Legislative Council Panel on Security

**2023 Policy Address
Policy Initiatives of Security Bureau**

Safety and stability of the society are fundamental to a peaceful and fulfilling life of Hong Kong people as well as the prosperous development of our economy. In the year to come, the Security Bureau (“SB”) and its disciplined services will continue to safeguard national security and uphold law and order in Hong Kong with their best endeavours, and will strengthen Hong Kong’s overall emergency preparedness. To attract more visitors to Hong Kong and enrich our talent pool, we will implement visa relaxation, upgrade the infrastructure of boundary control points (“BCPs”) and improve clearance efficiency, and will tell good stories of Hong Kong. At the same time, we will continue to enhance the rehabilitation services for persons in custody (“PICs”). We will also continue our efforts, through innovative technology, to provide the public with more convenient services and to enhance the law enforcement capability as well as efficiency of rescue operations of the disciplined services. We will take proactive actions to promote youth development to instill positive thinking, law-abiding and national security awareness and patriotism in the youth.

2. This paper elaborates on SB’s six major policy areas in the 2023 Policy Address –

- (i) Safeguarding Our Country and Home;
- (ii) Joining Hands on the Road to Rehabilitation;
- (iii) Enabling Highly Efficient Connectivity;
- (iv) Bringing Convenience to the Public through Innovative Technology;
- (v) Supporting Youth Development; and
- (vi) Telling Good Stories of Hong Kong.

(I) Safeguarding Our Country and Home

(A) Safeguarding National Security

3. The Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (“HKSAR”) is an inalienable part of the People’s Republic of China. It is the constitutional duty of the HKSAR and also the common responsibility of the people of Hong Kong to safeguard national sovereignty, security and development interests. Following the implementation of the National Security Law, Hong Kong has moved away from the worst-case scenario brought by the serious violence. Through investigatory and law enforcement actions against people and organisations suspected of endangering national security, we have successfully eradicated a number of key individuals and organisations endangering national security.

4. That said, there are still a small number of radical individuals in the society who have not given up their acts and activities endangering national security, while external elements have continued to leverage the unique environment of Hong Kong under the principle of “one country, two systems” and high degree of autonomy, and incessantly interfere with and smear the affairs of the HKSAR, with a view to endangering national security. In particular, after we commenced the operation in listing eight persons who have absconded overseas as wanted persons, government officials and politicians of the countries to which the eight persons have fled quickly jumped at the opportunity and launched attacks, including smearing the National Security Law and relevant law enforcement actions, so as to create public opinion to underpin the actions of United States and western countries to further “use Hong Kong to contain China”. Law enforcement agencies will continue to take investigatory and law enforcement actions, pursuant to the National Security Law and through reviving existing legislation, against acts and activities suspected of endangering national security, and step up collection and analysis of intelligence related to national security and counter-terrorism.

5. Enacting local legislation on Article 23 of the Basic Law (“BL”) and refining laws relevant to safeguarding national security are the

constitutional responsibilities of the HKSAR. Besides, there are also practical needs to legislate on Article 23 of the BL. The HKSAR Government has been carrying out the work in respect of the enactment of legislation on Article 23 of the BL. We are pressing ahead in drawing up effective legislative proposals, which can effectively address past and present national security risks and threats, are sufficiently forward-looking to address possible risks in future, and are practicable in terms of implementation. We will conduct public consultation at a suitable juncture, with a view to completing the legislative work within 2024.

6. At the same time, we will also continue to enhance the national security awareness of members of the public (especially our young people), including continuing to enhance the content of the National Security Law online virtual exhibition, organising inter-school competitions with the Department of Justice, Education Bureau and suitable non-government organisations to enhance the national security knowledge and awareness of young people (especially students), and continuing to promote national security education among members of youth uniformed groups under the disciplined services.

7. Moreover, the Committee for Safeguarding National Security of the HKSAR will set up an exhibition gallery on national security, which will serve as an educational base, and produce training materials and train community instructors to promote national security in various districts, so as to enhance the public's understanding and raise their awareness of the need to safeguard national security. The SB will lend its full support.

(B) Protection of cybersecurity of critical infrastructure

8. Enhancing the cybersecurity of Hong Kong's critical infrastructure will help consolidate Hong Kong's favourable business environment and status as an international financial centre, and ensure the smooth operation of essential services provided to the public. In view of the increasing risk of global cyber-attacks, the HKSAR Government will endeavour to enhance the cybersecurity protection of critical infrastructure (including energy, communications,

transportation, financial institutions, etc.) to guard against cybersecurity challenges. This includes formulating legislative proposals on the cybersecurity obligations of operators of critical infrastructure.

9. Together with the Office of the Government Chief Information Officer (“OGCIO”) and the Hong Kong Police Force (“HKPF”), we have consulted the cybersecurity industry in the first quarter of this year and met with major operators of critical infrastructure in the second and third quarters of this year to exchange initial views on the proposed legislative framework. We are now formulating the legislative proposals, and the related code of practice in collaboration with OGCIO. This will be followed by consultation with the Legislative Council (“LegCo”) Panel on Security and relevant stakeholders. The target is to introduce the bill into the LegCo within 2024.

(C) Co-operation with Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (“GBA”) in Emergency Response and Rescue

10. To take forward co-operation in regional emergency management, the HKSAR Government and People’s Government of Guangdong Province signed an “Agreement to enhance co-operation between Hong Kong and Guangdong in emergency management” back in 2008. Over the years, exchanges in the two places have promoted the professional collaboration and tacit understanding among various units, and yielded positive results in various aspects of emergency management.

11. Considering that the GBA is a region typically vulnerable to climate threats with frequent occurrence of hazardous weather including typhoons, torrential rain, high temperature, etc., and that isolated disasters may happen, we need to deepen and improve the management and co-operation mechanism in the GBA emergency response and rescue system, in a bid to enhance the action ability of the GBA cities, strengthen the overall emergency response operational capability in the GBA, facilitate in-depth integration within the region, with a view to developing an international first-class bay area ideal for living, working and travelling.

12. In fact, Hong Kong has put in place various contingency plans to tackle different scenarios of emergencies and has over the years accumulated experience and built up capability. On the other hand, the Mainland has been continuously strengthening the hardware in emergency response, particularly for heavy-duty equipment. In this connection, Hong Kong and other GBA cities will formulate a new “GBA Emergency Response and Rescue Operational Plan” (“Operational Plan”) to build a comprehensive, practical and systematic GBA emergency response operational mechanism under the principles of collaborative prevention and control as well as achieving synergy. The aim is to enhance the capability of the cities in the region for collaborative disaster prevention, mitigation and relief, and for responding to major public emergencies. We will take forward the co-operation framework agreement of the Operational Plan with the governments of Guangdong and Macao within 2024.

(D) Establishment of the Fire Services Department Building Improvement Support Centre

13. It has been the common goal of the HKSAR Government and all sectors of the community to provide members of the public with better protection by enhancing the fire safety of buildings, especially the old ones. We have therefore enacted the Fire Safety (Commercial Premises) Ordinance, the Fire Safety (Buildings) Ordinance and the Fire Safety (Industrial Buildings) Ordinance, with the aim to strengthen protection by upgrading the respective fire safety standards of old commercial premises/buildings, old composite and domestic buildings and old industrial buildings to present-day standards. We have also been proactively providing various kinds of support to owners of old buildings, particularly those of old composite and domestic buildings, with a view to assisting them in carrying out fire safety improvement works.

14. To offer further assistance, the Fire Services Department (“FSD”) will establish the Fire Services Department Building Improvement Support Centre by the end of this year to provide owners and occupiers of old buildings with one-stop support service to assist

them in complying with the requirements of the above-mentioned ordinances. For example, consultation services on fire safety improvement works as well as related subsidy and loan schemes will be provided, so as to facilitate member of the public.

(E) Strengthening Anti-drug Efforts

15. Our anti-drug strategy has all along been underpinned by a multi-pronged approach, comprising preventive education and publicity, treatment and rehabilitation, legislation and law enforcement, external cooperation, and research. The drug situation in Hong Kong is largely under control in recent years. Due in no small part to the concerted anti-drug efforts of various sectors in the community, the reported number of drug abusers has been more than halved in the past ten years. In particular, the Action Committee Against Narcotics (“ACAN”) has made remarkable contribution by proactively recommending various measures to the HKSAR Government to combat drug problems in the community. The ACAN will reach a milestone in 2025 when it turns 60. To mark this anniversary, we will organise a series of events, including roving exhibition and commemorative publication, with a view to solidifying the anti-drug awareness of the community.

16. In view of the increase in the number of cocaine abusers in recent years, we will strengthen publicity to combat the abuse of cocaine and educate the public about its harms through a range of activities in the coming year, including production of short publicity videos, so as to prevent the spread of drug harms. Interdisciplinary collaboration is direly needed for quitting psychotropic substances such as cocaine and methamphetamine (Ice). We would provide additional resources for subvented service units to strengthen manpower and training, so as to adopt interdisciplinary interventions to encourage quitting of drugs and maintaining abstinence.

(F) Handling of Non-refoulement Claims

17. We have all along attached great importance to handling non-refoulement claims, and have continued to handle the issue through a multi-pronged approach with considerable progress achieved. As at September 2023:

- (a) the number of non-ethnic Chinese illegal immigrants intercepted and new claims received dropped significantly by around 80% and 70% respectively as compared with the peak;
- (b) the handling time for each claim by the Immigration Department (“ImmD”) shortened significantly by around 60%, and the once accumulated backlog of claims pending screening by the ImmD was generally cleared in early 2019;
- (c) the number of outstanding appeals pending processing by the statutory Torture Claims Appeal Board (“TCAB”) dropped by around 77% from the peak; and
- (d) since the implementation of the updated removal policy in December 2022, the ImmD has removed 1 416 claimants from Hong Kong, which included 173 claimants removed pursuant to the updated removal policy. In the first nine months of 2023, the monthly average number of claimants removed has increased significantly by 65% as compared with that of 2022.

18. We will implement further enhanced measures, including:

- (a) through profile analysis of obvious abusers of the non-refoulement claim mechanism and via the Advance Passenger Information System to be rolled out in phases starting from the third quarter of 2024, the ImmD will enhance identification of potential abusers and prevent their entry to Hong Kong;

- (b) through streamlined process, the TCAB will enhance its efficiency in processing appeal cases, with the target of reducing the average processing time from over seven months in the past to around four months;
- (c) we have implemented arrangements of various legislative amendments to enhance treatments of immigration detainees, so as to further uphold discipline and order at detention facilities; and
- (d) we will continue to fully implement the updated removal policy so as to enhance the efficiency and efforts in removing unsubstantiated claimants, with the target of removing no less than 1 200 unsubstantiated claimants per year.

(G) Combating Deception

19. The rise in fraud and technology crimes is a global trend and the increase in fraud cases is not unique to Hong Kong. The main reasons include the widespread use of the internet and social media by citizens, their engagement in online activities such as making friends or communicating with others, online shopping, job searching, and investment etc. which provide opportunities for scammers to take advantage of.

20. The HKPF have all along been committed to combating various types of fraud. In addition to adopting an intelligence-led enforcement approach, the HKPF actively enhance collaboration with stakeholders through a multi-agency approach. A multi-channel, extensive publicity strategy is also adopted to heighten public awareness of different types of fraud. The HKPF will set up a new joint platform with major banks by the end of this year. Participating banks will deploy staff to station at the platform office to provide real-time assistance to the HKPF on fraudulent cases, so as to strengthen intelligence analysis and exchange, enhance the capability of identifying suspicious accounts, detecting the whereabouts of

fraudulent funds and intercepting fraudulent funds, as well as taking targeted and immediate anti-fraud actions to identify and assist victims at an early stage. This will enable the HKPF and banks to work together in combating fraudulent activities and related criminal syndicates.

(II) Joining Hands on the Road to Rehabilitation

(H) Establishment of the Ethics College

21. The Correctional Services Department (“CSD”) has been committed to encouraging continuous education among PICs to facilitate their smooth reintegration into society after release. To further assist adult PICs to rehabilitate, the CSD will strengthen its efforts in the promotion of educational services by arranging for adult PICs to pursue a full-time Diploma of Applied Education (“DAE”) programme, and engage in comprehensive learning activities related to vocational training, sports and arts, and national education. This initiative aims to cultivate positive values among adult PICs and enable them to acquire recognised qualifications, thereby preparing them for successful reintegration into society in future.

22. In this connection, the CSD plans to establish the Ethics College at Pak Sha Wan Correctional Institution and Lo Wu Correctional Institution¹ in the fourth quarter of this year to offer a one-year full-time DAE programme for adult PICs for voluntary participation. Upon completion of the DAE programme with a pass in the examination, PICs will be awarded a DAE certificate, and the qualification so obtained is deemed comparable to the attainment of Level 2 standard in five subjects including Chinese Language and English Language in the Hong Kong Diploma of Secondary Education Examination to facilitate their further studies and career development for smooth reintegration into society in future.

¹ Female PICs at Lo Wu Correctional Institution will attend classes simultaneously with male PICs at Pak Sha Wan Correctional Institution via remote live streaming. A teaching assistant will be available at Lo Wu Correctional Institution to provide them with real-time learning support.

(I) Establishment of Parent-child Centres

23. At present, there are three parent-child centres specifically designed for female PICs, which are located at Lai King Correctional Institution, Tai Lam Centre for Women and Lo Wu Correctional Institution respectively. The CSD will establish parent-child centres in three correctional institutions for male offenders (Hei Ling Chau Addiction Treatment Centre, Tong Fuk Correctional Institution and Stanley Prison) by the end of this year. These centres aim to provide a suitable environment for male PICs and their children under the age of 11, with a view to promoting parent-child interaction and enhancing the relationships between adult male PICs and their children, so as to strengthen their determination to rehabilitate through family support. Besides, the CSD will collaborate with local universities and non-governmental organisations to study the effectiveness of parent-child centres in correctional institutions for male offenders and the ways to reduce intergenerational offending.

(III) Enabling Highly Efficient Connectivity

(J) Multiple-entry visa to Mainland for foreign staff of Companies in Hong Kong

24. The HKSAR Government and Mainland authorities have been exploring means to further facilitate the “southbound and northbound” flow of high-end talents within the GBA. Further to the “southbound” exit endorsement for GBA talents rolled out by Mainland authorities in February this year which facilitates six types of talents in Mainland GBA cities to travel to Hong Kong, the Mainland authorities agreed that, starting from 26 October 2023, foreign staff of Hong Kong registered companies may apply for multiple-entry visas to the Mainland, which last for two years or more, with priority given in processing. Among them, non-Chinese Hong Kong Permanent Residents may even apply for multiple-entry visas which last for up to five years.

25. The introduction of the above-mentioned visa facilitation measure by the Mainland authorities positively responded to the

aspirations of foreign chambers of commerce and the business community in Hong Kong for ease of northbound travel which would further facilitate their active participation in the GBA development. This is a significant outcome made possible through close communication and cooperation between the HKSAR Government and relevant Mainland authorities. This measure gives full play to the unique connector role of Hong Kong in attracting high-end corporations and talents around the world to settle in Hong Kong, and gather as well as take root in the GBA. This is also a key strategy to speed up the development of a talent cluster in the GBA and enhance our country's soft power.

(K) Relaxing visa requirements

26. To further attract more talents to Hong Kong, we have relaxed the visa policy for Vietnamese talents to come to Hong Kong for employment with effect from 25 October 2023, including the Top Talent Pass Scheme. We have also relaxed the criteria for Vietnamese applying for multiple-entry visa for business and travel in response to the calls of the society. Meanwhile, we have also relaxed the visa policy for Laotian and Nepalese talents for employment, training and study in eligible full-time programmes at undergraduate level or above offered by University Grants Committee-funded institutions, with a view to promoting exchanges on various fronts with talents from these places.

(L) Enhancing infrastructure of land BCPs and clearance efficiency

27. To complement the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao GBA development blueprint and facilitate smooth and efficient people and cargo flows within the GBA, the HKSAR Government has been forging ahead a series of measures to further enhance their clearance capacity of control points and the clearance efficiency including collaboration with the Shenzhen Municipal Government to take forward the redevelopment of the Huanggang Port and the Sha Tau Kok (“STK”) Port.

28. For the Huanggang Port, the HKSAR Government will continue to maintain close liaison with the Shenzhen Municipal Government in respect of the set-up of the Hong Kong Port Area and implementation of the "collaborative inspection and joint clearance" mode, and with the aim of implementing the new clearance mode at the new Huanggang Port upon its commissioning in 2026. For the STK Port, the tendering exercise for the engineering feasibility study was commissioned in the first quarter of this year, with the contract awarded in the third quarter of this year.

29. We will continue to actively explore the adoption of new clearance mode, including implementing the "collaborative inspection and joint clearance" mode in the new land BCPs infrastructure projects to enhance passenger clearance efficiency.

(IV) Bringing Convenience to the Public through Innovative Technology

(M) Expediting Development of Digital Government

30. We will continue to make use of innovative technology in enhancing the enforcement capabilities and efficiency of rescue operations of the disciplined services, as well as conduct review of such use as appropriate, and proactively examine the use of technology in various aspects to optimise and enhance quick response ability with a view to providing more convenient services to the public. The key initiatives include –

- (a) The HKPF will introduce the "Electronic Closed Area Permit" ("Electronic CAP") and "Electronic Closed Road Permit" by end of this year and significantly shorten the processing time for applications. The HKPF will also launch the "HKSOS" mobile application in the first quarter of 2024, with built-in "Smart Search and Rescue Solutions" to assist rescuers to locate persons in need;

- (b) The CSD will launch the Social Visit e-Booking Service in the fourth quarter of this year for members of the public to book online for visits to PICs via the Department’s website or mobile application;
- (c) The Customs and Excise Department (“C&ED”) is adopting verification of registration by dynamic QR code in the “Dealers in Precious Metals and Stones Registration System” within 2023 to facilitate the industry and consumers to verify the registration of dealers immediately, which is conducive to law enforcement and business;
- (d) The FSD will introduce a new mobile application function in the fourth quarter of this year to help the public identify FSD-approved portable firefighting equipment for promoting the wider use of such firefighting equipment so as to enhance fire safety at domestic premises; and
- (e) The FSD will introduce remote-controlled robot dogs by the third quarter of 2024 to help conduct inspections in hazardous areas during “chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear” (“CBRN”) incidents for reducing fire personnel’s risk of being exposed to CBRN hazards.

(V) Supporting Youth Development

(N) Continuing to Implement the Youth Work of SB and its disciplined services

31. SB and the disciplined and auxiliary services have all along been committed to youth development work. The aim is to cultivate, through organising diverse activities, young people’s physical and mental health, positive thinking, law-abiding and national security awareness, patriotism, and sense of discipline and team spirit, thereby helping them to equip themselves to contribute to Hong Kong and our country. Currently, all disciplined and auxiliary services (except the

Government Flying Service (“GFS”)) have set up their own youth uniformed groups. As for the GFS, it will soon bring in the Hong Kong Air Cadet Corps (“HKACC”), its long-term partner in youth work, as a youth uniformed group under its subvention. Apart from supporting and coordinating the youth work of the disciplined and auxiliary services, last year we also launched the Security Bureau Youth Uniformed Group Leaders Forum (“Leaders Forum”) to benefit the elites in our youth uniformed groups, as well as the Project Lighthouse to nurture non-Chinese speaking students.

32. To continue to implement the Leaders Forum, SB will rigorously select members for the new term in the fourth quarter of this year. Diverse learning opportunities, exchange activities with Mainland universities as well as study tours to the GBA and other Mainland or overseas cities will be organised, and members will be encouraged to tender advice on youth development. In particular, SB will sign a Memorandum of Understanding with the Shenzhen University to arrange teaching and visit activities for Leaders Forum members, and arrange more opportunities for exchange and interaction with young people in the Mainland. SB will also establish the Leaders Forum Alumni Association in the fourth quarter of this year to select outstanding inaugural Leaders Forum members and enable these alumni to build peer support relationships with new term members. Sharing activities will be organised regularly to facilitate sharing of views and experience among alumni and current members. This can, on one hand, maintain former members’ sense of belonging to the Leaders Forum, and on the other hand, help the personal growth of current members and facilitate the development of the Leaders Forum. Besides, we will soon launch the second phase of Project Lighthouse. The number of partner schools will increase from five to ten. We aim to increase the number of student participants to no less than 200 within this year and organise more diverse activities, so as to encourage non-Chinese speaking students to fully integrate into the community.

33. At the same time, the disciplined and auxiliary services will continue to actively raise the number of active members of their youth uniformed groups and adopt a multi-pronged approach to recruit youth members. They will also strengthen the promotion of law-abiding

awareness and national education, including providing Chinese-style foot drill and flag-raising training and arranging exchange activities to the Mainland, with a view to enhancing young people's sense of belonging to our country and their national pride. In addition, the GFS will strengthen the support for HKACC after taking over its policy work, including providing flight simulator or virtual reality training to cadet members, so as to strengthen the aviation education for HKACC members.

(VI) Telling Good Stories of Hong Kong

(O) Gradual Opening up of STK

34. Since its launch in June 2022, the project of opening up STK Pier has received favourable response. We will implement the second phase of the STK opening-up plan in January 2024 to expand the scope to cover the whole STK (except Chung Ying Street) to promote cultural and eco-tourism. Upon application online for CAPs, visitors may enter STK for sightseeing and learn about the history, culture and natural landscape of STK and the nearby outlying islands. In the initial stage, the daily quota is 1 000 visitors (including 700 tour group visitors and 300 individual visitors).

35. Over the past six months, we have co-ordinated the efforts of relevant departments to carry out preparatory work for implementing the second phase of the opening-up plan, including constructing Chung Ying Street Garden, improving the ancillary facilities of tourist spots and the community facilities for locals, enhancing the frequencies of public transport services and introducing ferry rides to outlying islands to provide convenience for visitor travel. In view of the increased traffic in the STK Frontier Closed Area after the opening up, we have installed fences/ barriers/ CCTVs, re-provisioned the Chung Ying Street Checkpoint, in addition to the increased manpower to enhance patrols. Starting from 1 December this year, travel agents /visitors can apply for Electronic CAPs applicable to group visits/individuals for all days in January 2024 via the HKPF's online system on a first-come,

first-served basis². The HKPF will announce the details regarding the online application of Electronic CAPs in due course. Visitors may also contact licensed travel agents directly to sign up for sightseeing tours in STK. Travel agents will complete the relevant application procedures on their behalf.

36. We will work with local organisations and the tourism industry to publicise and promote the opening up of STK, highlighting its attractions. We will review the effectiveness of the project and timely adjust the visitor quotas in the first half of 2024 in the light of implementation experience, local views, etc. In addition, the HKSAR Government will explore with the Shenzhen Municipal Government the feasibility of developing a cultural tourism zone in STK of Hong Kong and Shenzhen, including exploring arrangements to facilitate access to the cultural tourism zone by visitors of both sides. To this end, we plan to launch a pilot scheme in the fourth quarter of 2024, under which current holders of CAPs who have access to Chung Ying Street in Hong Kong may, upon prior enrolment, use facial recognition technology without having to stop and produce their CAPs at the reprovisioned Chung Ying Street Checkpoint. It is expected that this will facilitate the flow of people and enhance the handling capacity of the Checkpoint, so as to support future tourism development. We will brief local stakeholders on the pilot scheme and its detailed implementation arrangements in due course.

(P) Strengthening International Participation of Departments

37. Under the “One Country, Two Systems”, Hong Kong has the distinctive advantages of enjoying strong support of the motherland and being closely connected to the world. To better leverage on this advantages, the disciplined services will continue to proactively involve themselves in international affairs and activities, and promote international cooperation through hosting of large-scale international conferences in Hong Kong.

² Starting from December this year, applications for CAPs applicable to tour group visits/individuals for all days in the following month will be accepted starting from the first day of the current month. The Travel Industry Council of Hong Kong will assist in coordinating the allocation of quotas for tour groups on Saturdays, Sundays and public holidays to facilitate travel agents in organising tours.

38. The C&ED was unanimously nominated by members of the Asia/Pacific Region as the next Vice-Chairperson for the Asia/Pacific Region of the World Customs Organization (WCO). The C&ED will set up a WCO Regional Dog Training Centre and actively prepare for hosting the 6th Global Canine Forum in March 2024.

39. Moreover, the FSD will make continuous efforts to enhance the professional capabilities of its Disaster Response and Rescue Team to better equip the team for participation in overseas rescue missions, and to obtain the accreditation as a medium International Urban Search and Rescue Team from the International Search and Rescue Advisory Group (INSARAG). Meanwhile, the FSD will organise in collaboration with relevant professional bodies the “Fire Asia International Conference” in 2024, and invite the participation of relevant scholars and fire service counterparts in the Mainland and different countries (including the Belt and Road regions).
