Reply :

In order to provide a wider choice to prospective home buyers and to promote home ownership more cost-effectively, the Government has decided to embark on a partial shift in the provision of public housing assistance from the conventional 'bricks and mortar' approach to the use of housing loans.

Agreement has been reached with the Housing Authority (HA) to reduce subsidised home ownership flat production by 4,000, 5,000, 6,000 and 6,000 units in each of the four years starting from 2003-04 to 2006-07. The mix between housing loans and subsidised home ownership flat production will be reviewed annually, and rolled forward.

The HA will provide sufficient loans to replace the reduction of subsidised home ownership flat production so that the Government's pledge of providing housing assistance to 50,000 families a year will be fulfilled. The Government remains fully committed to reducing the average waiting time for public rental housing and promoting wider home ownership.

The Government will offer additional land for sale to the private sector, starting from 2000-01, so that the extra demand for private housing can be met. The first batch of sites has already been included in the Land Sale Programme for 2000-01.

The administrative details of providing additional loans will be worked out between the Housing Authority and the Housing Bureau.

The cost of co-ordinating the formulation of the details of the scheme will be absorbed by existing resources in the Housing Bureau, the Housing Department, the Planning Department and the Lands Department.

The reduction of operating expenses by \$8.8M in 2000-01 is the result of deletion of posts detailed at (a) above and other expenditure savings under the Enhanced Productivity Programme through reduction in acting allowance and mileage claims, stricter control and economy on the use of stores and equipment etc. in the Clearance Sub-section, Temporary Housing Clearance Sub-section and Squatter Control Sub-section. The level of services provided by the squatter control offices and clearance offices will not be affected by the reduction in operating expenses.

(c) Squatter clearances are undertaken by the Clearance Subsection which is also responsible for rehousing victims of natural disasters and people affected by government operations such as land resumption and clearances for public development and demolition of unauthorised rooftop structures. All expenditure involved in pre-clearance surveys for squatter clearances has been absorbed in the operating expenses of the Clearance Sub-section. For 1999-2000, the estimated operating expenses for Clearance Sub-section is \$147.57M. It is estimated that the operating expenses for 2000-01 for the Clearance Sub-section will be \$129.67M.

(d) All expenditure for squatter clearance operations (including clearance of Diamond Hill squatter areas) are absorbed in the operating expenses of Clearance Sub-section. As for the payment of ex-gratia allowance to the business operators affected by the clearance of squatter areas at Diamond Hill, an amount of \$25M has been reserved under Head 701 (Lands Department) for the purpose.

Reply:

The Government fully shares the community's concern over the quality of public housing. The Housing Authority has completed a comprehensive review of the situation and, having held wide discussions with various stakeholders in the past few months, has drawn up measures to improve public housing quality. A public consultation document entitled "Quality Housing: Partnering for Change", which proposes 40 major recommendations to enhance building quality, was published and the consultation period will end on 31 March 2000. Following this, the Housing Authority will work out a plan for implementing the recommendations, and will assess the financial implications.

2. Interim feedback from the consultation indicates strong support for some of the recommendations which the Housing Authority is likely to implement in 2000-01. These are :

- (a) to lengthen the Defect Liability Period from one year to two years in all new building tenders;
- (b) to extend the construction period for piling and building contracts by one month and two months respectively;
- (c) to deploy resident engineers to all piling sites to strengthen supervision;
- (d) to require the use of sonic tubes in large diameter bored piles to facilitate 100% core testing when necessary; and
- (e) to improve the weighted scoring system for assessing consultancy projects by adjusting the weighting between technical score and fee score for Quantity Surveying Consultancy from 50:50 to 70:30.

This accounts for about 56% of the total number of public rental units available for allocation in the period.

Reply :

The purpose of the 13-year flat production programme, maintained by the Housing Bureau, is to enable effective monitoring of the annual supply of flats to meet housing demand.

The programme is divided into three parts -

(a) the first three years, where land allocation is completed and construction is underway;

- (b) the subsequent five years, where sites are being prepared for allocation or sale for housing development; and
- (c) the last five years, where new areas capable of housing development are being identified.

A directorate officer has been designated as Project Director for every housing project in the flat production programme. Project Directors are responsible through their Heads of Department to the Secretary for Housing, and ultimately to the Financial Secretary as the Chairman of the Steering Committee on Land Supply for Housing (HOUSCOM), for the timely completion of housing projects under their supervision. They must keep to agreed production timetables and endeavour to resolve problems and delays at the district level. They may escalate any insurmountable difficulties at the district level to their Heads of Department and, if necessary, to the Secretary for Housing or the Secretary for Planning and Lands, as relevant, for quick resolution. HOUSCOM is the final decision-making body for problems on housing production which cannot otherwise be resolved.

A summary of the first three years of the current flat production programme is at Annex. From 1999-2000 onwards, we expect to meet our target of producing an average of 50 000 public housing flats a year, as well as making sufficient land and infrastructure available to meet the demand for private housing.

The flat production programme is drawn up by the Housing Bureau with the assistance of 23 Project Directors in the Housing Department, the Lands Department, the Planning Department and the Territory Development Department. Response to Phase Two of the Tenants Purchase Scheme is satisfactory. As at 14 March 2000, 16,442 offers to purchase, representing 60.5% of the 27,161 flats for sale, have been received from tenants. This is comparable to the initial response rate in Phase One at a similar stage, which was at 63.6%. To encourage more tenants to participate in Phase Two, the Housing Department will issue monthly newsletters to remind them of the impending expiry of the First Year Tenants Credit on 31 March 2000^{Note}.

2. The Housing Department will continue to issue newsletters and arrange more home visits in future to encourage tenants to participate in the Tenants Purchase Scheme.

- Question : Concerning "the number of people rehoused as a result of programmed squatter and unauthorised rooftop structure clearances or emergency clearance following natural disaster" (Indicator 1), it is noted that the actual number of people rehoused in 1999 was merely 4,500, just 30% of the planned number of 15,000. Since the approval of funding for the proposed consultancy study for overseas uncompleted residential properties in September 1999, the Housing Bureau has discussed the matter with the Estate Agents Authority (EAA). As many local estate agents are involved in the sale of overseas uncompleted residential properties, the EAA plans to conduct a similar study. We agree that the EAA is a suitable body to undertake this study because the EAA consists of large and small estate agents, developers, lawyers and a representative from the Consumer Council. There is no longer the need for the Government to utilise the approved fund.

- <u>Question</u>: The expenditure for Subhead 600 Works will increase substantially by almost 50 times in the coming year. What are the details of the works? What are the reasons for the substantial increase of almost 50 times?

Reply: Provision of \$23,900,000 under Subhead 600 Works for 2000-01 represents an increase of \$23,400,000 or about 47 times over the revised estimate for 1999-2000. This Subhead consists of only Item 253 – Demolition of six Temporary Housing Areas. The total demolition cost of 6 Temporary Housing Areas (THAs) namely Kai Lok THA, Kai Wo THA, Kai Yiu THA, Tsing On THA, Sha Kok Mei THA and Long Bin THA is estimated to be \$24,400,000. The cashflow of the total cost over 1999-2000 and 2000-01 is as follows:
