Financial assets and financial liabilities

#### 2.3.1 Initial recognition

The Commission classifies its financial assets and financial liabilities into different categories at inception, depending on the purpose for which the assets were acquired or the liabilities were incurred. The categories are: loans and receivables, held-to-maturity securities, available-for-sale securities and other financial liabilities.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are measured initially at fair value, which normally equals to the transaction price, plus the direct transaction costs.

The Commission recognizes financial assets and financial liabilities on the date it becomes a party to the contractual provisions of an instrument. Regular way purchases and sales of financial assets, which require delivery of assets within the time frame established by regulation or convention in the marketplace, are recognized on a trade date basis.

#### 2.3.2 Categorization

#### 2.3.2.1 Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and which the Commission has no intention of trading. This category includes operating funds advanced to Members of LegCo ("Members"), receivables, bank deposits and cash at bank.

At each balance sheet date subsequent to initial recognition, loans and receivables are carried at amortized cost using the effective interest method less impairment losses, if any (note 2.3.6). The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments or receipts through the expected life of the financial instrument or, when appropriate, a shorter period to the net carrying amount of the financial asset or financial liability. When calculating the effective interest rate, the Commission estimates cash flows considering all contractual terms of the financial instruments but does not consider future credit losses. The calculation includes all fees paid or received between parties to the contract that are an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and all other premiums or discounts.

#### 2.3.2.2 Held-to-maturity securities

Held-to-maturity securities are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments and fixed maturity which the Commission has the positive intention and ability to hold to maturity, other than those that meet the definition of loans and receivables.

At each balance sheet date subsequent to initial recognition, held-to-maturity securities are carried at amortized cost using the effective interest method less impairment losses, if any (note 2.3.6).

#### 2.3.2.3 Available-for-sale securities

Available-for-sale securities are non-derivative securities that are designated as available for sale or are not classified in any of the other categories above. They include securities intended to be held for an indefinite period of time, but which may be sold in response to needs for liquidity or changes in the market environment.

At each balance sheet date subsequent to initial recognition, available-for-sale securities are carried at fair value. Unrealized gains and losses arising from changes in fair value are recognized in other comprehensive income and recorded separately in the investment revaluation reserve. Gains and losses arising from foreign exchange translation are recognized in the income and expenditure account.

When available-for-sale securities are sold, gains or losses on disposal include the difference between the net sale proceeds and the carrying amount, as well as the accumulated fair value adjustments released from the investment revaluation reserve to the income and expenditure account.

#### 2.3.2.4 Other financial liabilities

Other financial liabilities are carried at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

#### 2.3.3 Fair value measurement principles

The Commission measures certain financial instruments at fair value at each balance sheet date. The fair values of financial instruments carried at amortized cost are disclosed in note 17.2.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either (a) in the principal market for the asset or liability, or (b) in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability; and the Commission has access to these markets at the measurement date.

The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured with those assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their best economic interest.

The Commission uses valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, maximizing the use of relevant observable inputs and minimizing the use of unobservable inputs.

The Commission measures fair values using the following fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of inputs used in making the measurements:

- Level 1 fair values of financial instruments are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical financial instruments;
- Level 2 fair values of financial instruments are determined with inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the financial instruments, either directly (i.e. as prices) or indirectly (i.e. derived from prices); and
- Level 3 fair values of financial instruments are determined with input that are not based on observable market data (unobservable inputs).

For assets and liabilities that are recognized in the financial statements on a recurring basis, the Commission determines whether transfers between levels in the hierarchy should be reflected in the financial statements by re-assessing categorization (based on the level of input that is most significant and relevant to the fair value measurement as a whole) at the balance sheet date.

#### 2.3.4 Derecognition

A financial asset is derecognized when the contractual rights to receive the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or where the financial asset together with substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership have been transferred.

The Commission uses the weighted average method to determine realized gains and losses to be recognized in the income and expenditure account on derecognition.

A financial liability is derecognized when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled, or when it expires.

#### 2.3.5 Offsetting

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in the balance sheet when there is a legally enforceable right to offset the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

#### 2.3.6 Impairment of financial assets

The carrying amounts of loans and receivables, held-to-maturity securities and available-for-sale securities are reviewed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is objective evidence of impairment.

When there is objective evidence that an impairment loss on loans and receivables or held-to-maturity securities has occurred, the loss is recognized in the income and expenditure account as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the effective interest rate computed on initial recognition of the asset. If in a subsequent period, the amount of such impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be linked objectively to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognized, the impairment loss is reversed through the income and expenditure account.

When there is objective evidence that an impairment loss on available-for-sale securities has occurred, the cumulative loss previously recorded in the investment revaluation reserve is removed from the investment revaluation reserve and recognized in the income and expenditure account even though the financial asset has not been derecognized. The cumulative loss is the difference between the acquisition cost and the current fair value, less any impairment loss on that financial asset previously recognized in the income and expenditure account. Impairment losses for available-for-sale debt securities are subsequently reversed if an increase in fair value of the investment can be objectively related to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognized. In respect of available-for-sale equity securities and exchange traded funds ("ETFs"), impairment losses previously recognized in the income and expenditure account are not reversed through the income and expenditure account in subsequent periods. Any such subsequent increases in fair value are recognized in other comprehensive income and recorded in the investment revaluation reserve.

#### 2.4 Souvenir stock

A souvenir shop is operated at the LegCo Complex.

Souvenir stock is stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost is calculated using the weighted average method. It comprises design fees, mould charges and other production costs of the souvenir items. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less estimated costs of completion and estimated costs necessary to make the sale.

#### 2.5 Fixed assets

- 2.5.1 Measurement of fixed assets
- 2.5.1.1 Fixed asset items that are expected to be used for more than one year are capitalized, except that items costing less than \$3,000 were expensed when incurred.
- 2.5.1.2 Works of art acquired are capitalized and recognized in the balance sheet at cost less impairment losses, if any (note 2.5.3). They are not depreciated or revalued.
- 2.5.1.3 Other fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and less impairment losses, if any (note 2.5.3). Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives as follows:

- Furniture and fixtures 10 years

- Motor vehicles and office equipment 5 years

- Computers and software 3 years

Work in progress is not depreciated.

#### 2.5.2 Derecognition of fixed assets

The carrying amount of a fixed asset shall be derecognized on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from the use or disposal of the asset.

Gains or losses arising from the disposal of fixed assets are determined as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amounts of the assets, and are recognized in the income and expenditure account at the time of disposal.

#### 2.5.3 Impairment of fixed assets

The carrying amounts of fixed assets are reviewed at each balance sheet date to identify any indication of impairment. If there is an indication of impairment, an impairment loss is recognized in the income and expenditure account whenever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount of an asset is the greater of its fair value less costs to sell and value in use.

#### 2.6 Cash equivalents

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash equivalents include cash at bank and bank deposits with original maturity within three months.

#### 2.7 Staff benefits

#### 2.7.1 Contract gratuities

All full-time staff employed by the Commission are on fixed agreement terms, mainly for three years with a gratuity payable upon satisfactory completion of each term. Staff gratuities incurred but not yet due for payment are fully provided for and charged to the income and expenditure account. Those gratuities payable within one year from the balance sheet date are classified as current liabilities, while others are classified as non-current liabilities.

#### 2.7.2 Contributions to Mandatory Provident Fund ("MPF")

To comply with the requirements under the MPF Schemes Ordinance (Cap. 485), the Commission has set up an MPF Scheme by participating in a master trust scheme provided by an independent MPF service provider. Contributions paid and payable by the Commission to the Scheme are charged to the income and expenditure account.

#### 2.7.3 Staff leave entitlements

Staff's unexpired entitlements to paid annual leave as a result of services rendered up to the balance sheet date are charged to the income and expenditure account according to each individual staff member's remuneration package.

#### 2.8 Revenue and expenditure recognition

#### 2.8.1 Financial provisions from Government

Financial provisions from the HKSAR Government are recognized in the period when receivable.

#### 2.8.2 Interest income

Interest income is recognized as it accrues using the effective interest method. The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortized cost of a financial asset or a financial liability and of allocating the interest income or interest expense over the relevant period.

#### 2.8.3 Other investment income

Dividend income from listed securities is recognized when the share price of the investment is quoted ex-dividend.

Realized gains or losses on financial instruments are recognized in the income and expenditure account when the financial instruments are derecognized.

#### 2.8.4 Souvenir sales

Revenue from the sale of souvenirs is recognized when a souvenir item is sold to the customer.

#### 2.8.5 Expenses

Members' remuneration, staff emoluments and the Secretariat's operating expenses are accounted for as they are incurred. Members' reimbursable operating expenses and medical allowances are accounted for as they are claimed; and end-of-service gratuities payable to Members are accounted for at the end of each LegCo term when back-to-back financial provisions from the Government are obtained.

#### 2.9 Foreign currency translation

Foreign currency transactions during the year are translated into Hong Kong dollars at the spot exchange rates at the transaction dates. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into Hong Kong dollars using the closing exchange rates at the balance sheet date. Exchange gains and losses are recognized in the income and expenditure account.

#### 2.10 Impact of new and revised HKFRSs

The HKICPA has issued a number of new and revised HKFRSs which are effective for the current accounting period. There have been no changes to the Commission's accounting policies or impact on its operating results and financial position as a result of these developments.

The Commission has not applied any new standard that is not yet effective for the current accounting period (note 18).

#### 4 EXPENDITURE

#### (a) Members' remuneration, benefits and operating expenses reimbursements

Members are provided with a monthly remuneration, an annual medical allowance, an end-of-service gratuity and reimbursements for expenses arising from LegCo duties. The rates of such remuneration, benefits and reimbursements are proposed by the Government on the advice of the Independent Commission on Remuneration for Members of the Executive Council and the Legislature, and Officials under the Political Appointment System of the HKSAR, and approved by the Finance Committee of LegCo.

Under the delegated authority from the Finance Committee, the rates for Members' remuneration, medical allowance and recurrent operating expenses reimbursements are adjusted by the Government yearly in October according to the movement of Consumer Price Index (C). The relevant rates for each Member are as follows:

For setting up Members' offices and equipping them with IT and communication facilities, the ceiling of advance is \$375,000 for each Member of the Sixth LegCo. Funds advanced in these respects have to be settled within three months with expenses actually incurred and any excess returned to the Commission. They are classified as current assets.

For recurrent operating expenses, the ceiling of advance is equivalent to two months' office operation, entertainment and travelling expenses. As at 31 March 2017, the ceiling was \$469,960 (2016: \$431,562). Funds advanced in this respect have to be returned to the Commission when the Member concerned ceases office.

#### 16 FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT

The Commission is exposed to credit and liquidity risks in its normal course of business. The Commission's exposure to these risks, as well as market risks, and the financial risk management policies and practices are described below.

#### 16.1 General

To provide an ancillary source of income, surplus cash is invested in a portfolio of financial assets according to a target ratio set by the Commission. The portfolio includes fixed deposits, debt securities, equities and trust funds. It is the Commission's policy that all investments in financial assets, except equities and trust funds, should be principal-protected.

The Commission's financial assets are shown in note 6.

#### 16.2 Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will fail to discharge an obligation and cause the other party to incur a financial loss.

The Commission does not have significant concentrations of credit risk. The maximum exposure to credit risk at the balance sheet date without taking account of any collateral held or other credit enhancements is shown below:

In respect of operating funds advanced to Members, the credit risk is minimal, because a great proportion of the funds advanced will be offset against Members' expenses reimbursements when they cease office.

To minimize credit risks, all fixed deposits are placed with licensed banks in Hong Kong. For held-to-maturity securities, which are debt securities, only those classified under the investment grade by Moody's or Standard & Poor's are considered. At the balance sheet date, the credit quality of investments in debt securities, analyzed by the lower of ratings designated by Moody's or Standard & Poor's, was as follows:

At the balance sheet date, deposits and other receivables included mainly accrued interest, the associated credit risk of which was minimal, and remuneration and operating funds advanced to Mr Sixtus LEUNG Chung-hang and Miss YAU Wai-ching (see note 10). These receivables balances are monitored by the Commission on an ongoing basis and the Commission will commence legal actions to recover the remuneration and advances from Mr LEUNG and Miss YAU after the judicial proceedings in relation to the validity of their LegCo Oath have been completed.

#### 16.3 Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities.

The Commission employs projected cash flow analysis to manage liquidity risk, namely by forecasting the amount of cash required and monitoring the working capital of the Commission to ensure that all liabilities due and funding requirements known could be met. As the Commission has a strong liquidity position, it has a very low level of liquidity risk.

#### 16.4 Market risk

The Commission is exposed to market risk for its investment in financial instruments. Market risk comprises interest rate risk, currency risk and equity price risk.

#### 16.4.1 Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk refers to the risk of loss arising from changes in market interest rates. This can be further classified into fair value interest rate risk and cash flow interest rate risk.

- (a) Fair value interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. As the Commission's bank deposits and held-to-maturity securities bear interest at fixed rates, their fair values will fall when market interest rates increase. However, as they are all stated at amortized cost, changes in market interest rates will not affect their carrying amounts and the Commission's surplus and accumulated funds.
- (b) Cash flow interest rate risk is the risk that future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The Commission's exposure to cash flow interest risk is small as it has no major floating-rate investments other than bank balances in savings accounts.

#### 16.4.2 Currency risk

Currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates.

According to the Commission's policy, any financial instrument denominated in a currency other than the HK dollar, Renminbi or the US dollar has to be covered by a back-to-back forward exchange contract for converting back the funds invested into HK dollars. Moreover, the amounts of Renminbi and US dollar denominated financial instruments, as well as their weightings in the portfolio, have to be maintained under a pre-determined level.

At the balance sheet date, financial assets totalling \$16.3 million (2016: \$16.0 million) were denominated in US dollars and \$0.5 million (2016: \$113.0 million) in Renminbi. The remaining financial assets and all financial liabilities were denominated in HK dollars. Owing to the linked exchange rate of the HK dollar to the US dollar, the Commission has a very low level of currency risk for financial assets denominated in US dollars.

For financial assets denominated in Renminbi, it was estimated that, as at 31 March 2017, a 5% increase/decrease in the exchange rate of the Renminbi against the HK dollar, with all other variables held constant, would decrease/increase the net exchange losses by \$0.02 million (2016: \$5.7 million).

#### 16.4.3 Equity price risk

Equity price risk is the risk of loss arising from changes in equity prices. The Commission is exposed to equity price risk through its investment in equity securities and ETFs listed on the Stock Exchange of Hong Kong Ltd.

The Commission's equity price risk is mainly concentrated on equity securities which are Hang Seng Index Constituent Stocks or operating in the financial institutions and utilities sectors and ETFs which seek to provide investment results that closely correspond to the performance of the Hang Seng Index, the Hang Seng China Enterprises Index or those publicly traded securities in China. The Commission sets a limit on its investment in equity securities and ETFs. A Working Group on Investment formed under the Commission advises the Commission on its investment strategies.

If equity prices at the balance sheet date had been 10% higher/lower, other comprehensive income would have increased/decreased by \$3.2 million (2016: \$3.0 million decrease/increase in other comprehensive loss) as a result of the changes in fair value of available-for-sale securities.

#### 17 FAIR VALUE MEASURMENT OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The fair value of financial instruments classified under Level 1 is based on the quoted market prices of these financial instruments at the balance sheet date, without any deduction for estimated future selling costs.

In the absence of such quoted prices, the fair value of financial instruments classified under Level 2 is estimated using valuation techniques which maximize the use of observable data, including market yields of similar products.





## Appendix 5 Secretary General's Environmental Report for the Year 2016-2017

#### **Environmental Goal**

The Legislative Council ("LegCo") Secretariat is committed to:

- Conducting all its activities and operations in an environmentally responsible manner
- Minimizing consumption of resources by efficient use of materials
- Minimizing negative impacts on the environment during the whole work cycle

#### **Environmental Policy**

The environmental policy of the LegCo Secretariat requires all staff to make a special effort to protect the environment through:

- **Saving resources**, particularly on paper and electricity
- **Reducing waste** by re-using paper, collecting recyclable materials and adopting green procurements where applicable
- **Preserving a pleasant indoor working environment** through maintenance of good indoor air quality and minimization of noisy works during office hours
- **Preventing and minimizing air pollution** through the choice of commuting modes and good driving behaviour

#### **Environmental Management**

The Administration Division regularly reviews the Secretariat's environmental objectives and oversees the implementation of the green programme in the Secretariat. To monitor the implementation of green effort measures in office premises, individual divisions are requested to complete a compliance checklist every six months.

A description of the environmental measures and the performance of these measures are included in the table attached.

Following completion of the carbon audit for the LegCo Complex for the period from 1 April 2013 to 31 March 2014, a consultant was commissioned to conduct annual carbon audits for the LegCo Complex from 2014-2015 to 2018-2019. The report on the carbon audit for the LegCo Complex during the period from 1 April 2015 to 31 March 2016 shows different levels of reduction in most of the sources of emission and the greenhouse gas ("GHG") emission intensity of the LegCo Complex in 2015-2016 has reduced by 2.2% as compared to that of the base year of 2013-2014. The consultant's report contains a number of recommendations, including the engagement of different stakeholders to develop carbon reduction targets, implementation of GHG emission reduction measures, fresh water usage reduction and more interactive public engagement programmes. The Secretariat will study and follow up the consultant's recommendations.

- Control fuel consumption (e.g. minimize the use of official vehicles)
- Encourage the use of public transport and bicycle

#### Water conservation

- · Reduce the water flow of water taps
- · Install water flow controllers to wash basins in toilets and shower rooms

#### Waste reduction

- Encourage recycling of paper, plastic, metal, glassware and rechargeable batteries, and provide collection bins in the LegCo Complex
- Enhance public education on waste reduction by providing relevant tips to LegCo Complex users on a regular basis

- Consumption of electricity decreased by 0.8% from 10 142 981 KWh in 2015-2016 to 10 060 723 KWh in 2016-2017
- Consumption of paper increased by 0.6% from 17 338 reams in 2015-2016 to 17 438 reams in 2016-2017
- Collection of waste paper increased by 12.5% from 60 646 kg in 2015-2016 to 68 249 kg in 2016-2017
