**Proposed timing
for discussion**

1. Enhanced protection of green turtles

November 2020

The Administration will brief members on the proposed expansion of the Sham Wan Restricted Area to cover the sea inlet at Sham Wan, Lamma Islands and the extension of the restricted period to further enhance the protection of green turtles.

At the meeting on 17 October 2019, Mr HUI Chi-fung suggested that the Panel should further discuss the geographical coverage of the Sham Wan Restricted Area.

The Administration plans to introduce the relevant legislative proposal into the Legislative Council in December 2020/January 2021.

2. Management of restored landfills

November 2020

The Administration will brief the Panel on the Tung Wah Group of Hospitals "E-Co Village" project proposed to be implemented at the Tseung Kwan O Stage I Landfill as well as the management of restored landfills and the latest development of their beneficial afteruses.

The Administration plans to submit the proposal relating to the "E-Co Village" project to the Public Works Subcommittee and the Finance Committee in February and March 2021 respectively.

In his letter to the Chairman dated 25 May 2018 (LC Paper No. CB(1)1023/17-18(01)), Mr Kenneth LEUNG proposed discussion on this subject, including the progress of developing public facilities on the 13 restored landfills, implementation progress of the Restored Landfill Revitalisation Funding Scheme, and issues related to the handling of landfill gas, leachate and uneven ground settlement on the sites concerned.

3. Provision of sewerage network in Lantau and Lamma

To be confirmed

The Administration will seek members' views on the proposed upgrading of the following sewerage projects to Category A:

- (a) 4353DS – Outlying Islands sewerage stage 2 – extension of sewerage system to other unsewered villages in Mui Wo, whose aim is to construct sewerage works for village areas in Mui Wo; and
- (b) 4355DS – Outlying Islands sewerage stage 2 – Lamma village sewerage phase 2, package 2, whose aim is to construct sewerage network for village areas in Lamma Island.

The Administration plans to submit the proposal to the Public Works Subcommittee and the Finance Committee in the second quarter of 2021.

4. Phase Four of Mandatory Energy Efficiency Labelling Scheme

To be confirmed

The Administration will seek the Panel's views on new appliances to be included in Phase Four of the Mandatory Energy Efficiency Labelling Scheme.

5. Management of marine fill and marine disposal of dredged/excavated sediment

To be confirmed

The Administration will brief the Panel on the management of marine fill and disposal of dredged/excavated sediments by the project owners.

The subject was raised by Mr Steven HO at the meeting on 15 December 2014.

At the meeting on 28 November 2016, Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung suggested the Panel discuss the environmental issues relating to illegal disposal of construction and demolition materials into the sea/river. The Administration advised that these issues could be discussed under this item.

6. Review on measures to manage external lighting

To be confirmed

As suggested by some members at the meeting on 30 October 2017, members agreed to discuss the Administration's initiatives to regulate excessive external lighting.

On 12 April 2018 and 6 August 2019, the Panel received two referrals (LC Paper Nos. CB(1)802/17-18(01) and CB(1)1373/18-19(01)) arising from the meetings between Legislative Council Members and Wan Chai District Council members on 26 January 2018 and 28 June 2019 regarding the regulation of external lighting installations.

7. Combating climate change

To be confirmed

The Administration will update the Panel on the work related to the public engagement on Long-term Decarbonisation Strategy conducted by the Council for Sustainable Development.

As suggested by Mr CHU Hoi-dick at the meeting on 12 October 2017, members agreed that the topic of climate change should be brought up for discussion by the Panel every year. At the meeting on 11 October 2018, Mr CHU further proposed that the Administration should review its targets and strategies for reducing greenhouse gas emissions with reference to the findings in the Special Report on Global Warming of 1.5°C published by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change in October 2018; and Ms Elizabeth QUAT suggested that the Administration should brief members on the use of new technologies to combat climate change, thereby contributing to the development of a "smart environment". On 28 March 2019, Ms QUAT wrote to the Chairman (LC Paper No. CB(1)929/18-19(01)) appealing for early discussion of the topic.

8. Future arrangements for Dedicated Liquefied Petroleum Gas Filling Stations ("DFSs")

The Administration will brief the Panel on the future arrangements for DFSs after the expiry of the existing contracts.

9. Management of waste paper

To be confirmed

As suggested by Mr Kenneth LEUNG at the meeting on 12 October 2017, members requested the Administration to step up efforts to reduce paper towel consumption in public toilets. Moreover, Mr HUI Chi-fung wrote to the Chairman on 27 February 2018 (LC Paper No. CB(1)663/17-18(01)) proposing discussion on the recycling of waste paper, including the Administration's policy on supporting the local recycling of waste paper.

10. Noise pollution

To be confirmed

As suggested by Ms Elizabeth QUAT at the meeting on 30 October 2017, members agreed to discuss the Administration's initiatives to control noise pollution.

11. Review of the environmental impact assessment ("EIA") system

To be confirmed

Mr Kenneth LEUNG wrote to the Chairman on 24 November 2015 (LC Paper No. CB(1)202/15-16(01)) proposing discussion on the review of the EIA system, including the arrangements for the conduct of EIAs, public consultation arrangements, and enforcement of the environmental permit conditions. The Administration's response was circulated vide LC Paper No. CB(1)537/15-16(01) on 3 February 2016.

At the meeting on 11 October 2018, Mr Steven HO brought this issue up and suggested that the Administration should improve the transparency of the EIA system and public understanding of EIA reports, in anticipation of public concerns over the environmental impact of future reclamation works. In his letter to the Chairman dated 19 March 2019 (LC Paper No. CB(1)752/18-19(01)), Mr HO further expressed concerns about the ineffectiveness of EIAs in reflecting the cumulative environmental impacts of marine works projects and works related to new development areas on the agriculture and fisheries industries. The Administration's written response to the letter was circulated to members on 8 April 2019 vide LC Paper No. CB(1)859/18-19(01).

12. Existing policies on bicycles and promoting bicycles as a mode of transport as an initiative to improve roadside air quality

To be confirmed

Mr HUI Chi-fung wrote to the Chairman on 23 May 2017 (LC Paper No. CB(1)1009/16-17) proposing to hold a joint meeting with the Panel on Transport to discuss issues relating to the existing policies on bicycles and promoting bicycles as a mode of transport. Mr HUI further wrote to the Chairman on 12 October 2017 proposing to discuss bicycle-friendly policies (LC Paper No. CB(1)86/17-18(01)).

Separately, the Panel on Transport discussed at its meeting on 15 May 2020 "Improvement works of cycle track network in new towns and latest situation of automated dockless bicycle rental services".

13. Regulation of trade in bear bile products

To be confirmed

This item was raised at the meeting on 11 October 2018 by Ms Elizabeth QUAT who expressed concern about the inhumane practice of extracting bile from live bears. Members would like to be briefed on the statistics on and regulation of trading activities associated with bear bile and its products, and whether the Administration would consider prohibiting the trade in products containing bile extracted from live bears.

14. Environmental impact of the use of tear gas

To be confirmed

This item was raised by Ms Tanya CHAN on behalf of Mr CHAN Chi-chuen at the meeting on 17 October 2019. Ms CHAN suggested that the Administration should brief the Panel on the environmental and health impacts of the frequent use of tear gas in the community in the preceding few months, and how it would tackle the environmental pollution, if any, caused by tear gas residues. The Panel received a submission from The Conservancy Association on the subject (LC Paper No. CB(1)161/19-20(01)).
