# I. Formulation of a new Hong Kong Rehabilitation Programme Plan

[LC Paper Nos. CB(2)484/19-20(01) to (02)]

At the invitation of the Chairman, <u>Under Secretary for Labour and</u> <u>Welfare</u> ("USLW") briefed members on the progress of the formulation of a new Hong Kong Rehabilitation Programme Plan ("RPP"), and the strategic directions, themes and strategic recommendations of the new RPP.

2. <u>The Chairman</u> invited the deputations/individuals to present their views. A total of 46 deputations/individuals expressed their views which were summarized in the **Appendix**.

# The Administration's response to views of deputations/individuals

- 3. <u>USLW</u> made the following responses:
  - (a) the Administration had been examining the provision of services for persons with disabilities and implementing enhancement measures as and when they were ready without waiting for the completion of the RPP review;
  - (b) the new RPP would project the demand for future rehabilitation services, taking account of expressed service demand, population growth rate of persons with disabilities and relevant adjustment factors, and would draw up a projection model for manpower requirement on the basis of the projected demand for rehabilitation services;
  - (c) the new RPP would cover the provision of accessible transport services and accessibility of community environment for persons with disabilities. In this connection, the Administration planned to provide 20 additional Rehabuses in 2020-2021 to enhance the Rehabus service;
  - (d) the policy objective of providing employment support for persons with disabilities was to enable them to take up employment in the open market on the basis of their abilities rather than disabilities. Vocational training programmes were provided for persons with disabilities to equip them with work skills for better chance of employment. The suggestion of setting up an employment quota system for persons with disabilities should be carefully considered to avoid possible stigmatization;

- (e) the Administration had implemented employment support measures for persons with disabilities which included job-matching services, creating job opportunities by promoting the establishment of social enterprises which employed persons with disabilities and increasing the subsidies for employers employing persons with disabilities;
- (f) the Administration had provided assistance for persons with disabilities to help them adapt to the workplace and for employers to learn how to work with persons with disabilities smoothly;
- (g) funds were provided for eligible employers to procure assistive devices and/or carry out workplace modifications with a view to facilitating the work of their employees with disabilities;
- (h) many employers had positive feedbacks about employing persons with disabilities. These feedbacks should be promulgated to encourage more employers to employ persons with disabilities;
- (i) the Labour and Welfare Bureau would commence a study on carer support policy, including carers of persons with disabilities. The study would cover, among others, the different needs of carers at various caregiving stages. The Administration would also make reference to overseas experience in providing support for carers in conducting the study;
- (j) support services for carers of persons with disabilities had also been strengthened. For example, the number of District Support Centres for Persons with Disabilities, Support Centres for Persons with Autism and Parents/Relatives Resources Centres had been increased;
- (k) the new RPP had recommended that the service quality of residential care homes for persons with disabilities ("RCHDs") should be enhanced through upgrading the notional staffing requirements, adjusting upward the statutory minimum area of floor space per resident, raising the accountability of licensees, mandating registration of home managers and continuous training of health workers. The Administration would work towards these directions in enhancing the service quality of

## RCHDs;

- (1) the Administration had increased the number of residential respite places to cater for the provision of emergency placement service for persons with disabilities and would enhance the standards of such services;
- (m) given that application of technology was useful in helping elderly persons and persons with disabilities rehabilitate and reducing the burden of their carers, the Administration had increased the subsidies for elderly and rehabilitation service units to try out and procure/rent technology products in the past few years;
- (n) the Administration would continue to increase the provision of pre-school rehabilitation services with a view to achieving zero waiting time. There would be around 10 000 places for on-site pre-school rehabilitation services ("OPRS") in 2022;
- (o) the eligibility criteria for receiving after-school care support services had been relaxed and the number of such service places had been increased. Starting from October 2020, subsidies would be provided for children with special educational needs ("SEN") to use such services; and
- (p) the Administration was open minded towards renaming the new RPP and would listen to views in this regard during the public engagement exercise. To avoid confusion, RPP would continue to be used in the course of conducting the RPP review.

## **Discussion**

## The Hong Kong Rehabilitation Programme Plan Review

4. <u>Dr Fernando CHEUNG</u> shared the deputations' concern that the new RPP had not made concrete recommendations on how to address some long-standing problems such as the exceedingly long waiting time for residential care services ("RCS") and community care services, substandard quality of private RCHDs, etc. He also considered that the new RPP should be renamed as its service scope was not confined to rehabilitation services.

5. <u>USLW</u> responded that the Administration had implemented short, medium and long-term measures to address the needed premises for

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welfare services. In addition to drawing up long-term plans for provision of welfare services, the Administration had proposed to allocate \$20 billion to purchase premises for the provision of welfare facilities. The Administration had also required private developers through land sale conditions to construct specified welfare facilities. A recent example was the successful bidder of the Kai Tak Area 4A Site 2 being required to construct specified welfare facilities, including facilities for rehabilitation services.

# Support for children with special educational needs

6. <u>The Deputy Chairman</u> and <u>Mr Michael TIEN</u> expressed concern that many SEN children had no alternative but to study at ordinary kindergartens ("KGs") or ordinary child care centres ("CCCs") due to serious shortage of places in special child care centres ("SCCCs"). As a result, these SEN children were unable to receive suitable training and appropriate support. <u>The Deputy Chairman</u> further expressed disappointment that the new RPP had not made any short, medium or longterm recommendations to address the serious shortage of SCCC places.

7. <u>Mr Michael TIEN</u> said that there were 1 984 and 2 205 pre-school SEN children waiting for SCCC places in 2018 and 2019 respectively and the waiting time for these places was one to two years. Given that there would be profound effect on the development of SEN children if they were not provided with the necessary training early in their prime learning period, he called on the Administration to strengthen the manpower for providing pre-school rehabilitation services and arrange OPRS for SEN children in ordinary CCCs as soon as possible.

8. <u>USLW</u> explained that the total number of places of SCCCs as well as that of Early Education and Training Centres would be increased by about 1 200 to about 6 700 from the 2019-2020 financial year to the 2021-2022 financial year. The Administration had also implemented a pilot project, through the Lotteries Fund, on the provision of support for children who showed signs of special needs and were waiting for assessment in KGs or KG-cum-CCCs. The RPP review would consider ways to address the service needs of SEN children. At the request of Mr Michael TIEN, <u>USLW</u> undertook to provide the Administration's response on whether and when OPRS would be provided for SEN children who were admitted to ordinary CCCs due to lack of SCCC places.

(At 5:58 pm, the Chairman extended the meeting for 15 minutes beyond the appointed ending time to allow sufficient time for discussion.)

Introduction of care service vouchers for persons with disabilities

9. <u>The Deputy Chairman</u> and <u>Dr Fernando CEHUNG</u> had reservation about the new RPP's recommendation of introducing care service vouchers for persons with disabilities. <u>Dr CHEUNG</u> remarked that as many service providers participating in the care service voucher schemes for the elderly implemented by the Administration were already unable to cope with the existing service demand, they would not have any spare capacity to meet the demand of persons with disabilities.

10. <u>The Deputy Chairman</u> pointed out that the Administration had adopted the concept of "money following users" by implementing various care service voucher schemes and providing subsidies, such as the Residential Care Supplement, for eligible persons to receive non-subsidized RCS. However, as the amount of Residential Care Supplement was too small, RCS provided by many private residential care homes were of poor quality. <u>The Deputy Chairman</u> was of the view that the concept of "money following users" had created a lot of service quality problems, and questioned how the Administration could ensure the quality of services provided under such a funding concept.

11. <u>The Deputy Chairman</u> further opined that care service vouchers with a co-payment mechanism should not be introduced for persons with disabilities because the effectiveness of the existing care service voucher schemes was still doubtful and the co-payment mechanism might result in decreased access to care services for the poor. Since persons with disabilities were exempted from means test for receiving subsidized rehabilitation services, he also questioned the justifications for introducing a means test mechanism under the care service voucher scheme for persons with disabilities. <u>Dr Fernando CHEUNG</u> considered that it was a basic need of persons with disabilities to receive care service. As such, they should not be required to pay for such services.

12. <u>USLW</u> responded that the new RPP was recommending exploring the feasibility of providing care service vouchers for persons with disabilities. This would neither replace the existing services nor affect the Administration's service provision plan for persons with disabilities. The Administration would listen to views of the community on the provision of care service vouchers during the public engagement exercise. The Administration would continue to enhance the services for persons with disabilities to address the service needs.

# Support for self-help organizations

13. <u>The Deputy Chairman</u> said that the Administration had not increased the funding earmarked for self-help organizations although the number of such organizations had increased. As such, many self-help organizations did not have sufficient funds to meet their operating costs. In his view, simply reviewing the support for self-help organizations to promote self and mutual support among persons with disabilities and their carers as recommended by the new RPP was insufficient. He called on the Administration to implement strategies and set policy direction for the development of self-help organizations.

# **Motions**

14. <u>The Deputy Chairman</u> moved the following two motions:

# Motion 1

# (Translation)

"Given the serious shortage of places offered by special child care centres, children with severe special educational needs ("SEN") have no alternative but to study at ordinary kindergartens and are not provided with appropriate support as a result. This Panel urges the Administration to, through On-site Pre-school Rehabilitation Services, provide additional special child care workers for ordinary kindergartens which have admitted severe SEN children, so as to enhance rehabilitation training and assist schools to provide suitable support for severe SEN children, thereby safeguarding their rights of obtaining appropriate support and receiving education."

15. <u>The Chairman</u> put the motion to vote. All members present voted for the motion. <u>The Chairman</u> declared that the motion was carried.

#### Motion 2

## (Translation)

"This Panel urges the Government to, by reviewing and planning traditional community and home care services and establishing a third-party case manager system in the first place, provide all persons with disabilities in need with affordable, professional and people-oriented care services. Given that the effectiveness of the Pilot Scheme on Community Care Service Voucher for the Elderly is still doubtful and needs to be further discussed and testified in future, whilst the needs of persons with disabilities are more diversified and complicated, we do not agree with the Government's rolling out of the same service model to persons with disabilities without taking into full account the future development of service providers in the market and community care services."

16. <u>The Chairman</u> put the motion to vote. All members present voted for the motion. <u>The Chairman</u> declared that the motion was carried.

## **II.** Any other business

17. There being no other business, the meeting ended at 6:17 pm.
