The Administration was requested to revert to the Panel before the end of the 2018-2019 legislative session the outcome of the consultation and the finalized arrangements for re-allocating the vacant pitches. Initiatives on the reduction of salt and sugar in food	12 March 2019	The Administration was requested to provide the following information:  (a) enforcement actions taken over the past few years against false claims of "low salt", "no salt", "low sugar" and "no sugar" on the packaging labels (including nutrition labels or the specific display labels used under the voluntary "Salt/Sugar" Label Scheme for Prepackaged Food Products) of prepackaged food products for breach of the Food and Drugs (Composition and Labelling) Regulations (Cap. 132W); and	Response from the Administration awaited.
