Legislative Council Panel on Home Affairs

Progress Report on Enhancement of Programming, Audience Building and Collection Management of Public Museums

Purpose

This paper updates Members on the progress made since our last submission on the subject and outlines our future plan to enhance the programming, audience building, and collection management of public museums managed by the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD).

Background

2. The LCSD is dedicated to promoting culture as well as knowledge in arts, history and science, and to encouraging more visits to the museums in order to build a wider audience base. One of the major policy initiatives introduced during the period was the implementation of free admission to the permanent exhibitions of our major museums (for details please see paragraph 13 below). In devising strategies and directions for museum development, the LCSD works closely with the Museum Advisory Committee and its subcommittees¹ as well as its Museum Expert Advisers² for expert advice.

3. The Panel on Home Affairs was updated on 17 November 2014 vide LC Paper No. CB(2)238/14-15(05) regarding the measures to enhance public museum services, including the proposals to renew the permanent exhibitions of several public museums³. This paper reports the efforts made by the LCSD in the past three years and our future plan in enhancing the programming, audience building and collection management of public museums.

Programming

4. In the past three years, the LCSD museums continued to present a great variety of exhibitions and programmes to enrich the museum experience of the visitors.

Temporary Exhibitions

5. The LCSD museums are committed to staging a wide array of high quality temporary exhibitions that create enriching and inspiring museum visitation experience through unique curatorial approaches, use of modern technology and organisation of interactive activities. Apart from showcasing local art, history and culture, the museums have also staged blockbuster exhibitions by stepping up collaborations with world-renowned museums and cultural organisations such as the Palace Museum, Dunhuang Academy, State Administration of Cultural Heritage, British Museum, Musée du Louvre and London Science Museum. The major temporary exhibitions organised in the past three years are listed at Annex I. All the temporary exhibitions organised in 2017 in celebration of the 20^{th} Anniversary of the establishment of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region have received overwhelming response. Among them, the number of visitors (854,045) to *Eternal Life – Exploring* Ancient Egypt held at the Hong Kong Science Museum has set a new attendance record for museum exhibitions.

Permanent Exhibitions

Hong Kong Museum of Art

Opened in 1991, the Hong Kong Museum of Art (HKMA) is 6. undergoing a major expansion and renovation with a view to strengthening its positioning as a premier art museum as well as enhancing its accessibility, visibility and connectivity with the revitalised Tsim Sha Tsui harbourfront. The expansion and renovation works is expected to be completed in the first quarter of 2019 and the HKMA will re-open in the second half of 2019. Apart from giving the HKMA new façades with modern architectural features, the project will increase the total exhibition area by 42% from the existing $7,080 \text{ m}^2$ to $10,073 \text{ m}^2$. The number of galleries will also increase from 7 to 12^4 , in addition to a multi-function hall for holding thematic exhibitions. Existing galleries will be refitted to upgrade exhibition facilities. To enable HKMA to showcase possible major donations of art collections in the future, it is necessary to procure top-of-the-class, tailor-made showcases, cutting-edge conservation equipment, specialised lighting equipment and environmental monitoring system for its galleries. The total funding required is estimated at

\$39.4 million which will be reflected in the Estimates of the relevant financial years. The cash flow requirement of the above procurement is at <u>Annex II</u>.

Hong Kong Science Museum

Opened in 1991, the Hong Kong Science Museum (HKScM) has 17 7. exhibition galleries occupying a total area of 7,245 m^2 . 16 of these galleries are for permanent exhibitions and one (745 m²) for housing temporary special exhibitions. The renewal works for the Biodiversity Gallery and Children Gallery were completed in 2016 and 2017 respectively. The HKScM is pressing ahead with conversion/renewal works for *Palaeontology Gallery*, Earth Science Gallery, Transportation Hall, Home Technology Hall and Food Science Hall. These renewal projects will be completed in phases by 2021. The HKScM will also convert the *Telecommunications Gallery* into a new InnoTech Gallery to showcase the development and achievements of frontier science and technology research by 2023. The total funding required for developing the new InnoTech Gallery is estimated at \$40 million, which covers preliminary studies and design of exhibition gallery, infrastructure and equipment, flooring and electrical work, as well as fabrication, installation and integration of interactive exhibits. The provision required will be reflected in the Estimates of the relevant financial years. The cash flow requirement of the gallery project is at Annex II.

Hong Kong Heritage Museum

8. Opened in 2000, the Hong Kong Heritage Museum (HKHM) has a total of 12 galleries with a total exhibition area of $7,500 \text{ m}^2$, six of which are permanent galleries. *Jin Yong Gallery* has been opened since March 2017 and has so far attracted over 628,000 visitors. The HKHM is preparing a new permanent exhibition on Hong Kong popular culture, which portrays the unique features of Hong Kong culture as manifested by popular art forms such as movies, pop music and television, as well as elements closely related to our ordinary ways of life. The permanent exhibition is scheduled to open in late 2019.

Hong Kong Museum of History

9. Since 1998, the Hong Kong Museum of History (HKMH) has been housed at its current premises with a total exhibition area of $8,000 \text{ m}^2$, including 7,000 m² devoted to *The Hong Kong Story* permanent exhibition which as launched in 2001. Preparatory work for exhibition renewal commenced in 2015, and a series of public engagement exercises with various stakeholders and experts have been conducted to gauge views on the exhibition contents, display methods, exhibition space and facilities. The revamped exhibition is targeted for opening in 2022.

Hong Kong Museum of Coastal Defence

10. Opened in 2000, the Hong Kong Museum of Coastal Defence (HKMCD) is situated at a historical site with exhibition space of around 1,165 m² and a heritage trail of around 3,680 m². Preparatory work for exhibition renewal started in 2015 and the renewal is expected to be completed in early 2020.

Hong Kong Space Museum

11. Opened in 1980, the Hong Kong Space Museum (HKSpM) has two permanent exhibition halls occupying a total area of $1,600 \text{ m}^2$. The exhibition halls have been closed for renovation since October 2015 and the gallery renewal work and exhibitions mounting will be completed in late 2017. About 100 sets of new exhibits will be installed in the two halls to simulate the novel experience of travelling through space and time.

Hong Kong Railway Museum

12. Opened in 1985, the Hong Kong Railway Museum (HKRM) occupies a total area of $6,500 \text{ m}^2$. The HKRM is currently carrying out a major revamp of its permanent exhibition and extensive conservation treatment of the outdoor railway exhibits to enrich the museum visitation experience and preserve Hong Kong's unique railway heritage. The revamp is targeted for completion in 2019.

Audience Building

Free Admission

13. With effect from 1 August 2016, the community can enjoy free admission to the permanent exhibitions of the HKMA, HKMH, HKHM, HKMCD and Dr Sun Yat-sen Museum. The permanent exhibitions of the HKScM and HKSpM are also open to full-time students free of charge. The new initiative has helped promote the appreciation of culture, art, history and science, as well as widen the audience base of the public museums. After implementation of the new initiative, except for the HKMA and the exhibition halls of the HKSpM which have been closed for renovation, the total attendance of the aforesaid museums has increased by more than 70% in the first year when compared with the total attendance in the same period of the previous year. A breakdown of the attendance figures is shown at <u>Annex III</u>. In light of the encouraging results, the LCSD will maintain the free admission arrangements for the public museums.

Museum Pass

14. To complement the free admission arrangement, the half-yearly, monthly and weekly museum passes have been cancelled while the charges for standard, concessionary and family annual museum passes have been reduced by 50% since 1 August 2016. The sale of museum passes has recorded a significant increase of 240% (from 81,863 to 277,894 passes) in the first year when compared with the same period in the preceding year. Museum pass will encourage holders to conduct more frequent visits to the museums.

Annual Programmes

Hong Kong Science Festival (SciFest)

15. The HKScM has been organising the Hong Kong SciFest since 2014 as an annual large-scale community event to enhance public interest in science and technology. With the concerted efforts of government departments, academic institutions and community organisations, the Hong Kong SciFest offers a wide array of programmes such as carnivals, field visits, workshops, talks and competitions primarily targeting young people and families. From 2014 to 2017, the Hong Kong SciFest has grown in scale and popularity, from 19 to 42 partners, from 47 to 172 programmes, and with attendance soaring from around 201 000 to over 598 000. A number of other local and non-local organisations have also expressed an interest in joining the festival.

Museum Festival

16. First launched in June 2015 and subsequently developed as an annual major cultural event held in summer, the Muse Fest HK (MF) presents a wide array of fabulous exhibitions and creative programmes, offering a festive atmosphere and a unique, attractive and inspiring museum journey for the public. Through encouraging collaboration among public museums and fostering network with other cultural institutes, the MF also serves as a platform to promote museum culture and encourage cross-over activities that inject new impetus into the museum scene. Well-received by the public and the industry players, the MF has sought to extend its horizon by inviting museums in Guangdong and Macao SAR as well as other cities in the region to participate.

Outreach Programmes

Exhibitions outside museums

17. The LCSD continued to join hands with the Airport Authority Hong Kong to present a number of thematic exhibitions on arts and culture at the Hong Kong International Airport in the past years for the local passengers and overseas tourists to enjoy the distinctive flavours of Hong Kong's cultural heritage. In addition, the LCSD has also staged exhibitions beyond museums in order to appeal to a broader range of audiences. Amongst the others, "Living with Bamboo: Museum of Art is Here", "Genesis and Spirit: Recalling Jiangnan" at the Hong Kong Central Library and "China's War of Resistance against Japan" at various public libraries and community venues are successful examples of the outreaching exhibitions.

"Museum of Art on Wheels" Outreach Learning Programme

18. The "Museum of Art on Wheels" Outreach Learning Programme is a moving art museum initiative, bringing purpose-designed art programmes to different schools and the community. Through the interactive games on this mobile museum, participants could discover the uniqueness of Hong Kong's hybrid culture and visualise the presence of the HKMA during its closure.

Professional Excellence

Museum Summit

19. To enhance the professionalism and status of museum practitioners locally, regionally and internationally, the LCSD organised the Museum Summit in June 2017 at the Hong Kong Convention and Exhibition Centre. This international museum conference is the first of its kind in Hong Kong. With 20 celebrated museum professionals across the globe as speakers to share their precious experiences and insights on a wide array of topics, the Summit has attracted nearly 900 participants to its 2-day programme. Given the highly positive feedbacks from the participants, the LCSD will consider organising the Museum Summit again in late 2019.

International Institute for Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works

20. In 2014, Hong Kong hosted the biennial International Institute for Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works (IIC) Congress for the very first time in South East Asia, providing an excellent platform to foster professional exchange amongst conservation professionals, scholars, scientists to curators worldwide in the field of conservation. Riding on the success of the IIC 2014 Hong Kong Congress, the LCSD has jointly presented the IIC-Palace Museum 2017 Hong Kong Symposium with IIC and the Palace Museum from 24 to 26 November 2017. The Symposium underscored the LCSD's commitment to fostering professional exchange at a regional and international level, as well as

to cultivating closer partnerships for the development of a vibrant cultural landscape in the region.

Museum Collections

Heritage Conservation and Resource Centre

21. With notable acquisition efforts over the years, there are over 1.5 million museum items which have outgrown the available storage spaces on the premises of the LCSD museums. In order to better preserve and manage these invaluable yet rapid-growing museum collections, the LCSD plans to construct a Heritage Conservation and Resource Centre (HCRC) in Tin Shui Wai to meet the acute storage needs as well as to make them more accessible to the public. We plan to consult the Panel on Home Affairs on the pre-construction works for this project in the first quarter of 2018. Subject to the funding approval of LegCo, pre-construction works of the HCRC will commence in 2018 to formulate the detailed design for the main construction works.

Centralised Collection Management System

22. The LCSD is developing a Centralised Collection Management System (CCMS) to integrate the existing separate collection management systems of the Hong Kong Film Archive, HKHM and HKMH. The CCMS aims to enhance efficiency, encourage sharing of collection resources amongst the museums concerned, and facilitate public access to information on museum collections. Upon completion of the project, tentatively in 2020, LCSD will evaluate the effectiveness of the CCMS and consider possible integration with the collection management systems of the other LCSD museums.

Advice Sought

23. Members are invited to note and comment on the content of this paper. Subject to Members' view, we will seek the necessary funding approval for the two new projects of the HKMA and HKScM as mentioned in paragraphs 6 and 7 above from the Legislative Council according to established mechanism.
