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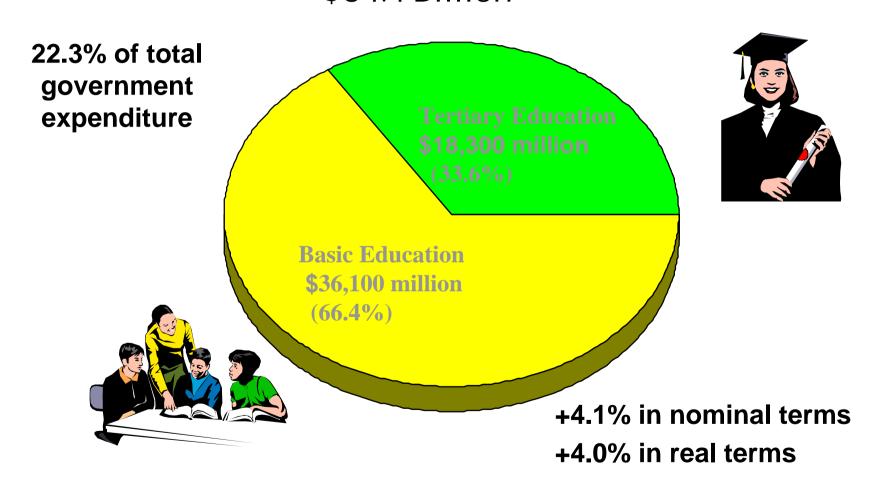

2000-01 Total Government Expenditure on Education \$54.4 Billion



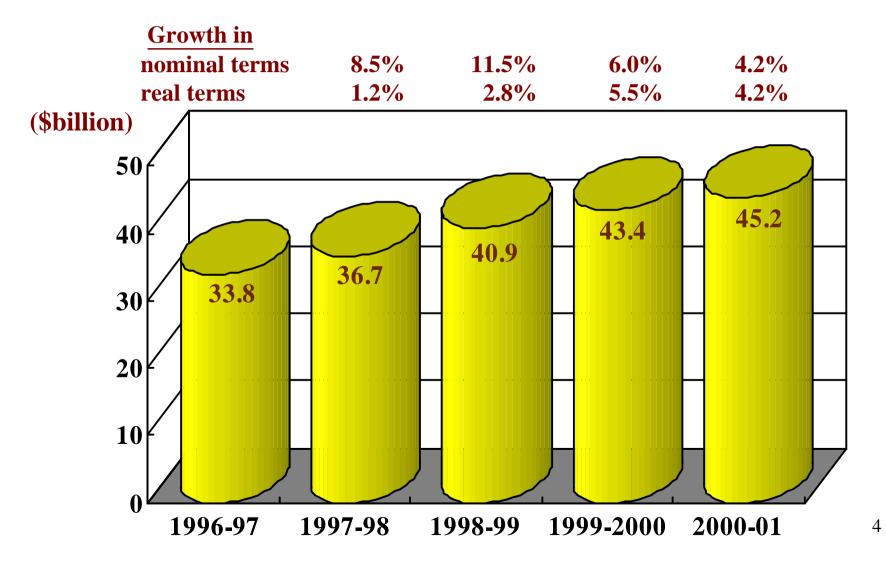
Total Expenditure on Education as a Percentage of Gross Domestic Product

(from 1996-97 to 2000-01)

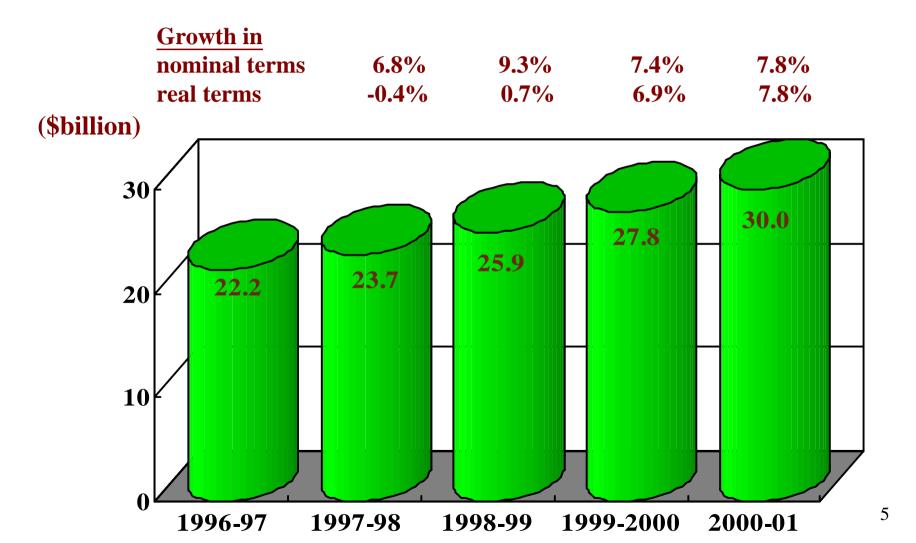

Total Recurrent Expenditure on Education

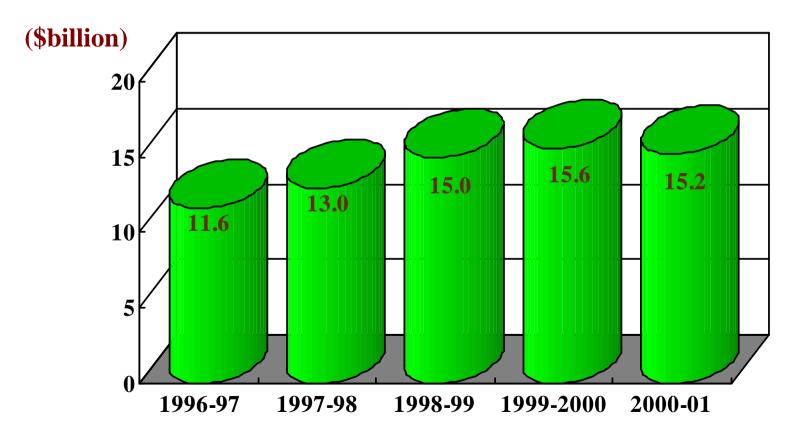


Recurrent Expenditure on Basic Education

Additional teaching support to primary schools since 1996/97

As a result of providing about 1 600 additional teachers under various initiatives, the student-teacher ratio in primary schools will be improved from 23.2:1 in 1996/97 school year to 21.6:1 in 2000/01 school year.

Additional teaching support to secondary schools since 1996/97

As a result of providing about 1 100 additional teachers under various initiatives, the student-teacher ratio in secondary schools will be improved from 19.5:1 in 1996/97 school year to 18.7:1 in 2000/01 school year.

Additional administrative and technical support to primary and secondary schools since 1996/97

About 100 additional clerical staff have been provided for schools with academically low achievers since 1996/97 school year.

To enhance the clerical provision for all primary and secondary schools commencing from 1998/99 school year. A total of about 1 000 clerical staff will have been provided up to 2000/01 school year.

Additional administrative and technical support to primary and secondary schools since 1996/97 (cont'd)

An annual supplementary grant of \$120,000 to each primary school and \$155,000 to each secondary school has been provided, commencing from 1999/2000 school year.

Transforming the subvention system

From 2000/01 school year, the Government will disburse the existing item-by-item non-salary grants to schools in the form of a single recurrent block grant. Schools will be able to use the funds within the block grant in a flexible manner and to retain any unspent funds for future use.

Additional Resources for 2000-01

- \$300 million to help people find jobs and encourage continuing education
- \$140 million to help needy students
- \$800 million to support education reform

Promote employment and encourage continuing education

- \$300 million of additional recurrent expenditure for the following 7 new initiatives:
 - 1. Continue the Youth Pre-employment Training Programme
 - 2. Arrange additional on-the-job training for trainees of the Youth Preemployment Training Programme
 - 3. Increase vocational training places for S3 and S5 school leavers
 - 4. Increase information technology training places for people of secondary school education level
 - 5. Launch the "Project Springboard" provide bridging programmes for S5 school leavers and adult learners
 - 6. Extend the Non-means Tested Loan Scheme
 - 7. Set up an on-line database for continuing education

1. Continue the Youth Pre-employment Training Programme

- We have earmarked \$80 million for the continuation of the Youth Pre-employment Training Programme:
 - Representing an increase of \$30 million over the existing provision
 - Provide pre-employment training and workplace attachment for over 10 000 young people
 - Will conduct a comprehensive review of the Programme and consult concerned organisations regarding the strengthening of future training
 - ➤ To launch this year's Programme in October

- 2. Arrange additional on-the-job training for trainees of the Youth Pre-employment Training Programme
 - We have earmarked \$26 million for the provision of additional on-the-job training for trainees:
 - ➤ Arrange trainees of the Youth Pre-employment Training Programme to receive on-the-job training at private companies/organisations of three months' duration
 - ➤ Employers have to commit to engaging the trainees for permanent jobs on satisfactory completion of the training and they will be granted a training subsidy by the Government at a rate of \$2,000 per trainee per month.
 - ➤ Will consult employers and other relevant parties on specific arrangements
 - On-the-job training will begin in May/June, about 4 000 trainees are expected to benefit.

3. Increase vocational training places for S3 and S5 school leavers

- We have earmarked \$55 million for the Vocational Training Council (VTC)
 - ➤ We will increase the number of places, from 800 to 1 300, for the Certificate in Vocational Studies course for S3 school leavers
 - ➤ We will increase the number of places, from 2 000 to 3 000, for the Foundation Diploma course for S5 school leavers
 - ➤ Aim to enhance the employability of trainees by providing them with training in vocational and general skills
 - ➤ Trainees with good performance may move up the training ladder and enrol in other courses offered by VTC

4. Increase IT training places for people of secondary school education level

- We have earmarked \$18 million for the Vocational Training Council (VTC) and the Employees Retraining Board (ERB)
 - Propose to provide 1 000 places for the IT Assistant Training Programme each year
 - ➤ The pilot course which commenced in February this year was well received and the number of places was increased from 170 to 300
 - ➤ The pilot course will become a regular programme and the number of places will increase substantially to meet the needs of job seekers and the industry
 - ➤ The course is a 10-week programme comprising 10 modules. Major contents include:
 - Basic IT skills
 - Maintenance and updating of web sites
 - Electronic commerce

- Computer graphics
- Internet support

5. Launch the "Project Springboard"

- We will provide new day or evening bridging programmes for secondary school leavers and adult learners to pursue continuing education
 - Organised by the Federation for Continuing Education in Tertiary Institutions
 - Some 5 500 places will be offered in the first year and will be increased according to demand
 - The programme is skill-based. It provides core subjects on Chinese, Putonghua, English, IT, quantitative skills, communication skills and electives on practical subjects
 - ➤ On completion of these programme, trainees may pursue courses at a higher level offered by the organiser or other institutions
 - ➤ The tuition fees for these self-financing programmes range from about \$2,500 to \$3,000 per module (at least 10 modules are required to complete the programme)
 - ➤ The programme will commence in October 2000

5. Launch the "Project Springboard" [Cont'd)

- We have earmarked \$60 million to encourage students to pursue the bridging programmes
 - ➤ Upon successful completion of each module, students will receive a reimbursement of 30% of the tuition fee
 - ◆ This subsidy scheme will be implemented on a pilot basis for three years. A comprehensive review will be conducted before the end of the period to evaluate its effectiveness
 - ➤ Other support measures include
 - Students may obtain a non-means tested loan to meet their tuition fees
 - An allocation of \$5 million to the Federation for curriculum development and relevant work
 - The Government will consider recognising the diploma of these bridging programmes as equivalent to satisfactory completion of S5 education in the recruitment for certain posts

6. Extend the Non-means Tested Loan Scheme

- To ensure that no one is deprived of continuing education opportunities for lack of financial means
 - ➤ To extend the scope of recognised institutions to include professional or continuing education courses provided locally by the following institutions
 - Non-local universities and professional bodies
 - Registered schools
 - Recognised training institutions
 - Criteria to recognise institutions are being drawn up
 - ➤ Eligible applicants estimated to increase from 200 000 to 700 000 people
 - Total annual loan estimated to be \$173 million

7. Set up a website on continuing education

- To set up a website on continuing education courses available in Hong Kong
 - Expected to be launched in July this year
 - Aspiring students and adult learners can browse the website for courses of their level and interest
 - ➤ To link up with major education and training institutions to provide a one-stop service

An additional \$140 million to help needy students

\$100 million (37% increase when compared with the expenditure in 1999-2000) to improve the School Textbook Assistance Scheme.

\$40 million (14% increase when compared with the expenditure in 1999-2000) to improve the Student Travel Subsidy Scheme.

Improvements to the School Textbook Assistance Scheme

- To apply 100% of the average costs of textbooks as a basis for grants for textbook for secondary students.
- To increase the non-textbook grant, with rates set at \$200 (half grant) and \$400 (full grant) per student per year, to help students pay for various types of stationery and non-tuition fees.
- Taking the two improvements together, full grant rates under the scheme will increase from \$422 to \$1,756 per student for various levels of study to \$864 to \$2,476 per student (increases ranging from 22% to 105%).
- Number of primary and secondary students to benefit totals 334 000.

Improvement to the Student Travel Subsidy Scheme

- ➤ Students aged 12 and above eligible for full grants under the student financial assistance schemes will receive full subsidy of the average fare. (At present they receive only 50% subsidy.)
- The average travel allowance per student per annum to increase from \$1,438 to \$2,876 for those eligible for full subsidy.
- About 28 000 students or 14% of successful applicants are expected to benefit from the improvement.

\$800 million additional resources to support education reform

- Early start on those recommendations of the Education Commission that the Government and the community consider to warrant priority action
- Expect the public, particularly those benefiting from the fruits of education, to shoulder a greater share of the substantial additional cost involved
