Question:

To facilitate the development of young people and further help meeting their housing needs, the Chief Executive announced in the 2022 Policy Address that the Government would explore ways to increase the supply of youth hostels, including subsidising non-governmental organisations to rent suitable hotels and guesthouses for use as youth hostels. Under Matters Requiring Special Attention in 2024-25, the Bureau will, inter alia, continue to implement the Youth Hostel Scheme – Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels. Please advise on the estimated manpower and provisions for the above Scheme.

Asked by: Hon CHAN Chun-ying (LegCo internal reference no.: 41)

Reply:

The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) secured approval from the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council in end 2022 for the creation of a new non-recurrent commitment of \$1 billion, and launched the Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS) - Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels (the Subsidy Scheme) in early 2023 to subsidise non-governmental organisations to rent suitable hotels and guesthouses for use as youth hostels. While the expenditure on the Subsidy Scheme for 2024-25 is estimated to be \$42.95 million, the actual expenditure for each year depends on the number of approved applications, the funding amounts for individual projects and their leasing conditions.

The YHS (including the Subsidy Scheme) is administered by a team of civil servants at the HYAB (comprising 1 Administrative Officer Staff Grade C, 1 Senior Executive Officer and 2 Executive Officers I) with the assistance of non-civil service contract staff. Since they are also responsible for other regular duties, we cannot single out the exact manpower and emoluments involved.

Reply:

The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) will launch a pilot scheme this year to provide young people with financial planning and counselling services as well as information on financial management, saving and investment that suits their individual needs, so as to assist young people in developing an effective financial management plan.

The HYAB and the Investor and Financial Education Council are planning to implement the pilot scheme at the 5 youth hostels currently in operation under the Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS), with the aim of helping young people customise their own financial plans and goals such that they will establish good habits of managing personal finances and investment. Details of the pilot scheme will be announced in due course.

At present, the pilot scheme is being taken forward by the same team of HYAB staff who administer the YHS. Since they are also responsible for other regular duties, we cannot



single out the exact manpower involved. We will keep in view the progress and effectiveness of the pilot scheme and make adjustment as and when necessary.

3. of the numbers of applicants for youth hostels and the respective rents in the past 3 years? As society resumed normalcy after the epidemic, will the estimated number of applicants and rents for this financial year be adjusted accordingly?

Reply:

The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau secured approval from the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council in end 2022 for the creation of a new non-recurrent commitment of \$1 billion, and launched the Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS) - Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels (the Subsidy Scheme) in early 2023 to subsidise non-governmental organisations (NGOs) to rent suitable hotels and guesthouses for use as youth hostels. While the expenditure on the Subsidy Scheme for 2024-25 is estimated to be \$42.95 million, the actual expenditure on the Subsidy Scheme for each year depends on the number of approved applications, the funding amounts for individual projects and their leasing conditions.

There are currently 7 youth hostel projects whose construction is fully funded by the Government under the YHS. The first 2 youth hostels run separately by the Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups and the Po Leung Kuk have commenced operation upon completion of construction in 2020 and 2023 respectively, offering a total of over 1 700 hostel places, which account for more than half of the total provision of hostel places under all the

projects. Since its launch in early 2023, 3 projects were approved under the Subsidy Scheme and they are located in Hong Kong Island, Kowloon and the New Territories respectively, to provide a maximum of 478 hostel places in total. The progress of the various youth hostel projects are at **Annex**.

Under the YHS (including the Subsidy Scheme), NGOs operate youth hostels on a self-financing basis. Of the 5 youth hostels currently in operation, 4 commenced operation in or after the second quarter of 2023. The NGOs concerned have recruited youth tenants as planned. As at end-February 2024, the 5 youth hostels received around 6 690 applications in total. At present, the rent of a hostel place under the YHS ranges between \$2,500 and \$5,576 per month on average. The rents charged to youth tenants are determined by the operators according to their approved proposals, provided that such amounts must not exceed 60% of the market rents.

Reply:

- (1) The Funding Scheme for Women's Development (Funding Scheme) provided women's organisations and those non-governmental organisations serving women with funding support to organise programmes and activities conducive to women's development. The Women Empowerment Fund (WEF), established in June 2023, has since replaced the Funding Scheme and thus no funding was approved under the Funding Scheme in 2023-24. In 2021-22 and 2022-23, the Funding Scheme provided funding support totalling around \$8.58 million for about 100 programmes and activities. Organisations were required to submit activity and financial reports for each funded programme, and all the programmes met the expected deliverables, including empowering women, bringing their

strengths into full play and promoting their awareness on physical and mental health.

- (2)&(3) Launched in 2004, the Capacity Building Mileage Programme (CBMP) is run by the Hong Kong Metropolitan University with an aim to encouraging women of different ages, backgrounds and educational levels to pursue lifelong learning, thereby achieving self-development and unleashing their potential. The expenditures, number of enrolment, average age of students, number of applications and successful applications for bursary and amount of bursary approved in relation to the CBMP in the past 3 academic years are as follows:

Note: There was a decline in enrolment between 2020 and 2022 due to the epidemic. As the epidemic situation eased, the enrolment number steadily picked up.

- (4) For the period in 2022-23 after the re-organisation of the Government Secretariat (i.e. from July 2022 to March 2023), the actual expenditure of the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) on supporting the Women's Commission (WoC) in conducting the relevant activities was about \$19.12 million, and the revised estimate in 2023-24 was \$28.6 million. Since the re-organisation of the Government Secretariat with effect from 1 July 2022, the work on the promotion of women's development, including the provision of support for the WoC, has been taken up mainly by 5 civil servants, with the assistance of non-civil service contract staff.

According to the information provided by the Labour and Welfare Bureau, the actual expenditures on the work on the promotion of women's development in 2021-22 and the period in 2022-23 prior to the re-organisation of the Government Secretariat (i.e. from April to June 2022) were \$18.8 million and \$807,000 respectively.

- (5) The WEF aims to empower women, regardless of their age, occupation, background, etc., to realise their full potentials in their respective arenas, ultimately achieving the goal of promoting women's development in Hong Kong. In 2023-24, 145 projects were approved under the WEF and the funding involved was about \$21.38 million. The funded projects are being rolled out and the funded organisations are required to submit activity and financial reports for each project to the WoC for reviewing the effectiveness of the project. The WoC will also review, among others, the utilisation and the vetting mechanism of the WEF to optimise its operation.



- (6) In 2024-25, the HYAB will keep supporting the work of the Family Council (the Council) to promote the 3 sets of family core values, i.e. “Love and Care”, “Respect and Responsibility”, and “Communication and Harmony”. Reply:

The Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS) is an important youth development initiative. Apart from providing relatively stable and long-term accommodation for young people to meet their aspirations of having their own living space, we also hope to benefit young people through the various support and training activities provided by the non-governmental organisations (NGOs) operating such youth hostels. The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) has been proactively implementing the YHS through a multi-pronged approach, which includes fully funding NGOs to construct youth hostels on under-utilised sites, and launching the YHS - Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels (the Subsidy Scheme).

There are currently 7 youth hostel projects whose construction is fully funded by the Government. The first 2 youth hostels run separately by the Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups and the Po Leung Kuk have commenced operation upon completion of construction in 2020 and 2023 respectively, offering a total of over 1 700 hostel places, which account for more than half of the total provision of hostel places under all the projects. Within one year since its launch, 3 projects have been approved under the Subsidy Scheme which provided a maximum of 478 hostel places in total. The latest progress and relevant information of the various youth hostel projects are at Annex.

Of the 5 youth hostels currently in operation, 4 commenced operation in or after the second quarter of 2023. The NGOs concerned have recruited youth tenants as planned. At present, the rent of a hostel place under the YHS ranges between \$2,500 and \$5,576 per month on average. As at end-February 2024, the 5 youth hostels received around 6 690 applications in total and, except for the usual tenant turnover slots, the average occupancy rate reached about 90%.

In the past 3 years, the YHS was administered by a team of civil servants at the former Home Affairs Bureau / the HYAB (comprising 1 Administrative Officer Staff Grade C, 1 Senior Administrative Officer or Chief Executive Officer and 2 Executive Officers I) with the assistance of non-civil service contract staff. Since they are also responsible for other regular duties, we cannot single out the exact manpower and emoluments involved.

In 2023-24, 145 projects were approved under the WEF and the funding involved was about \$21.38 million. The funded projects are being rolled out. The funded organisations are required to submit activity and financial reports for each funded project to the Women's Commission (WoC) for reviewing the effectiveness of the project. The WoC will also review, among others, the utilisation and the vetting mechanism of the WEF to optimise its operation.

The target beneficiaries of WEF are women in Hong Kong. The funded organisations are required to devise projects according to users' actual needs so as to meet the needs of different groups of women. The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) designated the post of Commissioner for Women Affairs (the Commissioner) and set up the dedicated Women Affairs Team on 1 April this year to steer work on women's development. Being a Principal Assistant Secretary post ranked at D2 level, the Commissioner heads the Women Affairs Team that is staffed by 6 civil servant posts, including Administrative Officer, Executive Officer as well as Clerical and Secretarial Grades staff, with the assistance of non-civil service contract staff.

The Commissioner will lead the Women Affairs Team to focus on work on the promotion of women's development. Moreover, the Commissioner will work closely with the Women's Commission (WoC) and the Family Council to assist in taking forward related activities and the new initiatives announced in the Policy Address, with a view to achieving complementary effects in promoting women's development and enhancing family well-being and social harmony.

The Government will continue to promote women's well-being and interests through a multi-pronged strategy, including the provision of an enabling environment, empowerment of

women and public education, as well as through collaborations with other sectors in the community. In 2024-25, the HYAB will continue to support the WoC in implementing the Capacity Building Mileage Programme and conducting public education and publicity activities. We will also continue to encourage women's groups and non-governmental organisations to make good use of the Women Empowerment Fund (WEF) to facilitate women's development of their own potential and self-enhancement. The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) will launch, in the second half of 2024, a one-stop family and women information portal to pool together information on family education, marriage and women's health, etc. and share legal information relating to family and women affairs. We will also organise the first Family and Women Development Summit to collect community views for formulating more focused measures to support women's development and promote family education. We are working on the details of these initiatives and will make relevant announcement in due course. Our initial estimation of the expenditure for the initiatives is about \$19 million in 2024-25.

Moreover, the HYAB and the Family Council (the Council) will launch a brand new five-year Funding Scheme on the Promotion of Family Education (new Scheme) in the second

half of 2024 to subsidise non-profit-making community projects in promoting family education. The Council will consolidate the existing Thematic Sponsorship Scheme to Support Family-related Initiatives, with the amount of funding increased from about \$4 million in each round previously to \$8 million per year. The new Scheme will expand its scope of funding to cover various family-related topics, such as education for new parents, parent-child education, maintenance of family relationship and other marriage-related subjects to meet the needs of different families. The new Scheme will also strive to promote family values and focus on enhancement of family building, family education and family traditions, with a view to enhancing family well-being and social harmony. The HYAB will draw up details of the new Scheme, including the funding arrangements and assessment mechanism, and make relevant announcement in due course upon consultation with the Council.

Since the one-stop family and women information portal, the Family and Women Development Summit and the new Scheme are still at the preparatory stage, the specific manpower requirement is yet to be confirmed.

In this connection, will the Government inform this Committee:

1. of the amount of funding it allocated to the YHS in 2023-24;
2. of the current application rate and occupancy rate of youth hostels, the average processing time of applications and, supported by specific data, the follow-up measures put in place by the Government;
3. whether the Government has regularly reviewed the efficacy of the implementation of the YHS and conducted satisfaction survey among young tenants; if yes, of the details; and
4. of the number of new project applicants (i.e. excluding projects approved) as at early 2024 and the average processing time of applications?

Reply:

The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) secured approval from the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council in end 2022 for the creation of a new non-recurrent commitment of \$1 billion, and launched the Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS) - Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels (the Subsidy Scheme) in early 2023 to subsidise non-governmental organisations (NGOs) to rent suitable hotels and guesthouses for use as youth hostels. Within one year since its launch, 3 projects have been approved under the Subsidy Scheme which provided a maximum of 478 hostel places in total. The revised estimated expenditure for 2023-24 was \$19.7 million.



Under the YHS (including the Subsidy Scheme), NGOs operate youth hostels on a self-financing basis. Of the 5 youth hostels currently in operation, 4 commenced operation in or after the second quarter of 2023. The NGOs concerned have recruited youth tenants as planned and, except for the usual tenant turnover slots, the average occupancy rate reached about 90%. The YHS projects have been operating smoothly, and we will keep in view the implementation progress and effectiveness of the YHS, as well as the operation of the hostels which have commenced services, to ensure that the YHS meets its policy objectives.

Since Hong Kong and the Mainland as well as the rest of the world fully resumed normal travel, there has been a leap in the demand for hotels and guesthouses by visitors to Hong Kong as compared to the time during the epidemic, hence the improving operating environment of hotels and guesthouses has brought greater challenges to NGOs when negotiating the terms of collaboration with individual hotels and guesthouses. That said, we note that there are still hotels and guesthouses willing to shoulder their social responsibilities and respond to the Government's appeal for supporting youth development through tripartite collaboration among the Government, the business sector and the community, and they have expressed interest in offering rooms to take part in the Subsidy Scheme. The HYAB will continue to proactively communicate with NGOs and relevant stakeholders to take forward the Subsidy Scheme, with a view to offering around 3 000 additional hostel places. We will announce the details upon approval of new projects.

Reply:

1. Following the resumption of normal travel between Hong Kong and other places in early 2023, the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) has resumed various internship activities outside Hong Kong, including the Funding Scheme for Youth Internship in the Mainland, the Thematic Youth Internship Programmes to the Mainland, the Scheme on Corporate Summer Internship on the Mainland and Overseas and the United Nations Volunteers – Hong Kong Universities Volunteer Internship Programme. For 2023-24, the expenditure and number of participants of various internship schemes/programmes outside Hong Kong were as follows:

& The Programme was suspended from 2020 to 2022 due to the epidemic. Following the resumption of normal travel between Hong Kong and other places, the Programme was resumed in early 2023. Its expenditure for 2023-24 included: (a) expenses for the first batch of 13 Hong Kong university students who started their internship from March 2023 onwards; (b) expenses for the second batch of 10 Hong Kong university students who started their internship from July 2023 onwards; and (c) expenditure on preparing for the new round of the Programme in 2024, including the expansion of the number of internship placements to 25 and covering more Belt and Road countries.

Question:

The Government rolled out in 2021 the Funding Scheme for Youth Entrepreneurship in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (the Entrepreneurship Scheme) and announced in end-2023 the official launch of the Alliance of Hong Kong Youth Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Greater Bay Area (the Alliance). In this connection, will the Government inform this Committee of the following:

1. For the past 3 years, what were the (a) funding amounts provided and (b) number of projects funded by the Government under the Entrepreneurship Scheme? What were the deliverables achieved?
2. For the financial year 2024-25, what is the estimated funding provision to be allocated to the Alliance by the Government? What are the anticipated deliverables?
3. What are the connections and differences between the Entrepreneurship Scheme and the Alliance in terms of their functions?

Reply:

To promote youth innovation and entrepreneurship, the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) and the Youth Development Commission (YDC) rolled out 2 funding schemes in 2019, namely the Funding Scheme for Youth Entrepreneurship in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (the Entrepreneurship Scheme) and the Funding Scheme for Experiential Programmes at Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (the Experiential Scheme), which provide support for potential Hong Kong young entrepreneurs. The HYAB announced the lists of funded organisations under these 2 schemes in 2021.

The Entrepreneurship Scheme subsidises non-governmental organisations (NGOs) to implement youth entrepreneurship projects, under which young people who are interested in starting their businesses locally and in other cities of the Greater Bay Area (GBA) are provided with entrepreneurial support, incubation services and start-up capital for 1 to 3 years.



Under the Entrepreneurship Scheme, we granted a total of about \$130 million to 16 NGOs. 217 youth start-up teams were successfully recruited, covering a wide range of businesses, including research and development of innovation and technology projects, retail, information technology, healthcare, brand design and education services, etc. All of the youth start-up teams have started their businesses in Hong Kong, and over 70 of them have established a presence in the Mainland cities of the GBA such as Guangzhou, Shenzhen, Zhuhai and Foshan. Meanwhile, the Experiential Scheme provides subsidy for NGOs to organise short-term experiential programmes at the innovation and entrepreneurial bases in Mainland cities of the GBA. With the full resumption of normal travel between Hong Kong and Mainland, 12 programmes under the Experiential Scheme were successfully organised in the end, benefitting about 300 youths. The lists of the funded NGOs, funded projects and funding amounts under these 2 schemes are at **Annex**.

Upon completion of an entrepreneurship project under such schemes, participants are invited to fill in evaluation questionnaires from which we can gauge their views on the project for monitoring its effectiveness and quality. This will also become part of the track record when assessing the same organisation's applications in the future. Based on the feedback collected from the participants of these 2 schemes, over 90% of the participants surveyed considered the schemes beneficial in deepening their understanding of business start-up, and the percentage is higher than our original indicator of no less than 70% of the participants surveyed.

Moreover, the Government established the Alliance of Hong Kong Youth Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Greater Bay Area (the Alliance) in December 2023. The HYAB, the Hong Kong and Macao Affairs Office of the People's Government of Guangdong Province and the Human Resources and Social Security Department of Guangdong Province are the leading parties of the Alliance. Nearly 60 organisations from various sectors in the GBA have also joined the Alliance as members, including government and public organisations, innovation and entrepreneurial bases, NGOs and social organisations, post-secondary institutions and scientific research institutes, professional organisations and venture funds. The Alliance provides young entrepreneurs (including but not limited to the youth start-up teams under the Entrepreneurship Scheme) with a one-stop information, publicity and exchange platform.

The objectives and key tasks of the Alliance include:

- (1) leveraging on member organisations' resources to organise diverse activities so as to provide youth entrepreneurs with more comprehensive information and support services, and facilitate them in expanding their social, commercial and investor networks, and enhance their competitiveness;
- (2) conveying the needs of Hong Kong youth entrepreneurs in relation to the business environment and policies in different cities of the GBA to relevant authorities;
- (3) fostering the exchange and co-operation between relevant stakeholders, so as to jointly promote Hong Kong youth in pursuing entrepreneurship in the GBA and provide comprehensive and all-round support for youth entrepreneurs; and

- (4) disseminating information about supporting Hong Kong youth in pursuing entrepreneurship in the GBA and activities organised by member organisations through the Alliance's designated webpage.

The HYAB will continue to work closely with the YDC and other stakeholders so as to take forward various initiatives that promote youth innovation and entrepreneurship. The HYAB implements the above initiatives using the Youth Development Fund and other existing resources.

Question:

Through the Funding Scheme for Youth Life Planning Activities (the Funding Scheme), the Government helps young people realise their life planning as early as possible. In this connection, will the Government inform this Committee of the following:

1. Information reveals that the Government has approved 26 projects under the Funding Scheme for the period from 2022 to 2025, what are the amounts of funding concerned;
2. What is the Government's mechanism in vetting these projects? Is the use of funds under regular monitoring? If yes, what are the details? If no, what are the reasons;
3. What deliverables (such as the respective figures on youth participants) have been achieved by the sponsored projects so far; and
4. Apart from the Funding Scheme, what other support measures does the Government have to help young people realise their life planning; or will the Government provide job matching services for them?

Asked by: Hon CHAN Wing-yan, JoePHY (LegCo internal reference no.: 6)

Reply:

The Government has all along attached great importance to youth life planning. The Funding Scheme for Youth Life Planning Activities (the Funding Scheme) was introduced by the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau and the Youth Development Commission (YDC) to support non-governmental organisations (NGOs), in collaboration with secondary schools, in organising various life planning projects, such as thematic talks, workshops, workplace visits, and job attachments, etc. These projects not only cater for the needs of students, but also cover training courses and activities for teachers and parents to enhance their awareness of life planning and multiple pathways. The current round (2022-2025) of the Funding Scheme has sponsored 26 NGOs (see Annex for the list of sponsored NGOs) which collaborated with around 400 secondary schools in school years 2022-25 to organise various life planning activities on different industries and occupations, covering not only well-known sectors such as education, hotel management, accounting, sales, catering and healthcare services, but also

new sports, e-sports, online marketing, digital media and application of information technology, etc. In addition, the Funding Scheme also encourages sponsored NGOs to organise more activities with a view to helping young people to further understand the development opportunities arising from the National 14th Five-Year Plan and the development of the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (GBA). The total amount of funding approved under the current round of the Funding Scheme is about \$170 million.

Applications for the Funding Scheme are assessed by an Assessment Panel (AP) in accordance with the assessment criteria. The AP consists of non-official members of the YDC and/or personnel with experience in the relevant fields. To monitor the progress of the sponsored projects, sponsored NGOs have to submit various reports in accordance with the Grant Agreements, while members of Action Group under the YDC may participate in the activities of the sponsored NGOs as observers from time to time to help assess the performance of these activities. In addition, government representatives will participate in the activities of the sponsored NGOs on a regular basis to examine the progress of the sponsored projects. The current round of the Funding Scheme has been well-received since its launch, with its concept recognised by participating NGOs and schools.

Apart from the Funding Scheme, the Education Bureau (EDB) has also actively promoted the implementation of life planning education in primary and secondary schools and enhanced online resources. EDB launched the one-stop Life Planning Information Website (the Website) in the 2019/20 school year to provide students, teachers and parents with comprehensive information on life planning and multiple pathways. An additional thematic corner, titled “The Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area”, was also set up on the Website in July 2023 to provide information on further studies and careers in the GBA cities. In the 2022/23 school year, EDB launched the “Business-School Partnership Programme 2.0” (the Programme) with more business partners joining the Programme and covering more industries, to provide more and a wider range of career exploration and work experience activities for students so as to widen their exposure and enhance their life planning. In addition, starting from the 2023/24 school year, EDB has launched the 5-year “Greater Bay Area Career Exploration Tours” Programme, under which public sector schools and Direct Subsidy Scheme schools offering the local senior secondary curriculum can arrange study activities in the GBA for senior secondary students.

The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) has been working closely with the Committee on the Promotion of Civic Education (CPCE) to promote civic and national education outside schools and in the community through various channels and diversified means, such as providing eligible organisations with sponsorships for organising civic and national education activities; producing publicity programmes, publications and organising exhibitions and seminars on relevant themes (e.g. the Basic Law). The actual/estimated expenditures on the promotion of national education in the past 3 years and for 2024-25 are as follows:

Reply:

- 1&2. Under the 2 annual funding schemes, namely the Ping Wo Fund Sponsorship Scheme and the Ping Wo Fund School Project Grants, the Ping Wo Fund (PWF) has been funding non-governmental organisations and schools to organise anti-gambling public education and publicity activities. In 2023-24, the approved funding amount for the 2 said schemes is about \$9.7 million (of which around \$9.5 million is for the Ping Wo Fund Sponsorship Scheme). The actual funding amount to be disbursed can only be confirmed upon completion of the approved projects when their activity details and expenditures are finalised. For 2024-25, a total of \$10 million has been earmarked under the PWF to take forward the 2 said schemes.
3. The PWF has been funding 4 counselling and treatment centres to provide telephone counselling, face-to-face counselling and other professional treatment services for people with gambling disorders and those affected by them (mainly family members of people with gambling disorders). The increase in the number of clients in 2023 as compared to 2022 is mainly because the demand for face-to-face counselling and treatment services has returned to the pre-COVID-19 epidemic level. In addition,

following the society's return to normalcy in 2023, the PWF has enhanced its publicity efforts via traditional media as well as online and social media platforms. Such efforts include placing advertisements on public transportation and online platforms, so that promotion of the PWF's Gambling Counselling Hotline (183 4633) and relevant anti-gambling messages can reach the wider public, and encourage those in need to seek early assistance. The enhanced publicity work has also helped more people in need receive counselling and treatment services. The Ping Wo Fund Advisory Committee regularly reviews the service performance of these centres and the effectiveness of their services. So far, the overall operation of the 4 centres has been satisfactory.

In 2023-24, 145 projects were approved under the WEF and the funding involved was about \$21.38 million.

Projects under the WEF are categorised into general projects and thematic projects. For approved general projects, their themes include assisting women in accomplishing transformations in the job market; enhancing women’s physical and mental health; helping women to cope with different roles in family and society; motivating women to enhance their personal attributes, achieve full potential and reach out to help others in society; and facilitating the use of new information and communication technology. The funded organisations are required to devise projects according to users’ actual needs, and such projects can be in the form of workshops, training courses, talks, practice sessions, etc. The thematic projects of 2023-24 referred to the “Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Exchange Programme” (Exchange Programme), which aimed to promote women’s development by broadening their horizons, deepening their understanding of our country’s

development, and enabling them to have exchanges with local people. Each Exchange Programme comprised a briefing, an exchange tour and a sharing session.

Over the years, a series of improvement measures have been implemented to facilitate recovery of maintenance payments by divorcees. Moreover, publicity and education programmes are conducted to enhance public understanding of the responsibilities of maintenance payers, the rights of maintenance payees and services available to payees when they fail to receive maintenance payments. The replies to the various parts of the question are as follows:

- 1) The Judiciary has advised that it does not maintain figures on the maintenance orders granted. In view of the lack of comprehensive data relating to maintenance payments at present, the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) has invited the Census and Statistics Department to conduct in 2024 a thematic household survey on the enforcement of maintenance orders to collect statistics concerning maintenance, so as to better consider the future work direction.

- 2&3) The HYAB is responsible for developing policies relating to the enforcement of maintenance orders. We received 1 enquiry in the past 3 years. Given that the handling of such matters is part of our regular work, there is no separate breakdown on the manpower and expenditure involved.
- 4) Regarding the suggestions on setting up a dedicated department by the Government to handle matters relating to maintenance payment, experience of maintenance assurance schemes in other jurisdictions has suggested problems such as long processing time with only few cases handled, management problems, high administrative costs, etc. Moreover, some of the suggestions concerned are controversial in nature as they involve restrictions of individuals' rights or privacy concerns, rendering doubts about their feasibility under the laws of Hong Kong. The Government will continue to assist people in need to recover maintenance payments by keeping the system of collection of maintenance payments and enforcement of maintenance orders under review. In this regard, the Government will launch, in the second half of this year, a maintenance mediation pilot scheme through the Community Care Fund to assist the parties concerned to resolve disputes on the related matters through mediation.

- 1) The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) currently provides young people with diverse internship opportunities in the Mainland and overseas through various schemes/programmes, including the Funding Scheme for Youth Internship in the Mainland, the Thematic Youth Internship Programmes to the Mainland, the Scheme on Corporate Summer Internship on the Mainland and Overseas, and the United Nations Volunteers - Hong Kong Universities Volunteer Internship Programme. Under these schemes/programmes, young people may understand first-hand the workplace culture and career prospects there, set their future career goals, accumulate work experience and build interpersonal network so as to boost their employment advantage.

Apart from internship opportunities, the HYAB also provides young people with in-depth exchange opportunities in the Mainland and overseas through various schemes/programmes, including the Funding Scheme for Youth Exchange in the Mainland, the Funding Scheme for International Youth Exchange, the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Youth Cultural Exchange Programme, as well as exchange activities outside Hong Kong under the YDC Youth Ambassadors Programme (YA Programme).

These schemes/programmes not only enrich youths' understanding of our country and the world but also facilitate their exchanges with young people from other places.

The Bureau plans to continue to support Hong Kong young people to start their businesses in Hong Kong and other cities of the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (GBA) through the Alliance of Hong Kong Youth Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Greater Bay Area and the relevant funding schemes under the Youth Development Fund. In this connection, please inform this Committee of the following:

- 1) How many Hong Kong young people are anticipated to receive funding in this financial year? Please list the respective numbers for Hong Kong and other GBA cities.
- 2) Please list the respective numbers of Hong Kong young people funded in Hong Kong and other GBA cities in the past 3 years.
- 3) Are there any performance indicators set for the funding schemes to review whether they have achieved the intended objectives?

Reply:

To promote youth innovation and entrepreneurship, the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) and the Youth Development Commission rolled out 2 funding schemes in 2019, namely the Funding Scheme for Youth Entrepreneurship in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (the Entrepreneurship Scheme) and the Funding Scheme for Experiential Programmes at Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (the Experiential Scheme), which provide support for potential Hong Kong young entrepreneurs. The HYAB announced the lists of funded organisations under these 2 schemes in 2021.

The Entrepreneurship Scheme subsidises non-governmental organisations (NGOs) to implement youth entrepreneurship projects, under which young people who are interested in starting their businesses locally and in other cities of the Greater Bay Area (GBA) are provided with entrepreneurial support, incubation services and start-up capital for 1 to 3 years. Under the Entrepreneurship Scheme, we granted a total of about \$130 million to 16 NGOs.

217 youth start-up teams have been successfully recruited, covering a wide range of businesses, including research and development of innovation and technology projects, retail, information technology, healthcare, brand design and education services, etc. All of the youth start-up teams have started their businesses in Hong Kong, and over 70 of them have established a presence in the Mainland cities of the GBA such as Guangzhou, Shenzhen, Zhuhai and Foshan. Meanwhile, the Experiential Scheme provides subsidy for NGOs to organise short-term experiential programmes at the innovation and entrepreneurial bases in Mainland cities of the GBA. With the full resumption of normal travel between Hong Kong and Mainland, 12 programmes under the Experiential Scheme were successfully organised in the end, benefitting about 300 youths. The lists of the funded NGOs, funded projects and funding amounts under these 2 schemes are at [Annex](#).

Upon completion of the entrepreneurship projects under the above schemes, participants are invited to fill in assessment questionnaires from which we can gauge their views on the project for monitoring its effectiveness and quality. This will also become part of the track record when assessing the same organisation's applications in the future. Based on the feedback collected from the participants of these 2 schemes, over 90% of the participants surveyed considered the schemes beneficial in deepening their understanding of business start-up, and the percentage is higher than our original indicator of no less than 70% of the participants surveyed.

As the existing projects under these 2 schemes are nearing completion, the Government launched the following initiatives to further support youth entrepreneurship:

- (1) to launch a new round of the Entrepreneurship Scheme to provide start-up capital and comprehensive support services for more Hong Kong young people interested in starting their businesses locally and in Mainland cities of the GBA. In this regard, the following new/updated indicators are set out in the 2023 Policy Address:
  - (i) no less than 100 funded youth start-up teams in aggregate to have settled in Mainland cities of the GBA after joining the scheme by 2026;
  - (ii) no less than 80% of the participants surveyed to consider their understanding of business start-up to increase after joining the scheme; and
- (2) to launch the Funding Scheme for Experiential Programmes at Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases, the scope of which has been expanded from the GBA to various Mainland provinces and municipalities, so as to encourage young people to explore entrepreneurial opportunities in the enormous Mainland market.

Moreover, the Government established the Alliance of Hong Kong Youth Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Greater Bay Area (the Alliance) in December 2023 for further support to Hong Kong young people on starting their businesses in the GBA. The HYAB, the Hong Kong and Macao Affairs Office of the People's Government of Guangdong Province and the Human Resources and Social Security Department of Guangdong Province are the leading parties of the Alliance. Nearly 60 organisations from various sectors in the GBA have also joined the Alliance as members, including government and public organisations, innovation and entrepreneurial bases, NGOs and social organisations, post-secondary institutions and scientific research institutes, professional organisations and

venture funds. The Alliance leverages the resources and networks of the member organisations to provide a one-stop information, publicity and exchange platform, thereby providing young entrepreneurs with comprehensive support, facilitating them in expanding their networks in the GBA and enhancing their competitiveness.

1. The Ping Wo Fund (PWF) has been funding 4 counselling and treatment centres to provide telephone counselling, face-to-face counselling and other professional treatment services for (i) people with gambling disorders and (ii) those affected by them (mainly family members of people with gambling disorders).

2. To raise public awareness of the problems arising from gambling addiction, the PWF has been promoting anti-gambling messages through public education and publicity activities. In addition to publicity efforts made via traditional media as well as online and social media platforms, the PWF funds non-governmental organisations and schools to organise diversified anti-gambling public education and publicity activities under 2 annual funding schemes. The PWF has also enhanced publicity on the harms of

gambling at school and community levels through the No-Gambling Publicity Truck, and promoted ways to prevent and alleviate gambling-related problems. The abovementioned public education and publicity activities have been held in different districts, including those with government-subsidised housing. The PWF will keep in close view the gambling situation in Hong Kong, maintain liaison and coordination with relevant departments including the Hong Kong Police Force, and take necessary enhanced action to prevent and alleviate gambling-related problems accordingly.

The exchange and internship schemes/programmes for 2024-25 have been rolled out since October 2023, and it is expected that Hong Kong young people will start to undertake these exchange and internship opportunities in the Mainland and overseas from May this year the earliest. We have implemented enhancement measures under various schemes/programmes to encourage participation of more young people from different backgrounds. The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) will further enhance the breadth and depth of these schemes/programmes, including strengthening our collaboration with more official cultural and scientific research institutions in the Mainland and major corporates to organise the Thematic Youth Internship Programmes to the Mainland and the Scheme on Corporate Summer Internship on the Mainland and Overseas, thereby providing unique Mainland internship placements for Hong Kong youths with different backgrounds, talents and interests.

For 2024-25, the estimated expenditure on various exchange and internship schemes/programmes outside Hong Kong is about \$250 million. As the HYAB staff

responsible for implementing these schemes/programmes are also required to perform other duties, we cannot single out the emoluments involved.

2. As for internship, the HYAB and the Youth Development Commission provide funding through the Funding Scheme for Youth Internship in the Mainland (FSYIM) for non-governmental organisations (NGOs) to organise internship projects in the Mainland for Hong Kong young people. Participants may experience first-hand the actual workplace environment in the Mainland, deepen their understanding of the employment market, workplace culture and development opportunities there, with a view to helping them set their future career goals, accumulate work experience, build interpersonal network and boost their employment advantage. Under the FSYIM, the funded NGOs are responsible for approaching corporates for the provision of internship placements. For 2024-25, about 6 500 internship places will be provided for young people with an estimated expenditure of about \$110 million.

Besides, the HYAB has collaborated with 25 major corporates to launch the Scheme on Corporate Summer Internship on the Mainland and Overseas 2024, under which over 400 Mainland and overseas internship places will be provided for Hong Kong youths. Major expenses related to the internship, such as airfares, accommodation and insurance for participants, will be covered by participating corporates while the HYAB will share part of the administrative and publicity expenses.

Reply:

The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) launched the brand new Youth Link (YL) in September 2023 to link up participants of various government youth programmes and offer them opportunities to develop diverse talents, as well as strengthening their communication, interaction and trust with the Government. The YL currently has over 5 000 youth members. The HYAB has not set a target for the number of YL members. We will continue to offer suitable and diverse activities through the YL to attract more young people to become its members, the number of which is expected to be on the increase.

Since the launch of YL, the HYAB has organised a number of activities for its members. To name a few, the Youth Dialogue on “The Chief Executive’s 2023 Policy Address”, a leadership training camp for members of the YL Committee, the exchange tour “Exploring Innovation and Entrepreneurship Opportunities in the Greater Bay Area”, visits to youth hostels and some voluntary work in large-scale government events. To date, over 500 young people have participated in such activities. The HYAB will keep providing YL members with various types of activities, including talent development, special visit programmes and social affairs participation. Our target is to host at least 10 youth development activities for

YL members by end-2024 and the HYAB will also provide members with opportunities to participate in various other youth development activities.

At present, YL activities are mainly co-ordinated by 1 Chief Executive Manager and 2 Senior Executive Managers appointed on non-civil service contract terms at the HYAB. In 2023-24, as at end February 2024, the expenditure involved for member recruitment as well as promotion and co-ordination of YL activities is around \$1.6 million.

Reply:

1. The Youth Square (YS) is a government venue under the purview of the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) which provides young people and youth groups with venues and facilities at affordable rentals, thereby serving as a focal point for territory-wide youth development activities to promote youth development. The YS consists of various facilities such as performance venues, activity rooms, hostel rooms, offices and retail shops. For the past 5 years, the occupancy rates of main facilities in the YS were as follows:

Note: Some facilities of the YS (including the Y Theatre and the Y Studio) were closed to the public on certain days between January 2020 and April 2022 as a result of the COVID-19 epidemic. The sessions closed to the public have been deducted when calculating the occupancy rates of the facilities.

In view of the COVID-19 epidemic, the Government granted rental concessions to eligible businesses or organisations which rented premises at government properties between April 2020 and December 2023, and the measure was applicable to office/retail shop tenants and venue/facility hirers of the YS.

2. The Space Sharing Scheme for Youth (SSSY) is premised upon tripartite collaboration among the business sector, non-governmental organisations (NGOs) and the Government to support potential young entrepreneurs, especially those in up-and-coming industries, through the provision of working space at affordable rentals. Under the SSSY, owners of revitalised industrial buildings and commercial buildings may rent out floor areas to NGOs for operation of space at a rent no more than one-third of the market rental, or the owners may choose to operate such space directly on their own. Operating agencies shall charge young users at a rent no more than half of comparable market rental. Since the launch of the SSSY, 12 owners have participated in the scheme. While most of the spaces are still in operation, a small fraction of the owners has terminated their operation of the shared spaces due to individual reasons. These operating agencies have also provided the young users concerned with support services, such as assisting them in search of other shared space where necessary.

Apart from the SSSY, the HYAB will continue to promote youth entrepreneurship through various schemes, including the launch of the Funding Scheme for Youth Entrepreneurship in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (the Entrepreneurship Scheme) and the Funding Scheme for Experiential Programmes at Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area in 2019 to support young people intending to start their businesses locally and in other cities of the Greater Bay Area. As the existing projects under the 2 schemes are nearing completion, the HYAB has launched a new round of the Entrepreneurship Scheme and the Funding Scheme for Experiential Programmes at Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases to further support youth entrepreneurship.

Reply:

- 1) In the past 3 years, a total of 41 meetings of the Women's Commission (WoC) and its working groups were held to give advice on different women-related policies and initiatives, including the Capacity Building Mileage Programme (CBMP), the Women Empowerment Fund (WEF), public education and publicity activities, etc. The Government actively considers the WoC's advice and promotes the development of women through a multi-pronged strategy, including the provision of an enabling environment, empowerment of women and public education, as well as through

collaborations with other sectors in the community. When formulating policies, the Government will continue to consult the WoC and give full consideration to its advice.

- 2) In 2023-24, the work on supporting the WEF was mainly taken up by Executive Officer grade staff, with the assistance of non-civil service contract staff. As all these staff were required to handle in parallel other work related to women's development, and the operating expenditure concerned were included in the estimates for Programme (2) of the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB), there was no separate breakdown on the operating expenditure of the WEF.
- 3) Established in June 2023, the WEF aims to empower women, regardless of their age, occupation, background, etc., to realise their full potentials in their respective arenas, ultimately achieving the goal of promoting women's development in Hong Kong. In 2023-24, 145 projects were approved under the WEF and the funding involved was about \$21.38 million.

Projects under the WEF are categorised into general projects and thematic projects. For approved general projects, their themes include assisting women in accomplishing transformations in the job market; enhancing women's physical and mental health; helping women to cope with different roles in family and society; motivating women to enhance their personal attributes, achieve full potential and reach out to help others in society; and facilitating the use of new information and communication technology. The funded organisations are required to devise projects according to users' actual needs, and such projects can be in the form of workshops, training courses, talks, practice sessions, etc. The thematic projects of 2023-24 referred to the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Exchange Programme (Exchange Programme), which aimed to promote women's development by broadening their horizons, deepening their understanding of our country's development, and enabling them to have exchanges with local people. Each Exchange Programme comprised a briefing, an exchange tour and a sharing session. As the funded projects are still being rolled out, the number of beneficiaries is not yet available.

All the funded organisations are non-profit-making women's organisations and non-governmental organisations (NGOs). The list of funded organisations and projects is available on the WEF website. The number of projects and funding amounts by category are as follows:

4&5) The HYAB designated the post of Commissioner for Women Affairs (the Commissioner) and set up the dedicated Women Affairs Team on 1 April this year to steer work on women's development. Being a Principal Assistant Secretary post ranked at D2 level, the Commissioner heads the Women Affairs Team that is staffed by 6 civil servant posts, including Administrative Officer, Executive Officer as well as Clerical and Secretarial Grades staff, with the assistance of non-civil service contract staff.

The Commissioner will lead the Women Affairs Team to focus on promoting women's development. Moreover, the Commissioner will work closely with the WoC and the Family Council to assist in taking forward related activities and the new initiatives announced in the Policy Address, with a view to achieving complementary effects in promoting women's development and enhancing family well-being and social harmony.

The Government will continue to enhance women's well-being and interests through a multi-pronged strategy, including the provision of an enabling environment, empowerment of women and public education, as well as through collaborations with other sectors in the community. In 2024-25, the HYAB will continue to support the WoC in implementing the CBMP and conducting public education and publicity activities. We will also continue to encourage women's organisations and NGOs to make good use of the WEF to facilitate women's development of their own potential and self-enhancement. In addition, the Exchange Programme under the WEF will be regularised and a new dedicated scheme will be introduced to encourage women to participate in community services.

Furthermore, we will launch, in the second half of 2024, a one-stop family and women information portal to pool together information on family education, marriage and women's health, etc. and share legal information relating to family and women affairs. We will also organise the first Family and Women Development Summit to collect community views for formulating more focused measures to support women's development and promote family education. We are working on the details of these initiatives and will make relevant announcement in due course.

We will keep in view the progress of various initiatives, and review the manpower arrangements in a timely manner to ensure proper use of the funds with a view to supporting women's development effectively.

The WEF's target beneficiaries are women in Hong Kong. Women from different social strata are all welcome to participate in the WEF projects. Projects under the WEF are categorised into general projects and thematic projects. For approved general projects, their themes include assisting women in accomplishing transformations in the job market; enhancing women's physical and mental health; helping women to cope with different roles in family and society; motivating women to enhance their personal attributes, achieve full potential and reach out to help others in society; and facilitating the use of new information and communication technology. To promote youth innovation and entrepreneurship, the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) and the Youth Development Commission rolled out 2 funding schemes in 2019, namely the Funding Scheme for Youth Entrepreneurship in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (the Entrepreneurship Scheme) and the Funding Scheme for Experiential Programmes at Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (the Experiential Scheme), which provide support for

potential Hong Kong young entrepreneurs. These 2 funding schemes were well received by various sectors of the community, and they received funding applications from 22 and 24 non-governmental organisations (NGOs) respectively. The HYAB announced the lists of funded organisations under these 2 schemes in 2021.

The Entrepreneurship Scheme subsidises NGOs to implement youth entrepreneurship projects, under which young people who are interested in starting their businesses locally and in other cities of the Greater Bay Area (GBA) are provided with entrepreneurial support, incubation services and start-up capital for 1 to 3 years. Under the Entrepreneurship Scheme, we granted a total of about \$130 million to 16 NGOs. 217 youth start-up teams were successfully recruited, covering a wide range of businesses, including research and development of innovation and technology projects, retail, information technology, healthcare, brand design and education services, etc. All of the youth start-up teams have started their businesses in Hong Kong, and over 70 of them have established a presence in the Mainland cities of the GBA such as Guangzhou, Shenzhen, Zhuhai and Foshan. Meanwhile, the Experiential Scheme provides subsidy for NGOs to organise short-term experiential programmes at the innovation and entrepreneurial bases in Mainland cities of the GBA. With the full resumption of normal travel between Hong Kong and Mainland, 12 programmes under the Experiential Scheme were successfully organised in the end, benefitting about 300 youths. The lists of the funded NGOs, funded projects and funding amounts under these 2 schemes are at [Annex](#). Given that the Entrepreneurship Scheme implements youth entrepreneurship projects and recruits youth start-up teams through the subsidised NGOs, we do not maintain figures on the relevant applications.

As the existing projects under these 2 schemes are nearing completion, the Government launched the following initiatives to further support youth entrepreneurship:

- (1) to launch a new round of the Entrepreneurship Scheme to provide start-up capital and comprehensive support services for more Hong Kong young people interested in starting their businesses locally and in Mainland cities of the GBA. In this regard, the following new/updated indicators are set out in the 2023 Policy Address:
  - (i) no less than 100 funded youth start-up teams in aggregate to have settled in Mainland cities of the GBA after joining the scheme by 2026;
  - (ii) no less than 80% of the participants surveyed to consider their understanding of business start-up to increase after joining the scheme; and
- (2) to launch the Funding Scheme for Experiential Programmes at Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases, the scope of which has been expanded from the GBA to various Mainland provinces and municipalities, so as to encourage young people to explore entrepreneurial opportunities in the enormous Mainland market.

When working out contents of the new rounds of the said schemes, we have made reference to the experience gained in the original schemes and the feedback from their participants, and have also proposed necessary enhancement measures, with a view to making good use of resources to provide suitable support for more aspiring youth entrepreneurs.

Moreover, the Government established the Alliance of Hong Kong Youth Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Greater Bay Area (the Alliance) in December 2023 for further support to Hong Kong young people on starting their businesses in the GBA. The HYAB, the Hong Kong and Macao Affairs Office of the People's Government of Guangdong Province and the Human Resources and Social Security Department of Guangdong Province are the leading parties of the Alliance. Nearly 60 organisations from various sectors in the GBA have also joined the Alliance as members, including government and public organisations, innovation and entrepreneurial bases, NGOs and social organisations, post-secondary institutions and scientific research institutes, professional organisations and venture funds. The Alliance leverages the resources and networks of the member organisations to provide a one-stop information, publicity and exchange platform, thereby providing young entrepreneurs with comprehensive support, facilitating them in expanding their networks in the GBA and enhancing their competitiveness. The HYAB implements the above initiatives using the Youth Development Fund and other existing resources.

The Funding Scheme for Youth Internship in the Mainland aims to provide funding for non-governmental organisations to organise internship projects in the Mainland for Hong Kong young people so that they may experience first-hand the actual workplace environment in the Mainland, deepen their understanding of the employment market, workplace culture and development opportunities there, with a view to helping them set their future career goals, accumulate work experience, build interpersonal network and boost their employment advantage. In this connection, will the Bureau inform this Committee:

1. of the number of participants of the scheme in each of the past 5 years and that anticipated for this financial year, together with the Government's respective funding expenditures;
2. of the Mainland cities visited by young people under the scheme in the past 5 years in descending order of number of participants;

Reply:

The Funding Scheme for Youth Internship in the Mainland (FSYIM) aims to provide funding for non-governmental organisations (NGOs) to organise internship projects in the Mainland for Hong Kong young people so that they may experience first-hand the actual workplace

environment in the Mainland, deepen their understanding of the employment market, workplace culture and development opportunities there, with a view to helping them set their future career goals, accumulate work experience, build interpersonal network and boost their employment advantage in the future.

1. For the past 5 financial years and the financial year of 2024-25, the expenditures and the numbers of participants in relation to the FSYIM are tabulated as follows:

2. and 3. The projects under the FSYIM covered a wide range of Mainland provinces/cities. In 2023-24, the 5 most visited provinces/cities were Guangdong, Shanghai, Beijing, Jiangsu and Chongqing, covering a wide array of industries such as finance, legal, trading, social service, information technology, engineering, media, etc. We do not maintain the detailed breakdown by enterprise/industry.
4. and 5. Upon completion of an exchange/internship project, participants are invited to fill in evaluation questionnaires from which we can gauge their views on the project for monitoring its effectiveness and quality. This will also become part of the track record when assessing the same NGO's applications in the future. Based on the feedback collected from the last rounds of participants, over 90% of the respondents considered the FSYIM beneficial in deepening their understanding of the employment market, workplace culture and development opportunities in the Mainland. Representatives of the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) and the Youth Development Commission also attend activities (such as concluding and sharing sessions) held locally by the funded NGOs to understand participants' views on the projects for monitoring their effectiveness and quality.



The exchange and internship schemes/programmes for 2024-25 have been rolled out since October 2023, and it is expected that Hong Kong young people will start to undertake these exchange and internship opportunities in the Mainland and overseas from May this year the earliest. We have implemented enhancement measures under various schemes/programmes to encourage participation of more young people from different backgrounds. The HYAB will further enhance the breadth and depth of these schemes/programmes, including strengthening our collaboration with more official cultural and scientific research institutions in the Mainland and major corporates to organise the Thematic Youth Internship Programmes to the Mainland and the Scheme on Corporate Summer Internship on the Mainland and Overseas, thereby providing unique Mainland internship placements for Hong Kong youths with different backgrounds, talents and interests.

Our target is to increase the number of beneficiaries under the HYAB's various youth exchange and internship schemes/programmes in the Mainland and overseas to no less than 30 000 in 2024, with no less than 90% of participants surveyed to consider themselves having benefitted from the exchange/internship and that the objectives of the schemes/programmes have been attained, and with no less than 80% of employers surveyed to consider the Mainland and overseas internship experience valuable and participants of such schemes/programmes more competitive than non-participants.

Question:

It is stated in Matters Requiring Special Attention in 2024-25 under Programme (2) that the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau will continue to take forward the Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS) by subsidising non-governmental organisations (NGOs) to rent suitable hotels and guesthouses for use as youth hostels, with the target of providing about 3 000 additional places within 5 years. In this connection, will the Bureau inform this Committee:

1. in tabulated form, of the NGO responsible for each project, the respective numbers of hostel places provided and to be provided by projects that are being vetted, the respective numbers of applicants and successful applicants for the launched projects, the number of hostel tenants, as well as details of the construction progress and the completion dates or projected completion dates of the unfinished projects;
2. in tabulated form, of the staff establishment and emoluments for handling matters relating to each project in the past 5 years;
3. of the number of organisations with which the Government is negotiating for the supply of hostel places and the number of hostel places to be involved; and
4. as the Government first announced the YHS in the 2011-12 Policy Address but so far only the projects in Po Heung Street, Tai Po Market and Ma Tin Pok, Yuen Long have been completed, whether the Bureau has reviewed the reasons for the slow progress in implementing the policy; if yes, of the details; if not, the reasons?

Reply:

The Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS) is an important youth development initiative. Apart from providing relatively stable and long-term accommodation for young people to meet their aspirations of having their own living space, we also hope to benefit young people through the various support and training activities provided by the non-governmental organisations (NGOs) operating such youth hostels. The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) has been proactively implementing the YHS through a multi-pronged approach, which includes

fully funding NGOs to construct youth hostels on under-utilised sites, and launching the YHS - Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels (the Subsidy Scheme).

There are currently 7 youth hostel projects whose construction is fully funded by the Government. The first 2 youth hostels run separately by the Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups and the Po Leung Kuk have commenced operation upon completion of construction in 2020 and 2023 respectively, offering a total of over 1 700 hostel places, which account for more than half of the total provision of hostel places under all the projects. Within one year since its launch, 3 projects have been approved under the Subsidy Scheme which provided a maximum of 478 hostel places in total. Of the 5 youth hostels currently in operation, 4 commenced operation in or after the second quarter of 2023. The NGOs concerned have recruited youth tenants as planned. As at end-February 2024, the 5 youth hostels received a total of around 6 690 applications and, except for the usual tenant turnover slots, the average occupancy rate reached about 90%. The latest progress and relevant information of the various youth hostel projects are at [Annex](#).

The aforesaid youth hostel projects, whose construction is fully funded by the Government, vary in size, building design and technical requirements, hence the planning and land procedures involved are also different. The HYAB has been assisting individual NGOs in liaising with the relevant government departments to resolve technical issues and expedite the progress. We will continue to work closely with the relevant NGOs to help them take forward the projects concerned.

Since Hong Kong and the Mainland as well as the rest of the world fully resumed normal travel, there has been a leap in the demand for hotels and guesthouses by visitors to Hong Kong as compared to the time during the epidemic, hence the improving operating environment of hotels and guesthouses has brought greater challenges to NGOs when negotiating the terms of collaboration with individual hotels and guesthouses. That said, we note that there are still hotels and guesthouses willing to shoulder their social responsibilities and respond to the Government's appeal for supporting youth development through tripartite collaboration among the Government, the business sector and the community, and they have expressed interest in offering rooms to take part in the Subsidy Scheme. The HYAB will continue to proactively communicate with NGOs and relevant stakeholders to take forward the Subsidy Scheme, with a view to offering around 3 000 additional hostel places.

In the past 5 years, the YHS was administered by a team of civil servants at the former Home Affairs Bureau / the HYAB (comprising 1 Administrative Officer Staff Grade C, 1 Senior Administrative Officer or Chief Executive Officer and 2 Executive Officers I) with the assistance of non-civil service contract staff. Since they are also responsible for other regular duties, we cannot single out the exact manpower and emoluments involved.

Question:

In the past, whenever there were mega football events, the Ping Wo Fund (PWF) would launch large-scale publicity campaigns to disseminate anti-football gambling messages. Please advise this Committee:

1. of the amount of money spent by the PWF on publicity campaigns for each of the international football matches over the past 3 years, and the respective numbers of people reached by the various types of publicity;
2. whether the PWF disseminates anti-gambling messages targeted at other major sports events (e.g. those of basketball and Formula One racing); and
3. whether the PWF will consider strengthening public education on the message that betting with illegal offshore gambling websites is also an offence; if yes, of the plans and the resources to be allocated; if not, the reasons.

Asked by: Hon KOON Ho-ming, Peter Douglas (LegCo internal reference no.: 28)

Reply:

1. During the peak seasons of mega football events, it is strategically important to raise public awareness of gambling-related problems. During the 2020 UEFA European Championship<sup>Note 1</sup> and the World Cup 2022, the Ping Wo Fund (PWF) launched territory-wide anti-gambling publicity and public education campaigns to not only raise public awareness of the problems arising from gambling addiction but also promote the message of “healthy living, no gambling”. The actual expenditures of the PWF on publicity and public education for the 2 abovementioned mega football events were about \$4.1 million and \$6 million respectively. Through publicity activities such as organising thematic exhibitions and Football Fun Days, placing advertisements and disseminating anti-gambling information via traditional media as well as online and social media platforms, etc., the relevant publicity messages reached over 11 million and 19 million people respectively.

Note 1: The tournament was postponed to 2021 due to the COVID-19 epidemic.

2&3. To raise public awareness of the problems arising from gambling addiction, the PWF has been promoting anti-gambling messages through diversified public education and publicity activities. In addition to publicity efforts made via traditional media as well as online and social media platforms, the PWF funds non-governmental organisations and schools to organise anti-gambling public education and publicity activities under 2 annual funding schemes, and encourages applicant organisations to organise activities that raise public awareness of the risks involved in various emerging gambling channels. The PWF has also enhanced publicity on the harms of gambling at school and community levels through the No-Gambling Publicity Truck, and promoted ways to prevent and alleviate gambling-related problems (including those arising from illegal online gambling).

As mentioned above, the PWF has organised large-scale publicity and public education campaigns targeting football events with a huge betting demand. For other major sports events, the PWF will keep them in view having regard to the gambling situation in Hong Kong, and take necessary enhanced action to prevent and alleviate gambling-related problems.

In addition, the Hong Kong Police Force has been carrying out preventive and educational work on anti-illegal gambling, such as producing promotional videos on anti-illegal gambling messages, distributing leaflets and displaying posters across different districts in Hong Kong, to disseminate the message that “betting with offshore gambling websites is an offence”.

- b. The CPCE has been monitoring the effectiveness of various projects and activities on promoting civic and national education and believes that the feedback from participants and the proper use of sponsorship by organisers should be taken into account under the monitoring mechanism. As stipulated in the relevant funding guidelines, organisations sponsored by the CPCE for organising civic and national education activities are required to submit to the CPCE the relevant activity reports and financial reports, as well as surveys on participants' feedback. Moreover, the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) will deploy staff to inspect activities on site. Members of the CPCE will also observe the conduct of the activities and submit their evaluation reports to the CPCE afterwards to facilitate members' deliberation on and planning for the work next year, as well as considering improvements if necessary. Taking the 2021-22 financial year as an example, over 90% of participants of the projects sponsored under the Community Participation Scheme considered the projects useful and beneficial to their deeper understanding of the relevant subject matters.

Reply:

The Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS) is an important youth development initiative. Apart from providing relatively stable and long-term accommodation for young people to meet their aspirations of having their own living space, we also hope to benefit young people through the various support and training activities provided by the non-governmental organisations (NGOs) operating such youth hostels. The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau has been proactively implementing the YHS through a multi-pronged approach, which includes fully funding NGOs to construct youth hostels on under-utilised sites, and launching the YHS - Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels (the Subsidy Scheme).

There are currently 7 youth hostel projects whose construction is fully funded by the Government. The first 2 youth hostels run separately by the Hong Kong Federation of Youth

Groups and the Po Leung Kuk have commenced operation upon completion of construction in 2020 and 2023 respectively, offering a total of over 1 700 hostel places, which account for more than half of the total provision of hostel places under all the projects. Within one year since its launch, 3 projects have been approved under the Subsidy Scheme which provided a maximum of 478 hostel places in total. Of these 5 youth hostels currently in operation, 4 commenced operation in or after the second quarter of 2023. The NGOs concerned have recruited youth tenants as planned. As at end-February 2024, except for the usual tenant turnover slots, the average occupancy rate reached about 90%.

The financial provision under Subhead 88J “Youth Hostel Scheme (block vote)” is for funding the participating NGOs under the YHS to procure equipment. In 2024-25, we will grant around \$60,000 and \$7.44 million to the Po Leung Kuk and the Hong Kong Girl Guides Association respectively for procuring related equipment such as information technology systems.

In operating the youth hostels, the NGOs are required to maintain regular communication with tenants and provide support and counselling services whenever necessary and when tenants move out from the hostel units, so that the NGOs may learn about tenants’ personal development and help them understand their strengths for future planning. This is to ensure that the policy objectives of the YHS can be achieved.

Since the current-term Government, the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) has been providing secretariat support to the WoC to promote women's development through a multi-pronged strategy, including the provision of an enabling environment, empowerment of women and public education, as well as through collaborations with other sectors in the community.

The HYAB designated the post of Commissioner for Women Affairs (the Commissioner) and set up the dedicated Women Affairs Team on 1 April this year to steer work on women's development. Being a Principal Assistant Secretary post ranked at D2 level, the Commissioner heads the Women Affairs Team that is staffed by 6 civil servant posts, including Administrative Officer, Executive Officer as well as Clerical and Secretarial Grades staff, with the assistance of non-civil service contract staff.

Apart from leading the Women Affairs Team to focus on promoting women's development, the Commissioner will also lead the WoC Secretariat to support the WoC and its working groups. Moreover, the Commissioner will work closely with the WoC and the Family Council to assist in taking forward related activities and the new initiatives announced in the Policy Address, with a view to achieving complementary effects in promoting women's development and enhancing family well-being and social harmony.

The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) and the Family Council (the Council) will launch a brand new five-year Funding Scheme on the Promotion of Family Education (new Scheme) in the second half of 2024 to subsidise non-profit-making community projects in promoting family education. The Council will consolidate the existing Thematic Sponsorship Scheme to Support Family-related Initiatives (Sponsorship Scheme), with the amount of funding increased from about \$4 million in each round previously to \$8 million per year. Since the Sponsorship Scheme only sponsors, in each round, 3 to 4 designated family-related topics such as "Divorce Education", "Step and Split Families", "Preventing and Resolving Family Conflicts/Disputes" and "Strengthening Family Cohesion and Solidarity", it may not be able to cater for the varied needs of different families. Therefore, the new Scheme will expand its scope of funding to cover various family-related topics, such as education for new parents, parent-child education, maintenance of family relationship and other marriage-related subjects to better meet the needs of different families. The latest progress and relevant information of the various youth hostel projects are at Annex.

Under the Subsidy Scheme, the subsidy to be allocated to each approved project depends on the merits of the proposal submitted by the project applicant and a number of project-specific factors, including but not limited to the project's room size(s), ventilation and lighting conditions, provision of basic communal facilities and accessibility, etc. As the software and hardware of each project differ and the subsidy amounts involve commercially sensitive information, it is not appropriate to disclose the financial details of individual projects.

The policy framework of the YHS was formulated by the Government after careful consideration, having taken into account the policy objectives and views of various stakeholders. Under the current policy design, young people aged 18 to 30 are permitted to apply for living in the youth hostels with a maximum tenancy of 5 years per tenant to facilitate the turnover of units for the benefit of more young people in need. While young people must meet the income limit requirement for admission to youth hostels, many of them are likely to have their income increased during the tenancy period because of their career development. We are of the view that these young tenants should be allowed to fully utilise their increased income during their tenancies for more savings to prepare for their future development. Tenants are therefore not subject to the income and asset limit assessment again when applying for tenancy renewal.

The YHS is administered by a team of civil servants at the HYAB (comprising 1 Administrative Officer Staff Grade C, 1 Senior Executive Officer and 2 Executive Officers I) with the assistance of non-civil service contract staff. Since they are also responsible for other regular duties, we cannot single out the exact manpower and emoluments involved.

Reply:

- (1) to (3) The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) organised the first Youth Festival in 2023 with themes of “Positive Thinking” and “Positivity”. Under the tripartite collaboration among the Government, the business sector and the community, around 200 all-compassing activities were organised by various bureaux/departments, community bodies, youth or district organisations and non-governmental organisations. These activities covered knowledge and exchange, arts and culture as well as sports-related items. All these activities were launched in end-July 2023 and carried on for about 5 months until end-2023. Activities were held in all 18 districts across the territory, and some of them were also held in other cities of the Greater Bay Area. The total number of participants was about 200 000.

The types of activities involved in the 2023 Youth Festival were as follows:

The Action Group on Youth Festival under the Youth Development Commission will continue to steer and co-ordinate different sectors in jointly organising the various activities of the 2024 Youth Festival. Details will be announced in due course.

The co-ordination work for the Youth Festival is mainly undertaken by the HYAB through its existing manpower and resources, we thus cannot single out the manpower requirement and estimated expenditure involved.

For the Youth Development Summit (the Summit) that the HYAB plans to organise in August this year as the opening and highlight of the 2024 Youth Festival, we intend to invite guest speakers and youth groups from the Mainland and overseas to come to Hong Kong to attend the Summit, where they can exchange views and engage in mutual learning with local youths on issues of concern to young people, thereby helping young people to accurately learn and understand the latest developments and future challenges. It is anticipated that no less than 1 000 persons will participate in the Summit.

The HYAB will arrange for necessary manpower and resources for the organisation of the Summit. However, as the Summit is still at its preparatory stage, the exact manpower requirement and estimated expenditure are yet to be confirmed.

- (4) The HYAB has launched the first release of the youth mobile application “HKYouth+” (the App), providing a one-stop platform to disseminate comprehensive information about youth development programmes. Young people can make use of the App to explore different opportunities and activities according to their individual needs and interests. We will utilise various online and offline channels for publicity and promotion so that young people will fully grasp the features and functions of the App. We will also make use of the App to regularly disseminate latest youth-related information, and keep an eye on young users’ feedback on the App so as to optimise and enhance its functions. As the development work of the App is still ongoing, we will give an account of the expenses on its development and maintenance in due course.
- (5) The HYAB launched the brand new Youth Link (YL) in September 2023 to link up participants of various government youth programmes and offer them opportunities to develop diverse talents, as well as strengthening their communication, interaction and trust with the Government. The YL currently has over 5 000 youth members.

Since the launch of YL, the HYAB has organised a number of activities for its members. To name a few, the Youth Dialogue on “The Chief Executive’s 2023 Policy Address”, a leadership training camp for members of the YL Committee, the exchange tour “Exploring Innovation and Entrepreneurship Opportunities in the Greater Bay Area”, visits to youth hostels and some voluntary work in large-scale government events. To date, over 500 young people have participated in such activities. The HYAB will keep providing YL members with various types of activities, including talent development, special visit programmes and social affairs participation. Our target is to host at least 10 youth development activities for YL members by end-2024 and the HYAB will also provide members with opportunities to participate in various other youth development activities.

Apart from the HYAB, many bureaux have set up informal and regular youth exchange platforms. For example, the Security Bureau launched in October 2022 the Security Bureau Youth Uniformed Group Leaders Forum (the Leaders Forum) to benefit the elites in the youth uniformed groups of its departments. Since its establishment, SB has organised over 20 diverse activities for the Leaders Forum, such as training camps; seminars on national security, the Basic Law and “One Country, Two Systems”; and study tours to the Mainland. In addition, 10 summer internship places were offered to the Leaders Forum to enhance its members’ competence and broaden their horizons. Meanwhile, with the support of the Development Bureau, the Construction Industry Council (CIC) set up the Youth Affairs Committee and the Construction Youth Alliance in 2022 and 2023 respectively. The CIC has also organised various activities for young people and encouraged youth exchange on matters relating to the development of the construction industry.

The HYAB will continue to encourage bureaux to deepen their youth work and strengthen their interaction and communication with young people through various channels such as informal and regular youth exchange platforms.

In 2023-24, 145 projects were approved under the WEF and the funding involved was about \$21.38 million. The funding amount and proportion by category of funded projects are as follows:

The Government states that in 2024-25, it will continue to support Hong Kong young people to start their businesses in Hong Kong and other cities of the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (GBA) through the Alliance of Hong Kong Youth Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Greater Bay Area and the relevant funding schemes under the Youth Development Fund. Will the Government inform this Committee of the following:

1. What were the respective figures on the applications received and the young people who were funded and succeeded in starting their businesses in the past year?
2. What are the proportions, by industry type, of start-ups and applications under these funding schemes?
3. Please set out, by GBA city (including Hong Kong), the proportions of start-ups and funding amounts under these funding schemes.
4. What is the anticipated number of young entrepreneurs to be benefitted in the coming year and the estimated expenditure on the relevant funding?

Reply:

To promote youth innovation and entrepreneurship, the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) and the Youth Development Commission rolled out 2 funding schemes in 2019, namely the Funding Scheme for Youth Entrepreneurship in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (the Entrepreneurship Scheme) and the Funding Scheme for Experiential Programmes at Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (the Experiential Scheme), which provide support for potential Hong Kong young entrepreneurs. The HYAB announced the lists of funded organisations under these 2 schemes in 2021.

The Entrepreneurship Scheme subsidises non-governmental organisations (NGOs) to implement youth entrepreneurship projects, under which young people who are interested in

starting their businesses locally and in other cities of the Greater Bay Area (GBA) are provided with entrepreneurial support, incubation services and start-up capital for 1 to 3 years. Under the Entrepreneurship Scheme, we granted a total of about \$130 million to 16 NGOs. 217 youth start-up teams have been successfully recruited, covering a wide range of businesses, including research and development of innovation and technology projects, retail, information technology, healthcare, brand design and education services, etc. All of the youth start-up teams have started their businesses in Hong Kong, and over 70 of them have established a presence in the Mainland cities of the GBA such as Guangzhou, Shenzhen, Zhuhai and Foshan. Meanwhile, the Experiential Scheme provides subsidy for NGOs to organise short-term experiential programmes at the innovation and entrepreneurial bases in Mainland cities of the GBA. With the full resumption of normal travel between Hong Kong and Mainland, 12 programmes under the Experiential Scheme were successfully organised in the end, benefitting about 300 youths. The lists of the funded NGOs, funded projects and funding amounts under these 2 schemes are at [Annex](#). Given that the Entrepreneurship Scheme implements youth entrepreneurship projects and recruits youth start-up teams through the subsidised NGOs, we do not maintain figures on the relevant applications.

As the existing projects under these 2 schemes are nearing completion, the Government launched the following initiatives to further support youth entrepreneurship:

- (1) to launch a new round of the Entrepreneurship Scheme to provide start-up capital and comprehensive support services for more Hong Kong young people interested in starting their businesses locally and in Mainland cities of the GBA. In this regard, the following new/updated indicators are set out in the 2023 Policy Address:
  - (i) no less than 100 funded youth start-up teams in aggregate to have settled in Mainland cities of the GBA after joining the scheme by 2026;
  - (ii) no less than 80% of the participants surveyed to consider their understanding of business start-up to increase after joining the scheme; and
- (2) to launch the Funding Scheme for Experiential Programmes at Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases, the scope of which has been expanded from the GBA to various Mainland provinces and municipalities, so as to encourage young people to explore entrepreneurial opportunities in the enormous Mainland market.

Moreover, the Government established the Alliance of Hong Kong Youth Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Greater Bay Area (the Alliance) in December 2023 for further support to Hong Kong young people on starting their businesses in the GBA. The HYAB, the Hong Kong and Macao Affairs Office of the People's Government of Guangdong Province and the Human Resources and Social Security Department of Guangdong Province are the leading parties of the Alliance. Nearly 60 organisations from various sectors in the GBA have also joined the Alliance as members, including government and public organisations, innovation and entrepreneurial bases, NGOs and social organisations, post-secondary institutions and scientific research institutes, professional organisations and venture funds. The Alliance leverages the resources and networks of the member organisations to provide a one-stop information, publicity and exchange platform, thereby providing young entrepreneurs with comprehensive support, facilitating them in expanding

their networks in the GBA and enhancing their competitiveness. The HYAB implements the above initiatives using the Youth Development Fund and other existing resources.

- 1) What were the numbers of participants and the expenditures involved in the past year in relation to the various youth exchange schemes/programmes funded by the Government (including international youth exchange programmes, the Funding Scheme for Youth Exchange in the Mainland (FSYEM) and the Funding Scheme for Youth Internship in the Mainland (FSYIM))?
- 2) Please tabulate details of the Mainland provinces/cities visited by participants under the FSYEM in 2019-20 and 2023-24 and their respective numbers of participants.
- 3) Please tabulate details of the industries in which participants have had an internship under the FSYIM in 2019-20 and 2023-24 and their respective numbers of interns.
- 4) What were the details of the assessments on the effectiveness of the afore-mentioned exchange and internship schemes/programmes in the past year? What measures will be put in place to enhance the effectiveness of the schemes/programmes?

Reply:

- 1) In 2023-24, the numbers of participants and the expenditures related to the international youth exchange programmes, the Funding Scheme for Youth Exchange in the Mainland (FSYEM) and the Funding Scheme for Youth Internship in the Mainland (FSYIM) were as follows:

2) and 3) The projects under the FSYEM and FSYIM covered a wide range of Mainland provinces/cities. In 2023-24, the 5 most visited provinces/cities under the FSYEM were Guangdong, Beijing, Shanghai, Zhejiang and Sichuan. As for the FSYIM, the 5 most visited provinces/cities were Guangdong, Shanghai, Beijing, Jiangsu and Chongqing, covering a wide array of industries such as finance, legal, trading, social service, information technology, engineering, media, etc. We do not maintain the detailed breakdown by enterprise/industry.

4) Upon completion of an exchange/internship project, participants are invited to fill in evaluation questionnaires from which we could gauge their views on the project for monitoring its effectiveness and quality. This would also become part of the track record when assessing the same organisation's applications in the future. Based on the feedback collected from the last rounds of participants, over 90% of the respondents considered that the respective schemes/programmes have attained the intended objectives and helped them broaden their exposure and deepen their understanding of the Mainland / overseas countries they visited. Representatives of the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) and the Youth Development Commission also attend activities (such as concluding and sharing sessions) held locally by the funded organisations to understand participants' views on the projects for monitoring their effectiveness and quality.

The exchange and internship schemes/programmes for 2024-25 have been rolled out since October 2023, and it is expected that Hong Kong young people will start to undertake these exchange and internship opportunities in the Mainland and overseas from May this year the earliest. We have implemented enhancement measures under various schemes/programmes to encourage participation of more young people from different backgrounds. The HYAB will further enhance the breadth and depth of these schemes/programmes, including strengthening our collaboration with more official cultural and scientific research institutions in the Mainland and major corporates to organise the Thematic Youth Internship Programmes to the Mainland and the Scheme on Corporate Summer Internship on the Mainland and Overseas, thereby providing unique Mainland internship placements for Hong Kong youths with different backgrounds, talents and interests.

Our target is to increase the number of beneficiaries under the HYAB's various youth exchange and internship schemes/programmes in the Mainland and overseas to no less than 30 000 in 2024, with no less than 90% of participants surveyed to consider themselves having benefitted from the exchange/internship and that the objectives of the schemes/programmes have been attained, and with no less than 80% of employers surveyed to consider the Mainland and overseas internship experience valuable and participants of such schemes/programmes more competitive than non-participants.

Under Programme (2) Youth Development, Social Harmony and Civic Education, the Bureau will support Hong Kong young people to start their businesses in Hong Kong and other cities of the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (GBA) through the Alliance of Hong Kong Youth Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Greater Bay Area (the Alliance) and the relevant funding schemes under the Youth Development Fund. Please advise this Committee on the following:

- 1) What are the work objectives of the Alliance in the coming year? What schemes will be formulated to help enhancing potential local youth entrepreneurs' understanding of the entrepreneurial environment in the GBA?
- 2) Please tabulate details of the respective figures on the funding schemes approved by the Alliance since its establishment, the amount of provision involved and the estimated number of participants.
- 3) How to set key performance indicators for such funding schemes so as to review the work effectiveness of the Bureau?

Reply:

To further support Hong Kong youth entrepreneurship in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (GBA), the Government established the Alliance of Hong Kong Youth Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Greater Bay Area (the Alliance) in December 2023. The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB), the Hong Kong and Macao Affairs Office of the People's Government of Guangdong Province and the Human Resources and Social Security Department of Guangdong Province are the leading parties of the Alliance. Nearly 60 organisations from various sectors in the GBA have also joined the Alliance as members, including government and public organisations, innovation and entrepreneurial bases, non-governmental organisations (NGOs) and social organisations, post-secondary institutions and scientific research institutes, professional organisations and venture funds.

The Alliance provides young entrepreneurs with a one-stop information, publicity and exchange platform.

The objectives and key tasks of the Alliance include:

- (1) leveraging on member organisations' resources to organise diverse activities so as to provide youth entrepreneurs with more comprehensive information and support services, and facilitate them in expanding their social, commercial and investor networks, and enhance their competitiveness;
- (2) conveying the needs of Hong Kong youth entrepreneurs in relation to the business environment and policies in different cities of the GBA to relevant authorities;
- (3) fostering the exchange and co-operation between relevant stakeholders so as to jointly promote Hong Kong youth in pursuing entrepreneurship in the GBA and provide comprehensive and all-round support for youth entrepreneurs; and
- (4) disseminating information about supporting Hong Kong youth in pursuing entrepreneurship in the GBA and activities organised by member organisations through the Alliance's designated webpage.

Meanwhile, the HYAB will continue to support Hong Kong youth entrepreneurship in Hong Kong and other GBA cities through the various funding schemes under the Youth Development Fund. The HYAB and the Youth Development Commission (YDC) rolled out 2 funding schemes in 2019, namely the Funding Scheme for Youth Entrepreneurship in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (the Entrepreneurship Scheme) and the Funding Scheme for Experiential Programmes at Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (the Experiential Scheme), which provide support for potential Hong Kong young entrepreneurs. The HYAB announced the lists of funded organisations under these 2 schemes in 2021.

The Entrepreneurship Scheme subsidises NGOs to implement youth entrepreneurship projects, under which young people who are interested in starting their businesses locally and in other cities of the GBA are provided with entrepreneurial support, incubation services and start-up capital for 1 to 3 years. Under the Entrepreneurship Scheme, we granted a total of about \$130 million to 16 NGOs. 217 youth start-up teams were successfully recruited, covering a wide range of businesses, including research and development of innovation and technology projects, retail, information technology, healthcare, brand design and education services, etc. All of the youth start-up teams have started their businesses in Hong Kong, and over 70 of them have established a presence in the Mainland cities of the GBA such as Guangzhou, Shenzhen, Zhuhai and Foshan. Meanwhile, the Experiential Scheme provides subsidy for NGOs to organise short-term experiential programmes at the innovation and entrepreneurial bases in Mainland cities of the GBA. With the full resumption of normal travel between Hong Kong and Mainland, 12 programmes under the Experiential Scheme were successfully organised in the end, benefitting about 300 youths. The lists of the funded NGOs, funded projects and funding amounts under these 2 schemes are at **Annex**.

Upon completion of an entrepreneurship project under such schemes, participants are invited to fill in evaluation questionnaires from which we can gauge their views on the project for

monitoring its effectiveness and quality. This will also become part of the track record when assessing the same organisation's applications in the future. Based on the feedback collected from the participants of these 2 schemes, over 90% of the participants surveyed considered the schemes beneficial in deepening their understanding of business start-up, and the percentage is higher than our original indicator of no less than 70% of the participants surveyed.

As the existing projects under these 2 schemes are nearing completion, the Government launched the following initiatives to further support youth entrepreneurship:

- (1) to launch a new round of the Entrepreneurship Scheme to provide start-up capital and comprehensive support services for more Hong Kong young people interested in starting their businesses locally and in Mainland cities of the GBA. In this regard, the following new/updated indicators are set out in the 2023 Policy Address:
  - (i) no less than 100 funded youth start-up teams in aggregate to have settled in Mainland cities of the GBA after joining the scheme by 2026;
  - (ii) no less than 80% of the participants surveyed to consider their understanding of business start-up to increase after joining the scheme; and
- (2) to launch the Funding Scheme for Experiential Programmes at Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases, the scope of which has been expanded from the GBA to various Mainland provinces and municipalities so as to encourage young people to explore entrepreneurial opportunities in the enormous Mainland market.

The HYAB will continue to work closely with the YDC and other stakeholders so as to take forward various initiatives that promote youth innovation and entrepreneurship.

Question:

The Bureau will continue to implement the Youth Hostel Scheme – Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels (the Subsidy Scheme). Please advise this Committee:

- 1) of the total number of participant hotels or guesthouses under the Subsidy Scheme, the respective numbers and areas of the rooms provided, the average alteration costs of each room, and the average amount of government subsidy for each participant;
- 2) of the respective numbers of applicants and approved applicants in the past year;
- 3) in tabulated form, of the new projects on youth hostels in the coming 3 years, the numbers of hostel places so provided, the works progress and the anticipated completion dates; and
- 4) as the demand for local hotel and guesthouse rooms is expected to rise following the recovery of the tourism industry, whether the Government has assessed if the Subsidy Scheme will achieve its intended objectives; if it will not, whether the Government has any back-up plans to increase the supply of youth hostel units and how much expenditure is expected to be involved.

Asked by: Hon LAM Lam, Nixie (LegCo internal reference no.: 24)

Reply:

The Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS) is an important youth development initiative. Apart from providing relatively stable and long-term accommodation for young people to meet their aspirations of having their own living space, we also hope to benefit young people through the various support and training activities provided by the non-governmental organisations (NGOs) operating such youth hostels. The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) has been proactively implementing the YHS through a multi-pronged approach, which includes fully funding NGOs to construct youth hostels on under-utilised sites, and launching the YHS - Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels (the Subsidy Scheme).

There are currently 7 youth hostel projects whose construction is fully funded by the Government. The first 2 youth hostels run separately by the Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups and the Po Leung Kuk have commenced operation upon completion of construction in 2020 and 2023 respectively, offering a total of over 1 700 hostel places, which account for more than half of the total provision of hostel places under all the projects. Within one year since its launch, 3 projects have been approved under the Subsidy Scheme which provided a maximum of 478 hostel places in total. The latest progress and relevant information of the various youth hostel projects are at [Annex](#).

Under the Subsidy Scheme, the subsidy to be allocated to each approved project depends on the merits of the proposal submitted by the project applicant and a number of project-specific factors, including but not limited to the project's room size(s), ventilation and lighting conditions, provision of basic communal facilities and accessibility, etc. As the software and hardware of each project differ and the subsidy amounts involve commercially sensitive information, it is not appropriate to disclose the financial details of individual projects.

Since Hong Kong and the Mainland as well as the rest of the world fully resumed normal travel, there has been a leap in the demand for hotels and guesthouses by visitors to Hong Kong as compared to the time during the epidemic, hence the improving operating environment of hotels and guesthouses has brought greater challenges to NGOs when negotiating the terms of collaboration with individual hotels and guesthouses. That said, we note that there are still hotels and guesthouses willing to shoulder their social responsibilities and respond to the Government's appeal for supporting youth development through tripartite collaboration among the Government, the business sector and the community, and they have expressed interest in offering rooms to take part in the Subsidy Scheme. The HYAB will continue to proactively communicate with NGOs and relevant stakeholders to take forward the Subsidy Scheme, with a view to offering around 3 000 additional hostel places.

Reply:

The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) launched the brand new Youth Link (YL) in September 2023 to link up participants of various government youth programmes and offer them opportunities to develop diverse talents, as well as strengthening their communication, interaction and trust with the Government. The YL currently has over 5 000 youth members and their age distribution is: 40% of them are aged 12 to 17, 40% aged 18 to 25, 16% aged 26 to 33 and 4% aged 34 to 39.

The HYAB has not set a target for the number of YL members. We will continue to offer suitable and diverse activities through the YL to attract more young people to become its members, the number of which is expected to be on the increase.

Since the launch of YL, the HYAB has organised a number of activities for its members. To name a few, the Youth Dialogue on “The Chief Executive’s 2023 Policy Address”, a leadership training camp for members of the YL Committee, the exchange tour “Exploring Innovation and Entrepreneurship Opportunities in the Greater Bay Area”, visits to youth hostels and some voluntary work in large-scale government events. To date, over 500 young people have participated in such activities. The HYAB will keep providing YL members with various types of activities, including talent development, special visit programmes and social affairs participation. Our target is to organise at least 10 youth development activities for YL members by end-2024 and the HYAB will also provide members with opportunities to participate in various other youth development activities. At present, YL activities are mainly co-ordinated by 1 Chief Executive Manager and 2 Senior Executive Managers appointed on non-civil service contract terms at the HYAB. Since the activities concerned are still at the preparatory stage, their specific details, expenditures and estimated attendances are yet to be confirmed. The operating expenditure concerned were included in the 2024-25 estimates of the HYAB.

The HYAB has adopted various measures to evaluate the effectiveness of YL activities, such as gauging views and suggestions on these activities from the youth participants, keeping the progress and efficacy of the preparation work in view with the relevant partners, and receiving opinions and feedback from young people at the YL Secretariat.

- 1) to 3) Established in June 2023, the Women Empowerment Fund (WEF) aims to empower women, regardless of their age, occupation, background, etc., to realise their full potentials in their respective arenas, ultimately achieving the goal of promoting women's development in Hong Kong. In accordance with



the criteria set out in the Guide to Application, the Women's Commission (WoC) assesses the applications received based on key considerations such as whether the projects are in line with the purpose and themes of the WEF, the content and nature of the projects, their cost-effectiveness, the implementation details stated in their proposals, and the relevant experience of the applicant organisations, etc. Funding is allocated to projects that best meet the criteria.

In 2023-24, the WEF received a total of 240 eligible applications, among which 145 projects were approved, and the funding involved was about \$21.38 million. The average funding amount per project and the highest funding amount approved are as follows:

The Council will consolidate the existing Thematic Sponsorship Scheme to Support Family-related Initiatives, with the amount of funding increased from about \$4 million in each round previously to \$8 million per year. Except for salary, major expenses related to the internship, such as airfares, accommodation and insurance for participants, are subsidised by the Government to ensure that young people will not be denied participation owing to financial difficulties. For the Scheme on Corporate Summer Internship on the Mainland and Overseas, major expenses related to the internship are covered by the participating corporates while the corporates may determine whether to provide salary or allowance for their interns.
- (3) Based on the feedback collected from the last rounds of participants, over 90% of the respondents considered their respective schemes/programmes have attained the intended objectives, and helped them broaden their exposure and deepen their understanding of

Since the launch of the Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS) over 10 years ago, non-governmental organisations (NGOs) have been fully funded by the Government to construct youth hostels, which are then operated on a self-financing basis. To further meet the housing needs of young people, the Government announced in the 2022 Policy Address the expansion of the YHS, under which NGOs are now subsidised to rent suitable hotels and guesthouses for use as youth hostels. In this connection, please advise this Committee on the following:

1. What are the respective estimated expenditures and manpower arrangements for the YHS and the YHS – Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels (the Subsidy Scheme) in 2024-25?
2. For the past 3 financial years, please set out the respective figures on i) the hostels constructed under the YHS and their rents, ii) the applicants for such hostels and iii) the approved applicants.
3. Regarding the Subsidy Scheme, please set out i) the number of NGO applications received to date, ii) the names of these NGOs, iii) the respective districts where the hotels/guesthouses under application are located, iv) the number of hostel places to be provided and v) the respective funding amounts for the applicant NGOs. Please also advise on the estimated number of NGOs that will participate in the Subsidy Scheme in 2024-25.
4. Does the Bureau have any objective criteria for evaluating the effectiveness of the 2 schemes mentioned above? Are the schemes effective in relieving young people's housing needs and building their sense of belonging to the community?

Reply:

The Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS) is an important youth development initiative. Apart from providing relatively stable and long-term accommodation for young people to meet their aspirations of having their own living space, we also hope to benefit young people through

the various support and training activities provided by the non-governmental organisations (NGOs) operating such youth hostels. The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) has been proactively implementing the YHS through a multi-pronged approach, which includes fully funding NGOs to construct youth hostels on under-utilised sites, and launching the YHS - Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels (the Subsidy Scheme).

The cost of each youth hostel project whose construction is fully funded by the Government hinges on the scale of development, building design and specific site characteristics of the project. The construction costs of the Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups' (HKFYG) project (youth hostel portion)<sup>1</sup>, the Po Leung Kuk's (PLK) project, the Hong Kong Girl Guides Association's (HKGGA) project (youth hostel portion)<sup>1</sup>, the Tung Wah Group of Hospitals' project and the Hong Kong Association of Youth Development's project are estimated to be \$158.1 million, \$1.5128 billion, \$781.3 million, \$451.0 million and \$242.3 million respectively. For the other 2 projects, it is difficult to precisely estimate their construction costs at the moment since they are at various pre-construction stages.

The HYAB secured approval from the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council in end 2022 for the creation of a new non-recurrent commitment of \$1 billion, and launched the Subsidy Scheme in early 2023 to subsidise NGOs to rent suitable hotels and guesthouses for use as youth hostels. While the expenditure on the Subsidy Scheme for 2024-25 is estimated to be \$42.95 million, the actual expenditure for each year depends on the number of approved applications, the funding amounts for individual projects and their leasing conditions.

Under the Subsidy Scheme, the subsidy to be allocated to each approved project depends on the merits of the proposal submitted by the project applicant and a number of project-specific factors, including but not limited to the project's room size(s), ventilation and lighting conditions, provision of basic communal facilities and accessibility, etc. As the software and hardware of each project differ and the subsidy amounts involve commercially sensitive information, it is not appropriate to disclose the financial details of individual projects.

There are currently 7 youth hostel projects whose construction is fully funded by the Government. The first 2 youth hostels run separately by the HKFYG and the PLK commenced operation upon completion of construction in 2020 and 2023 respectively, offering a total of over 1 700 hostel places, which account for more than half of the total provision of hostel places under all the projects. Within one year since its launch, 3 projects have been approved under the Subsidy Scheme which provided a maximum of 478 hostel places in total. Of the 5 youth hostels currently in operation, 4 commenced operation in or after the second quarter of 2023. The NGOs concerned have recruited youth tenants as planned. At present, the rent of a hostel place under the YHS ranges between \$2,500 and \$5,576 per month on average. As at end-February 2024, the 5 youth hostels received around 6 690 applications in total and, except for the usual tenant turnover slots, the average occupancy rate reached about 90%. The latest progress and relevant information of the various youth hostel projects are at [Annex](#).

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Note 1: Regarding the youth hostel projects of the HKFYG and HKGGA, youth hostels as well as other facilities are constructed under the "single site, multiple uses" principle. For the YHS, the relevant funding provisions are solely for the NGOs to construct the youth hostel portions of their projects.

The YHS is administered by a team of civil servants at the HYAB (comprising 1 Administrative Officer Staff Grade C, 1 Senior Executive Officer and 2 Executive Officers I) with the assistance of non-civil service contract staff. Since they are also responsible for other regular duties, we cannot single out the exact manpower and emoluments involved.

The YHS projects have been operating smoothly thus far. The NGOs responsible for operating the youth hostel projects submit annual reports to the HYAB on the operation of their youth hostels, including details on the outreach and self-enhancement activities held for youth tenants. We will keep in view the implementation progress and effectiveness of the YHS, as well as the operation of the hostels which have commenced services, to ensure that the YHS meets its policy objectives.

Reply:

1. The Ping Wo Fund (PWF) has been funding 4 counselling and treatment centres to provide telephone counselling, face-to-face counselling and other professional treatment services for (i) people with gambling disorders and (ii) those affected by them (mainly family members of people with gambling disorders). Information by age, gender and gambling type on people with gambling disorders in the past 5 years was as follows:

- 2 & 3. The increase in the number of clients in 2023 as compared to 2022 is mainly because the demand for face-to-face counselling and treatment services has returned to the pre-COVID-19 epidemic level. In addition, following the society's return to normalcy in 2023, the PWF has enhanced its publicity efforts via traditional media as well as online and social media platforms. Such efforts include placing advertisements on public transportation and online platforms, so that promotion of the PWF's Gambling Counselling Hotline (183 4633) and relevant anti-gambling messages can reach the wider public, and encourage those in need to seek early assistance. The enhanced publicity work has also helped more people in need receive counselling and treatment services. The estimated number of people receiving counselling and treatment

services in 2024 (i.e. 2 500) is based on the service targets on the number of clients at the 4 counselling and treatment centres funded by the PWF. The Government will continue to monitor the situation of members of the public receiving these counselling and treatment services and make timely adjustments.

4. Since its establishment in 2003, the PWF has been funded primarily by the Hong Kong Jockey Club, and donations from the public are also welcome. The Government has not provided any funding for the PWF.
5. To raise public awareness of the problems arising from gambling addiction, the PWF has been promoting anti-gambling messages through public education and publicity activities. Apart from publicity efforts made via traditional media as well as online and social media platforms as mentioned above, other initiatives include funding non-governmental organisations and schools to organise anti-gambling public education and publicity activities under 2 annual funding schemes. To address the problems arising from illegal online gambling, the PWF has, since 2020, accorded priority to funding activities related to the prevention of online gambling behaviours, and encouraged applicant organisations to organise activities that raise public awareness of the risks involved in various emerging gambling channels. Moreover, the PWF has enhanced publicity on the harms of gambling at school and community levels through the No-Gambling Publicity Truck, and promoted ways to prevent and alleviate gambling-related problems (including those arising from illegal online gambling). As the public education and publicity activities and projects funded by the PWF that cover illegal online gambling also cover other gambling problems, there is no separate breakdown on the expenditure and manpower involved.

In addition, the Hong Kong Police Force has been carrying out preventive and educational work on anti-illegal gambling, such as producing promotional videos on anti-illegal gambling messages, distributing leaflets and displaying posters across different districts in Hong Kong, to disseminate the message that “betting with offshore gambling websites is an offence”.

Reply:

1. For 2023-24, the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) provided over 36 000 exchange places and 4 800 internship places for young people through its exchange and internship projects outside Hong Kong, covering various themes and industries. In particular, the placements of various Mainland and overseas internship schemes/programmes covered different industries such as financial services, innovation and technology, cultural and creative industries, legal services, ecological conservation, trading, real estate and engineering services. We do not maintain the detailed breakdown by industry.
2. Take the Funding Scheme for Youth Internship in the Mainland for 2024-25 as an example, about 2 600 internship placements are located in the Mainland cities of the Greater Bay Area, and many of them are related to the fields of finance and asset

management. The HYAB will further enhance the breadth and depth of these schemes/programmes, including strengthening our collaboration with more major corporates to organise the Scheme on Corporate Summer Internship on the Mainland and Overseas, thereby providing unique internship placements for Hong Kong youths with different backgrounds, talents and interests.

Reply:

The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) will organise the Youth Development Summit (the Summit) in August this year as the opening and highlight of the 2024 Youth Festival. While the major target participants of the Summit are local youths aged 12 to 39, we plan to invite guest speakers and youth groups from the Mainland and overseas to come to Hong Kong to attend the Summit, where they can exchange views and engage in mutual learning with local youths on issues of concern to young people, thereby helping young people to

accurately learn and understand the latest developments and future challenges. It is anticipated that no less than 1 000 persons will attend the Summit.

The HYAB will promote the Summit to young people via diversified online and offline channels and platforms, and will also arrange for necessary manpower and resources for the organisation of the Summit. As the Summit is still at its preparatory stage, its specific details, manpower requirement and estimated expenditure are yet to be confirmed.

Will the Bureau step up its publicity efforts, including launching promotions in tertiary institutions and on major youth activities, thereby attracting young people aged 18 to 35 with commitment to serving the community to participate in the MSSY and become members of specified government advisory committees? For the past year, what were the numbers of meetings held and district projects followed up by the District Youth Community Building Committee and the District Youth Development and Civic Education Committee? Reply:

1. To provide more opportunities for young people to participate in policy discussions, the Government launched the Pilot Member Self-recommendation Scheme for Youth (Pilot Scheme) in late October 2017 for young people aged 18 to 35, and with the commitment to serving the community, to self-nominate for joining advisory and statutory bodies of the Government. The Pilot Scheme was then regularised in 2018. From the Pilot

Scheme to Phase VI of the regularised Member Self-recommendation Scheme for Youth (MSSY), over 10 100 applications were received with 172 seats offered in total, covering 85 committees. The number of applications received in each of the phases is tabulated as follows:

2. The Chief Executive announced the launch of the Youth Participation Initiative in the 2022 Policy Address with measures such as further expanding the MSSY, with the aim of tripling the number of participating advisory committees from over 60 in mid-2022 to no less than 180 within the current term of the Government. The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) launched Phase VI of the MSSY in late May 2023, with the number of participating committees in each phase increased from 15 in Phase V to 20 in Phase VI. So far, there are a total of 85 participating committees. Phase VII of the MSSY is expected to kick off in the second quarter of 2024.
3. To attract more young people with commitment to serving the community to participate in the MSSY, we will step up promotion and publicity efforts and widen our publicity channels by way of participating in the Education and Careers Expo organised by the Hong Kong Trade Development Council, as well as working with youth uniformed groups / youth organisations / youth hostels to organise briefing sessions where youth members under the MSSY will be invited to share their experience. We will also enhance promotion on social media and online platforms such as Instagram, LinkedIn, YouTube and various applications that are popular among young people, as well as producing promotional videos on the work of previously appointed youth members to deepen young people's understanding of the MSSY and the government committees. The expenditure on the publicity work of the MSSY is absorbed by existing resources of the HYAB.
4. The Home Affairs Department (HAD) established in April 2023 the District Youth Community Building Committee and the District Youth Development and Civic Education Committee in each of the 18 districts across the territory. So far, each committee has held 3 to 4 meetings, at which young people offered their views on district affairs such as district works, youth development and civic education. Each committee consists of 20 to 30 members, whose average age is below 35. Over one-third of the members are self-nominated young people aged between 16 and 35. The HAD will review the relevant arrangements with regard to the operation of the committees as appropriate.

The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) and the Family Council (the Council) will launch a brand new five-year Funding Scheme on the Promotion of Family Education (new Scheme) in the second half of 2024 to subsidise non-profit-making community projects in promoting family education. The Council will consolidate the existing Thematic Sponsorship Scheme to Support Family-related Initiatives, with the amount of funding increased from about \$4 million in each round previously to \$8 million per year. The new Scheme will expand its scope of funding to cover various family-related topics, such as education for new parents, parent-child education, maintenance of family relationship and other marriage-related subjects to meet the needs of different families. The new Scheme will also strive to promote family values and focus on enhancement of family building, family education and family traditions, with a view to enhancing family well-being and social harmony. As regards the details of the new Scheme, the HYAB will, apart from making reference to various information (including the Law of the People's Republic of China on Family Education Promotion) conducive to the formulation of the Scheme content, consult the Council and make relevant announcement in due course.

The Judiciary does not maintain other statistics as requested in the question.

The Government is committed to enhancing the effectiveness of the system of collecting maintenance payments and enforcing maintenance orders. Over the years, a series of improvement measures have been implemented to facilitate recovery of maintenance payments by divorcees. These include relaxing the requirement for the Court to make Attachment of Income Orders, imposing interest or surcharge against defaulting maintenance payers, allowing designated Government departments to disclose the addresses of maintenance payers upon the request of legal professionals where it is in compliance with relevant legislation, and adjusting upward the amount of monthly maintenance that may be exempted from the Director of Legal Aid's First Charge, etc. Moreover, publicity and education programmes are conducted to enhance public understanding of the responsibilities of maintenance payers, the rights of maintenance payees and services available to payees when they fail to receive maintenance payments. The Government will continue to assist people in need to recover maintenance payments by keeping the system of collection of maintenance payments and enforcement of maintenance orders under review. In this regard, the Government will launch, in the second half of this year, a maintenance mediation pilot scheme (pilot scheme) through the Community Care Fund to assist the parties concerned to resolve disputes on the related matters through mediation. We will also continue to collect statistics concerning maintenance to better consider the future work direction. We are working on the details of the pilot scheme and will make relevant announcement in due course.

It is stated under Matters Requiring Special Attention in 2024-25 that the Bureau will continue to implement the Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS) – Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels (the Subsidy Scheme). In this connection, please advise this Committee on the following:

1. According to the information provided by the Government in February 2024, 3 projects with the provision of 478 hostel places in total have been approved since the launch of the Subsidy Scheme in January 2023. The amount is considerably less than the targeted number of some 3 000 additional hostel places within 5 years. There are views that as the tourism industry gradually recovers, hotels and guesthouses might be less willing to participate in the Subsidy Scheme, hence posing challenges to the Subsidy Scheme. What measures will the Bureau adopt to take the Subsidy Scheme forward so as to achieve its target?
2. Working youths aged 18 to 30 are eligible to apply for youth hostel places. According to the information from the Census and Statistics Department, however, the proportion of youths aged 25 to 34 living with parents increased continuously over the past decade, from 56.4% in 2011 to 63.7% in 2021, indicating that young people are facing a severe housing problem. There are views hoping that the age requirement for the YHS could be relaxed. In this connection, will the Bureau consider relaxing such age requirement to benefit more young people? If yes, what are the details; if no, what are the reasons?

Reply:

The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) secured approval from the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council in end 2022 for the creation of a new non-recurrent commitment of \$1 billion, and launched the Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS) - Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels (the Subsidy Scheme) in early 2023 to subsidise non-governmental organisations (NGOs) to rent suitable hotels and guesthouses for use as youth hostels, with a target of providing about 3 000 hostel places within 5 years. Since its

launch in early 2023, 3 projects have been approved under the Subsidy Scheme and they are located in Hong Kong Island, Kowloon and the New Territories respectively, to provide a maximum of 478 hostel places in total.

Since Hong Kong and the Mainland as well as the rest of the world fully resumed normal travel, there has been a leap in the demand for hotels and guesthouses by visitors to Hong Kong as compared to the time during the epidemic, hence the improving operating environment of hotels and guesthouses has brought greater challenges to NGOs when negotiating the terms of collaboration with individual hotels and guesthouses. That said, we note that there are still hotels and guesthouses willing to shoulder their social responsibilities and respond to the Government's appeal for supporting youth development through tripartite collaboration among the Government, the business sector and the community, and they have expressed interest in offering rooms to take part in the Subsidy Scheme. The HYAB will continue to proactively communicate with NGOs and relevant stakeholders to take forward the Subsidy Scheme.

The policy framework of the YHS, including the age requirement in respect of applicants, was formulated by the Government after careful consideration, having taken into account the policy objectives and views of various stakeholders. Under the current policy design, young people aged 18 to 30 are permitted to apply for living in the youth hostels with a maximum tenancy of 5 years per tenant to facilitate the turnover of units for the benefit of more young people in need. At present, we have no plan to change this requirement. We will keep in view the implementation progress and effectiveness of the YHS, as well as the operation of the hostels which have commenced services, to ensure that the YHS meets its policy objectives.

For the international youth exchange programmes and the Funding Scheme for Youth Internship in the Mainland, the estimated percentage increases in their numbers of participants in 2024 are both higher than the percentage increase in the financial provision for Programme (2) of the same period. In this connection, please advise this Committee on the following:

- a) Given that the percentage increase in the provision concerned is considerably lower than the percentage increases in the numbers of participants, will the standards, durations and contents of the exchange programmes be affected?
- b) For the past 5 years, what were the respective annual provisions for these exchange programmes?

Reply:

- a) The financial provision for Programme (2) covers the expenses on various portfolios under the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB), such as promoting youth development, social harmony, civic education including national education outside schools, participation of young people in policy discussion, the development of social enterprises, and the empowerment of women in Hong Kong. For Programme (2), its provision for 2024-25 is higher than its revised estimate for 2023-24. This is mainly due to the increased provision for new and enhanced youth development, women and family related initiatives and the increased cash flow requirements for non-recurrent and capital account items. Direct comparison cannot be made on the percentage increases in the numbers of participants of the international youth exchange programmes and the Funding Scheme for Youth Internship in the Mainland (FSYIM) against the percentage increase in the financial provision for Programme (2).

As regards the exchange and internship schemes/programmes, following the resumption of normal travel between Hong Kong and other places since early 2023, the HYAB has

resumed various exchange and internship activities outside Hong Kong. We have also implemented enhancement measures under various schemes/programmes to encourage participation of more young people from different backgrounds.

Question:

As stated under Matters Requiring Special Attention, Hong Kong young people will continue to be supported to start their businesses in Hong Kong and other cities of the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area through the Alliance of Hong Kong Youth Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Greater Bay Area and the relevant funding schemes under the Youth Development Fund. In this connection, please advise this Committee of:

- a) the Bureau's specific initiatives on the afore-mentioned matter in the coming year;
- b) the statistics on the successful start-ups in the Mainland for the past 5 years; and
- c) the specific details of the Bureau's provision for the afore-mentioned matter.

Asked by: Hon LUK Hon-man, Benson (LegCo internal reference no.: 12)

Reply:

To further support Hong Kong youth entrepreneurship in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (GBA), the Government established the Alliance of Hong Kong Youth Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Greater Bay Area (the Alliance) in December 2023. The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB), the Hong Kong and Macao Affairs Office of the People's Government of Guangdong Province and the Human Resources and Social Security Department of Guangdong Province are the leading parties of the Alliance. Nearly 60 organisations from various sectors in the GBA have also joined the Alliance as members, including government and public organisations, innovation and entrepreneurial bases, non-governmental organisations (NGOs) and social organisations, post-secondary institutions and scientific research institutes, professional organisations and venture funds. The Alliance provides young entrepreneurs with a one-stop information, publicity and exchange platform.

The objectives and key tasks of the Alliance include:

- (1) leveraging on member organisations' resources to organise diverse activities so as to provide youth entrepreneurs with more comprehensive information and support

services, and facilitate them in expanding their social, commercial and investor networks, and enhance their competitiveness;

- (2) conveying the needs of Hong Kong youth entrepreneurs in relation to the business environment and policies in different cities of the GBA to relevant authorities;
- (3) fostering the exchange and co-operation between relevant stakeholders so as to jointly promote Hong Kong youth in pursuing entrepreneurship in the GBA and provide comprehensive and all-round support for youth entrepreneurs; and
- (4) disseminating information about supporting Hong Kong youth in pursuing entrepreneurship in the GBA and activities organised by member organisations through the Alliance's designated webpage.

Meanwhile, the HYAB will continue to support Hong Kong youth entrepreneurship in Hong Kong and other GBA cities through the various funding schemes under the Youth Development Fund. The HYAB and the Youth Development Commission (YDC) rolled out 2 funding schemes in 2019, namely the Funding Scheme for Youth Entrepreneurship in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (the Entrepreneurship Scheme) and the Funding Scheme for Experiential Programmes at Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area (the Experiential Scheme), which provide support for potential Hong Kong young entrepreneurs. The HYAB announced the lists of funded organisations under these 2 schemes in 2021.

The Entrepreneurship Scheme subsidises NGOs to implement youth entrepreneurship projects, under which young people who are interested in starting their businesses locally and in other cities of the GBA are provided with entrepreneurial support, incubation services and start-up capital for 1 to 3 years. Under the Entrepreneurship Scheme, we granted a total of about \$130 million to 16 NGOs. 217 youth start-up teams were successfully recruited, covering a wide range of businesses, including research and development of innovation and technology projects, retail, information technology, healthcare, brand design and education services, etc. All of the youth start-up teams have started their businesses in Hong Kong, and over 70 of them have established a presence in the Mainland cities of the GBA such as Guangzhou, Shenzhen, Zhuhai and Foshan. Meanwhile, the Experiential Scheme provides subsidy for NGOs to organise short-term experiential programmes at the innovation and entrepreneurial bases in Mainland cities of the GBA. With the full resumption of normal travel between Hong Kong and Mainland, 12 programmes under the Experiential Scheme were successfully organised in the end, benefitting about 300 youths. The lists of the funded NGOs, funded projects and funding amounts under these 2 schemes are at **Annex**.

As the existing projects under these 2 schemes are nearing completion, the Government launched the following initiatives to further support youth entrepreneurship:

- (1) to launch a new round of the Entrepreneurship Scheme to provide start-up capital and comprehensive support services for more Hong Kong young people interested in starting their businesses locally and in Mainland cities of the GBA. In this regard, the following new/updated indicators are set out in the 2023 Policy Address:

- (i) no less than 100 funded youth start-up teams in aggregate to have settled in Mainland cities of the GBA after joining the scheme by 2026;
  - (ii) no less than 80% of the participants surveyed to consider their understanding of business start-up to increase after joining the scheme; and
- (2) to launch the Funding Scheme for Experiential Programmes at Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases, the scope of which has been expanded from the GBA to various Mainland provinces and municipalities, so as to encourage young people to explore entrepreneurial opportunities in the enormous Mainland market.

The HYAB will continue to work closely with the YDC and other stakeholders so as to take forward various initiatives that promote youth innovation and entrepreneurship. The HYAB implements the above initiatives using the Youth Development Fund and other existing resources.

Question:

It is reiterated in the Budget that the various actions and measures set out in the Youth Development Blueprint (the Blueprint) are being actively implemented, and more Mainland and overseas exchange and internship opportunities will be opened up for young people with the target of benefitting no less than 30 000 youths this year. In this connection, please advise this Committee of the following:

- a) On reviewing and monitoring the implementation progress of the Blueprint, what are the Bureau's criteria and performance indicators for assessing the implementation of the Blueprint?
- b) For the past 5 financial years, what were the respective figures on youth participation in government advisory and statutory bodies through the Member Self-recommendation Scheme for Youth (MSSY), and activities/meetings held by the relevant bodies? On assessing the effectiveness of the MSSY, apart from the figures on youth participation and activities/meetings held, does the Government have other criteria and performance indicators?
- c) It is stated under Matters Requiring Special Attention that the Bureau will continue to implement the Youth Hostel Scheme – Subsidy Scheme for Using Hostels and Guesthouse as Youth Hostels. What are the details of the relevant provision? With the recovery of the tourism industry after the epidemic and the rising hotel occupancy rate, will the targets of the scheme be affected? How will the Bureau cope with the situation?

Asked by: Hon LUK Hon-man, Benson (LegCo internal reference no.: 16)

Reply:

- a) The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) released the Youth Development Blueprint (the Blueprint) in December 2022, which outlined the overall vision and guiding principles for the Government's long-term youth development work in future and put forward over 160 concrete actions and measures as well as indicators for specified tasks of each policy bureau. The HYAB has been in close liaison with

various bureaux to monitor and assess the implementation progress and effectiveness of the Blueprint. On 5 February 2024, the HYAB reported to the Panel on Home Affairs, Culture and Sports of the Legislative Council (LegCo) on the latest implementation progress of the Blueprint. Among the some 160 measures set out in the Blueprint, nearly 50 are already completed with the remaining measures progressing well towards the set targets. In future, the HYAB will continue to report to the Youth Development Commission chaired by the Chief Secretary for Administration on the implementation progress of the Blueprint on a regular basis.

- b) To provide more opportunities for young people to participate in policy discussions, the Government launched the Pilot Member Self-recommendation Scheme for Youth (Pilot Scheme) in late October 2017 for young people aged 18 to 35, and with the commitment to serving the community, to self-nominate for joining advisory and statutory bodies (ASBs) of the Government. The Pilot Scheme was then regularised in 2018. From the Pilot Scheme to Phase VI of the regularised Member Self-recommendation Scheme for Youth (MSSY), 85 committees have participated so far, offering 172 seats in total. In addition to opening seats for recruitment under the MSSY, the Government has also invited applicants attending the interviews to authorise the HYAB to include their personal particulars in the Central Personality Index database, so that relevant bureaux and departments may retrieve the information for reference during selection of candidates for appointment as members of other ASBs under their purviews. It is gratifying that over 90% of the applicants have consented to the authorisation, and the number of young people in the Government's "talent pool" has significantly increased from about 1 000 prior to the launch of the Pilot Scheme in October 2017 to about 3 000 at present. So far, about 571 posts are held by young people appointed to ASBs directly or indirectly through the MSSY, involving 316 persons. We do not maintain statistics on the activities/meetings held by the advisory committees which participated in the MSSY. The meeting arrangements of Government advisory committees vary. Generally speaking, meetings are convened on a regular basis such as monthly, quarterly or half-yearly, or for specific matters. Moreover, such committees may arrange visits or other activities for their members wherever necessary. According to the relevant committee secretariats, the young members concerned have actively participated in their committees' work and activities since their appointment.

The MSSY has been well received since its launch. From the Pilot Scheme to Phase VI of the MSSY, over 10 100 applications were received in total, with the number of participating committees in each phase doubled from 10 in Phase I to 20 in Phase VI, covering more committees on policy areas of greater interests and concerns to young people. They include many committees relating to Hong Kong's positioning in the "eight centres" as promulgated under the National 14th Five-Year Plan. The MSSY enables young people to participate in the formulation, planning and execution of policies, thereby strengthening young people's sense of belonging and ownership so that those dedicated to serving the community can play an active role in contributing to Hong Kong. It is gratifying that the MSSY helps engage young people of different backgrounds and from various sectors, and the overall ratio of youth members in ASBs increased from 7.8% in end-2017 when the MSSY launched, to 15.9% in end-2023.

- c) The HYAB obtained approval from the Finance Committee of the LegCo in end-2022 for the creation of a new non-recurrent commitment of \$1 billion, and launched the

Youth Hostel Scheme - Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels (the Subsidy Scheme) in early 2023 to subsidise non-governmental organisations (NGOs) to rent suitable hotels and guesthouses for use as youth hostels. Within one year since its launch, 3 projects have been approved under the Subsidy Scheme which provided a maximum of 478 hostel places in total. The latest progress and relevant information of the various youth hostel projects under the Subsidy Scheme are at **Annex**.

Since Hong Kong and the Mainland as well as the rest of the world fully resumed normal travel, there has been a leap in the demand for hotels and guesthouses by visitors to Hong Kong as compared to the time during the epidemic, hence the improving operating environment of hotels and guesthouses has brought greater challenges to NGOs when negotiating the terms of collaboration with individual hotels and guesthouses. That said, we note that there are still hotels and guesthouses willing to shoulder their social responsibilities and respond to the Government's appeal on supporting youth development through tripartite collaboration among the Government, the business sector and the community, and they have expressed interest in offering rooms to take part in the Subsidy Scheme. The HYAB will continue to proactively communicate with NGOs and relevant stakeholders to take forward the Subsidy Scheme, with a view to offering around 3 000 additional hostel places.

Question:

For Matters Requiring Special Attention in 2024-25 under this Programme, the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau will, inter alia, “continue to run the Women Empowerment Fund under the Women’s Commission to subsidise community projects that support women in balancing job and family commitments, and unleashing their potential”. Please inform this Committee of the work done in 2023-24 on supporting women and the potentials so released. What was the expenditure involved? For 2024-25, what are the anticipated specific work plans on supporting women’s development? What are the expenditures, timetables and key performance indicators (KPIs) to be involved?

Asked by: Hon NG Kit-chong, Johnny (LegCo internal reference no.: 26)

Reply:

The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) provides secretariat support to the Women’s Commission (WoC) to promote women’s development through a multi-pronged strategy, including the provision of an enabling environment, empowerment of women and public education, as well as through collaborations with other sectors in the community. With the support from the HYAB, the major initiatives of WoC in 2023-24 included (i) implemented the Capacity Building Mileage Programme (CBMP), which attracted 6 711 enrolments in the academic year of 2022/23; (ii) implemented the Women Empowerment Fund (WEF), which subsidised a total of 145 projects in 2023-24; and (iii) conducted public education and publicity activities, such as organising a total of 28 school talks on the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women since April 2023. In 2023-24, the HYAB’s revised estimate for supporting the WoC in implementing the relevant activities was \$28.6 million.

In 2024-25, the HYAB will continue to support the WoC in implementing the CBMP and conducting public education and publicity activities. We will also continue to encourage women’s groups and non-governmental organisations to make good use of the WEF to facilitate women’s development of their own potential and self-enhancement. In addition, the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Exchange Programme under the WEF

will be regularised and a new dedicated scheme will be introduced to encourage women to participate in community services. The estimated expenditure for the above initiatives is about \$36.34 million.

Meanwhile, we will launch, in the second half of 2024, a one-stop family and women information portal to pool together information on family education, marriage and women's health, etc. and share legal information relating to family and women affairs. We will also organise the first Family and Women Development Summit to collect community views for formulating more focused measures to support women's development and promote family education. We are working on the details of these initiatives and will make relevant announcement in due course. Our initial estimation of the expenditure for the initiatives is about \$19 million in 2024-25. We will continue to work closely with the WoC and report to the Commission the progress of various projects in a timely manner to ensure that our work supports women's development effectively.

Reply:

In the Youth Development Blueprint released by the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) in end-2022, it was mentioned that we would further enhance the breadth and depth of internship and exchange schemes/programmes in the Mainland and overseas with a view to enriching youth's understanding of the development of our country and the world. Following the resumption of normal travel between Hong Kong and other places in early 2023, the HYAB has resumed various youth exchange and internship schemes/programmes outside Hong Kong, including the Funding Scheme for Youth Internship in the Mainland, the Thematic Youth Internship Programmes to the Mainland, the Scheme on Corporate Summer Internship on the Mainland and Overseas, the United Nations Volunteers - Hong Kong Universities Volunteer Internship Programme, the Funding Scheme for Youth Exchange in the Mainland, the Funding Scheme for International Youth Exchange (FSIYE), the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Youth Cultural Exchange Programme, as well as exchange activities outside Hong Kong under the YDC Youth Ambassadors Programme (YA

Programme). The respective expenditures of the said schemes/programmes for the financial years of 2023-24 and 2024-25 are as follows:

Based on the feedback collected from the last rounds of participants, over 90% of the respondents considered that the respective schemes/programmes have attained the intended objectives and helped them broaden their exposure and deepen their understanding of the Mainland / overseas countries they visited.

The exchange and internship schemes/programmes for 2024-25 have been rolled out since October 2023, and it is expected that Hong Kong young people will start to undertake these exchange and internship opportunities in the Mainland and overseas from May this year the earliest. We have implemented enhancement measures under various schemes/programmes to encourage participation of more young people from different backgrounds. The HYAB

will further enhance the breadth and depth of these schemes/programmes, including strengthening our collaboration with more official cultural and scientific research institutions in the Mainland and major corporates to organise the Thematic Youth Internship Programmes to the Mainland and the Scheme on Corporate Summer Internship on the Mainland and Overseas. Through such diverse, unique and in-depth internship opportunities, Hong Kong young people may deepen their knowledge in our country's development, the relevant disciplines and professional fields. These internship schemes/programmes will help enrich the participants' exposure and enhance young people's employment advantage and upward mobility.

Our target is to increase the number of beneficiaries under the HYAB's various youth exchange and internship schemes/programmes in the Mainland and overseas to no less than 30 000 in 2024, with no less than 90% of participants surveyed to consider themselves having benefitted from the exchange/internship and that the objectives of the schemes/programmes have been attained, and with no less than 80% of employers surveyed to consider the Mainland and overseas internship experience valuable and participants of such schemes/programmes more competitive than non-participants.

Question:

The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau will set up a dedicated Women Affairs Team and designate the post of Commissioner for Women Affairs to steer work related to women's affairs. What are the estimated manpower and expenditure to be involved? What were the manpower and expenditure involved in supporting the work of the Women's Commission over the past 3 years? In 2024-25, what are the Bureau's plans to continue to promote family-friendly measures to support working women in achieving work-life balance and improving their mental health, and create an environment conducive to family reproduction?

Reply:

The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) provides secretariat support to the Women's Commission (WoC) to promote women's development through a multi-pronged strategy, including the provision of an enabling environment, empowerment of women and public education, as well as through collaborations with other sectors in the community.

The HYAB designated the post of Commissioner for Women Affairs (the Commissioner) and set up the dedicated Women Affairs Team on 1 April this year to steer work on women's development. This includes leading the WoC Secretariat to support the WoC and its working groups. Being a Principal Assistant Secretary post ranked at D2 level, the Commissioner heads the Women Affairs Team that is staffed by 6 civil servant posts, including Administrative Officer, Executive Officer as well as Clerical and Secretarial Grades staff, with the assistance of non-civil service contract staff.

In 2024-25, the Government will continue to adopt the multi-pronged strategy mentioned above and support the WoC in implementing the Capacity Building Mileage Programme and conducting public education and publicity activities. We will also continue to encourage women's groups and non-governmental organisations to make good use of the Women Empowerment Fund (WEF) to facilitate women's development of their own potential and self-enhancement. In addition, the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area

Exchange Programme under the WEF will be regularised and a new dedicated scheme will be introduced to encourage women to participate in community services.

Furthermore, we will launch, in the second half of 2024, a one-stop family and women information portal to pool together information on family education, marriage and women's health, etc. and share legal information relating to family and women affairs. We will also organise the first Family and Women Development Summit to collect community views for formulating more focused measures to support women's development and promote family education. We are working on the details of these initiatives and will make relevant announcement in due course.

The HYAB will keep supporting the work of the Family Council (the Council) to promote the 3 sets of family core values, i.e. "Love and Care", "Respect and Responsibility", and "Communication and Harmony". Meanwhile, we will strive to promote and encourage the wider adoption of more diversified and flexible family-friendly employment practices in the community. To this end, the Council will continue to conduct relevant publicity campaigns, including the production of promotional videos and radio programmes.

For the period in 2022-23 after the re-organisation of the Government Secretariat (i.e. from July 2022 to March 2023), the HYAB's actual expenditure on supporting the WoC in conducting the relevant activities was about \$19.12 million. The revised estimate in 2023-24 was \$28.6 million. Since the re-organisation of the Government Secretariat with effect from 1 July 2022, the work on the promotion of women's development, including the provision of support for the WoC, has been taken up mainly by 5 civil servants, with the assistance of non-civil service contract staff.

According to the information provided by the Labour and Welfare Bureau, the actual expenditures on the work on the promotion of women's development in 2021-22 and the period in 2022-23 prior to the re-organisation of the Government Secretariat (i.e. from April to June 2022) were \$18.8 million and \$807,000 respectively.

The 2022 Policy Address announced the establishment of the Women Empowerment Fund (WEF) to subsidise community projects that support women in balancing job and family commitments, and unleashing their potential. For the community projects funded by the WEF over the past 3 years, please provide the respective estimated expenditures, project details and numbers of participants.

Reply:

Established in June 2023, the Women Empowerment Fund (WEF) aims to empower women, regardless of their age, occupation, background, etc., to realise their full potentials in their respective arenas, ultimately achieving the goal of promoting women's development in Hong Kong. In 2023-24, 145 projects were approved under the WEF and the funding involved was about \$21.38 million.

Projects under the WEF are categorised into general projects and thematic projects. For approved general projects, their themes include assisting women in accomplishing transformations in the job market; enhancing women's physical and mental health; helping women to cope with different roles in family and society; motivating women to enhance their personal attributes, achieve full potential and reach out to help others in society; and facilitating the use of new information and communication technology. The funded organisations are required to devise projects according to users' actual needs, and such projects can be in the form of workshops, training courses, talks, practice sessions, etc. The thematic projects of 2023-24 referred to the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Exchange Programme (Exchange Programme), which aimed to promote women's development by broadening their horizons, deepening their understanding of our country's development, and enabling them to have exchanges with local people. Each Exchange Programme comprised a briefing, an exchange tour and a sharing session. As the funded projects are still being rolled out, the number of participants is not yet available.

All the funded organisations are non-profit-making women's organisations and non-governmental organisations. The list of funded organisations and projects is available on the WEF website. The number of projects and funding amounts by category are as follows:

Question:

The Government released the Youth Development Blueprint (the Blueprint) in December 2022 and put forward 160-odd concrete actions and measures. However, as reported earlier, a survey has found that 60% of the respondents have never read the Blueprint and 80% know nothing about its contents. While the youth unemployment rate remains as high as 13%, given that local youths have been incited by “Hong Kong Independence” and misled by the anti-government “black-clad violence”, it is less likely that they are interested in pursuing development in the Mainland. Please provide information on the following government measures in tabulated form:

1. As mentioned in the Budget Speech, the Government is actively implementing the various actions and measures set out in the Blueprint in phases, and the Blueprint points out that “more Mainland and overseas exchange and internship opportunities will be opened up for young people”, please set out such information as the actual amount of additional resources allocated to implement the Blueprint for the coming year, the implementation timetable, and the target industries and projects to be supported.
2. Further to the above, what were the projects put forward by the Government in the past year? How many local youths participated in these projects? What was the total amount of expenditure involved?
3. How many employment opportunities relating to the cultural and creative industries are expected to be created under the relevant programmes? Has the Government assessed whether the objectives of such programmes can be achieved accordingly and whether the estimated expenditures are used properly? If assessment has been made and the result is positive, what are the details? If the assessment result is negative, will the Government take forward any improvement measures to enhance the attractiveness and actual effectiveness of these programmes?
4. Does the Government have any plans to develop more new types of internship and exchange programmes, thereby strengthening Hong Kong’s ties with member countries of the Association of South East Asian Nations or the Belt and Road countries?

Reply:

1. to 4. The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) released the Youth Development Blueprint (the Blueprint) in December 2022 and put forward over 160 concrete measures and actions, including the provision of suitable youth exchange and internship opportunities outside Hong Kong. In this regard, the HYAB rolled out various schemes/programmes in 2023-24, including the Funding Scheme for Youth Internship in the Mainland, the Thematic Youth Internship Programmes to the Mainland, the Scheme on Corporate Summer Internship on the Mainland and Overseas, the United Nations Volunteers - Hong Kong Universities Volunteer Internship Programme, the Funding Scheme for Youth Exchange in the Mainland, the Funding Scheme for International Youth Exchange (FSIYE), the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Youth Cultural Exchange Programme, as well as exchange activities outside Hong Kong under the YDC Youth Ambassadors Programme. The revised estimated expenditure was about \$170 million and the number of beneficiaries was about 26 000.

The main purpose for the HYAB to take forward various internship schemes/programmes is to enable young people to understand first-hand the local workplace culture and career prospects, set their future career goals, accumulate work experience and build interpersonal network so as to boost their employment advantage. These schemes/programmes provide internship placements covering different industries such as financial services, innovation and technology, cultural and creative industries, legal services, ecological conservation, trading, real estate and engineering services.

Upon completion of an exchange/internship project, participants are invited to fill in evaluation questionnaires from which we can gauge their views on the project for monitoring its effectiveness and quality. This will also become part of the track record when assessing the same organisation's applications in the future. Based on the feedback collected from the last rounds of participants, over 90% of the respondents considered that the respective schemes/programmes have attained the intended objectives and helped them broaden their exposure and deepen their understanding of the Mainland / overseas countries they visited. Representatives of the HYAB and the Youth Development Commission (YDC) also attend activities (such as concluding and sharing sessions) held locally by the funded organisations to understand participants' views on the projects for monitoring their effectiveness and quality.

For 2024-25, the HYAB will provide more Mainland and overseas exchange and internship opportunities for young people with an estimated expenditure of about \$250 million. We have implemented enhancement measures under various schemes/programmes to encourage the participation of more young people from different backgrounds. The HYAB will further enhance the breadth and depth of

these schemes/programmes, including strengthening our collaboration with more official cultural and scientific research institutions in the Mainland and major corporates to organise the Thematic Youth Internship Programmes to the Mainland and the Scheme on Corporate Summer Internship on the Mainland and Overseas, thereby providing unique Mainland internship placements for Hong Kong youths with different backgrounds, talents and interests.

Various exchange and internship schemes/programmes have been rolled out since October 2023, and it is expected that Hong Kong young people will start to undertake these exchange and internship opportunities in the Mainland and overseas from May this year the earliest. Many of these exchange and internship projects take place in member countries of the Association of South East Asian Nations (ASEAN) or the Belt and Road (B&R) countries. For instance, under the United Nations Volunteers - Hong Kong Universities Volunteer Internship Programme, participants undertake six-month assignments in the field units of various United Nations agencies in the ASEAN or B&R countries such as Indonesia, Malaysia and Thailand. Moreover, projects under the FSIYE with exchange activities or supporting activities that can enhance Hong Kong youths' understanding of the B&R Initiative would be accorded with higher priority.

Our target is to increase the number of beneficiaries under the HYAB's various youth exchange and internship schemes/programmes in the Mainland and overseas to no less than 30 000 in 2024, with no less than 90% of participants surveyed to consider themselves having benefitted from the exchange/internship and that the objectives of the schemes/programmes have been attained; and with no less than 80% of employers surveyed to consider the Mainland and overseas internship experience valuable and participants of such schemes/programmes more competitive than non-participants.

5. Since the release of the Blueprint, the HYAB has been promoting the vision and initiatives of the Blueprint to young people through diverse channels. For instance, we have tailor-made pamphlets and infographic leaflets for distribution to young people of different age groups through various post-secondary institutions, primary and secondary schools, over 500 youth organisations and the Home Affairs Enquiry Centres in all districts, so as to disseminate the information to young people in society. The HYAB has also been disseminating information relating to the Blueprint and the relevant policy measures, as well as the latest updates of various youth development initiatives on social media platforms. Moreover, with a view to promoting the Blueprint to young people in a more in-depth manner, the HYAB and members of the YDC have proactively visited various post-secondary institutions, over 110 secondary schools, several government advisory bodies and other organisations, as well as setting up street counters in different districts across the territory to exchange views with young people and relevant stakeholders and listen to their feedbacks. So far, we have introduced the key content of the Blueprint to over 40 000 people in person. Such publicity efforts will be continued.

Reply:

Established in June 2023, the Women Empowerment Fund (WEF) aims to empower women, regardless of their age, occupation, background, etc., to realise their full potentials in their respective arenas, ultimately achieving the goal of promoting women's development in Hong Kong. In 2023-24, 145 projects were approved under the WEF, among which 21 projects were under the theme of "assisting women in accomplishing transformations in the job market" and the funding involved was about \$4.34 million. The projects covered workshops on interview skills, training on digital marketing techniques, sharing sessions on entrepreneurship, etc.

In 2024-25, the estimated funding for the WEF is \$20 million. "Assisting women in accomplishing transformations in the job market" will remain as one of the themes under the WEF's general projects. Women's organisations and related non-governmental organisations (NGOs) may devise projects according to users' actual needs.

In the 2023-24 Budget Speech, the Financial Secretary announced that \$100 million would be set aside to strengthen support for women's development. Starting from 2023-24, the Government has used this additional provision to increase the annual funding for the WEF from \$10 million to \$20 million to subsidise women's organisations and related NGOs for launching appropriate projects to support women's development. On the basis of an annual allocation of \$20 million, the relevant provision will support the operation of the WEF for 6 years. We will continuously monitor the operation of the WEF to ensure proper use of the funds with a view to supporting women's development effectively.

According to paragraph 194 of the Budget, the Government is actively implementing the various actions and measures set out in the Youth Development Blueprint (the Blueprint), with the target of benefitting no less than 30 000 youths this year, enabling young people to learn about our country's major development trends and broaden their global exposure. The Government will also organise the Youth Development Summit (the Summit) in mid this year, where Mainland and overseas youth organisations will be invited, and it is anticipated that more than 1 000 people will participate in the Summit. In this connection, will the Government inform this Committee of the following:

1. What were the activities organised by the Government in 2023 for implementing the actions set out in the Blueprint? What were the total amount allocated and the number of local youths benefitted?
2. Given that the Government's target is to benefit no less than 30 000 youths in 2024, please advise on the specific expenditure items and their estimated expenditures.

Reply:

1. Youth development work covers a wide range of policy areas and involves the work of various bureaux. Since the release of the Youth Development Blueprint (the Blueprint), the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) has been actively co-ordinating with various bureaux to promote youth development work under their relevant policy areas, and implementing at full steam some 160 actions and measures set out in the Blueprint, among which nearly 50 are already completed with the remaining measures progressing well towards the set targets.

In 2023, the HYAB was active in taking forward various youth development measures, including:

- (a) the launch of various internship and exchange activities in the Mainland and overseas for 2023-24, with more than 26 000 youth participants in total and destinations covering various Mainland provinces and cities, as well as over 30 overseas countries including some Belt and Road countries;
- (b) the kick-off of the first Youth Festival in July 2023. Under the tripartite collaboration among the Government, the business sector and the community, around 200 activities covering knowledge and exchange, arts and culture, and sports were featured with the total attendance of about 200 000;
- (c) the launch of the Youth Link (YL) in September 2023 to link up participants of various government youth programmes and offer them opportunities to develop diverse talents, as well as strengthening their communication, interaction and trust with the Government. The YL currently has over 5 000 youth members. Since the launch of YL, the HYAB has organised a number of activities for its members. To name a few, the Youth Dialogue on “The Chief Executive’s 2023 Policy Address”, a leadership training camp for members of the YL Committee, the exchange tour “Exploring Innovation and Entrepreneurship Opportunities in the Greater Bay Area”, visits to youth hostels and some voluntary work in large-scale government events. To date, over 500 young people have participated in such activities;
- (d) the establishment of the Alliance of Hong Kong Youth Innovation and Entrepreneurial Bases in the Greater Bay Area in December 2023, leveraging the resources and networks of representative organisations from various sectors in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area to provide a one-stop information, publicity and exchange platform and offer comprehensive support to Hong Kong youth entrepreneurs;
- (e) the continual implementation of various projects under the Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS), as well as the launch of the YHS - Subsidy Scheme for Using Hotels and Guesthouses as Youth Hostels in early 2023 with 3 approved projects which provided a maximum of 478 hostel places in total;
- (f) the launch of the Funding Scheme for Youth Positive Thinking Activities and the Funding Scheme for Youth Adventure Training Activities in late 2022. The first rounds of these two schemes subsidises 11 non-governmental organisations (NGOs) in total to conduct activities on promoting youth positive thinking. The sponsored NGOs have gradually rolled out their activities, which last for two years. The total number of beneficiaries in the first round of the two funding schemes is estimated to be no less than 16 000; and
- (g) the co-organisation of 4 rounds of “Chinese Drill Train-the-Trainer Workshops” by the HYAB, the Hong Kong Police College and the Civil Aid Service in 2023 with a view to enhancing national education for youth uniformed groups (UGs). Having nurtured more than 220 trainers, the workshops enabled every UG to have its own formally-trained trainers to train their members on Chinese foot-drills.

For 2023-24, the HYAB's revised estimated expenditure on implementing various youth development initiatives and activities under its purview was about \$567 million. We do not maintain information on the revised provision involved in the implementation of the measures in the Blueprint by other bureaux and departments.

2. Our target is to increase the number of beneficiaries under the HYAB's various exchange and internship schemes/programmes in the Mainland and overseas to no less than 30 000 in 2024. The HYAB will continue to take forward various youth exchange and internship schemes/programmes outside Hong Kong, including the Funding Scheme for Youth Internship in the Mainland, the Thematic Youth Internship Programmes to the Mainland, the Scheme on Corporate Summer Internship on the Mainland and Overseas, the United Nations Volunteers - Hong Kong Universities Volunteer Internship Programme, the Funding Scheme for Youth Exchange in the Mainland, the Funding Scheme for International Youth Exchange, the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Youth Cultural Exchange Programme, and exchange activities outside Hong Kong that arranged for Youth Ambassadors under the YDC Youth Ambassadors Programme. Reply:

1. In this financial year, the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) will continue to work closely with the Committee on the Promotion of Civic Education (CPCE) to promote civic and national education outside schools and in the community through various channels and diversified means. Apart from organising annual flagship activities (such as the Basic Law Quiz Competition, Basic Law Seminars, Civic Education Exhibition and Civic Education Calendar) and providing eligible local organisations with sponsorship for organising civic and national education activities, we



will also hold a National Security Colouring Activity and a Roving Exhibition to tie in with the National Security Education Day and the 75th anniversary of the founding of the People's Republic of China respectively. Meanwhile, the HYAB and the CPCE will continue to disseminate information through channels such as the parent-child magazine published by the CPCE, its website and social media platforms.

2. The HYAB provides young people with internship opportunities in the Mainland through various internship schemes/programmes, including the Funding Scheme for Youth Internship in the Mainland, the Thematic Youth Internship Programmes to the Mainland and the Scheme on Corporate Summer Internship on the Mainland and Overseas, under which young people may experience first-hand the actual workplace environment in the Mainland and deepen their understanding of the employment market, workplace culture and development opportunities there. Through these internship schemes/programmes, young people are offered more in-depth, extensive and diverse exposures to the historical and cultural literacy as well as rapid development of the Motherland, hence a thorough grasp of our country's development trends.

Apart from offering youth internship opportunities in the Mainland, the internship schemes/programmes also arrange such diverse activities as tours, visits, study visits and exchanges with local people for young people to enhance their understanding of the Mainland and strengthen their interactions with the Mainland youth. Some organisers would brief their participants, prior to their departures for the internship, on the economic development and workplace culture of the Mainland, as well as Hong Kong's role in the overall planning of our country, thereby ensuring youth participants' proper understanding of our country's history, development and achievements.

3. We will continue to review youth-related initiatives as appropriate and introduce new measures to address specific areas in light of the latest development and needs in society, so as to ensure that the initiatives in the Youth Development Blueprint (the Blueprint) are progressing with the times and can consistently respond to the evolving needs of young people. The HYAB will continue to co-ordinate with various bureaux and departments on youth development work. Apart from actively taking forward the various initiatives as set out in the Blueprint, relevant bureaux have also been following the policy direction in the Blueprint, keeping a close watch over the latest situation of society and the youth, and putting forward new youth-related measures. For instance, the Government will roll out patriotic education to enhance national identity and appreciation of the richness and beauty of the traditional Chinese culture amongst the people of Hong Kong, laying a good foundation for our national unity and solidarity. We will also integrate patriotic education into our education system.

In this connection, will the Government inform this Committee of the following:

- (1) Regarding the Summit, what are the details, expenditure and manpower involved?

Reply:

- (1) The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) will organise the Youth Development Summit (the Summit) in August this year as the opening and highlight of the 2024 Youth Festival. The HYAB plans to invite guest speakers and youth groups from the Mainland and overseas to come to Hong Kong to attend the Summit, where they can exchange views and engage in mutual learning with local youths on issues of concern to young people, thereby helping young people to accurately learn and understand the latest developments and future challenges. It is anticipated that no less than 1 000 persons will participate in the Summit.

The HYAB will arrange for necessary manpower and resources for the organisation of the Summit. As the Summit is still at its preparatory stage, the exact manpower requirement and estimated expenditure are yet to be confirmed.

- (2) To dovetail with the policy objectives on youth development and the Youth Development Blueprint, the Government has been organising an annual Youth Festival since 2023, where different sectors of the community are invited to jointly organise a wide spectrum of activities for engaging and helping young people to develop their

potential, enhance their knowledge and share their experience, etc. The Action Group on Youth Festival under the Youth Development Commission will continue to steer and co-ordinate different sectors in jointly organising the various activities of the 2024 Youth Festival. Details will be announced in due course.

The co-ordination work for the Youth Festival is mainly undertaken by the HYAB through its existing manpower and resources, we thus cannot single out the manpower requirement and estimated expenditure involved.

The Government attaches great importance to women's development. Last year, it set aside \$100 million to strengthen support for the relevant work and established the Women Empowerment Fund (WEF), which has provided funding support to women's organisations and non-governmental organisations for launching over 140 projects. Will the Government advise on the following:

1. Since the establishment of the WEF, how many funding applications have been received, approved and rejected? What is the range of funding amounts for the approved projects and what is the total amount of funding approved by the WEF to date?
2. Regarding the approved projects, how many of them have been implemented and what are the numbers of participants? What is the ratio between employed and unemployed female participants?
3. How will the Government evaluate the effectiveness of the relevant projects?

Reply:

Established in June 2023, the Women Empowerment Fund (WEF) aims to empower women, regardless of their age, occupation, background, etc., to realise their full potentials in their respective arenas, ultimately achieving the goal of promoting women's development in Hong Kong. In 2023-24, the WEF received a total of 240 eligible applications, among which 145 projects were approved, and the funding involved was about \$21.38 million. 95 applications were rejected.

The Women's Commission (WoC) assesses the funding amounts of approved projects based on factors such as the funding amount requested, content and nature of the project as stated in its proposal, number of beneficiaries and scale of the activity, etc. In 2023-24, funding amounts for the approved projects ranged from \$5,000 to \$510,000. As the funded projects are still being rolled out, the number of participants is not yet available. Since the WEF aims to empower women and it is not a retraining programme specifically designed for promoting

employment, no statistics on the ratio between employed and unemployed female participants are maintained. The funded organisations are required to submit activity and financial reports for each project to the WoC for reviewing the effectiveness of the project. The WoC will also review, among others, the utilisation and the vetting mechanism of the WEF to optimise its operation.

Upon completion of an exchange/internship project, participants are invited to fill in evaluation questionnaires from which we can gauge their views on the project for monitoring its effectiveness and quality. This will also become part of the track record when assessing the same organisation's applications in the future. Based on the feedback collected from the last rounds of participants, over 90% of the respondents considered that the respective schemes/programmes have attained the intended objectives and helped them broaden their exposure and deepen their understanding of the Mainland / overseas countries they visited. Representatives of the HYAB and the Youth Development Commission also attend activities (such as concluding and sharing sessions) held locally by the funded organisations to understand participants' views on the projects for monitoring their effectiveness and quality.

Question:

The Social Welfare Department established the Central Office for Volunteer Service in 1997, and launched the territory-wide Volunteer Movement (VM) in 1998 to encourage the integration of voluntary work into everyday life. Since the conclusion of the VM at the end of 2021, the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau has been providing the Agency for Volunteer Service (AVS) with recurrent subventions for promoting volunteerism in the community. In this connection, please advise this Committee:

1. of the comparisons between the VM and the AVS on the average annual expenditure and manpower involved for their operation; whether the Government has evaluated the effectiveness of such a change; if yes, the details;
2. as the estimates for “youth development activities” in 2024-25 is \$290 million, which is nearly 30% more than the revised estimates (\$197 million) for the last financial year, of the details of the initiatives concerned, including the projects organised and funded; and
3. on promoting youth volunteerism, of the details of the initiatives taken in the past 3 financial years and their respective expenditures.

Reply:

The Government has all along been committed to promoting volunteerism. The Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) leverages on various channels, such as the Service Corps, the United Nations Volunteers-Hong Kong Universities Volunteer Internship Programme and the Guangdong-Hong Kong Youth Volunteer Service Programme, to encourage the general public, particularly young people, to participate in and support different types of volunteer services. Apart from incorporating elements of volunteerism into different youth development programmes / funding schemes, we encourage youth uniformed groups and their members to participate in volunteer services so that young people can build positive values, confidence and leadership skills through volunteering.



The HYAB offers an annual recurrent subvention of about \$11 million to the Agency for Volunteer Service (AVS) for promoting volunteerism in the community. The AVS runs a volunteer referral service to arrange volunteer opportunities for the general public and recruit suitable candidates for organisations requiring volunteers' assistance. Moreover, the HYAB and AVS have co-organised the Hong Kong Volunteer Award since 2022 to recognise contributions to the community and achievements of outstanding volunteers, corporations, organisations from different sectors and cross-sectoral partnership projects. In particular, the Award aims to motivate more young people to actively take part in volunteering. The Award has been well received by different sectors of society.

Given that promotion of volunteerism is part of youth development programmes / funding schemes, the HYAB does not maintain a breakdown of the expenditure involved. As the HYAB staff responsible for handling the relevant work are also required to perform other duties, we are unable to single out the exact manpower and emoluments involved.

Overall, the HYAB has set aside provisions for implementing youth development initiatives under its policy areas when preparing the estimates for 2024-25. The estimate for the item "youth development activities" is \$291.4 million, about 47% more than the revised estimate for the last financial year (\$197.6 million). This is mainly because we plan to launch several new and enhanced initiatives relating to youth development in 2024-25, such as fully resuming various youth exchange and internship programmes, organising the Youth Development Summit and arranging different activities for Youth Link members.

2. The funded non-governmental organisations (NGOs) and their respective funded projects, numbers of places approved and funding amounts approved under the FSYEM over the financial years of 2018-19, 2019-20 and 2023-24 are set out in **Annex**.
3. Upon completion of an exchange project, participants are invited to fill in evaluation questionnaires from which we could gauge their views on the project for monitoring its effectiveness and quality. Over the said 3 financial years, all projects except 1 obtained an overall satisfaction level higher than 70% in the evaluation questionnaires. We have conveyed the participants' views and areas for improvement to the NGO concerned, and will consider the track record when assessing its applications in the future.
4. When assessing applications under the FSYEM, the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau (HYAB) and the Youth Development Commission will consider on the basis of the assessment criteria, including the applicant NGO's background and track record, whether the proposed project could achieve the objectives of the FSYEM, the content and quality (e.g. breadth, depth and creativity) of activities, service targets, publicity and promotional arrangements, financial arrangements and viability, etc. Under the assessment criteria, the views provided by participants through the evaluation questionnaires they filled in would also become part of the track record of the relevant NGO. Individual applications failing to meet the requirements of the assessment criteria or having low overall scores would not be approved.

For 2024-25, the estimated expenditure on implementing the FSYEM is \$80 million. As the HYAB staff responsible for implementing the FSYEM are also required to perform other duties, we cannot single out the emoluments involved.

Reply:

1. Established in June 2023, the Women Empowerment Fund (WEF) aims to empower women, regardless of their age, occupation, background, etc., to realise their full potentials in their respective arenas, ultimately achieving the goal of promoting women's development in Hong Kong. In the first 2 rounds of applications, 145 projects have been approved under the WEF, among which 21 are under the theme of "assisting women in accomplishing transformations in the job market" and 11 under the theme of "facilitating the use of new information and communication technology". As the funded projects are still being rolled out, the number of female beneficiaries is not yet available.



2. Under the theme of “assisting women in accomplishing transformations in the job market”, the funded projects cover workshops on interview skills, training on digital marketing techniques, sharing sessions on entrepreneurship, etc. Since the WEF aims to empower women and it is not a retraining programme specifically designed for promoting employment, no statistics on participants’ employment status are maintained.

No additional manpower or expenditure was involved.

According to the progress reports submitted for the funded projects, around 60% of the projects which have been in operation for more than 3 years can break even.
- (b) and (c) The ESR Programme aims at providing seed grants for eligible organisations to set up and expand social enterprises (SEs), with a view to creating job opportunities for the socially disadvantaged or providing products and services meeting their specific needs. General information about the ESR Programme, including the application guide, is available on the dedicated website of the programme for reference of applicant organisations. The Secretariat to the ESR Programme will also organise briefing sessions to give an overview of the programme and explain the application procedures.

Grantees of the ESR Programme are required to enter into a funding agreement with the Government and submit progress reports (including annual audited accounts) regularly to the Government during the funding period and the monitoring period. The Secretariat will also maintain liaison with the grantees to keep track of the project progress and provide assistance as appropriate. More than 7 600 people have been directly employed by the funded projects so far, and over 80% of them were socially disadvantaged. According to the results of questionnaires conducted by HAD for the operating SE projects funded by the ESR Programme, about 80% of the employees considered that working at SEs enabled them to acquire more skills and strengthened their confidence for future employment.

Reply:

As announced by the Chief Executive in the 2023 Policy Address, the Home Affairs Department (HAD) launched the Clansmen Culture Promotion Scheme (the Scheme) in the first quarter of 2024. The Scheme, which will run for a period of 3 years with a total funding of \$30 million earmarked for application by clansmen associations to organise activities promoting hometown culture, aims to deepen the public's understanding of and sense of belonging to their hometowns, thereby fostering the spirit of loving the motherland, Hong Kong and their hometowns. Any locally registered clansmen associations which have all along been committed to promoting hometown culture and fostering exchanges between Hong Kong and hometowns in order to promote the spirit of loving the motherland, Hong Kong and hometowns, and with experience in organising relevant activities are eligible to apply for the Scheme. The manpower involved in implementing the Scheme will be absorbed within the existing resources of HAD. Briefing sessions have been organised for

representatives of clansmen associations to introduce to them the details and application arrangements of the Scheme. HAD will also stay connected with the applicant associations and offer them appropriate assistance with their applications. HAD will implement the Scheme in accordance with the relevant funding guidelines and monitoring mechanism. The effectiveness of the Scheme will be reviewed in due course.

It is mentioned in Matters Requiring Special Attention in 2024-25 that the Department will strengthen support services for ethnic minorities, including setting up 2 additional support service centres for ethnic minorities (EM centres), setting up an Ethnic Minority Care Team in each EM centre, regularising the enhanced services provided by EM centres for ethnic minority new arrivals and youths, and the District-based Programmes for Racial Harmony. In this connection, would the Government inform this Committee of the following:

- (a) Where are the 2 additional EM centres, and when are they expected to commence operation? What are the manpower and estimated expenditure involved?
- (b) What is the estimated number of beneficiaries of the 2 additional EM centres? Will the Government consider setting up more EM centres in the future?

Reply:

- (a) The Home Affairs Department (HAD) has commissioned non-profit-making organisations to run 8 support service centres for ethnic minorities (EM centres) in Wan Chai, Yau Tsim Mong, Sham Shui Po, Kwun Tong, Yuen Long, Tuen Mun, Kwai Tsing and Tung Chung. To enhance support services for ethnic minorities, HAD plans to set up 2 additional EM centres in Kowloon Central (covering Kowloon City and Wong Tai Sin) and New Territories East (covering Sai Kung and Tseung Kwan O), which are expected to commence service in the fourth quarter of 2024. The estimated expenditure for each new centre is capped at about \$11 million per year. HAD has just openly invited eligible non-profit-making organisations to submit service proposals to apply for government funding to establish and operate the 2 new centres. Applicant organisations are required to submit proposals detailing centre facilities, services and activity plans based on their experience and understanding of the needs of ethnic minorities for consideration by HAD.

- (b) The total estimated number of service recipients of the 2 additional EM centres is about 16 000 per year. With the establishment of the 2 new centres, there will be a total of 10 EM centres to provide services for ethnic minorities in the territory, covering the districts where ethnic minorities mainly reside. We will keep in view the needs of ethnic minorities and review how to strengthen the support services from time to time.

Regarding the Building Management Professional Advisory Service Scheme (BMPASS) and Resident Liaison Ambassador Scheme (RLA Scheme), which provide support services for “three-nil” buildings, please inform this Committee of the following:

- (a) the number of “three-nil” buildings in Hong Kong, with a breakdown by the 18 districts;
- (b) the numbers of buildings and flats benefited and the details of the services provided under the BMPASS since its implementation, with a breakdown by year and by the 18 districts; and the number of owners’ corporations formed with the assistance of the BMPASS;
- (c) the number of Resident Liaison Ambassadors recruited under the RLA Scheme since its implementation, with a breakdown by year and by the 18 districts;
- (d) the manpower and expenditure involved in the implementation of the 2 schemes, and the percentage of such expenditure in the total expenditure of the Department in the past 3 years, with a breakdown by year and by the 18 districts;
- (e) whether the Government has reviewed the effectiveness of the 2 schemes since their implementation, and whether the Government has any plan to introduce and use new technologies or services to provide more targeted support for “three-nil” buildings. If yes, what are the details?

Reply:

- (a) According to the information obtained by the Home Affairs Department (HAD), as at December 2023, there were 3 097 “three-nil” buildings (i.e. buildings which do not have owners’ corporations (OCs) or any form of residents’ organisations and do not engage property management companies (PMCs), but excluding those that are under single

ownership and can be self-managed) in the territory. The breakdown by district is set out in **Annex A**.

- (b) To enhance the support for owners of “three-nil” buildings, and buildings where the management committee of the OC concerned was defunct, HAD implemented 3 phases of the Building Management Professional Advisory Service Scheme (BMPASS) between 2011 and 2020 to commission PMCs to provide owners of old buildings in need, in particular those of “three-nil” buildings, with a range of free professional advisory and follow-up services on building management, including facilitating the formation or re-activation of OCs, assisting OCs in applying for funding under various loan and subsidy schemes for maintenance works, and following up on building/window inspections, maintenance works and tendering. The PMCs commissioned in the 3 phases of the BMPASS reached out to about 3 800 buildings (involving 58 000 units), encompassing all eligible “three-nil” buildings under the scheme, and assisted in the formation/re-activation of 540 OCs. The key results are summarised as follows:

## The PMCs commissioned are responsible for assisting OCs in procuring third party risks insurance and recruiting RLAs starting from Phase 2 of the BMPASS.

The BMPASS was well received by owners of target buildings and relevant members of the community, who considered that the scheme had helped owners of old buildings improve building management, living environment and building safety. HAD has therefore decided to regularise the BMPASS. With reference to the recommendation of the Legislative Council’s Public Accounts Committee, HAD has implemented a pilot scheme under the regularised BMPASS to invite local organisations/non-governmental organisations with experience in building management or related fields to reach out to owners of “three-nil” buildings and to encourage and assist them in forming OCs. The pilot scheme was first launched in Sham Shui Po and Tsuen Wan in June 2022, and has



progressively extended to cover 7 other districts with a relatively large number of “three-nil” buildings, including the Central & Western, Eastern, Wan Chai, Kowloon City, Yau Tsim Mong, Tai Po and North Districts. As at December 2023, the pilot scheme reached out to about 580 “three-nil” buildings in 9 districts. With the assistance of the scheme, 70 OCs were formed, 45 OCs procured third party risks insurance and 755 RLAs were recruited. The breakdown by district of the number of OCs formed is set out in **Annex C**.

- (c) To assist residents of old buildings in enhancing building management, HAD has been implementing the Resident Liaison Ambassador Scheme (RLA Scheme) since 2011 to recruit owners or residents of “three-nil” buildings aged 30 years or above as RLAs. The scheme seeks to establish a resident liaison network, facilitate residents’ discussion and handling of daily building management matters, and assist government departments in liaising with residents and promoting the message of effective building management. As at December 2023, about 2 060 RLAs were living in “three-nil” buildings. The breakdown by district is set out in **Annex D**.
- (d) The number of Liaison Officers engaged in building management related duties (including various building management support services such as the BMPASS and the RLA Scheme) in HAD Headquarters and the 18 District Building Management Liaison Teams (DBMLTs) increased from 138 in 2018-19 to 145 in 2023-24. The actual expenditures on Phases 1 to 3 of the BMPASS implemented between 2011 and 2020 were \$48 million, \$58 million and \$64 million respectively. As to the pilot scheme launched in June 2022, which is expected to end on 30 June 2024, the estimated total expenditure is about \$19.3 million. The RLA Scheme is mainly implemented through the DBMLTs and other support services for “three-nil” buildings (such as the BMPASS). A breakdown of the expenditure involved is not available.
- (e) HAD reviews the support for owners of “three-nil” buildings from time to time to promote good building management, and encourage and assist owners to form OCs for proper management of their private properties.

Regarding the BMPASS, the pilot scheme has received overwhelming support from the community and service users since its implementation in June 2022, who consider that the involvement of organisations with wide district networks in the scheme has helped reach out to the owners of “three-nil” buildings more effectively, thereby increasing the success rate of OC formation. HAD will extend the scheme with reference to the operation mode of the pilot scheme to cover 18 districts across the territory, and invite community organisations/non-governmental organisations with experience in building management or related fields to participate.

In addition, HAD and District Offices have been providing old buildings in need, including “three-nil” buildings, with cleaning service for their common parts through various channels such as the District-led Actions Scheme having regard to the actual circumstances, so as to demonstrate the benefits brought by good building management. We will also step up efforts in recruiting RLAs and provide them with information on building management, in order to promote the message of effective building management and enable them to assist government departments in liaising with residents. Our long-term objective is to help owners of these buildings form OCs for proper management of their own properties.

Minor Works in Rural Areas

District Councils (DCs) in the New Territories are responsible for the co-ordination and management of minor works in rural areas. Would the Government inform this Committee of the following:

- (a) Since District Officers have taken up the role of DC Chairmen, governance at the district level is further enhanced. Will the new term of DCs in the New Territories and the District Offices concerned review the efficiency of minor works in the rural areas in their respective districts?
- (b) Further to the above, there are views that it takes 6 months to complete the installation of a letterbox in rural areas. Will the Government consider reviewing whether the time taken for individual minor works projects is reasonable, so as to meet the expectations of the public and the villagers who will benefit?
- (c) Quite a number of villages have not yet had their own village offices. With regard to their construction applications, will the Government consider making available idle government sites to be leased by way of short term tenancies in the villages for application for construction of village offices through inter-departmental co-ordination?
- (d) The Government allocated \$4 billion to implement the Rural Planning and Improvement Strategy Minor Works Programme in the 1990s with good results, but the programme was then replaced by the Rural Public Works (RPW) programme, to which an annual provision of only around \$100 million is allocated. Does the Government have any plans to expand the ambit of the RPW programme so as to achieve the same effectiveness as that of the former programme?

Reply:

- (a) and (b) To upgrade the infrastructure and improve the living environment in rural areas, the Home Affairs Department (HAD) launched the Rural Public Works (RPW) programme in 1999. HAD provides funding for carrying out minor works to upgrade the infrastructure and improve the living environment of the rural community through the RPW programme. The 9 District Offices (DOs) in the New Territories collect views from local organisations and individuals, including District Council members, Rural Committees and villagers, through various channels with a view to identifying minor works projects for the benefit of the local community. As at the end of February 2024, more than 2 700 projects have been completed under the RPW programme. The living environment and infrastructure in rural areas have improved significantly. Generally speaking, it takes time to finalise and implement the projects under the RPW programme, as each of them involves a lot of preparatory work, such as conducting feasibility studies, carrying out design work and consulting relevant stakeholders. HAD and the DOs will continue to work proactively with the relevant departments in closely monitoring the projects, including their progress and works schedules, with a view to implementing and completing the projects at the soonest possible time.
- (c) Under the existing arrangement of the Lands Department, vacant government sites are available for application for short-term tenancy (STT) by non-governmental organisations for community, institutional or other non-profit-making purposes. The respective District Lands Offices (DLOs) are responsible for approving STT applications, including those for constructing village offices. HAD will consider the circumstances and needs of the villages concerned and provide policy support to the relevant DLOs in respect of the STT applications for the construction of village offices.
- (d) Given that rural planning involves relatively complicated statutory procedures and requires considerable time to address issues like land ownership and land resumption, projects involving land resumption are not included in the RPW programme. This will enable HAD to improve the rural environment in a more timely and flexible manner. Projects involving land resumption are undertaken by other works departments.

Works projects under the RPW programme mainly aim at upgrading the infrastructure and improving the living environment of the rural community and most of them are of a smaller scale. On 22 January 2021, the Finance Committee of the Legislative Council approved the increase of the financial ceiling of the delegated authority from \$30 million to \$50 million per project for 21 block allocation subheads, including Subhead 7014CX - Rural Public Works Programme, under the Capital Works Reserve Fund. Hence, works projects with a project estimate not exceeding \$50 million can be included in the RPW programme.

Rural committees (RCs) are feedback channels and bridges of communication for residents in rural areas, having an extensive presence across the areas and a wide scope of responsibilities. However, the subsidies or support provided to them are insufficient. The development of the Northern Metropolis involves 10 villages in the New Territories. In this connection, would the Government inform this Committee whether it will consider providing accountable subsidies to RCs for them to meet water and electricity charges or other operating expenses?

Reply:

The Government has been granting monthly subventions to rural committees (RCs) since the 1960s to cover their daily operating expenses, such as electricity and water charges, costs of stationery and so on. Besides, the rates and Government rents of RCs are paid in full by the Government. There are currently 3 levels of RC subventions: \$15,300, \$15,800 and \$16,700 per month, which are set according to factors such as the size of the RC. Adjustments are made by the Government from time to time with reference to changes in the Composite Consumer Price Index.

- (a) to (c) The Government provides some of the resources required by the District Services and Community Care Teams (Care Teams). District Offices specify the service requirements and key performance indicators (KPIs) (e.g. the total number of service targets/service times, the number of caring activities and the types of buildings to be visited) for individual sub-districts based on local needs, and set a funding ceiling for each Care Team for the two-year period of the funding agreement based on local circumstances. Depending on the situation of individual sub-districts, the funding for each Care Team for the two-year period of the funding agreement ranges from about \$0.8 million to \$1.2 million. The Home Affairs Department does not have information on the income and expenditure of each Care Team in the 18 districts.
- (d) Care Teams are set up to consolidate community resources and forces to support district work. Therefore, apart from providing resources directly to Care Teams, the Government also encourages the operating organisations of Care Teams to make use of sponsorship, donations or internal resources to provide services, so as to tap the strengths and resources of all sectors for community building. The

setting up of Care Teams is a new policy initiative of the Government. The operation and resources of Care Teams will be reviewed in due course.

- (c) What is the specific division of labour between Care Teams, "the three committees" (Area Committees, District Fight Crime Committees and District Fire Safety Committees) and DC members in implementing district services?

Reply:

- (a) The Government provides some of the resources required by the District Services and Community Care Teams (Care Teams). The funding for each Care Team for the two-year period of the funding agreement ranges from about \$0.8 million to \$1.2 million, depending on the service proposals submitted and the key performance indicators set for the Care Team concerned. The Government also encourages the operating organisations of Care Teams to make use of sponsorship, donations or internal resources to provide services. The Home Affairs Department (HAD)'s revised estimated expenditure on Care Teams for 2023-24 is about \$96 million and the estimated expenditure for 2024-25 is \$181 million. Regarding manpower, HAD carried out the work relating to Care Teams using the resources available in 2022-23, and a total of 25 time-limited civil service posts will be created in 2023-24 and 2024-25, incurring an annual expenditure of about \$22 million.

- (b) The Government delineates the 18 districts into 452 sub-districts, and one Care Team is set up in each sub-district. The number of sub-district Care Teams in each district is as follows:

There are about 5 000 Care Team members in the 18 districts. Care Teams have visited more than 30 000 elderly households and other households in need, and provided over 7 000 times of basic home/other support services for them since May 2023, when they started to come into operation progressively in various districts. On policy promotion, Care Teams in the 18 districts actively participated in publicising the 2023 District Council (DC) Ordinary Election by organising a total of about 20 publicity activities between November and December 2023, during which promotional leaflets were distributed to members of the public and business operators at markets, shopping centres, restaurants, etc. in various districts to appeal to electors to vote. In addition, Care Teams rendered support services during typhoons in the second half of 2023, which include providing support for the operation of temporary shelters, disseminating typhoon-related information to residents through established communication networks and participating in relief work.

- (c) DCs, Care Teams and “the three committees” discharge their respective duties while complementing each other. DCs focus on understanding and relaying public views, promoting government policies, providing consultation or case referral services, etc. The work of a DC covers the whole district concerned.

Care Teams are service teams that support the Government’s district work, provide caring services for members of the public, and assist in handling incidents and emergencies. They provide district-based services according to the needs of the residents in their sub-districts.

As for “the three committees”, the District Fight Crime Committees and the District Fire Safety Committees mainly advise on crime fighting and fire safety, and assist in the organisation of related activities, while members of Area Committees offer advice to District Officers on issues affecting the areas concerned on the basis of their backgrounds, expertise and knowledge of the areas. Area Committees also organise activities in the area.

Reply:

- (a) Policy bureaux and departments of the Government formulate appropriate policies and introduce funding schemes to support different policy objectives. For example, on promoting community building, the Home Affairs Department (HAD) implements the Community Involvement Programme through which eligible organisations, including non-governmental organisations (NGOs) such as clansmen associations and district organisations, may apply for funding support to organise projects featuring local characteristics and popular festive celebrations as well as cultural, artistic and recreational activities to promote district harmony.

In addition, HAD maintains close liaison with various sectors of the community, including clansmen associations, and launched the Clansmen Culture Promotion Scheme (the Scheme) in the first quarter of 2024. The Scheme, which will run for a period of 3 years with a total funding of \$30 million earmarked for application by clansmen associations to organise activities promoting hometown culture, aims to deepen the public's understanding of and sense of belonging to their hometowns,

thereby fostering the spirit of loving the motherland, Hong Kong and their hometowns. At the same time, the 18 District Offices will also continue to collaborate with district organisations and clansmen associations from time to time to promote community building.

- (b) HAD helps new arrivals from the Mainland (NAs) integrate into the community through district networks and collaborations with NGOs. Key services include the District-based Integration Programme, which organises a range of activities to help NAs enhance their understanding of the community and establishes mutual help networks; the Ambassador Scheme, which arranges for persons with similar background and experience to reach out to NAs to introduce public services to them; the Expectation Management Programmes in the Mainland, which organise activities for Mainland residents applying for settlement in Hong Kong to have a better understanding of the circumstances in Hong Kong; and the Neighbourhood Mutual Help Programme, which provides funding to NGOs for organising various activities to help NAs and ethnic minorities integrate into the community. HAD also conducts quarterly questionnaire surveys on NAs to identify their service needs and uploads the survey reports to HAD's website for reference of relevant government departments, NGOs and local organisations; and co-ordinates with relevant government departments and NGOs to update and publish the Service Handbook for New Arrivals regularly.

Reply:

- (a) and (d) To celebrate the significant occasion of the 75th anniversary of the founding of the People's Republic of China (PRC), all bureaux and departments, led by the Chief Secretary for Administration, will make concerted efforts to plan and take forward the preparatory work for the National Day celebrations on all fronts, with a view to creating a colourful and enthusiastic National Day atmosphere and cultivating people's sense of patriotism at different levels of the community. Apart from the key programmes such as the annual large-scale National Day reception, flag-raising ceremony, variety show and fireworks display, all bureaux and their departments will also plan an array of celebration activities rich in content and diversity under their respective work areas, with a view to enabling more members of the public from different backgrounds and age groups to take part in the

celebration activities and share the joy of the National Day. In addition, the 18 District Offices of the Home Affairs Department (HAD) will organise key National Day celebration events with local characteristics in various districts to share the joy with the public. Apart from fostering patriotic sentiments, the Government will also organise a series of thematic National Day celebration activities to showcase to all visitors from the Mainland and other places the unique advantages and attractions of Hong Kong in terms of the staunch support we receive from the Motherland and our global outlook.

Moreover, bureaux and departments will plan for displays of a wider variety of publicity materials in celebration of the 75th anniversary of the founding of the PRC at the venues and buildings under their management, and step up the scale and creativity of their festive decorations at popular and iconic locations, so as to jointly foster an intense festive ambience, promote the spirit of patriotism and mobilise the active participation of all sectors of the community in celebrating the National Day together.

As for estimated expenditure, bureaux and departments will organise the activities with their existing resources. In 2024-25, the estimated expenditure for HAD on organising key celebration events for the 75th anniversary of the founding of the PRC is about \$27 million.

- (b) In 2019, the National Day celebration events co-ordinated by HAD include large-scale National Day reception and flag-raising ceremony. Other activities were called off as a result of the social unrest. The expenditure on the 75th anniversary of the founding of the PRC should not be directly compared with that on the 70th anniversary.
- (c) According to the Culture, Sports and Tourism Bureau, the Government understands the affection of the general public for giant pandas and will make relevant considerations at an appropriate juncture.

Reply:

- (a) and (b) Regarding the funding approved in the past 3 years, there is 1 community building project of a relatively large scale carried out in Yau Tsim Mong District and led by the Home Affairs Department (HAD), namely the construction of a standard community hall in the commercial development at Sai Yee Street, Mong Kok. The estimated project cost is \$84 million in money-of-the-day prices. Funding approval was given by the Finance Committee (FC) of the Legislative Council (LegCo) in December 2022. In addition, HAD has been implementing minor works projects under the District Minor Works programme in the 18 districts, including Sham Shui Po and Yau Tsim Mong, to improve local facilities, living environment and hygienic conditions in the territory.

- (c) The Hoi Ting Road Joint User Complex (the Complex) is a project led by the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD). As advised by LCSD, in accordance with the “single site, multiple use” principle, which aims to better utilise land resources, the Complex will accommodate different government facilities. LCSD has been working closely with various stakeholders in the project planning stage. The Yau Tsim Mong District Council was consulted in March 2019, July 2020 and September 2022 respectively and supported the proposed project scope and planning concept. LCSD will continue to take forward the project in accordance with the established public works procedures. Currently, the relevant works department is handling matters related to the works tender. The estimated expenditure and implementation schedule of the project have yet to be finalised. Project details will be submitted when the relevant LegCo Panel and the Public Works Subcommittee are consulted and funding approval from the FC is sought.

The Government provides some of the resources required by the District Services and Community Care Teams (Care Teams). The funding for each Care Team for the two-year period of the funding agreement ranges from about \$0.8 million to \$1.2 million, depending on the service proposals submitted and the key performance indicators (KPIs) set for the Care Team concerned. The Government also encourages the operating organisations of Care Teams to make use of sponsorship, donations or internal resources to provide services. The Home Affairs Department (HAD)'s revised estimated expenditure on Care Teams for 2023-24 is about \$96 million and the estimated expenditure for 2024-25 is \$181 million. Regarding manpower, HAD carried out the work relating to Care Teams using the resources available in 2022-23, and a total of 25 time-limited civil service posts will be created in 2023-24 and 2024-25, incurring an annual expenditure of about \$22 million.

Care Teams are required to provide services in accordance with the approved service proposals and the relevant KPIs (e.g. the total number of service targets/service times and the number of caring activities), submit regular work and financial reports, and arrange for independent certified public accountants to audit their accounts to ensure that all income and expenditure items meet the requirements specified in the funding agreements and relevant guidelines/codes. District Offices regularly monitor the work of Care Teams, including arranging for staff and members of the District Assessment and Coordinating Panels on Care

Teams to attend the activities organised by Care Teams, so as to evaluate the effectiveness of their services and review their progress of achieving the KPIs.

The Scheme, which will run for a period of 3 years with a total funding of \$30 million earmarked for application by clansmen associations to organise activities promoting hometown culture, aims to deepen the public's understanding of and sense of belonging to their hometowns, thereby fostering the spirit of loving the motherland, Hong Kong and their hometowns. Any locally registered clansmen associations which have all along been committed to promoting hometown culture and fostering exchanges between Hong Kong and hometowns in order to promote the spirit of loving the motherland, Hong Kong and hometowns, and with experience in organising relevant activities are eligible to apply for the Scheme. Building management requires professional knowledge. Owners' corporations (OCs) generally engage professional property management companies (PMCs) to undertake daily management of their buildings. However, there are news reports on poor building management from time to time. In this connection, would the Government inform this Committee of the following:

- (a) What are the Government's plans to publicise and promote building management knowledge among property owners? What is the public expenditure involved in these plans?
- (b) What is the Government's policy on handling property owners' complaints against PMCs and OCs? If the complaints are substantiated, what follow-up actions will the Government take?
- (c) What is the Government's estimated expenditure on improving building management for 2024-25?

Reply:

- (a) To publicise and promote the knowledge of building management to property owners, the Home Affairs Department (HAD) Headquarters and the 18 District Offices (DOs) organise various kinds of educational and publicity programmes regularly, such as providing structured training courses on building management for owners' corporations (OCs) and owners; organising thematic workshops or seminars for them on the need for OCs to comply with the relevant requirements of the Building Management Ordinance (Cap 344) (BMO) in their daily operation and procurement; inviting representatives of government departments to brief them on the orders/notices/directions issued by the relevant departments and the suitable subsidy schemes available to them; and producing handy publicity materials with commonly used information on building management for owners' reference. The actual expenditure on educational and publicity programmes

for 2022-23 was about \$4.7 million, and the revised estimated expenditure for 2023-24 is about \$4.9 million.

- (b) Private buildings are the property of owners and it is owners' responsibility to manage their buildings properly. The Government's policy on private building management is to encourage and assist owners to form suitable organisations, such as OCs, through multi-pronged measures, and provide appropriate support to assist them in discharging their building management responsibilities. Generally speaking, upon receiving a complaint about building management, the DO concerned will first approach the management committee of the OC or the property management company (PMC) (if any) for details of the case. If the provisions of the BMO are applicable, the DO will request the OC to handle the case properly in accordance with the relevant provisions. If the complaint concerns criminal sanctions under the BMO, HAD will conduct investigation and, if necessary, refer the case to the Department of Justice for consideration of prosecution. The DO will also recommend relevant building management support services (such as legal advisory and mediation services) to OCs or owners to help them solve the issues.
- (c) To strengthen the support for OCs and owners of private buildings, HAD has introduced a number of support services to enhance their capability in dealing with daily building management issues and foster a culture of building care. These support services cover various areas, including assistance to "three-nil" buildings (i.e. buildings which do not have OCs or any form of residents' organisations and do not engage PMCs, but excluding those that are under single ownership and can be self-managed), legal and other advisory services, dispute resolution, education and publicity. The estimated expenditure on the above support services for 2024-25 is about \$30 million.

The Government introduced the hillside burial policy and designated about 520 Permitted Burial Grounds (PBGs) for burial of deceased indigenous villagers of the New Territories in 1983. Since 2016, a pilot scheme on the management of PBGs (the Scheme) in individual PBGs has been implemented, under which appropriate improvement measures have been taken according to the actual circumstances of each PBG. In this connection, would the Government inform this Committee of the following:

- (a) the current number of PBGs in each of the 18 districts;
- (b) the number of Burial Certificates issued in the past 5 years, with a breakdown by year and by the 18 districts;
- (c) the total number of Burial Certificates issued since they were first issued in 1983;
- (d) the details of the Scheme, including the numbers of proactive inspections conducted by the Government, complaints about burials outside PBGs received, cases requiring follow-up actions, and removal operations of burials outside PBGs in each of the past 5 years; and
- (e) the staffing establishment, expenditure on emoluments and total expenditure of the Scheme in each of the past 5 years?

Reply:

The hillside burial policy is jointly implemented by a number of departments, including the Home Affairs Department (HAD), the Lands Department, the Food and Environmental Hygiene Department, the Agriculture, Fisheries and Conservation Department and the Water Supplies Department, within their respective purview. Since the introduction of the policy in 1983, the Government has designated a total of about 520 Permitted Burial Grounds

(PBGs) in the 9 districts in the New Territories and issued a total of about 41 000 Burial Certificates so far.

The number of PBGs in the 9 districts in the New Territories and the number of Burial Certificates issued in the past 5 years are provided in the table below:

The Government has been implementing a pilot scheme on the management of PBGs in designated PBGs since 2016. Taking into account the actual circumstances of individual PBGs, the Government has introduced appropriate improvement measures, including conducting record surveys of existing graves, erecting boundary markers for PBGs, imposing restrictions on the size of burial sites and demarcating available spaces in PBGs for new applications for burial sites, so as to facilitate applicants for Burial Certificates to ensure the burial locations identified are within PBGs. The pilot scheme has so far been extended to cover a total of 15 PBGs, which are located across the 9 administrative districts in the New Territories.

Having examined the data obtained from the pilot scheme, the relevant departments have commenced joint enforcement actions against illegal burials in the designated PBGs in phases from 2021 onwards, including posting notices on unauthorised graves with an aim to remove unclaimed graves as soon as possible after the expiry of the notice period and rebury the human remains therein at the Sandy Ridge Cemetery. Since then, some of the descendants have applied to the District Offices concerned for Burial Certificates.

Regarding the implementation of the pilot scheme on the management of PBGs in designated PBGs, the relevant departments have been carrying out the work within their respective purview with their existing resources. In the past 5 years, insofar as HAD is concerned, the implementation of the pilot scheme was undertaken by its existing staff and a breakdown of the expenditure involved is not available. A breakdown by year of the implementation details of the pilot scheme is provided in the table below:

In 2024-25, a total of 10 improvement projects are planned for implementation at the leisure venues in the 2 districts of Sham Shui Po and Yau Tsim Mong, including sports centres, swimming pools, parks and other leisure grounds, involving a total estimated expenditure of about \$10 million. 3 of the projects are on-going items and the remaining 7 are new items. Reply:

Private buildings are the property of owners and it is owners' responsibility to manage their buildings properly. The Government's policy on private building management is to encourage and assist owners to form suitable organisations, such as owners' corporations (OCs), through multi-pronged measures, and provide appropriate support to assist them in discharging their building management responsibilities. To strengthen the support for OCs and owners of private buildings, the Home Affairs Department (HAD) has introduced a number of support services to enhance their capability in dealing with daily building management issues and foster a culture of building care. These support services cover various areas, including assistance to "three-nil" buildings (i.e. buildings which do not have OCs or any form of residents' organisations and do not engage property management companies, but excluding those that are under single ownership and can be self-managed), legal and other advisory services, dispute resolution, education and publicity. The estimated expenditure on the above support services for 2024-25 is about \$30 million.

Schedule 2 to the Building Management Ordinance (BMO) (Cap. 344) provides that a member of a management committee (MC) shall cease to be a member of the committee if he absents himself from 3 or more consecutive meetings of the MC without the consent of the MC. Schedule 2 to the BMO also empowers an OC to remove a member of an MC from office by resolution. OCs and owners may deal with the failure of an MC member to perform his/her duties due to continuous absence from meetings in accordance with the above provisions. HAD does not have figures on continuous absence of MC members of OCs from meetings.

- (a) and (b) The expenditure for the District Services and Community Care Teams (Care Teams) for 2023-24 was originally estimated at \$226 million on the assumption that the 452 Care Teams in the 18 districts would be launched concurrently in April 2023. Given that the Care Teams in the Southern and Tsuen Wan Districts were first set up in early May 2023, while those in the remaining 16 districts were launched in the third quarter of the same year, the Home Affairs Department (HAD) adjusted the revised estimated expenditures for Care Teams for 2023-24 and the estimated expenditure for 2024-25 to reflect the actual circumstances and the provision required for the phased formation of Care Teams in the 18 districts. The total annual provision of \$226 million to be disbursed to the 452 Care Teams in the 18 districts for the two-year period of the funding agreement will remain unchanged as in the original estimate.

- (c) The Government provides some of the resources required by Care Teams. The funding for each Care Team for the two-year period of the funding agreement ranges from about \$0.8 million to \$1.2 million, depending on the service proposals submitted and the key performance indicators set for the Care Team concerned. The Government also encourages the operating organisations of Care Teams to make use of sponsorship, donations or internal resources to provide services. Through their district networks, these associations have unique advantages in promoting district-based cultural, recreational and sports activities and encouraging active participation of members of the public in the community. In order to support the day-to-day operation of these associations and encourage them to organise more district activities, the Home Affairs Department has implemented the Community Sports Subvention Scheme and the Community Arts Subvention Scheme, under which an annual provision of up to \$150,000 is provided to each DSA and DAA to support their operating expenses and finance their activities. The list of the 21 DSAs and 21 DAAs is at Annex. In 2023-24, the total amounts of subvention for the 2 schemes were \$3 million and \$2.7 million per year respectively.

In order to properly implement the activities and programmes to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the founding of our country, the Chief Executive has instructed the Chief Secretary for Administration (CS) to lead bureaux and departments in making preparations for the National Day celebrations. In this connection, CS gave instructions at the meetings of the Steering Committee on District Governance and the Task Force on District Governance held in January 2024, asking all bureaux and departments to make concerted efforts to plan and take forward the preparatory work for the National Day celebrations on all fronts, with a view to creating a colourful and enthusiastic National Day atmosphere and cultivating people's sense of patriotism at different levels of the community.

Apart from the key programmes such as the annual large-scale National Day reception, flag-raising ceremony, variety show and fireworks display, all bureaux and their departments will also plan an array of celebration activities rich in content and diversity under their respective work areas, with a view to enabling more members of the public from different backgrounds and age groups to take part in the celebration activities and share the joy of the

National Day. In addition, the 18 District Offices of the Home Affairs Department (HAD) will organise key National Day celebration events with local characteristics in various districts to share the joy with the public. Apart from fostering patriotic sentiments, the Government will also organise a series of thematic National Day celebration activities to showcase to all visitors from the Mainland and other places the unique advantages and attractions of Hong Kong in terms of the staunch support we receive from the Motherland and our global outlook.

Moreover, bureaux and departments will plan for displays of a wider variety of publicity materials in celebration of the 75th anniversary of the founding of the PRC at the venues and buildings under their management, and step up the scale and creativity of their festive decorations at popular and iconic locations, so as to jointly foster an intense festive ambience, promote the spirit of patriotism and mobilise the active participation of all sectors of the community in celebrating the National Day together.

As for expenditure and manpower, bureaux and departments will organise the activities with their existing resources. In 2024-25, the estimated expenditure for HAD on organising key celebration events for the 75th anniversary of the founding of the PRC is about \$27 million. The work will be undertaken by existing staff.

- (a) As announced by the Chief Executive in the 2023 Policy Address, the Home Affairs Department (HAD) launched the Clansmen Culture Promotion Scheme (the Scheme) in the first quarter of 2024. The Scheme, which will run for a period of 3 years with a total funding of \$30 million earmarked for application by clansmen associations to organise activities promoting hometown culture, aims to

deepen the public's understanding of and sense of belonging to their hometowns, thereby fostering the spirit of loving the motherland, Hong Kong and their hometowns. Any locally registered clansmen associations which have all along been committed to promoting hometown culture and fostering exchanges between Hong Kong and hometowns in order to promote the spirit of loving the motherland, Hong Kong and hometowns, and with experience in organising relevant activities are eligible to apply for the Scheme.

- (b) and (c) HAD and District Offices have been maintaining close liaison and collaboration with clansmen associations and various district organisations to promote their participation in community work and to engage them in building a harmonious society. At present, members of the District Committees of the 18 districts, including the District Fight Crime Committees, the District Fire Safety Committees and the Areas Committees, come from different sectors of the community, many of whom are members of the local community with clansmen association and district organisation backgrounds. HAD also implements the Community Involvement Programme through which eligible organisations, including clansmen associations and district organisations, may apply for funding support to organise projects featuring local characteristics, festive celebrations as well as cultural, artistic and recreational activities to promote district harmony.

Reply:

Starting from 2024-25, the Home Affairs Department (HAD) will implement the following initiatives to further facilitate the integration of ethnic minorities into the community: (1) setting up 2 additional support service centres for ethnic minorities (EM centres), 1 in Kowloon Central and 1 in New Territories East; (2) inviting each of the 10 EM centres (including the 2 additional centres mentioned above) in the territory to set up 1 Ethnic Minority Care Team; (3) regularising the services provided by EM centres for ethnic minority new arrivals and youths; and (4) regularising activities held at the district level to facilitate communication and exchange between ethnic minorities and local communities. The estimated annual expenditure on the above measures is \$44.15 million for 2024-25. HAD will implement the above measures with existing manpower.

To help new arrivals from the Mainland (NAs) integrate into the community, HAD provides a number of key services, including the District-based Integration Programme, under which a range of activities are organised to help NAs enhance their understanding of the community and establish mutual help networks; the Ambassador Scheme, under which persons with

similar backgrounds and experience to those of NAs are appointed as Ambassadors to reach out to NAs to introduce public services; the Expectation Management Programmes implemented in the Mainland, under which activities are organised for Mainland residents applying for settlement in Hong Kong to enable them to have a better understanding of Hong Kong; and the Neighbourhood Mutual Help Programme, under which non-governmental organisations (NGOs) are provided with funding to organise various activities to facilitate the integration of NAs and ethnic minorities into the local community. HAD also conducts quarterly questionnaire surveys on NAs to identify their service needs and uploads the survey reports to HAD's website for reference of relevant Government departments, NGOs and local organisations; and co-ordinates with relevant Government departments and NGOs to update and publish the Service Handbook for New Arrivals regularly. HAD will continue to monitor the service needs of NAs and consider rolling out new policy initiatives in a timely manner to facilitate their integration into the community.

Reply:

- (a) The Government delineates the 18 districts into 452 sub-districts, and 1 District Services and Community Care Team (Care Team) is set up in each sub-district. The 452 Care Teams in the 18 districts were fully launched in the third quarter of 2023. Care Teams are service teams that support the Government's district work and strengthen district networks. They organise caring activities such as visiting or reaching out to elderly households and other households in need in the sub-districts, establishing contacts, providing households with basic services and information, and assisting in arranging household services or other support services. Care Teams also assist in handling incidents and emergencies, and help the Government disseminate information to the public.

Care Teams have visited more than 30 000 elderly households and other households in need, and provided over 7 000 times of basic home/other support services for them since they started to come into operation. On policy promotion, Care Teams in the 18 districts actively participated in publicising the 2023 District Council Ordinary Election by organising a total of about 20 publicity activities between November and December 2023, during which promotional leaflets were distributed to members of the public and business operators at markets, shopping centres, restaurants, etc. in various districts to appeal to electors to vote. In addition, Care Teams rendered support services during typhoons in the second half of 2023, which include providing support for the operation of temporary shelters, disseminating typhoon-related information to residents through established communication networks and participating in relief work.

- (b) and (c) The Government provides some of the resources required by Care Teams. The funding for each Care Team for the two-year period of the funding agreement ranges from about \$0.8 million to \$1.2 million, depending on the service proposals submitted and the key performance indicators (KPIs) set for the Care Team concerned. The Government also encourages the operating organisations of Care Teams to make use of sponsorship, donations or internal resources to provide services. The Home Affairs Department (HAD)'s revised estimated expenditure on Care Teams for 2023-24 is about \$96 million and the estimated expenditure for 2024-25 is \$181 million. Regarding manpower, HAD carried out the work relating to Care Teams using the resources available in 2022-23, and a total of 25 time-limited civil service posts will be created in 2023-24 and 2024-25, incurring an annual expenditure of about \$22 million.

The estimated number of community involvement (CI) projects in 2024 is higher than that in 2023. The increase is mainly attributed to the cessation of transfer of fund to the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) for organising CI projects since 2024. Under the new financial arrangement, the estimated number of CI projects implemented by LCSD will be included in the estimated number of projects under Head 63 — Home Affairs Department. As the number of CI activities implemented by LCSD, such as sports training courses, cultural, arts and recreational activities, is high, there will be a substantial increase in the estimated number of projects in 2024. Regarding the number of participants, the activities organised by LCSD, such as sports training courses, are generally small-scale activities, while the activities organised by District Offices using CI fund, such as major celebratory and signature district events, are usually large-scale ones. Hence, the increase in the estimated number of participants will not be as substantial as that in the estimated number of CI projects in 2024.

No speaking engagement sponsorship was involved.
2. To step up external promotion of Hong Kong, ISD will launch a new sponsored overseas speaking engagement programme, under which sponsorship will be provided to renowned academics, leaders or experts in their respective industries, sectors or professions to speak at Hong Kong SAR Government-supported events held abroad, such as conferences, forums, summits and receptions. To tell the good stories of Hong Kong, the Information Services Department (ISD) has been adopting various publicity measures to promote the advantages, potentials and opportunities of Hong Kong in the overseas and Mainland regions. The major measures in 2023-24 include collaborating with major local, Mainland and international media to produce publicity content and place advertisement; using multimedia channels and networks, such as promotion via social media and digital platforms; holding roving overseas exhibitions to showcase the appeal of Hong Kong through art technology; partnering with mega event organisers to promote Brand Hong Kong; making tailor-made arrangements for prominent political, business and media leaders from the Mainland and overseas to visit Hong Kong on sponsorship. These visitors can see for themselves the latest developments in the city, and bring home the good stories of Hong Kong. ISD will continue to implement relevant publicity measures to promote Hong Kong in the coming year.

Since most of the publicity measures are carried out in the overseas and Mainland markets at the same time with some applicable to both markets, we are not able to provide the relevant costs separately.

The Information Services Department (ISD) has been monitoring public opinions expressed on major social media platforms, including Facebook, Instagram and YouTube, to help bureaux and departments stay abreast of public sentiments on subjects under their purview and make timely responses and clarifications as appropriate. Hong Kong and the Mainland are closely connected with a growing number of Mainland netizens sharing and discussing government policies and the social situation in Hong Kong. There is a need for the ISD to expand the scope of its public opinion monitoring to cover popular Mainland social media platforms such as Weibo, Xiaohongshu and Douyin, so as to grasp online public opinions in a timely manner.

The ISD utilises outsourced services making use of advanced tools such as big data analytics and computer programmes to monitor social media platforms for discussions relating to the work of the HKSAR Government, with the help of human input for analysis and compilation for enhanced accuracy and reliability. We have put aside around \$2 million for monitoring Mainland social media platforms in the 2024-25 financial year. The department will continue to procure social media monitoring services from the market in light of circumstances with appropriate service period, and the outsourced company will make its own manpower plans according to work requirements.

The ISD has been monitoring media reports and messages posted on major social media platforms at the headquarters level and through Information Officers stationed at various bureaux and departments. This is part of the day-to-day work of our staff and we are not able to single out the exact manpower involved and expenses incurred.

Reply:

1. The Ping Wo Fund (PWF) has been funding 4 counselling and treatment centres to provide telephone counselling, face-to-face counselling and other professional treatment services for people with gambling disorders and those affected by them (mainly family members of people with gambling disorders). Figures on enquiries received by the 4 counselling and treatment centres through the PWF gambling counselling hotline in the past 3 years are tabulated below:

Note 1: In recent years, people having gambling-related problems tend to make enquiry and seek assistance through text messages via instant messaging applications and social platforms.

2. During the peak seasons of mega football events, it is strategically important to raise public awareness of gambling-related problems. During the 2024 UEFA European Championship, the PWF will launch territory-wide anti-gambling publicity and public education campaign to not only raise public awareness of the problems arising from gambling addiction but also promote the message of “healthy living, no gambling”. A total of \$6 million has been earmarked under the PWF to take forward the above campaign. During the UEFA European Championship, the 4 counselling and treatment centres funded by the PWF will enhance their services in a targeted manner, particularly in terms of the support for the counselling hotline calls and text messages services.
3. At present, pursuant to the Betting Duty Ordinance (Cap. 108), the Government authorises the Hong Kong Jockey Club (HKJC) to conduct horse race betting, football betting and the Mark Six Lottery. The purpose of authorising the HKJC to provide legal betting means is to address the public demand for the betting activities concerned which would otherwise turn to illegal operators. A number of conditions have been imposed under the relevant betting licences issued to the HKJC to require its adoption of measures to minimise the negative impact of gambling on the public, especially young people. These conditions include that the HKJC shall not accept bets from juveniles; shall not accept credit betting; must display notices reminding the public of the seriousness of gambling addiction and provide information on the services available for those with gambling disorder; and shall not, in conducting any promotional activities, target juveniles, exaggerate the likelihood of winning or impliedly suggest that betting is a source of income, etc.

Reply:

The Government established the Ping Wo Fund (PWF) in 2003 to finance preventive and remedial measures to address the gambling-related problems. To raise public awareness of the problems arising from gambling addiction, the PWF has been promoting anti-gambling messages to the public, including young people, through public education and publicity activities.

Regarding counselling and treatment, the PWF has been funding 4 counselling and treatment centres to provide telephone counselling, face-to-face counselling and other professional treatment services for people with gambling disorders and those affected by them (mainly family members of people with gambling disorders). The service targets of the 4 counselling and treatment centres also include people affected by illegal online gambling and emerging types of gambling activities.

As regards publicity and education, apart from publicity efforts made via traditional media (e.g. public transportation) as well as online and social media platforms, other initiatives include funding non-governmental organisations and schools to organise anti-gambling public education and publicity activities under the 2 annual funding schemes. To address the problems arising from illegal online gambling, the PWF has, since 2020, accorded priority



to funding activities related to the prevention of online gambling behaviours, and encouraged applicant organisations to organise activities that raise public awareness of the risks involved in various emerging gambling channels. Moreover, the PWF has enhanced publicity on the harms of gambling at school and community levels through the No-Gambling Publicity Truck, and promoted ways to prevent and alleviate gambling-related problems (including those arising from illegal online gambling and emerging types of gambling activities).

The PWF will keep in close view the gambling situation in Hong Kong, maintain liaison and coordination with relevant departments including the Hong Kong Police Force, and take necessary enhanced action to prevent and alleviate gambling-related problems accordingly.

Please advise this Committee on how the Government monitors the operation and management, such as the levels of management fees and maintenance fees, of youth hostels upon their commissioning so as to maintain a good living environment at low rents for young people.

Reply:

Among the current 7 youth hostel projects whose construction is fully funded by the Government, 2 commenced operation upon completion of construction in 2020 and 2023 respectively. Under the policy framework of the Youth Hostel Scheme (YHS), non-governmental organisations (NGOs) operate youth hostels, after their construction is completed, on a self-financing basis and are required to, inter alia, charge youth tenants rents not exceeding 60% of the market levels and bear the relevant maintenance fees.

To ensure that each youth hostel is developed and operated in accordance with the policy objectives of the YHS, NGOs are governed by Grant and Operation Agreements (GOA) and the land leases concerned. The GOA sets out the parameters under which NGOs must manage and maintain their youth hostels. For example, NGOs are required to establish a mandatory reserve at a level sufficient to cover the maintenance costs for their hostels during the lease terms. We will keep in view the implementation progress and effectiveness of the YHS, as well as the operation of the hostels which have commenced services, to ensure that the youth hostels meet the policy objectives of the YHS.

Regarding the Women Empowerment Fund established in June last year, please advise on the details of the projects approved so far, including but not limited to the respective organisations/groups and the names, themes, content designs and funding amounts of the projects.

Reply:

Established in June 2023, the Women Empowerment Fund (WEF) aims to empower women, regardless of their age, occupation, background, etc., to realise their full potentials in their respective arenas, ultimately achieving the goal of promoting women's development in Hong Kong. In 2023-24, 145 projects were approved under the WEF and the funding involved was about \$21.38 million.

Projects under the WEF are categorised into general projects and thematic projects. For approved general projects, their themes include assisting women in accomplishing transformations in the job market; enhancing women's physical and mental health; helping women to cope with different roles in family and society; motivating women to enhance their personal attributes, achieve full potential and reach out to help others in society; and facilitating the use of new information and communication technology. The funded organisations are required to devise projects according to users' actual needs, and such projects can be in the form of workshops, training courses, talks, practice sessions, etc. The thematic projects of 2023-24 referred to the "Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Exchange Programme" (Exchange Programme), which aimed to promote women's development by broadening their horizons, deepening their understanding of our country's development, and enabling them to have exchanges with local people. Each Exchange Programme comprised a briefing, an exchange tour and a sharing session.

All the funded organisations are non-profit-making women's organisations and non-governmental organisations. The list of funded organisations and projects is available on the WEF website. The number of projects and funding amounts by category are as follows:

Reply:

The series of activities of the Day x Night Vibes @ 18 Districts organised by the District Offices of the Home Affairs Department (HAD) in the first half of this year mainly aim to provide the public with a wide range of cultural and leisure events to showcase local diversity or traditional cultural connotations in various districts, so as to promote a vibrant atmosphere in the community.

The series of activities, which have been rolled out progressively since late January this year, take various forms, ranging from bazaar carnivals, artwork exhibitions and musical performances to sports experiences. The activities have successfully boosted the atmosphere in the community and attracted many members of the public to take photos at the events and enjoy the joyful atmosphere. Feedback from the stall operators has also been generally positive, indicating that there has been a high patronage and the activities have helped promote their business. The themes, scale and duration of the activities vary. Taking individual bazaar carnivals as an example, the bazaar in Kwun Tong recorded 800 000 visitors in 23 days, the one in Wong Tai Sin had 114 000 visitors in 3 days and the one in Yuen Long had 120 000 visitors in 3 days. Stall operators of the bazaars generally expressed satisfaction with their sales, but did not disclose actual profits due to commercial considerations.

HAD implements the series of activities of the Day x Night Vibes @ 18 Districts with its existing resources and manpower. Hence, a breakdown of the expenditure involved is not available.

- (b) What are the details of the activities?

Reply:

The 1st October 2024 marks the 75th anniversary of the founding of the People's Republic of China (PRC), which manifests the glorious achievements of our country from standing up, prospering to becoming strong under the leadership of the Communist Party of China, thereby building China into a great modern socialist country in all respects and promoting the great rejuvenation of the Chinese nation. In order to properly implement the activities and programmes to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the founding of our country, the Chief Executive has instructed the Chief Secretary for Administration (CS) to lead bureaux and departments in making preparations for the National Day celebrations. In this connection, CS gave instructions at the meetings of the Steering Committee on District Governance and the Task Force on District Governance held in January 2024, asking all bureaux and departments to make concerted efforts to plan and take forward the preparatory work for the National Day celebrations on all fronts, with a view to creating a colourful and enthusiastic National Day atmosphere and cultivating people's sense of patriotism at different levels of the community.

Apart from the key programmes such as the annual large-scale National Day reception, flag-raising ceremony, variety show and fireworks display, all bureaux and their departments

will also plan an array of celebration activities rich in content and diversity under their respective work areas, with a view to enabling more members of the public from different backgrounds and age groups to take part in the celebration activities and share the joy of the National Day. As stated in Programme (2) of the Home Affairs Department, the Government has planned to strengthen support services for ethnic minorities, including setting up 2 additional support service centres for ethnic minorities (EM centres), setting up an Ethnic Minority Care Team (EM Care Team) in each EM centre, regularising the enhanced services provided by EM centres for ethnic minority new arrivals and youths, and the District-based Programmes for Racial Harmony. In this connection, please inform this Committee of the following:

- (a) How many EM centres funded by the Government are there in Hong Kong at present? Please provide details of their locations, operating organisations and operation periods, the annual funding involved and the number of service recipients.
- (b) Please provide details of the 2 additional EM centres, including their locations and expected dates of establishment.
- (c) How many EM Care Teams are set up in the EM centres funded by the Government in the territory at present? What are the specific areas of work of the EM Care Teams?

Reply:

- (a) The Home Affairs Department (HAD) has commissioned non-profit-making organisations to run 8 support service centres for ethnic minorities (EM centres) in Wan Chai, Yau Tsim Mong, Sham Shui Po, Kwun Tong, Yuen Long, Tuen Mun, Kwai Tsing and Tung Chung to provide language classes, interest classes, after-school tutorial classes, youth activities, integration programmes, etc. for ethnic minorities to facilitate their integration into the community. Among these centres, the CHEER Centre in Kwun Tong also provides general interpretation and translation services of English and 8 ethnic minority languages (i.e. Bahasa Indonesia, Hindi, Nepali, Punjabi, Tagalog, Thai, Urdu and Vietnamese) in non-specialised/non-professional areas. The information on the 8 EM centres is set out in the Annex.

- (b) To enhance support services for ethnic minorities, HAD plans to set up 2 additional EM centres in Kowloon Central (covering Kowloon City and Wong Tai Sin) and New Territories East (covering Sai Kung and Tseung Kwan O), which are expected to commence service in the fourth quarter of 2024.
- (c) The service targets of the District Services and Community Care Teams (Care Teams) in the 18 districts include ethnic minorities. However, due to language and culture differences with ethnic minorities, HAD plans to set up 1 Ethnic Minority Care Team (EM Care Team) mainly constituted by ethnic minorities in each of the 8 existing EM centres and the 2 new centres to better serve ethnic minorities. These EM Care Teams are expected to commence service within this year.

Through the networks in the local ethnic minority communities and referrals from Care Teams, EM Care Teams will visit ethnic minority households, establish connections with them, disseminate important government information to them, understand their needs, familiarise them with public/social welfare/healthcare services and those services provided by Care Teams/EM centres, and assist in referring their cases to relevant departments or organisations for arrangement of professional services. In addition, EM Care Teams will collaborate with the District Offices and Care Teams in various districts. Care Teams in the 18 districts may refer cases to EM Care Teams for follow-up when encountering difficulties in serving ethnic minorities. EM Care Teams will also provide assistance for those ethnic minorities affected by accidents, emergencies or disastrous events.

- (a) The relevant information pertaining to the number of existing fishermen villages, their locations, reasons for building the villages, year of completion, present population, number of buildings therein and their average size, and ownership of the land of such village sites.
- (b) For fishermen villages under different ownership, what are the application procedures when they are to carry out various types of maintenance and improvement of ancillary facilities in the villages? Does the Government currently have any schemes or funds to provide assistance for these maintenance and improvement works?
- (c) In the past 5 years (2019-20 to 2023-24), has the Government provided any support for maintenance works in fishermen villages? What are the expenditure involved and the details?
- (d) Some fishermen have pointed out that some fishermen villages are still faced with inconvenient water and electricity supply, lack of individual toilet facilities and dilapidation despite the Government's effort to assist in their restoration through minor works programmes or other works. Will the Government review the situation in order to render genuinely suitable assistance to them?

Reply:

- (a) Details about existing fishermen villages based on information available to District Offices (DOs) are at Annex. With regard to details on the number and size of buildings, land ownership, etc. of fishermen villages which involve lands matters, the Home Affairs Department (HAD) does not have the information.

- (b) HAD provides funding for carrying out minor works to upgrade the infrastructure and improve the living environment of the rural community mainly through the Rural Public Works programme and the District Minor Works programme. DOs would collect views from local organisations and individuals, including Rural Committees and villagers, through various channels with a view to identifying minor works projects for the benefit of the local community.
- (c) During the period from 2019-20 to 2023-24 (as at the end of February 2024), HAD carried out a total of 45 minor improvement and maintenance works projects for various fishermen villages in Kwai Tsing, North, Sai Kung, Tai Po and Yuen Long districts. The works comprised mainly improvement and maintenance of access roads and storm water drains, involving a total cost of about \$14.39 million.
- (d) Matters such as supply of electricity and potable water, and provision of toilet facilities are outside the ambit of HAD. DOs would refer the requests to relevant departments for consideration and follow-up actions.

Question:

The Government launched the Private Street Resumption Programme (the Programme) targeting 166 private streets as early as 1986. However, only 70 streets were resumed and the remaining 96 streets were deleted from the Programme for various reasons when it officially ended in 2020. At present, private streets still create many problems, including illegal occupation, obstruction of access for emergency and rescue services, poor hygiene and disputes over maintenance. For instance, the road surfaces of some private streets damaged during the torrential rain last September were left unrepaired for quite some time. Would the Government inform this Committee of the following:

- (a) Taking the Eastern and Wan Chai Districts as an example, the then Private Street Resumption Committee had pointed out that 16 out of the 24 private streets deleted from the Programme could not be resumed due to the problem of protruding balconies above the private streets. The Government had considered issuing individual licences to confirm the legality of the overhanging structures of the buildings on those streets, but eventually failed to do so due to the lack of manpower. Did the Government assess the amount of manpower required for resuming a private street with the problem of protruding balconies at that time? If there is sufficient manpower, will resumption operations be re-activated for individual private streets?
- (b) The Programme ended in 2020 and the Government indicated that there was no plan to re-activate the Programme at that time. If it is the wish of the owners of individual private streets that the Government should review afresh the resumption of their streets due to change in circumstances, will the Government conduct new surveys and consultations on the intention of owners regarding the resumption of individual streets, and re-examine the cases with a view to tackling and solving the legal problems leading to the failed attempts to resume the private streets then?
- (c) In recent years, disputes over private streets occur not only in rural villages in the New Territories but also in busy areas of Hung Hom from time to time, leading to the closure of the only or main passageway for some building users who do not have access rights to the private streets concerned, resulting in disputes such as overcharging of access fees

and obstruction of access. Will the Government review the existing policies or laws, or take any action to assist the persons affected and prevent the occurrence of the above situation?

Reply:

The Government launched the Private Street Resumption Programme (the Programme) in 1986 to co-ordinate departmental efforts in resuming private streets. The Programme aimed to improve the conditions of private streets with environmental hygiene problems through resumption of the streets under the Roads (Works, Use and Compensation) Ordinance (Cap. 370) and on the premise that the Government would not be required to pay any compensation for the resumption. The Programme was introduced in 1986 and officially ended in December 2020. Of the 166 private streets included under the Programme, 70 streets were resumed and the remaining 96 streets were deleted from the Programme for various reasons, including the street conditions having improved, or the involvement of compensation claims in the resumption, which was contrary to the policy principle of the Programme.

Private streets are private properties, the management and maintenance of which are land owners' responsibilities. Under normal circumstances, the Government will not be involved in the management of private properties, including private streets. The Government will only consider providing assistance to property owners under very exceptional circumstances and where significant public interest is involved.

Resumption of private streets is not the only way to improve the management and environmental conditions of the streets. The owners are in the best position to manage the private streets to protect their own interests. The departments concerned will continue to co-ordinate their efforts in improving the conditions of the streets as necessary depending on the actual circumstances.

- (a) The Home Affairs Department (HAD) set up dedicated help desks in the 18 districts on 12 and 13 September 2023 to assist members of the public who experienced financial difficulties due to Typhoon Saola and torrential rain to fill in application forms for the emergency relief funds provided by government departments and specified charity groups. The number of applications received by the help desks in the 18 districts on those 2 days is set out in the Annex.
- (b) and (c) The total number of applications for the General Chinese Charities Fund (GCCF) and the Special Aid Fund (SAF) received by HAD from the dedicated help desks

in the 18 districts and other sources in relation to Typhoon Saola and the subsequent torrential rain is 1 759, of which 1 583 applications were approved, involving a total grant of about \$4.8 million.

- (d) HAD has not identified any suspected fraudulent cases among the applications for the GCCF and SAF.

The Home Affairs Department (HAD) has commissioned non-governmental organisations to run 8 support service centres for ethnic minorities (EM centres) in Wan Chai, Yau Tsim Mong, Sham Shui Po, Kwun Tong, Yuen Long, Tuen Mun, Kwai Tsing and Tung Chung to provide various support services for EMs to facilitate their integration into the community. The EM centres provide services on a territory-wide basis for target users in all districts. The statistics on population of EMs (excluding foreign domestic helpers) by district based on the 2021 Population Census are set out in **Annex A**.

The gross floor area of the EM centres and the number of service recipients from 2018-19 project year to 2022-23 project year are set out in **Annex B** and **Annex C** respectively. HAD does not have information on the net operating floor area or net usable floor area of the EM centres.

The series of activities of the Day x Night Vibes @ 18 Districts organised by the District Offices of the Home Affairs Department (HAD) in the first half of this year mainly aim to provide the public with a wide range of cultural and leisure events to showcase local diversity or traditional cultural connotations in various districts, so as to promote a vibrant atmosphere in the community. The activities have been rolled out progressively since late January this year. More than 20 of them were organised as at the end of March. A breakdown by district is provided in the table below:

The activities take various forms, ranging from bazaar carnivals, artwork exhibitions and musical performances to sports experiences. They have successfully boosted the atmosphere in the community and attracted many members of the public to take photos at the events and enjoy the joyful atmosphere. Feedback from the stall operators has also been generally positive, indicating that there has been a high patronage and the activities have helped promote their business. The themes, scale and duration of the activities vary. Taking individual bazaar carnivals as an example, the bazaar in Kwun Tong recorded 800 000 visitors in 23 days, the one in Wong Tai Sin had 114 000 visitors in 3 days and the one in Yuen Long had 120 000 visitors in 3 days. Stall operators of the bazaars generally expressed satisfaction with their sales, but did not disclose actual profits due to commercial considerations.

HAD implements the series of activities of the Day x Night Vibes @ 18 Districts with its existing resources and manpower. Hence, a breakdown of the expenditure involved is not available.
